I am a long term resident of The Blue Mountains and been lucky enough to be employed up here for all of it, most of this time in tourism. I understand how important tourism is to the Blue Mountains but how vital it is that this is balanced with protecting the National Park, the World Heritage listing and the people who live up here.

The airstrip at Medlow Bath is of course attractive to tourist operators but is unlikely to create an increased tourist demand to the area just another attraction for people already up here to enjoy. It would definitely increase noise, pollution and negatively impact the quiet lifestyle people enjoy here and probably pose a risk to World Heritage listing.

Even ignoring those reasons the fact that the airstrip is on Crown Land should mean that it is precluded from exploitation of commercial operators looking for a quick profit. I also think that this land should be transferred to the National Park and protected forever with the one proviso of keeping the airstrip operational for emergency use only. I had friends lose houses in bushfires and the ability to have use of this airstrip could help mitigate these tragedies.

Please don't allow short term commercial interests to take precedence over the natural environment.

We note that the proposed lessees of the Katoomba Airfield state that helicopters and aircraft will not be flying over built up areas presumably to minimise noise and visual impacts. This proposed benefit has a cost for others. The blue line on maps tabled at community consultation meetings shows that the fight path from the airport passes to the northwest along the Grose Valley. This is a prime location for bushwalking and other outdoor activities. Bushwalking attracts many people to the Upper Blue Mountains and participants will be impacted upon visually and audibly by increased helicopter and light aircraft traffic.

From the airfield towards the North West, any increase in helicopter or light plane traffic impinges on the following areas:

- The iconic Grand Canyon Track is under 1km from the airfield. Noise generated at takeoff and landing approaches would affect the experience of those walking in this area
- The Blue Mountains are a premier destination in Australia for canyoning. The track to Juggler Canyon is opposite the airfield. Arethusa Canyon, Alpheus Canyon, Fortress Canyon, Butterbox Canyon, David Crevasse, Orunga Canyon, Dalpura Canyon, Birrabang Canyon, Koombamba Canyon, Wotta Canyon, Better Offer Canyon, Yileen Canyon and Hat Hill Canyon are all within two kilometres of the proposed flight path. Rick Jamieson's Canyons near Sydney, 5<sup>th</sup>Edition, is a guide to around 100 of the Blue Mountains more accessible canyons. It is sold at Blue Mountains outdoor activity shops and at the NPWS Centre at the end of Govetts Leap Road. A significant increase in traffic on the proposed flight path has a potential impact on the experience in 15% of accessible canyons if sound levels are not minimised or eliminated.
- The sides of the Grose valley are the sites of a large variety of lookouts. Many are easily accessible by tourists in their cars, primarily Evans Lookout, Govetts Leap Lookout, Pulpit Rock, Perry's Lookdown and Anvil Rock. Paths along the edge of the Grose from Evans to Pulpit Rock exploit a cliff edge location with stupendous views. Walkers access views in the valley at Baltzer Lookout, Lockleys Pylon, Mt Banks and Fortress Ridge. At the magnificent lookout of Anvil Rock, the views along three arms of the bottle shaped Grose Valley with the tower blocks of Sydney visible on a clear day are unrivalled. Helicopters and other aircraft will fly almost over the top of this lookout.
- The bottom of the Grose Valley is the site of a remote camp site. Paths lead to the bottom of the valley, through the Blue Gum forest and on to Mount Victoria. Perry's Lookdown, Rodriguez Pass, the Horse Track and Pierces Pass all lead walkers into and out of the valley. Mt Banks overlooking the Grose Valley and the site of the one of the Blue Mountains largest cliff faces could become a large echo chamber magnifying any sound.

The birthplace of the Blue Mountains National Park is the Blue Gum forest below Mt Banks. Almost 100 years ago, a group of bushwalkers intervened before trees were cleared to establish a walnut plantation.

The NSW National Parks and Wildlife Service makes the following comment about this special place:

The historical and natural significance of the mighty Blue Gum Forest can't be understated. It's spoken of in hushed tones by those who know of it, and once seen, is never forgotten.

Situated in Grose Valley, in the World Heritage-listed Blue Mountains National Park, this stand of magnificent eucalypts is a fine example of closed forest. A haven for birds and wildlife, it was saved from the axe by bushwalkers in the 1930s. These intrepid nature-lovers pooled resources and bought the forest to preserve it for future generations.

Any increase in volume of traffic along the Grose Valley has the potential to have an impact on the area's conservation values and, in particular, on those of us who enjoy bushwalking and other outdoor activities. 

I have witnessed joyflights in other areas of incredible beauty such Uluru and the Kings Canyon in Central Australia and I have always felt they are an intrusion and unjustified disruption to a peaceful scenery and the people who have come to enjoy the tranquillity of these ancient places.

The Blue Mountains are no exception. ## Reference: 602686 Proposed lease of Katoomba Airfield – submission

I object to the issuing of a long term commercial lease over Katoomba Airfield. I support the inclusion of Katoomba Airfield into the Blue Mountains National Park, to be managed only as an emergency airfield, with specific funding provided to the NPWS for management.

As a resident of the Blue Mountains I think there is already too much aircraft noise overhead from joy flights, and it is rarely policed, so basically it is a free for all to the detriment of the residents of the Blue Mountains and those who visit. The Fly Neighbourly Agreement of 1994 too, was unenforceable and unlikely to be enforceable now. I object to even more unenforced commercial flights being allowed in the area. The Blue Mountains is a World Heritage Park not a playground. Aircraft noise impacts on animals as well as people. The allowance of yet more aircraft will have adverse effects on the environment, flora and fauna, for example on migrating flocks of birds. Tourists on the ground have come to the Mountains for peace and quiet, for a picnic or bushwalking. Why should these people along with residents be subjected to unnecessary aircraft noise for the sake of a handful of tourists who can splash a bit of money around to see it from the air, and operators cashing in on the popularity of the area?

Previous use of the airfield for joy flights was heavily opposed by the community and the same applies now. This is a sensitive and valuable area appreciated by those who live here, and those who enjoy nature activities such as bushwalking. The Department should not be pandering to private operators at the expense of the broader community of the Blue Mountains.

In two previous assessments in 2000 and 2008 it was concluded that the land should not be privately leased but should be incorporated into the Blue Mountains National Park and used for emergency and bushfire operations only. This was supported by the Blue Mountains City Council and the National Parks and Wildlife Service.

Consultation with the community of the Blue Mountains for this new proposal has been totally inadequate. It appears the department has instead been promoting the proposal, for example supporting the operatos' wishywashy "green" arguments. There is nothing "green" about increased commercial flights over a national park and shame on the department for instituting a process which appears to favour the lease operators. I have lived in the vicinity of the airfield for over 20 years now and at first I did not feel the need to object to this proposal as when it was in operation in the past it had minimal impact on our environment and my own amenity. However, people and the nature of tourism has changed and the fact that this may be used for sight seeing and shuttling tourists back and forth really does change my outlook.

Firstly, we do not know that the conditions imposed will be policed and that the claims made by the applicants will be adhered to.



My family and I are residents of Wentworth Falls in the Blue Mountains. we are opposed to commercial helicopter tourism in the mountains. This is public land. The commercial tourist flight proposal provides little benefit for the public. It is better to remain as an occasional emergency airfield rather than a disruptive commercial airfield.

In the past six months, we have had a taste of occasional test helicopter flights. We have become increasingly concerned that a license has been granted to operate a tourist helicopter flight business from Katoomba airport. We are mostly concerned because our lives, the sensitive ecology and existing tourism in the mountains are being disrupted the specter of tourist helicopter flights over the escarpment.

Tourism is important for the local economy. But these flights do not add to the greater benefit of local people or existing tourism operations. This disruption will not contribute to the long-term sustainability of tourism in this region.


Birdlife and the diversity of species make the mountains a very special place. Such beauty and diversity can be observed by a tourist on foot, by wheels or on-line. Helicopter flights will create enormous disruption to the living ecology of the mountains and contribute little to sustain the community.

We cannot see how such a 'thin' business proposal has gained traction in State Government when it is a direct conflict with historic State and Federal Government investment in the region.

I suspect the helicopter operators are well-aware of their weak business case. I'd like to offer them an alternative that helps make aerial perspectives available to tourists.

I would encourage them to invest in Virtual Reality. The State Government can direct them to its Arts agency, Create NSW who are developing VR in the digital economy. It would also enable local artists and technicians like MTNS MADE to make a living.

I feel that my quality of life, living in Medlow Bath, and other residents of the Blue Mountains, will be greatly impacted by Katoomba airfield operating as a commercial venture.

During the NSW April 2019 school holidays my husband and I went for a walk along the Grand Canyon Track within the Blue Mountains National Park near Blackheath. According to Google Earth this is less than 1.5 km from Katoomba airfield. During the course of our 2 hour walk I counted 42 people, a mixture of ages and ethnicities. Most of these people seemed to be visitors to the Blue Mountains, i.e. not locals. These were people who had come from other places to enjoy something of the Blue Mountains and would no doubt be adding something to the local economy. If the number of people who were counted on one walk on one day during one two hour period were extrapolated to a whole day and then a whole week it can be argued that over a thousand people may use this one walk in one week of the school holidays. This does not take into account the many others who may do walks on other tracks or merely enjoy the views from and serenity of nearby lookouts.

Noise from aircraft is something people have to endure in Sydney. People come to the Blue Mountains to escape things such aircraft noise. They come to enjoy things that cannot be enjoyed in built up regions and cities such as peace, quite and serenity. It is not something people appreciate within or adjacent to the Blue Mountains National Park. This includes both residents and visitors.

From the website of the lease applicant, Fly Blue, I note that flights will be at least 30 minutes duration but that this does not indicate the number of aircraft movements per hour that may be possible. I also note that the applicant for the lease does "not intend to fly in sensitive and populated areas or over Echo Point, the Three Sisters, Grose Valley and up the Grand Canyon". An intention is not legally binding and the lease applicant was not required to submit flight paths in their lease application. If Fly Blue does not intend to fly over what are some of the most scenic places near to Katoomba airfield where will they fly? Surely Echo Point, the Three Sisters, Grose Valley and up the Grand Canyon are the most desirably scenic places "high-yield" customers might wish to view.

My objections to the proposed development of Katoomba Airfield are that it would have a negative effect on a far greater number of people than it would advantage and as such is inequitable.

As a long-time resident of the Blue Mountains, I wish to make an objection to the proposal to grant a commercial lease for the Katoomba Airfield. The basis of my objections are:

- I do not support private, profit-making commercial leases being issued over public land. The public gets no benefit from this and I am concerned that the airfield site could eventually end up in private hands, thus alienating even more public land.
- Any commercial leaseholder would want to maximize their profit on the investment through maximizing aircraft operations at the site. I believe that any long term leaseholder would want to take advantage of the magnificent Blue Mountains scenery to make maximum money by running as many 'joy flights' (even if longer than 10 minutes) or other commercial operations as possible. This will amount to fun for some at the cost of noise and visual intrusion/pollution for everyone else.
- Noise. I absolutely object to the intended and unavoidable introduction of more noise into the Blue Mountains environment through aircraft operations based at the airfield. I remember when joy flights previously ran out of the Katoomba Airfield in the 1990s and the disruption and noise pollution they caused. My understanding is that they stopped because of the noise that local residents, as well as well as other mountains' residents and holidaymakers and tourists, experienced. The noise ruined the quiet enjoyment of local residents at their homes, and helicopters buzzing over tourist icons and around the escarpment ruined the experience and quiet appreciation of the mountains for residents, holiday makers and tourists. No doubt the joy flights ruined the wilderness experience for bushwalkers in the national park because of the amplification of the noise in the valleys. Since then, the Greater Blue Mountains has gained status as a World Heritage Area.
- Impact on the Greater Blue Mountains World Heritage Area. I believe the federal government should be involved in considering this proposal because of the impact of aircraft noise on the Greater Blue Mountains World Heritage Area. Becoming a World Heritage Area has attracted international tourists, including bushwalkers, naturalists, canyoners etc, to the Blue Mountains. I believe our reputation as a nature-based tourist destination which recognises and protects the values enshrined by World Heritage listing will be ruined by the impacts of aircraft noise.
- **Noise impacts on native fauna.** What are the impacts of aircraft movement and noise on the native fauna of the World Heritage Area? The Blue Mountains is renowned for its fauna and bird migrations through the region. I do not believe that disruption caused to the native fauna of the region has been considered in the proposal to lease the airfield.

I strongly believe that Katoomba airfield should be incorporated into the national park and maintained for emergency use only. I trust you will listen to the community that will be negatively impacted and reconsider issuing a long-term commercial lease over this site.

I write in response to learning of the proposed commercial flight operations over the World Heritage Listed Blue Mountains National Park.

I am extremely opposed to this proposal for numerous reasons. Firstly, the Blue Mountains National Park is a World Heritage Listed Area, an area marked for future preservation that should remain as unpolluted and as close to its 'natural' self as has always been. It is to be preserved in the most pristine condition possible and putting in a commercial flight operations would be going against this.

Secondly, the noise and air pollution to the surrounding area will not be appreciated. People come to the Blue Mountains for peace and quiet and to find the space to escape from busier areas of Australia. Putting in a commercial flight operations would be going against this.

Additionally, we have not been informed of the flight paths or number of flights or little about the actual operations. It could potentially mean helicopters flying over the more touristy areas i.e. 3 Sisters at low levels which may interfere with the pleasure of seeing such marvels. I personally do not wish to be going on a bush walk with helicopters constantly flying over the canopy and having to hear the constant droning noise of these machines.

Thirdly, commercial flights are at a cost that only a few could afford. This luxury would bring in an elite clientele to the area which may be time sparse. This clientele may subsequently only stay in the Blue Mountains for a limited amount of time and thus not inject additional funds into other commercial enterprises in the mountains such as hotels, restaurants or boutique shops. Additionally, I believe most locals in the Blue Mountains would not be able to use this service as they could not afford it.

Fourthly, I believe that the prior attempt to have a helicopter operation in the area failed. This subsequently proving that on an ongoing basis this tourist service is not viable.

A successful tourist operation such as the Scenic Railway only uses a specific area of the mountains and is not working against an urbanised housing area. It is close to Katoomba Centre/3 Sisters yet does not create congestion, unnecessary noise and is able to bring in more tourists to the area by having the Sculptures at Scenic World associated with it.

Should people wish to have the thrill of seeing the Blue Mountains by air possibly a proposed hot air balloon company may be appropriate. This is a quieter, less pollutant alternative. The operators could even possibly establish a hot air balloon festival luring colourfully shaped balloons and thus even more visitors to the area. I believe it would also bring in a broader range of interested parties from very young children to the elderly and not just an elitist crowd.

Subsequently, I propose that the airfield be used as an emergency facility only and not as a commercial venture.

In a world that is becoming ever busier, more developed, noisier and more hectic, tranquillity and preservation of nature and wild places will become even more valuable in the years to come.

Commercialisation of Katoomba Airfield is not in the interest of the majority. As public land its use should be of benefit to the majority of the public. The number of people who will benefit from commercial flights is much smaller than the number of people who will be disadvantaged. The loss of amenity and a feeling of being in the wild for those visiting, bushwalking or living within the vicinity of the airfield will be ongoing and unavoidable and an invasion of their privacy and rights. The commercialisation is trading economic benefits and an additional entertainment option for people who already have many for a loss of amenity for many.

I believe the Crown land should be transferred to the Blue Mountains National Park. In this way the public amenity of the surrounding areas will be preserved for the public. The airstrip should be preserved for emergency use.

Because the proposed commercialisation is of most concern to locals, you will probably receive submissions predominantly from locals. I fully support the upgrading of Katoomba Airfield. It is in a bad state with 2 unusable runways. It will never be a busy airport due to runway limitations and also the weather in the mountains. Thus whilst there may be some helicopter tourist flights they would barely impact on the noise in the area. Already there are 'fly neighbourly procedures' to which responsible operators adhere. There is potential for the airfield to become a good community centre with premises for a flying club, or flying school, vacant grounds for cadet camps etc. All this was in place in the past prior to the new lease, and there were never objections.

The approach for light aircraft from the East is away from any house, and the approach from the west only passes 3-4 properties. Helicopters can land and take off well away from any houses.

YKAT is a great place for emergency landings as it is situated between Bathurst/Orange & Dubbo to Bankstown route. Also vital that the airfield is marinated for the bush fire season when the emergency service can commandeer the field for firefighting equipment.

I sincerely object to the proposal of the use of Katoomba airfield, Medlow Bath, for tourist flights for the following reasons:

Any use of the airfield that will have or is likely to have a significant impact on its World Heritage values would breach the (Commonwealth) Environmental Protection and Biodiversity Conservation Act. It would require a full Environmental Impact study and the approval of the federal Minister for the Environment. No such study has been done, nor any such approval given.

The major impact would be noise, especially from helicopters and low-flying aircraft. This not only affects all those who wish to enjoy the park in all its grandeur and spectacular scenery, but also the wildlife. The park protects a large number of threatened, rare and restricted species. Australian record on extinction is very poor.

The airfield is within 10 kilometres of the townships of Katoomba, Medlow Bath and Blackheath, so also of the Centre, all of which would be affected.

The current commercial lease process is in direct contradiction of the land assessments and consultations carried out in the past.

The community engagement policy of the Department has been flawed. Public drop-in sessions have been held, but the rooms were too small, and the public's comments were not recorded as they should have been. The department's submission form is misleading.

The airfield property is zoned E3 (environmental conservation under the Blue Mountains Local Environment Plan) and an aerodrome is not a permitted use.

I propose that the Katoomba Airfield should be merged into National Park as should have happened in 2008. It could still be used for emergency purposes.





I am writing regarding the proposal for Katoomba Airfield to be leased for use as a site for helicopter flights. I have been a resident of the upper Blue Mountains for 20 years, and, like many others, I moved here to enjoy the natural environment. I am also a psychologist, and am aware of the real benefits to wellbeing that come from being in peaceful, natural environments. I am highly concerned about the impact that helicopter noise will have on the experience of people who live in, and visit the upper Blue Mountains. I have spent a considerable amount of time travelling both in Australia and overseas, including in natural environments with helicopter joy flights. As a walker in the Bungle Bungle National park in WA, I remember the experience of peace that came at the end of the day when the last flight had landed. I also remember the sense of intrusion and anger I felt while climbing in the Alps in France, with helicopters roaring past all day. My own experience is far from unique. A very brief look on google scholar yields numerous research articles on visitor experience and helicopter noise. This research shows that people visit national parks not only for the visual beauty they contain, but also for the peace and quiet, and the for the natural soundscapes. However, visitors to parks report experiencing less natural beauty, peace, and tranquillity in areas where there are helicopters, and consistently rate their experience much less positively if they are exposed to helicopter noise.

The Blue Mountains is the city in a national park – we are proud to be a world heritage listed area. Importantly, we are a community that relies on tourists. The commercialisation of Katoomba Airfield will no doubt provide financial gain for the operators, but this should not come at the expense of the wellbeing and experience of the rest of us, including tourists and those of us who live here. Instead of commercialisation of the airfield, this area should become part of the National Park.

#### REFERENCE 602686: PROPOSED LEASE OF KATOOMBA AIRFIELD

Dear Madam/Sir,

I am writing to express my strong objection to the proposal to commercialise Katoomba Airfield (and introduce helicopter joy flights).

Having studied the issue I believe that the approach with the most benefit to the broader community interest is to return this Crown land to the national park, to be managed by National Parks and Wildlife Service for <u>emergency use</u> only.

Over the years I have travelled many times to the Blue Mountains and to nearby Blackheath and Medlow Bath to enjoy the beautiful scenes from its look-outs and from walks criss-crossing its valley floors. One of the stand out memories of these walks is the fact that all that can be heard is birdsong, trickling creeks and wind in the tops of the forest. This form of serenity is largely absent from our noisy world today.

There is bushland near where I live in the city but its noises include cars on nearby busy highways, people calling, car horns, planes overhead and machinery going full bore. The Blue Mountains are surely unique in that they maintain their serenity while still being quite close to Sydney. The tranquillity they evoke is one of the cornerstone reasons that bushwalkers, bird watchers, day trippers and tourists are drawn to the area.

I am an ardent birdwatcher and lover of our extraordinary natural biodiversity. I would note that the high level of noise generated by helicopters (amplified by the canyons' natural stone amphitheatres) would invariably impact on the flight paths of birds, their feeding, breeding and nesting. The mountains are an important flight path for hundreds of thousands of birds during peak migrations. Many of these birds are already threatened or vulnerable and can be diverted dangerously from their goals by buzzing helicopters. Other animals can be severely impacted when loud, intermittent noise breaks into their daily lives.

Having lived under the flight path in the inner city of Sydney I can also attest to the aviation-related pollution that this proposal would introduce to otherwise pristine forests and streams in this World Heritage listed park.

The proposed introduction of commercial joy flights is yet another example of how we can ruin the very best aspects of our world by constantly seeking a quick profit. I spoke recently with a friend who had just returned from visit to a part of Western Australia with her family. Their day walks at this location in the 'wilderness' were constantly interrupted by helicopters buzzing overhead. She indicated that she would never visit again because the noise ruined their experience. I agree with the Civil Aviation Safety Authority (CASA) which has noted that:

"Noise within the National Park system often interferes with the very reason visitors go to the National Park - for peace and quiet. Aircraft tends to interfere with natural quiet for visitors within National Parks. Another consideration of aircraft overflight over National Parks is the reduction in enjoyment and appreciation of cultural and historical resources within the National Parks and the reduction of the sounds of nature at the park. Studies have shown helicopter noise in natural settings has resulted in lower ratings of scenic beauty, solitude, tranquillity, freedom, naturalness, and preference, and higher ratings of annoyance."

Commercial joy flights over the Blue Mountains will also impact greatly on the local community, many of whom moved or retired to Blue Mountains to escape the noise of Sydney. Living in Chatswood we are exposed a number of times a year to helicopter noise with emergency transport of hospital patients and police pursuits being carried out by helicopter. The noise travels for kilometres, is often deafening and is akin to living in a war-zone. Luckily for us, we are only exposed to this half a dozen times a year. I am horrified on behalf of the hundreds of local residents that might face this on a daily-basis.

Please don't squander our World Heritage listed park and the amenity of the communities who surround it.

There should be no commercial lease approved for Katoomba Airfield.

Return the land to the surrounding national park.

Fund the National Parks and Wildlife Service to manage the airstrip for emergency use and not for commercial profit.

I object vehemently to FlyBlue's proposal to operate Katoomba Airfield for scenic flights. I am a Blue Mountains resident that caters to tourists and visitors. Most of my visitors come from Sydney for the weekend, and a smaller proportion come from interstate and overseas. The main reason visitors come to the Blue Mountains is for the sense of peace, tranquility, serenity, and natural majesty.

My anecdotal evidence matches government surveys of the Blue Mountains Tourism Region<sup>1</sup>. In fact, tranquility and relaxation has been the trademark of the Blue Mountains since Victorian times when the Blue Mountains became a centre of rejuvenation and health spas. Today, these qualities are becoming increasingly rare and more valued in global recreational and travel markets. Tourists come here to recharge their spirits and they need natural sounds and vistas in which to do that. FlyBlue's proposal threatens those valuable qualities that international and domestic tourists want. If they can't find it here, they will go elsewhere and leave a gaping hole in our regional economy, and Sydney-siders will have lost their nearest place to retreat and recharge.

Tourists' reviews on <u>TripAdvisor.com</u> illustrate the loss of tranquility that is associated with helicopter noise in natural landscapes. For instance:

Uluru, Australia: "The incessant noise of helicopters flying the wealthy over the rock detracted from the magic of this ancient spiritual site of the Aboriginal people of Australia" August 2018

Kings Canyon, Australia: "The visit was however spoilt by the constant noise of helicopters over the canyon. Sometimes two (or three) at the same time. Park management should consider to reduce this audio "pollution"." May

Franz Josef Glacier, New Zealand: 27 reviews that mention "helicopter noise". e.g. "The serenity of the landscape is spoiled by (too many) helicopters. Lot of noise. New Zealand have to think about making the whole country one big theme park for youngsters." December 2016

Waimea Canyon, USA: "And you will hear and see helicopters. Lots of them. A never ending racket that utterly destroys the short lived 'quietest place on earth' reputation. Perhaps once it was, but not anymore. They do not stop. It's a shame. They should have a time limit on aircraft so that one can go up to the canyon and hear nothing but the winds and the birds without having to listen to the never ending helicopter (and private plane) noise." January 2017

Grand Canyon, USA: "Really wish the helicopter tours don't exist. The frequent helicopter noise really ruined the atmosphere." December 2012

Katoomba Airfield's location and the proposed flight paths will propagate noise much beyond the flight lines depicted in the proposal. The prevalence of rocky cliffs and canyons in the vicinity will mean that aircraft noise echoes along valleys and cliff lookouts that visitors favour.

Katoomba Airfield is public land. Consistent with the Crown Lands Act 2016, I object to it being used by a private company for private gain:

Excerpt from Crown Lands Act 2016:

1.3 (d) to provide for the consistent, efficient, fair and transparent management of Crown land for the benefit of the people of New South Wales.

Moreover, this public land is surrounded by a World Heritage Area National Park. The impacts of a commercial airfield are antithetical to such a glorious example of natural splendour and threaten the World Heritage status that attracts visitors. Impacts of this proposal range from noise and visual pollution, to the threat posed by refuelling in a remote location surrounded by flammable bushland that is accessible only by a narrow dirt road—a very difficult location to service should a fire or fuel spill occur. Rare and endangered hanging swamps ecosystems occur on the Airfield site and downslope of it, and should a fuel spill occur, both these and two adjacent waterways that feed into the heart of the Grose River bushland would be destroyed.

There are several problems with FlyBlue's proposal that haven't allowed a full and exhaustive understanding of their proposal. Firstly, there's been no information on the number of flights per day, and the time of day that they propose to fly. While FlyBlue has said on community fora that they will establish a Fly Neighbourly Agreement, that will include not flying over popular bushwalking areas like the Grand Canyon and the Grose Valley, the flight maps in their proposal directly contradict this, and show aircraft flying over the Grose Valley, while the Grand Canyon is not in their No Fly Zone.

Unfortunately, the Civil Aviation Safety Authority (CASA) defines a Fly Neighbourly Agreement (FNA) as "a voluntary code of practice", with no requirement for monitoring and adherence. Recently, Australia has seen the spectacular failure of self-regulation via the Royal Commission into Misconduct in the Banking, Superannuation and Financial Services Industry. Thus, any FNA will not have public confidence, because there is no independent regulation authority, restrictions, or fines for breaches of the FNA.

The duration of the proposed lease is too long, especially considering the lack of regulation. Furthermore, FlyBlue could on-sell their lease to another commercial entity that doesn't adhere to the FNA.

The proposed flight paths don't accurately represent the noise impacts on locals and visitors. A noise intensity map would better help other asses potential aircraft noise to people on the ground. Such a map would take into account the balance of hard surfaces that echo the sound, the lowest aircraft elevation flying levels, typical clouds conditions that might bounce the sound back to the ground, the type of aircrafts, and both the density of residents and visitors at lookouts and on bushwalking tracks.

FlyBlue's proposed flight paths use local drinking water supplies as landmarks, by flying directly over Cascade Creek Dam and Lake Medlow. Because of their proximity to Katoomba Airfield, and the associated low flying levels of associated aircraft, these local drinking water supplies are likely to be adversely affected by the fallout of aircraft exhaust pollution which will then affect locals and visitors drinking from the reticulated water supply.


The associated effects of commercialising Katoomba Airfield will be seen to benefit a few people who are directly associated with the Airfield at the expense of many established businesses and private residences in the region that rely on the current mix of tourists. Thus, it will divide the Blue Mountains' community, both economically and socially.

I believe that Katoomba Airfield should be returned to the NSW National Parks and Wildlife Service, in line with several reports that have made such recommendations. For instance, the NSW Government via the Department of

Industry (Crown Lands) has previously carried out many studies of the site, culminating in a recommendation in 2000 that the area be added to the Blue Mountains National Park, with the airfield being used for emergency purposes only.

Returning Katoomba Airfield to the National Park would allow for this public resource to be used for emergency use only, for fire-fighting purposes in the National Park. This is in keeping with the Crown Lands Act 2016, the surrounding land use, the wants of domestic and international visitors, and the majority of local residents.

The Blue Mountains National Park is the result of generations of forward-thinking people that have sought to protect and preserve these natural landscapes by encouraging appropriate developments that are in long-term harmony with landscape. Current visitor numbers and spending are at an all-time high³ and indicate that the Blue Mountains Tourism Region has a world class sustainable tourist industry that services both Australia's largest city and visitors from further afield. I urge you to act in line with the generations of visionaries and preserve the serenity of the Blue Mountains for generations to come.

Dear Sirs/Madams: I am not a mathematician, but I can do some basic arithmetic. I have done a back of envelope calculation on the risible carbon offset proposal by Derek and Floyd Larsen of FlyBlue Management Pty Ltd in regard to their application to run commercial flights from Katoomba airfield, including short trips from Mudgee, from where they operate exclusive pleasure flights.

By my calculations their proposal to plant ONE tree per flight leaving Katoomba airfield is ONE-SIXTIETH of the required offset.

I based my assumptions on a Bell Jetranger helicopter (one pilot and four passengers) and/or a light twinengine aircraft (carrying four passengers). A helicopter uses about 100 litres of fuel per hour and a small fixed-wing about 19 litres per 100 kms. I made my calculations on a return flight from Katoomba to Mudgee (a return distance of 320kms).

Aviation fuel generates about 2.2kgs of carbon dioxide per litre, making this about 132kgs of carbon dioxide for the return trip. An average tree sequesters about 22kgs of carbon dioxide per year. Dividing 132kgs of carbon dioxide generated by Katoomba-Mudgee return trip by one tree's carbon sequestering capacity (2.2kgs) gives a figure of SIXTY.

FlyBlue Management is offering ONE tree per flight. It needs to offer SIXTY trees per flight to even get within the ballpark of managing carbon dioxide emissions.

I trust this aspect of the Larsens' application will be reviewed.

I must object to leasing Katoomba Airfield for helicopter joyflights because the areas that would be affected have sensitive ecosystems. I must also object because residents who live near those areas choose to be there for the peace and quiet and they appreciate living close to natural places that should be protected.

Please understand that I have reached this conclusion with regret, having carefully considered the promises of the licensees and the objections of community activists opposing plans for the airfield.

In principle I admire people who aim to bring economic activity to our community in the Blue Mountains. I appreciate the stated intentions of the Katoomba Airfield licensees to care for the natural environment, to set aside areas of the land for community use and to maintain the amenity of residents — while contributing to the local economy. Several months ago, when a Katoomba shopkeeper asked me to sign a petition opposing the licensees' proposal, I declined and said I would need to research this question before forming an opinion.

However it has become clear to me that helicopter noise would have a severe impact on resident and migratory birds and other wildlife. I note that the report "Birds and the Katoomba Airfield", prepared for the Blue Mountains Conservation Society (which I recently joined), says bird species including Yellow-faced Honeyeaters, White-naped Honeyeaters and Silvereyes use the airfield property and nearby areas for their annual migration. This report also says vulnerable species including Gang-gang Cockatoos, Glossy Black Cockatoos and Scarlet Robins live in these areas.

I note that the licensees promise that helicopters would fly no lower than 500 feet above non-residential areas. That is less than 170 metres. Helicopter noise from this height would disrupt the activities of migratory and resident birds — and thereby threaten local populations. This would be exacerbated by helicopter noise echoing through nearby canyons.

I also note the licensees' promise that aircraft may fly no lower than 1,000 feet above residential areas. This is approximately 300 metres. Frequent helicopter noise from this height above private properties would have a severe impact on the amenity of residents who have chosen to live here for peace and quiet and because they enjoy being close to nature. I must also ask whether people who live on more remote properties would have to endure noise helicopter joyflights from 160-170 metres above their homes.

I wish to emphasise that these residents have chosen to live where they do because they enjoy being close to nature. I live 20 to 25 minutes' drive from the main residential, tourist and bushwalking areas of the upper Blue Mountains and I share this enjoyment of nature. We residents assert our firm belief that human beings have a responsibility to be stewards of nature, to care for it and protect it. The clear negative impacts of noise from frequent helicopter joyflights on migratory and resident birds is a direct contradiction to this value of stewardship.

In many such contentious matters, the ultimate question is: what level of impact could be accepted? In other words, can a compromise be negotiated? I regret to say that in this case the answer is no. The sincerity of my regret does not weaken my resolve. The severe negative effects that frequent helicopter joyflight-noise would have on populations of migratory and resident birds and on nature-loving residents is not acceptable.

I must point out my confusion about the licensees' campaign literature. In the frequently asked questions section of <a href="flyblue.com.au">flyblue.com.au</a>, the licensees say "FLYBLUE will not be undertaking joy flights over Echo Point, the Three Sisters, Grose Valley, up the Grand Canyon and all residential areas of the Blue Mountains". However I cannot help being confused by screenshots in the "Info pack", downloaded from the link in the top right corner of this website, including these words: "Avoid the crowds and explore Sydney's famous Blue Mountains from the best vantage point — from a chopper! See the Three Sisters, Katoomba, explore the valleys and catchment areas and fly over the iconic areas of the Sydney Harbour." This would clearly bring noise that would disrupt local bird populations and the amenity of residents and tourists.


I am also confused by the licensees citing the regulation in this "Info pack" that aircraft may not fly less than 1,000 feet above residential areas and saying in their website's frequently asked questions section that that their helicopter joyflights would not fly above residential areas at all.

Even if I had misunderstood these screenshots, I remain convinced of the threat to wildlife posed by noise from frequent helicopter joyflights.

Please note that I believe Katoomba Airfield should be maintained in good condition for use in emergencies. Emergency actions are essential. Disruption to wildlife and amenity from emergency flights is unavoidable but occurs less frequently than would disruption from commercial helicopter joyflights.

I would like to ask the NSW Government to incorporate the property of Katoomba Airfield into Blue Mountains National Park and maintain it for emergency use.

To whom it may concern,

I wish to register my strongest objection to the proposed use of crown land at Mellow Bath/Katoomba for commercial aviation purposes.

Local residents have for years been advocating the return of this crown land to the National Park. The existing dirt airstrip is surrounded by National Park and as such is unsuitable for any commercial development. It needs to be incorporated into the Blue Mountains National Park and managed by the National Parks and Wildlife Service.

The proposed commercial development of the airfield will have detrimental effects on the local tourism industry. The Blue Mountains is famous for its natural environment and the outdoor experiences that it offers both visitors and locals. An estimated 1.25 million people undertake bushwalks in the Blue Mountains each year.

Landing tourist helicopters and fixed winged aircraft within the World Heritage-listed national park could jeopardise the Blue Mountains experience by:

- 1. Impacting the reputation of the Blue Mountains as a quiet and peaceful escape
- 2. Increasing noise and reducing amenity for hikers, climbers and canyoners
- 3. Concentrating tourist dollars in fewer hands. Tourists that arrive or depart by helicopter are much more likely to be dependent on a few operators for transport and accommodation
- 4. A decrease in reputation or "wilderness experience" will logically result in fewer visits, meaning less spent at local cafes, pubs, shops and retail outlets or spent on supporting local culture and events.

Katoomba Airfield is completely surrounded by the Greater Blue Mountains World Heritage Area. Within 5km of the airfield there are over 3000 native plant species, including those listed as endangered.

I have particular concerns that a commercial lease of the airfield will result in damage to the nearby rare hanging swamp habitat caused by runoff and erosion from increased traffic on the unsealed section of Grand Canyon Road and the asphalting of the runway.

The proposed commercial development of the airfield will also adversely affect residents' lifestyle and amenity. Residents in eastern Medlow Bath will bear the brunt of noise pollution from the proposed helicopter operations. However, from past experience of "joy flights" from this location, the noise readily spreads to residents in Evans Lookout Road, Blackheath and North Katoomba which are both less than 2km from the airfield and which will, no doubt, experience fly overs despite the unenforceable fly neighbourly policy.

Finally, I have major concerns about the bureaucratic "process" which has got us to this point. The paralysis of intellect on display here is simply breathtaking. It's almost unbelievable that someone thought that this

was a good idea. Proposing a commercial lease of crown land situated where it is demonstrates lack of insight, arrogance and complete disdain for the democratic process.

The lease of crown land at Mellow Bath for commercial aviation purposes must not proceed.

My reasons for no commercial use of Crown Lands are:-

#### 1. NO COMMERCIAL LEASE now or in the future

There should be no Commercial Development in the middle of a National Park, let alone a World Heritage Area.

Scenic tours/joy flights, taking off and landing in a National Park should not occur because of the impacts on park visitors and our native plants and animals.

Joy flights were stopped in 1995 because of the noise, and should not start again.

Because of the shapes of the valleys helicopter noise is echoed and amplified, impacting on far more areas than just directly below.

My concern is not just with this specific proposal, I object to ANY commercial lease now or in the future.

This land is PUBLIC land. A private lease allows changes to be decided behind closed doors.

WHO could take over the lease? WHAT could they do in the future? Could it be sold?

There are numerous international studies demonstrating the significant impacts of helicopters on native fauna, in particular on disruptions to bird migrations; also on fauna reliant on hearing for feeding, mating and care of young.

The conclusion of a 2019 ecological study is that the aircraft activity will negatively impact on the internationally recognised migration of honeyeaters through the Blue Mountains. It could also impact other birds inhabiting the diverse bushland surrounding the site. (BMRM Ecological Surveys - LINK BMCS website)

#### 2. PUT THIS LAND INTO THE SURROUNDING NATIONAL PARK

The airfield land was always intended to be returned to its surrounding National Park. This is the solution.

A commercial development within the World Heritage Area threatens the integrity of the land, makes it more difficult to manage as a natural area and could even put its status in jeopardy.

We need to stop this threat ever arising again! Protect our World Heritage Area

Fly Neighbourly Agreements are self regulated and not enforced by any government agency.

The NSW Office of Environment and Heritage states the Blue Mountains National Park has the highest number of visitors of NSW National parks with over 5 million visitors per year. This is many times more than visit the Art Gallery of NSW.

This level of visitation to the region would be threatened should flight numbers and flight altitudes increase in intensity over any of the **World Heritage area** or tourist activity or **accommodation areas** in **both urban and rural zones**.

We would be looking at a net loss of tourism due to noise impacts.

I am afraid the peace and quiet will be lost if helicopter joy flights are allowed to fly over the National Park. The reason most people come to the Blue Mountains is to enjoy the beauty, peace and tranquility the Blue Mountains has to offer. Imagine being on a day walk in the Blue Mountains and hearing the constant noise of helicopters as opposed to the birds and waterfalls or a tourist standing at Echo Point looking out at the beauty and having it disrupted by the sound of helicopters flying overhead and impinging the view that they have come to see.

The Blue Mountains area is acoustically sensitive - I know this because I live in the mountains and can hear the sound of aircraft flying overhead at above 18,000 ft let alone at a much lower altitude. I have also been a witness, on multiple occasions, to the sound of Police Rescue Helicopters trying to rescue someone when I've been on a walk in the Blue Mountains and also when there are bushfires and helicopters need to collect water from the lakes to help put out the fires - I can tell you the sound is incredibly noisy. In saying that I do not object to emergency service helicopters as they are a vital service, but what I do object to is the constant noise of helicopter joy flights as I do not believe they are needed in the Blue Mountains. I wish to register my dismay that a commercial lease is even being considered for the Katoomba Airfield site. I strongly believe the best outcome for this site is for it to be:

- 1. Incorporated into the National Park
- 2. With no commercial activity allowed
- 3. And used for emergencies only

For the following reasons:

#### Prior reports have recommended this outcome

Prior to moving to the area I investigated the likely development scenarios for this airfield. All I found where letters, reports and minutes from your own department and the Local Council stating that the preferred outcome is incorporation into the national park.

Failure to comply with these recommendations without due process is a Breach of Trust.

#### It will have a strong negative effect on the local economy

Our local economy is driven by on the ground eco-tourism. The Blue Mountains has 2.9 million domestic visitors each year. The top activities will all be detrimentally affected by an increase in aircraft noise, these being "sightseeing or looking around" (34.4%) and "bushwalking or rainforest walks" (33%). Total tourist spend is \$350 million in the region (reference attached to submission: travel-to-blue-mountains-snapshot-dec-2018.pdf).

This proposed development has flight paths directly over some of the most popular walks in the Blue Mountains (Blue Gum forest, Grose Valley) and is in full view of all the main lookouts in Blackheath.

Chopper noise reverberates right up and down the valley's, as we all know when there is a rescue going on. They aren't quiet beasts. Tourists don't come here to hear the thump, thump, thumping of helicopters. They come to hear the sounds of nature, which regular chopper flights will totally disrupt.

It will certainly turn off more people than it will bring in. Leading to a net negative affect on our local economy.

There are also numerous businesses directly under the flight paths that will be negatively affected e.g. the Medlow Bath Mediation Centre as well as numerous B&B's. The negative affects on just these few businesses should be more than enough to stop this going ahead.

CASA itself agrees with this. Here are some excerpts from CASA Environmental Implications Guidelines Form 1289 (reference attached to submission: CASA environmental guide.pdf).

NOISE IN NATURE RESERVES AND NATIONAL PARKS "Noise within the National Park system often interferes with the very reason visitors go to the National Park - for peace and quiet. Aircraft tends to interfere with natural quiet for visitors within National Parks. Another consideration of aircraft overflight over National Parks is the reduction in enjoyment and appreciation of cultural and historical resources within the National Parks and the reduction of the sounds of nature at the park."

Even if we assume a low end amount of 1% of people being turned off that is still a \$3.5 million hit to our local economy!

We really do risk killing the goose laying our golden eggs!!

#### It threatens our World Heritage status and a such our economy

One of the main draw cards is our World Heritage Status, it drives international visitation. This development directly threatens that and as such our local economy.

#### **Environmental**

There is no question it will have environmental effects on our wildlife. There are numerous species with migratory patterns over the Blue Mountains. As well as numerous rare and threatened species in the local area such as the spotted quoll.

CASA itself agrees with this. Here are some excerpts from CASA Environmental Implications Guidelines Form 1289 (reference attached to submission: CASA environmental guide.pdf).

**NOISE IMPACTS ON WILDLIFE** Any proposal for airspace change that may cause a 'noise' effect on wildlife must be further examined in order to determine the likelihood of long-term effects on this wildlife which may be detrimental to its survival.

Within the 5.5km flight circuit there are numerous species listed under the EPBC Act of 1999 and the NSW Threatened Species Conservation Act 1995. Listed on the EPBC Act of 1999 as:

- *critically endangered* are the Regent Honeyeater, Slaty Leek Orchid and the Monkey Gum/Mountain grey gum.
- *endangered* are the Eastern Bristlebird, Spotted-tailed quoll, the Blue Mountains Swamp-Skink, Epacris hamiltonii, Eucalyptus copulans, Dwarf Mountain Pine and Leionema lachnaeoides, Giant Dragonfly.
- *vulnerable* are the Broad-Headed Snake, Zieria involucrate, Flockton Wattle, Acrophyllum austral, Acacia bynoeana, Euphrasia bowdeniae and Diuris aequalis, Gang-Gang Cockatoo, Varied Sittella, Glossy Black Cockatoo, Little Lorikeet, Speckled Warbler, Spotted-tailed quoll, Eastern False Pipistrelle, Eastern Pygmy Possum, Flockton Wattle, Acrophyllum austral.
- endangered ecological community is the Monkey Gum/Mountain grey gum.

#### Lifestyle

The proposed development has stated it will operate basically between sunup to sundown. This is simply unacceptable noise pollution to the 1000's of residents who live within earshot of the airfield and its proposed flight paths in North Katoomba, Medlow Bath, Pulpit Hill Rd, Blackheath and Linden.

CASA itself agrees with this. Here are some excerpts from CASA Environmental Implications Guidelines Form 1289 (reference attached to submission: CASA environmental guide.pdf).

**LOW LEVEL FLYING** Aircraft flying at levels below their normal cruising altitudes may cause levels of noise exposure greater than generally acceptable limits for noise exposure. They may also cause impacts within communities regardless of whether acceptable levels are exceeded or not because of awareness of a change having occurred or of the heightened sensitivities of some people.

## It is a substantial change of use and one which previous experience shows has so little community support it will be shut down

Katoomba Airfield is a small country dirt airfield that has seen little use. However, in the early 90's helicopter scenic flights were run from the airfield and were then shut down due to community concerns. At the time the community was assured this would never be allowed to happen again, yet here we are.

Why are we going through this argument yet again? Surely the smartest thing to do is pass this to the National Park so we don't need to go through this every 15 years or so!

#### There is no strategic reason for this airfield being commercial

In a letter from Lands dated 23-February 2017 (DOC17/028257, File 08-1364-03) it is made quite clear that emergency services do not wish to take tenure of the land and it is not needed for support of emergency services training and operations. And I quote "DoI Lands have been advised that the site is not required for support of emergency services training and operations."

I believe that the commercialisation of the airfield should not go ahead.

The Blue Mountains are a treasure not only for those of us who live amongst it but also for the hundreds of thousands of visitors who come each year to take it all in. I am aware of the large volume of submissions you will receive (which I can only imagine will be overwhelmingly opposed to Fly Blue's proposal) so I will be concise in my own submission.

This is a World Heritage National Park. None of us have the right to make decisions that will adversely impact upon that. Fly Blue may claim they'll leave a minimal footprint but the bottom line is that a commercial venture such as theirs will have profound, long term, negative effects on our environment, our tranquility and our local tourism economy.

As you are aware the feeling amongst much of the local community at present is laden with mistrust towards the Department. Despite your proclamations of considered community consultation, I believe it is fair to say that this has not been the case. You insist that no decisions have been made in terms of how things will proceed with the airfield but your actions to date do not support this. I understand that you are a Department existing under a Liberal Government whose legacy, sadly, will be the destruction and disregard of our environment. The fact that no Ministers showed up in Parliament for the petition debate on Thursday 1st August is a sorry indication of this Government's priorities. I am hopeful however that amongst those of you who will make the final decision on the airfield, there exists someone with conscience and a heart.

I am aware of how political game playing works. We live in a strong Labor seat in all three tiers of Government so our voices are often ignored. A punishment of sorts, perhaps. There should be no Commercial Development in the middle of a National Park and World Heritage Area.

Scenic tours/joy flights, taking off and landing in a National Park should not occur because of the impacts on park visitors and our native plants and animals.

Joy flights were stopped in 1995 because of the noise, and should not start again. Because of the shapes of the valleys helicopter noise is echoed and amplified, impacting on far more areas than just directly below.

My concern is not just with this specific proposal, I object to ANY commercial lease now or in the future. This land is PUBLIC land. A private lease allows changes to be decided behind closed doors. WHO could take over the lease? WHAT could they do in the future? Could it be sold?

There are numerous international studies demonstrating the significant impacts of helicopters on native fauna, in particular on disruptions to bird migrations; also on fauna reliant on hearing for feeding, mating and care of young.

The conclusion of a 2019 ecological study is that the aircraft activity will negatively impact on the internationally recognised migration of honeyeaters through the Blue Mountains. It could also impact other birds inhabiting the diverse bushland surrounding the site. (BMRM Ecological Surveys).

The airfield land was always intended to be returned to its surrounding National Park and this is what should happen.

A commercial development within the World Heritage Area threatens the integrity of the land, makes it more difficult to manage as a natural area and could even put its status in jeopardy.

We need to stop this threat ever arising again! Protect our World Heritage Area Keep this public land in public hands.

Fly Neighbourly Agreements are self regulated and not enforced by any government agency. They have not protected the National Park in the past and cannot in the future.

Keep the dirt airstrip for emergency landings and firefighting as management of the airstrip is best undertaken by a firefighting agency. In addition to it's other function the National Parks and Wildlife Service (NPWS) is a vital firefighting agency already managing a number of emergency airfields.

Thanks for giving me the opportunity to express my concern about the commercial lease of Katoomba Airfield, Medlow Bath. I grew up in the Blue Mountains and have recently returned to live in Medlow Bath.

My use of the airfield:

- 1) I walk around the site using service roads on a regular basis (around 1–2 times a week on average) to access views/the start of the Bruce Walk.
- 2) I walk and bike ride past the airfield and into the national park to access Point Pilcher and Grand Canyon Walk via Old Point Pilcher Walking Track (around 1–2 times a month); and
- 3) I regularly ride my bike and walk along the route to YKAT ie along Railway Parade, Rutland Road and Grand Canyon Road.

I fully support the use of the airfield for emergency service use (as it has been for the past 50 years) but have the following concerns around its use by commercial operators:

#### Safety and environmental issues with the route from Medlow Bath to the airfeld.

I am very concerned that the erosion issues on Grand Canyon Road will become even worse with increased traffic to the airfield, making the road unsafe to drive on and more than offsetting any environmental improvements made to the site itself by further damaging endangered hanging swamps in the area (through increased runoff and sedimentation).

I am also extremely concerned about safety on the narrow route to the airfield from the station—bikes, walkers, prams, horse riders and dog walkers all use this route on a regular basis. There are several pinch points where two cars cannot pass each other safely. If you add aircraft fuel tankers and tourist minibuses into the mix, it will put existing road users at risk.

## The inability of state government departments and/or other public agencies like CASA to enforce conditions for use of the site

Controlling the number and frequency of flights into and out of the airfield, the potential number of operators that will use the field, and the designated flight paths aircraft will follow (particularly as these will need to be flexible for safety reasons to account for the highly variable weather conditions at and around the site) is essential to protect surrounding residents, and tourists, from invasive noise.

However,If the state government enters the lease it will be relying on the 'good intentions' of a commercial operator (or *operators* if the lease is transferred) to protect the community rather than legislation.

A fly neighbourly agreement is a voluntary code and there are no government bodies (local, state or federal) with the resources and legislative teeth to:

- 1) adequately monitor aircraft movements to ensure they are kept to
- 2) prosecute and/or fine offenders

Despite the arguments put on the FlyBLue website, there is no commercial imperative for the new leaseholders to monitor flight movements either—the more flights into and out of the airfield the higher

the likely profit. This is particularly the case if a 50-year lease is entered into because there is strong potential any new operators (leaseholders) of the site will have no publicly stated intention (or obligation) to protect the amenity of visitors and residents of the Blue Mountains at all.

It would be irresponsible for the government to enter a lease agreement over an environmentally sensitive site on the edge of the Grose Valley wilderness and near upper mountains towns and villages when they have neither the resources nor the legal ability to enforce conditions to control the number of flights into and out of the site.

It should also be noted that if flights are shoehorned onto weekends and/or into sunny days (avoiding foggy and windy conditions), this will impact residents much more severely than the numbers of flights allowed (per week or month) would indicate. I.e if 20 to 30 flights in and out of the airfield are crowded onto one or two days to make up for bad weather or capitalise on tourism potential of weekends the noise impacts will be very severe—particularly for those living near the airfield.

#### The incompatibility of the proposed leaseholders, community and environmental needs

To get a return on the significant investments being made at the site, the new operators will need to increase the number of flights into and out of the Blue Mountains National Park. Residents of upper Blue Mountains townships are likely to be affected, but so will visitors wanting to get away from the noise of the city and enjoy the sights. The peaceful natural environment is one of the key drivers of tourism to the area—walkers, rock climbers, canyoners and sightseers all contribute significantly to the local economy and are likely to be adversely affected.

In particular, landing tourist helicopters and fixed-winged aircraft with World Heritage-listed national park could jeopardise the long-term sustainability of the Blue Mountains tourism economy by:

- 1: Impacting the reputation the Blue Mountains as a quiet and peaceful escape
- 2: Increasing noise and reducing amenity for hikers, climbers and canyoners
- 3: Concentrating tourist dollars in fewer hands. Tourists that arrive or depart by helicopter are much more likely to be dependent on a few luxury operators for transport and accommodation (including those currently under investigation for rorting visa schemes and underpaying international workers)
- 4: A decrease in reputation or 'wilderness experience' will likely result in fewer visits from those tourists that spend at local cafes, pubs, shops and retail outlets or support local culture and events.

The proposed commercial lease of the Katoomba Airfield contradicts the NSW Government's own strategic plan for the World Heritage area, which stated aim is that: 'Recreational and tourist overflights do not interfere with the natural quiet, biodiversity and GBMWHA [Greater Blue Mountains World Heritage Area's] aesthetic values.'

My wife and I purchased our home in Katoomba in late 2010. As Sydney CBD professionals we were attracted to the area for its unique combination of peace and quiet, clean air, World Heritage/National Park location, and proximity to every amenity. My wife and I are long term residents of hand believe we have a significant interest in the issue of a lease for the use of this airfield for commercial helicopter operations.

We OBJECT in the strongest possible terms to the transfer of this land out of the National Park in which it is situated.

The airfield should be permanently incorporated into the BMNP and used only for emergency landings and firefighting.

We are also most concerned at the lack of meaningful consultation and access to information regarding numbers of flights and their paths which will impact negatively on our already threatened environment and the peace and amenity of our villages and homes. Tourism will suffer so that a very small number of people can make money out of a public asset.

These points have been made by others before but please read them again as they represent a majority community view.

- 1. Numerous government reports have recommended or anticipated the site should be returned to the National Park. Why has this process not occurred?
- 2. How can anyone properly engage in community consultation when we don't know the scale of the proposed helicopter tourism operation? The state government has steadfastly refused to release the numbers of flights and their frequency to the general public.
- 3. Flight paths have only been displayed at "drop-in" sessions at Hotel Blue, but do not include intended pathways beyond the immediate vicinity of the airfield. The proposed "hub and spoke" model means flights will head to the Central West. Do we know these flight paths? We do not. This model may also bring in other operators further increasing activity.
- 4. Why was the community not consulted by the state government about what kind of use was appropriate for such a sensitive site *before* they released a tender for a licence by direct negotiation (see Expression of Interest), and awarded it to a high-impact helicopter tourism business, when community groups had also applied?
- 5. Why has public land, used by the Rural Fire Service during fire fighting operations, been licensed to a private operator to manage primarily for profit rather than for the benefit of the community?



I object to the issuing of a long term commercial lease over Katoomba Airfield. I support the inclusion of Katoomba Airfield into the Blue Mountains National Park, to be managed only as an emergency airfield, with specific funding provided to the NPWS for management.

As a resident of the Blue Mountains I think there is already too much aircraft noise overhead from joy flights, and it is rarely policed, so basically it is a free for all to the detriment of the residents of the Blue Mountains and those who visit. The Fly Neighbourly Agreement of 1994 too, was unenforceable and unlikely to be enforceable now. I object to even more unenforced commercial flights being allowed in the area. The Blue Mountains is a World Heritage Park not a playground. Aircraft noise impacts on animals as well as people. The allowance of yet more aircraft will have adverse effects on the environment, flora and fauna, for example on migrating flocks of birds. Tourists on the ground have come to the Mountains for peace and quiet, for a picnic or bushwalking. Why should these people along with residents be subjected to unnecessary aircraft noise for the sake of a handful of tourists who can splash a bit of money around to see it from the air, and operators cashing in on the popularity of the area?

Previous use of the airfield for joy flights was heavily opposed by the community and the same applies now. This is a sensitive and valuable area appreciated by those who live here, and those who enjoy nature activities such as bushwalking. The Department should not be pandering to private operators at the expense of the broader community of the Blue Mountains.

In two previous assessments in 2000 and 2008 it was concluded that the land should not be privately leased but should be incorporated into the Blue Mountains National Park and used for emergency and bushfire operations only. However, in the quiet air of Blackheath, helicopter noise and single-engine planes can be heard in the airspace for a disturbingly long time as they come and go. Over sumer, while bushfires rage, the sound of aircraft fighting the fires is comforting. When someone is lost in bush, too, and the police are out in helicopters searching at all hours, it's a welcome sound. But day in, day out, 5, 10, 20 times a day, ferrying wealthy sightseers around so they can "look but not touch", would be unbearable. And the impact and stress on our wild creatures -- it just isn't worth it!

The Blue Mountains is an important place. It cradles Sydney and is its lungs. People come from all over the world to experience peace, stillness, nature, fresh air and quiet here.

If every person who came here for the peace and serenity was aware of the proposed development, there would be an enormous number of objections. However people don't know and so you're possibly only hearing from the locals, and you might think this is just another "nimby" reaction.

Please do not allow a commercial operator to lease the airfield. I am very concerned that allowing commercial flights to and from Katoomba Airfield will disturb the proper usage of the World Heritage- listed National Parks in the Blue Mountains and beyond.

The tourism value of the National Parks depends on undisturbed vistas of peaceful scenery. I have read that the economy of the upper Blue Mountains is largely dependent on tourism, and indeed, the city describes itself as "The City Within a World Heritage National Park." I believe helicopter joy flights would bring only a small number of tourists but would ultimately turn away a much greater number of tourists.

Walkers, climbers, and visitors should not have their "escapes" hounded by the noise and vibrations or air compression waves caused by aircraft such as helicopters. This air compression is felt physically as well as heard. The natural ecology of the area, so vital for the whole Sydney region, depends on the wildlife being undisturbed and not frightened away by noise and vibration of aircraft. Local accommodation businesses, retreat centres and health resorts, etc. market themselves as peaceful getaways. Many restaurants and boutiques depend on the special character of the Blue Mountains. All of this incalculable value will be damaged if everyone has to put up with the noise and vibration of overhead helicopter flights. And of course, residents also value their peace and quiet.

I am a fairly recent local (moving from Sydney's eastern suburbs a few years ago). I am also a bush walker. Furthermore, I often have friends and relatives (some interstate, some from overseas) to stay and enjoy the natural atmosphere of the upper Blue Mountains so I have good reason to be concerned and urge that the local community be heard on this issue.

I join other residents and citizens from further afield to ask that this public land NOT be used for commercial purposes and that the airfield be used for emergencies only. During an emergency, of course, everyone would be willing to put up with any necessary noise and air compression. For good measure, I also agree with the call that this crown land be transferred to the National Park.

I have lived in the Blue Mountains for 31 years, and the reason I absolutely disagree with the commercial lease of Katoomba Airfield, is the following:

Airfield, keeping the airfield for EMERGENCY USE only.

- 1. There are glossy black cockatoos, listed as VULNERABLE, that are very noise sensitive, as well as other noise sensitive local wildlife who will be adversely effected by the additional noise that the commercialisation of the air field will inevitably bring.
- 2. Plane and helicopter noise and pollution over both a National Park and a World Heritage area, is not only damaging for highly sensitive ecosystems, but will also deter tourists and hikers who come to the mountains specifically for quiet natural tranquility, away from anthropogenic noise.
- 3. Peregrine falcons have been regularly seen (I've seen them multiple times) in bushlands surrounding the airfield, and they need to soar uninhibited at great heights in order to find their prey.
- 4. Community consultation must occur first in an area as unique and as fragile the Blue Mountains. Community consultation should always be first priority, and overwhelmingly, with well over 3000 signatures, the local community is saying no.
- 5. We do not need additional air pollution over wilderness areas. There are incredibly sensitive flora and fauna and given that these are remote wildernesses, they are World Heritage areas, pollution will adversely affect these remote areas, it is absolutely not worth the risk.
- 6. Many of us move to the Blue Mountains to escape anthropogenic noise. It is not fair to punish Blue Mountains residents, artists, writers who chose to move here for the peace and quiet.

I love the Blue Mountains so much, and it is very important to me that this environmental disaster does not go ahead. It's not okay to do this in this middle of a beautiful National Park. It should be kept as it is, incorporated into the National Park and left for emergency use only.

I have lived in Katoomba since 1978, we live on the edge of the put up with low flying aircraft flying over our house for many years, our house stands at around 3,000 feet altitude, and planes and helicopters from Bankstown frequently fly over our house only 100 or 200 feet above us (according to flight radar online). Previous users of Katoomba Airfield have caused even greater inconvenience, and I have no reason to expect the Larsons will be any different, seeking money from the few, while spoiling the peace and quiet of the many. The terrain of Katoomba should always have been a consideration when flight paths were planned, but the low altitude limit and set flight paths demonstrate that nobody in aviation regulation has considered why Echo Point was so named.

There should be no airfield in Katoomba, and all flights over Katoomba, whether large or small aircraft, should have regulated altitude minimums

- at least 10,000 feet for larger craft, and 6,000' for smaller craft.

The community would be happier still if all aircraft, including commercial passenger flights, were routed around Katoomba instead of flying directly over the town as they have done for as long as I can remember. In light of the money Katoomba and the Blue Mountains brings into the country as a world famous landmark and haven of peace and quiet, all aircraft should be kept clear of our skies.

Imagine standing at Echo Point admiring the Three Sisters for the first time, with amplified low flying aircraft ruining the scene and drowning out all conversation.

Larger, passenger jets flying at around 5,000', cause reverberating noise, bouncing off the many cliffs and rock walls to an unacceptable noise level - unless you see it, it is impossible to tell the direction of the aircraft because of the sound bounces off the rock walls, which greatly amplifies the volume.

This is not the image Australia wishes to create for it's World Heritage national parks. We have thousands of tourists coming here every day of the week, and it is common to hear them complain of the aircraft noise caused by both large commercial jets and low flying planes and helicopters. The noise spoils bushwalks, and picnics are ruined by noise and turbulence from joy flights.

I am a long-term local resident in Katoomba and would like to submit my objections to the proposed commercial leasing of the Katoomba Airfield.

My objections to this commerical lease are as follows:

- 1. The Katoomba airfield is entirely surrounded by World Heritage Listed national park and was originally part of the national park. When the airfield was created and transferred from National Park to Crown land status, it was recommended that it be returned to the National Park in the long term. Many government reports have recommended that the airfield be returned to the National Park in the interests of the integrity of the park.
- 2. In the 1990's, the airfield was leased to a commercial company which ran tourist joy rides. The impact of the noise on the local community and the ability for people to enjoy the natural environment in the National Park was so great that extended community protests continued until the lease was cancelled by the mid-1990s.
- 3. The Blue Mountains economy relies very heavily on tourists and the reputation of the mountains as a place of peaceful retreat is so critical to this. Helicopters are very loud, fly much lower than other aircraft and joy-ride flights would be frequent in order to be profitable for the company holding the lease.

It is actually impossible to enjoy sitting by a beautiful waterfall, or in one of our amazing canyons with the sound of a helicopter dominating everything. Most Blue Mountains residents have already experienced this at times when a rescue helicopter flies overhead.

- 4. The negative impact of the lease would extend to so many businesses working in tourism in the mountains while the benefit is only for a single or very small number of operators. Government is responsible for making decisions that benefit the majority of the public which they have a mandate to serve not a small number of individuals.
- 5. The airport needs to stay entirely in public hands for the safety of our residents and infrastructure. The Blue Mountains is an area which is increasingly at risk of fires as the trend seems to be that maximum summer temperatures have been increasing. This has been recognized by the Rural Fire Service in the creation of the new Catastrophic fire conditions rating. We need the airport to be 100% dedicated to use by our Rural Fire Services at all times.

Thank you for taking the time to read this submission against the commercial lease of Katoomba Airport.

I sincerely hope that the interests of the majority of businesses, and individuals who live in and who visit the Blue Mountains will have more weight than the benefit to a single operator.

Whilst we signed the petition that was sent around and online voted against this action I have been told none of that is valid. This is also why I am writing to you directly.

How can anyone properly engage in community consultation when we don't know the scale of the proposed helicopter tourism operation? The state government has steadfastly refused to release the numbers of flights and their frequency to the general public. This lack of community communication is highly inappropriate.

This region is a World Heritage Area listed bush land setting and it is filled with at risk plant and animal species. When you move here or spend extended time here you become more aware of the areas vulnerability.

The tourism economy within this area has long been fueled by this peaceful environment and the spectacular landscape. Why change this? Our visitors come because of the peaceful environment.

The proposed "hub and spoke" model means flights will head to the Central West- who is speaking of these flight paths and will there be multiple programs or other operator's further increasing activity.



## The Environment

Katoomba Airfield is completely surrounded by the Greater Blue Mountains World Heritage Area. Within 5km of the airfield there are over 3000 native species, including those listed as endangered.

- The Blue Mountains World Heritage Area is up for review later this year. It's status may be effected (and threatened further in combination with proposed changes to Warragamba Dam)
- Damage to rare hanging swamp habitat caused by runoff and erosion from increased traffic on the unsealed section of Grand Canyon Road and the tarmacing of the runway
- 3. The detrimental impact of Helicopters on Blue Mountains Wildlife and other World Heritage Values.

## Lifestyle and amenity

The liveability of upper Blue Mountains towns and villages is likely to be impacted by:

- 1. An increase in helicopters and associated noise—we already have issues with scenic flights over the area conducted by other operators. However, those helicopters do not land in or take off from within the World Heritage Area.
- 2. Helicopter noise can travel long distances in an acoustically-sensitive environment dominated by cliffs and canyons, potentially affecting parts of North Katoomba, Medlow Bath and Blackheath and other areas in earshot of the flight paths.

- 3. Any Fly Neighbourly Policy is self-regulated. The policy does not, at the admission of the lease applicant, include aircraft that do not originate from Katoomba Airfield, so that would include many arrivals.
- 4. Increased traffic along the route to the airfield (including fuel tankers and airport runway building equipment) on a narrow local road and walking path. The road is not designed for large vehicles (Station Street, Rutland Road and Grand Canyon Road).

# Detrimental effects on the Local Tourism Industry

The Blue Mountains is famous for its natural environment and the outdoor experiences that it offers both visitors and locals. An estimated 1.25 million people undertake bushwalks in the Blue Mountains each year.

Landing tourist helicopters and fixed winged aircraft within World Heritage-listed national park could jeopardise the Blue Mountains experience by:

- 1. Impacting the reputation of the Blue Mountains as a quiet and peaceful escape
- 2. Increasing noise and reducing amenity for hikers, climbers and canyoners
- 3. Concentrating tourist dollars in fewer hands. Tourists that arrive or depart by helicopter are much more likely to be dependent on a few operators for transport and accommodation
- 4. A decrease in reputation or 'wilderness experience' will logically result in fewer visits, meaning less spent at local cafes, pubs, shops and retail outlets or spent on supporting local culture and events.

# Concerns about the bureaucratic process that got us here

- 1. Numerous government reports have recommended or anticipated the site should be returned to the National Park. Why has this process not occurred?
- 2. How can anyone properly engage in community consultation when we don't know the scale of the proposed helicopter tourism operation? The state government has steadfastly refused to release the numbers of flights and their frequency to the general public.
- 3. Flight paths have only been displayed at "drop-in" sessions at Hotel Blue, but do not include intended pathways beyond the immediate vicinity of the airfield. The proposed "hub and spoke" model means flights will head to the Central West. Do we know these flight paths? We do not. This model may also bring in other operators further increasing activity.
- 4. Why was the community not consulted by the state government about what kind of use was appropriate for such a sensitive site before they released a tender for a licence by direct negotiation, and awarded it to a high-impact helicopter tourism business, when community groups had also applied?

5. Why has public land, used by the Rural Fire Service during fire fighting operations, been licensed to a private operator to manage primarily for profit rather than for the benefit of the community?

I am writing to add my voice to others that have been raised in serious objection to the proposal that Katoomba Airfield may become a busy commercial enterprise, tainting the serenity of the World Heritage Blue Mountains 'hot spots" with invasive noise pollution from helicopters and aircraft. These activities would significantly detract, in my view, from the treasured values of this one of a kind natural area of national and international significance. If this operation was allowed to go ahead, the momentary enjoyment of the passing few would impact on the quality of life of all in our community. The serenity and peace of the Blue Mountains, and its importance to tourism, biodiversity, quality of life of residents and visitors cannot be underestimated.

Many years ago I remember another commercial operation of joy flights in the Grose Valley with great distress. Quiet walks in the Grand Canyon and along the Grose cliff edges were disturbed by the sound of choppers reverberating across the cliff walls as they flew below the cliff line. The noise was dreadful. I believe that operation was halted through public protest and am greatly disturbed that we are fighting the same fight again, when the world is more in need of nature and the serenity that natural areas provide than ever. Such areas should be utterly cherished as they diminish, as they are finite and irreplaceable.

How can the profit of the few be justified when their benefit brings very little to the local community, and in fact detracts significantly from enjoyment of the national park and townships by residents and land based visitors? In terms of Cost Benefit Analysis, it makes no sense. The few who can afford to experience from the area via helicopter will negatively impact on the significant number who access the 100s of kilometres of walking trails, taking it slow, staying in our townships - all drawn by the very real feeling of wilderness that our national park surrounds provides. There are case studies of this value diminishment from of natural areas around the world, where commercial operations of helicopters are having a harsh and negative impact of the quality of experience for land based visitors, and a permanent loss of peace for residents. I strongly wish it not to happen here.

So, in harmony with others that also hold this unique and peaceful place very precious, I wish to express that:

- 1. I vehemently object to this public land being used for commercial purposes
- 2. I would wish for this crown land should be kept for the benefit of the majority, not for the profit of a few, by transferring it to national park and protecting it from commercial interest forever
- 3. Keep a working dirt strip for emergency use only, with the understanding that fire fighting and enmergency helicopters do not require the same standard of strip as a commercial fixed wing operation.



I am strongly opposed to the Medlow Bath Airfield being used for commercial purposes through Sky Blue.

I live in the direct line of the proposed helicopter flight path. This would be disruptive, noisy and an intrusion on privacy with helicopters flying directly over my home. I do not want to live with this invasive noise numerous times a day, every day, which would be a likely scenario if Sky Blue gains permission to lease the airfield.

We live in a World Heritage National Park. People live here to enjoy its natural beauty. Visitors and National Park user's come to the area to experience a natural, peaceful, unspoilt environment. The airstrip and surrounding bushland of the World Heritage National Park are sensitive areas.

The airstrip is situated in close vicinity to our water catchment and drinking water supply. The lease of the airstrip by Sky Blue could potentially be a threat to polluting Lake Medlow and Cascade. I am unaware of any environmental impact study being conducted to assess the impact on the World Heritage National Park and it's wildlife and ecology in relation to the use of the airstrip by Sky Blue.

I think the airstrip would be better managed by National Parks or Blue Mountains Council and could be used for Emergency helicopter services only. This option would significantly decrease the cost of maintenance but still allow emergency use which would be acceptable and beneficial to the public by assisting in protection of properties and the community.

I am concerned that the presence of aircraft activities will greatly degrade the ambience, and natural beauty of our World Heritage National Park and do not support Sky Blue operating from the airfield in any capacity.

RE: Prosed commercial development Katoomba Airstrip.

As a resident of the Blue Mountains, I am writing to voice my strong objections to the commercialisation of the Katoomba airfield, and in particular, the granting of permission for scenic helicopter flights in the area.

Given that there are already some 90,000 tourists to the area each year, and that what attracts them is not only the spectacular scenery, but the ability to walk in such a peaceful and ecologically diverse area in tranquility and to observe native fauna, it is hard to accept that the constant noise of helicopters ferrying only the richest of visitors to the region can in any way enhance that experience.

Offering of scenic flights is surely redundant in an area where the natural beauty is already so accessible, in addition to compromising the status of the National Park as a World Heritage area.

As a resident I am always very aware of the sound of a helicopter overhead as it certainly shatters the tranquillity of the area, but it raises the alarm that someone is missing or injured, or that there is a bushfire or other emergency. A few years ago, helicopters flew at a low level across many suburbs over an entire weekend. Police Command in Katoomba received so many hundreds of calls that they were forced to issue public announcements to explain an electricity company was checking the state of its poles and wires through several townships. Imagine living with this level of intense noise through every daylight hour, let alone the damage it will cause to local wildlife.

Of course the Airfield has been there for a long time, of course there is a need for a landing strip to be maintained for emergency services. But could this airstrip not be assimilated into the nearby National Park, to be managed by National Parks and Wildlife Service (NPWS) thereby still providing emergency services but protected from unnecessary development which in the long term is going to severely harm the environment which attracts visitors to the area already?

In recent years the Blue Mountains has made great strides as an arts business precinct, with the Cultural Centre and Scenic World featuring exhibitions and sales of well-known local artists and artisans, new ventures in the performing arts, and most notably, the boost to the local economy through film production: *My Favourite Dinosaur; Book Week, Acute Misfortune* and *Smoke Between Trees* are just four recent examples that have all been shot entirely in the Blue Mountains and have played in cinema release and/or at International Film Festivals. The presence of an airfield with constant helicopter noise overhead or nearby will severely limit the attraction of the Blue Mountains as a filmmaking location. Other institutions such as Varuna, the Writers' House, this year hosting an international Writers Festival in addition to its main aim of providing a quiet and beautiful location for selected writers to complete their work, would surely find their main purpose and function severely compromised.

I do hope you can take the above points into consideration.

To Whom It May Concern

I wish to raise my concerns over the future of Katoomba Airfield (YKAT). It has come to my attention that the government is considering closing the facility completely, in response to the actions of a very small but very hostile group of local residents.

As an expectation of the last 23 years, I have conducted many fieldcraft training activities on the YKAT facility and the surrounding bushland every year. The site offers a unique combination of terrains, with an operational airfield, with relatively easy access to hospital and other emergency services, as well as good mobile phone coverage. This allows us to facilitate valuable fieldcraft training in the safest possible environment, within reasonable transport range of our bases in Sydney. We have always respected the natural environment and hope that it will remain unchanged for many years to come. We hope to be able to continue to conduct fieldcraft and leadership training on the site.

The current Managers of the site have done an outstanding job, at considerable expense, of improving the site – both in terms of cleaning up the abandoned materials on the site and improving the infrastructure for the aviation community – all done in a responsible and sustainable way.

It is vital that the Airfield remain available as an operational facility, albeit with limitations of traffic, for the safety of the local community. I remember the great role it played a few years ago, when the aircraft being used for firefighting were being refilled with fire retardant foam on the site, saving valuable time that otherwise would have lost flying to more distant sites.

It is imperative that the safety of the broader local community should be considered above the short-sighted, "not-in-my-back-yard" interests of a small group of individuals. The utility value of this public asset is much greater than the perceived increase in the "peace and quiet" value to those individuals. Moreover, we must recognise that, once lost, it is extremely unlikely that this asset will ever be recovered.

Of course, the facility will need to be made available to the aviation community to be sustainable in the long term, but the level of potential traffic is never likely to be a significant inconvenience to anyone other than the small group of people who allow the hysteria of environmental protest to tunnel their vision.

I pledge my support, on behalf of the Australian Air Force Cadets, to assist in any way possible to keep this valuable asset in operation. Please feel free to contact me if I may be of any assistance.

I am writing in support of the proposed lease of Katoomba Airfield to the applicant, who I understand is operating at the airfield under a short-term licence.

I had intended to attend an information session conducted by the Department of Industry at Katoomba recently, but was turned away by a large agitated group of people protesting against the proposed lease. Over the past few months, I have been approached several times by people requesting I sign a petition "opposing the commercialisation of Katoomba Airfield" — outside polling booths at both elections, on the street and inside shopping malls. There have been numerous letter-box drops and full-colour newspaper advertisements. It appears to be a remarkably well-organised and well-funded campaign, which I think is partly a carry-over from frustration at the failure of the campaign opposing the airport at Badgerys Creek.

I am a resident of Blackheath. In my younger, bushwalking days, I spent some time exploring the Grose, Cox and Kanangra Rivers, and fully appreciate the majesty and wonder of those wild areas. The Blue Mountains National Park is itself surrounded by areas of great interest- such as the Wolgan and Capertee Valleys – which are difficult for the day tourist to access but which can be readily appreciated by air.

Over the past several months, I have noticed helicopters "dropping in" to the Megalong Valley Tea-rooms without raising complaints from patrons and neighbours, and without disturbing stock grazing nearby. I understand that, as a condition of the lease, constraints will be placed on the lessee which will ensure minimal disturbance to both neighbours and tourists.

Opponents of the proposed lease are demanding that the airfield be incorporated into the National Park and maintained by NPWS for emergency use only. The Katoomba Airfield is accessed by the NPWS-maintained road to Point Pilcher – a road which has deteriorated very badly over the past few years. I doubt whether the NPWS has the will and the funding to maintain the airfield safely.

I strongly believe that Katoomba Airfield should remain as Crown Land, leased to a commercial operator under strict conditions.

Over the last few months, given the uproar surrounding the proposal to reopen the airfield at "Katoomba", and as a local business owner, and resident of the upper Blue Mountains for the best part of 40 years, I have taken the issue very seriously, and have research both sides of the argument, quite heavily. First I found it alarming, very alarming, that the negative campaign is relying almost exclusively on incorrect and misleading information, such as stating it is FACT that National Parks own the airfield, and that they operate several other airfields inside national parks.. This is a point blank lie, National parks do not operate any airfields, they simply do not have the funding to do so. In fact, if you use the airspace rules for the region, and try to contact National Parks to request approval to fly over national parks in the region, either no one answers the phone, or the people answering have no idea of the protocol to follow! The same pattern turns up with the various other claims being made by the negative campaign, including overflight of towns being requested, land clearing ( planting is to be carried out ).

The airfield was designated such before the establishment of the National Park, it was never carved out of an existing Park, for example.

Sorry for getting sidetracked, but the approach of the group campaigning against the airfield has been highly unprofessional, misleading, and forceful, I have been physically blocked from passing a protester, being told I had to sign a petition to " save the mountains", there was no mention of it being a petition against the airfield, MANY PEOPLE HAVE SIGNED THE PETITION NOT KNOWING WHAT THEY HAVE SIGNED, as its been misrepresented what is being asked to be signed.

1. The desire to seek financial returns via rental agreements from commercial operators is only one small consideration, it should be weighed

against the incalculable value to future generations of appropriately extending the Blue Mountains National Park. Because of its special location and value, I believe this public land should remain

under the management of a public institution, not leased to a private company to develop for their personal gain.

I would like to see Lot 550 DP 751657, Grand Canyon Road, Medlow Bath gazetted as an extension of our Blue Mountains National Park.

- 2. Your fact sheet on the proposal states that the department will not permit short-cycle/short-duration joy flights or circuit training. The financial investment proposed by FlyBlue would seem only sensible if they imagine a considerable traffic of recreational aviation, so their business model must anticipate a large flying club, or maybe frequent passing air traffic (perhaps a helicoptered elite from the Walgan Valley dropping in for some sight-seeing?) This is inappropriate use of the land and should not be allowed.
- 3. The users would only represent a minority of the millions of visitors enjoying the Blue Mountains every year. And yet all visitors would be negatively affected by the increased noise pollution and the loss of wildlife in surrounding bush.
- 4. I would hope that future use of the xisting airfield by RFS and other emergency services will continue and perhaps be enhanced by

dedicating the existing facilities to these organisations for training and operational purposes. This is compatible with the land being within the

National Park and having the surrounding bush managed by NPWS. This could improve the provision of vital fire-fighting facilities in the Blue

We focus on the pristine environment and the tranquility of the bush. A private company making financial gain from my and my customers discomfort is insulting, inappropriate and wrong. 60% of our 29 acres is conservation zoned because of rare and endangered plants and animals that live here. The affect of the helicopter noise on the endangered species on our property needs serious consideration. To date no environmental impact studies have been done and this fact alarms me. My name is and I am currently a student pilot. General aviation in Australia is dying. My flight school is at Bankstown Airfield, the only airfield open for general aviation in Sydney. The only other strip in the greater Sydney area is Camden. Had I been flying 30yrs ago I would have had the option to fly from airfields at Schofield and Hoxston Park. Airfields are shutting down and the ones left are becoming more restricted. At the moment there are no registered airfields between Bankstown and Bathurst, a distance of 135km. The only Helicopter Landing Sites are at Lithgow Hospital, Blackheath NPWS, Blue Mountains Hospital, Glenbrook NPWS and RAAF Glenbrook. None of these are open for general aviation. Allowing FlyBlue to take up a commercial lease at Katoomba Airfield will fill this gap. Not only will it be open for general and recreational aviation, having it in operation will mean it is in good condition when needed for emergency services. At the moment it is in such poor condition it is closed for fixed wing operations. Allowing scenic and charter flights to operate from Katoomba to the surrounding area will not suddenly bring aircraft into the area, multiple companies operating out it Sydney and Bankstown already offer scenic flights to the Blue Mountains, having them fly out of Katoomba will simply bring that industry and revenue to the local area. I write to voice my concerns, and the concerns of every member of my community who has discussed this issue with me, regarding the commercial use of Katoomba airfield.

Like most local residents and others familiar with the Mountains and the national park, I tried to keep an open mind about this proposal, and did not rush into a position before doing my best to become informed over the past months during the debate over its future impact. In fact, I am writing now only hours before the close of submissions. But I believe the impacts are clear, and overwhelmingly negative to the residential areas as well as the national park, even if the proposal does stick to the limits it claims to respect. Projects to mitigate impacts of noise on residents and wildlife by 'planting a tree for every flight' appear nothing more than a pointless sop in a protected World Heritage wilderness such as this.

It is an established fact that noise pollution is damaging to wildlife for which, in large part, this place was created. Some people persist in drawing a line between environmental protection and economic viability, as though the two factors are in conflict with one another. Surprising as it sometimes seems to be to these people, that is often far from the truth. Economic viability exists in the Blue Mountains hand in hand with the ongoing protection of what people come here to experience. Millions come from around the world to enjoy its wilderness, its views and its peace and quiet. Millions more come from Australia's towns and cities, for the same reasons, as they have for generations.

Peace and quiet may be difficult to quantify economically. But we ought to do it more often. The objections of Mountains residents to this proposal are too obvious to mention here. However, the attractions for tourists who sustain every aspect of the Mountains economy can best be expressed by the tourists themselves. How many stand in wonder at Echo Point or Govett's Leap or the lookouts of Narrow Neck and Ruined Castle, enjoying the treasured and vanishing luxury of silence and the sounds of birdlife generally denied them? It is exceedingly rare - but it is not priceless. Most of us here make our living from it.

Today you can walk into the Grose Valley and find an environment basically unchanged since long before the arrival of the first European explorers set eyes on it two centuries ago. The Blue Gum Forest there is known as the Cradle of Conservation because the movement to save this landscape - against a litany of selfish and damaging schemes - was began there in earnest. This proposal would fill the great escarpments with the sound of swashplates and rotor engines, gradually eroding its values and everything it has come to stand for.

I have seen the flight paths of this proposal, heard out their ideas and listened to the pitch, and none of that has convinced me that it is anything but a commercialisation of our wilderness areas for the economic gain of a few, at the expense of the many. Countless millions have enjoyed the Blue Mountains National Park without requiring a helicopter, and they will continue to do so for generations to come.

Blue Mountains National Park has long been an Australian icon, a reserve for all Australians, and through its World Heritage status everyone else as well. I urge you to keep this airfield limited to emergency services and strictly regulated use - preferably under the control of our NSW Parks and Wildlife Service - and reject any proposal for commercial sightseeing flights over our homes and this precious wilderness.

To whom it may concern, for 35 years and also a landowner in the Megalong Valley for that time so I I have been a resident of have a deep interest in the lease of the airfield. I considered I had a responsibility to inform myself of the details as well as possible, not only for me personally but my fellow residents of the Upper Mountains. Apart from thoroughly studying the FlyBlue website, I have attended 2 public meetings held by Crown lands, a meeting of the Megalong Community Association and two Blackheath Rotary meetings where the subject was discussed, one addressed by the prospective lessees Derek and Floyd Larsen and the second by Di Shanks from the Blue Mountains Conservation Society and Chris Howden, the convenor of the Community Alliance against the lease.

There would appear to be 2 aspects to the proposal, the details of the business activities of the lessees and the maintenance of the site

- 1. Business and Aviation activities: The type of aviation activity, flight paths and altitudes seem to be well described on the website and appear to be well away from and above residential areas. The frequency of flights is not revealed, or even approximated - when questioned on this, the Larsens said it is difficult to predict and I understand that but I feel a minimum for the proposal to be viable could have been suggested. A maximum number of flights per month could possibly be included in the lease, subject to review. I am generally satisfied with the answers to the "frequently asked questions" on the Department website.
- 2. Maintenance: To have the site well maintained by private enterprise rather than from the public purse is economic good sense. Again, it's important that the lease include strict and enforceable conditions so that the airfield is always available for emergency use and that the environmental damage caused by neglect over the years is corrected. Opponents to the lease proposal have suggested that the airfield be maintained by National Parks - while this organisation carries out some admirable work, my enquiries and my experience as a landholder adjacent to the National Park would indicate that they are not equipped for the task, have no specific experience in airfields and so to go down this path with respect to maintaining the site for emergency use would be at least suspect and possibly dangerous.

Overall, I found the Larsen's proposal on the website and in person to be well developed and inclusive of community concerns. While many community members have justifiable questions, I found that the majority of opponents at public meetings were ill-informed and emotional. Many still talked about "joy flights", "circling iconic sights" and "swooping low over residential areas", indicating they hadn't even read the proposal. Many were just against any private enterprise on public land, an unrealistic and economically unsustainable view in this case. I am in favour of the proposal as long as the lease conditions are strict on altitudes, flight paths, flying hours and airfield maintenance. The lease must also be monitored for compliance with an unambiguous and enforceable avenue of action if it is not adhered to.



I moved to the mountains with a young family, and feel very lucky to have raised four children in such a beautiful environment, subsequently recognised with World Heritage listing. I am very concerned that the proposal is not in the best interests of our community. We owe it to future generations to protect our national park, and to resist encroachments on it. The airfield was originally excised from national park. I support the NPWS's approach of looking to incorporate into national parks any privately owned or leased land surrounded by national park when that land becomes available. It is not appropriate to grant a long term lease for the commercial development and operation of an airfield on land which is wholly within the Blue Mountains National Park. However, I fully support continued use of the airfield for emergency purposes if required, as such a use clearly would be in our community's interests. Any upgrading of the airfield for commercial purposes will impact on the residents, and on the tourist trade on which the community is heavily economically dependent. People live in the Blue Mountains and visit the area for its natural beauty, wildlife and the peacefulness of the bush setting. All will be detrimentally impacted by noise pollution from low flying aircraft and helicopters. I propose that the lease application of Derek and Floyd Larsen and Flyblue be rejected and that the airfield be transferred, as previously proposed, to be incorporated into the Blue Mountains National Park, and further that the airfield be maintained with Federal and or NSW funding such as under the Natural Disaster Resilience Program or Bush Fire Risk Mitigation and Resilience Funding Brigade Mitigation Support Programme.


I suspect the nature of a commercial operation is such that it would be economically incentivised to increase helicopter traffic and have a detrimental impact on our community. The Significant increase Noise Pollution would impact in the following ways:

- Noise pollution affects both health and behaviour, sound noise would be detrimental to the peaceful nature of the valley.
- Noise can have a detrimental effect on animals, increasing the risk of death by changing the delicate balance in predator or prey detection and avoidance, and interfering the use of the sounds in communication, especially in relation to reproduction and in navigation.
- Noise pollution would create safety concerns for community members such as horse riders, working with animals in our valley.
- Increased air traffic in our valley would undermine our natural privacy
- Increased air traffic will undermine property values and the local economy by countering the very reasons that attract people to our valley to live or to visit either as tourists or for other activities such as horse riding

We believe that if a lease is granted on the Katoomba Airfield for a commercial operation, there will be limited to no recourse for the community to prevent a future escalation of Katoomba Airfield related aircraft traffic.

To whom it may concern,

I am writing to express my concern and objection to the proposal for the Katoomba airfield to be leased for a commercial tourist flight venture.

I moved to a years ago for the peaceful lifestyle offered in comparison to the city, and the amazing outdoor activities and connectedness to nature and wilderness. I feel the proposed venture would compromise this, and would provide no benefit to outweigh the negatives. While the proposal is for the commercial lease of the Katoomba airstrip, the negative impacts of granting this lease would be far reaching, with flight paths proposed throughout the Blue Mountains, close to towns and directly over wilderness areas.

Most of the area affected by this proposal is National Parks. National parks were created for the people and for the protection of these precious wilderness areas. People go to these places for natural beauty, serenity and peace and quiet. We need these places for the health of the population. People need opportunities for be amongst nature, to get away from civilisation and continual hum of technology. Allowing that hum to occur directly over the park, at low altitude (below the cliff line on some flight paths) will destroy the experience of the park for many users. Granting this lease will enable a business opportunity that will enhance the experience of a select few park users at the detriment of MOST other park users. This is not a fair and equitable commercial use of a public facility. It is robbing a public resource for commercial, class dividing interest, externalising the utility of most park users.

The environment would also be externalised by this venture. While sadly the environment pays a hidden cost for nearly everything humans do on this earth, the one place I would think it would actually factor in a decision making process is in the very place is it supposed to be protected. I am not opposed the helicopters flying over the national park on occasion – to drop off track building supplies, or rescue a lost hiker, but releasing emissions over the national park, for the sake of a commercial venture that is detrimental to the experience of nearly all other park users, is not equitable or just. In fact, I estimated that around 40kg of Green-House Gas emissions will be released over the Gross Wilderness area *per flight* (based on an efficiency assumption of 1.47km/L and 3kg of GHG emissions / L of Jet A fuel). The current proposal is to schedule helicopter flights from dawn until dusk. Assuming each flight is about half an hour, on a fully booked day, nearly 1 tonne of GHG emissions would be realised...per day! The applicant's proposal to plant new trees wouldn't be necessary if they weren't proposing to pollute the air right over one of the most important Carbon Sinks in NSW.

Many people who move to Blackheath and other Blue Mountains towns, do so for its tranquillity, proximity to wilderness, and the sporting and outdoor recreational pursuits offered by the park, such as trail running, paragliding, rock climbing and hiking. These people are our community's nurses, doctors, physios, fire fighters, teachers, engineers, artists, small business owners, and carpenters (to name the few that I know personally). If the very reason they moved here is compromised, then our diverse community and our skilled workforce will be compromised. Paragliding for example, stands to be banned by the proposal due to airspace restrictions, and hiking, climbing and trail running will become so unpleasant with the constant overhead buz, that people will seek other, helicopter free, locations. The lifestyle of anyone who moved to Blackheath seeking peace, tranquillity, and views offered by the eastern ends of Govetts Leap Rd and Hat Hill Rd will be compromised. The benefit of a few tourists buying lunch in town on the weekends surely does not outweigh what the paragliders, runners, hikers, climbers and general community members contribute to this community daily.

The applicant's claim the this is an investment that will help the local economy is completely unfounded and questionable. Many tourists of all socio-economic backgrounds, from all over the world, come to visit the Blue Mountains. I find it very hard to imagine that more would come specifically due to a helicopter flight service

offering, but rather that it is something people who are visiting the area anyway, may decide to do while they are here. Therefore the economic benefit to the wider community would be very little to nil, or even negative. The only benefit would be to a private company making money from tourists who would have visited the area anyway, and in fact most likely spent their money on other local services instead of a helicopter flight.

Furthermore, any economic benefit that could be attributed to the venture, would have to be outweighed by damage to the economy caused ruining the amenity (via noise pollution) of many popular walking areas and existing tourist attractions. The applicant's claim that leasing the site for recreational and tourist flight operations would some how open up more opportunities for bushwalkers is absurd, when numerous established and famous walking tracks, already popular with bushwalkers, will become far less attractive. There are already existing walking trails near the airstrip, such as the one linking to the 'grand canyon'. The claim that these trails and the experience of bushwalkers will somehow be enhanced by having helicopters fly over head is a joke.

With no logical argument for how this venture would be of benefit to anyone of anything apart from themselves, and many arguments for how it would be damaging to the environment, community, lifestyle and other forms of tourism, I urge decision makers to re-consider the use of the airstrip, and incorporate it into National Parks for emergency use only.

The conclusion of a 2019 ecological study is that the aircraft activity will negatively impact on the internationally recognised migration of honeyeaters through the Blue Mountains. It could also impact other birds inhabiting the diverse bushland surrounding the site.

### 2. PUT THIS LAND INTO THE SURROUNDING NATIONAL PARK

The airfield land was always intended to be returned to its surrounding National Park. This is the solution.

Dear Scott Mullen,

I was recently made aware that Katoomba Airfield may possibly be granted a commercial licence. It was good meeting you, and thank you for the opportunity of commenting on the proposal.

While I support the use of Katoomba Airfield as an emergency airstrip, I wish to protest the proposal of a commercial licence in the strongest possible terms.

As a long term resident of the Blue Mountains I am well aware of the noise and disruption caused by helicopters. Every fire season and bushfire helicopters make themselves useful - this is appropriate in that it is a direct benefit to the residents.

A commercial licence is in-appropriate for the following reasons:-

- **1**. If 'Joy Flights' were permitted, the residents of Katoomba (population 7,964) and surrounding area would be subjected to between 6 and 8 hours of continuous noise **for each helicopter operating.** I live 7 km from the airstrip and, due to the topographical formations of this Heritage, I can still hear aircraft operating from the airstrip.
- **2.** The only people benefiting from the granting of this licence would be the helicopter and fixed wing operators, the licence owner (I have been told this is two people?) and the passengers. There will be of no benefit to the locals. **7,964 to 2 seems like a very unfair ratio to me.**
- 3. The promise of a Joy-Flight may be appealing to day tourists, but it is unlikely to create an increase the number of 'bums on beds' being booked in the Katoomba area. The best way to see the Blue Mountains Park has always been by 'Shanks' Pony'. One of the major tourist contributors to the Blue Montains are those who travel up here to experience the walks through this beautiful place. Helicopter noise with destroy their peace and quiet as well. And these people do contribute to putting 'bums on beds'
- **4. Local wildlife will be adversely affected** by the noise, pressure from the rotor cavitations and polution. Also, it is unknown what affect commercial use will have on other local environmental matters (ie: Hanging swamps, weed intrusion, groundwater contamination, etc. For example, The area around the airfield is a regular home to roosting Black Cockatoos.)
- 5. What damage will be caused by fuel exhaust? Anyone living under the flight paths at Sydney Airport will already be aware of the black, greasy,

residue, caused by aircraft exhaust, on horizontal surface around their homes. While I understand that the scale of operations is different, what will happen to the gum trees and other vegitation when exposed to fuel dumps and exhaust fumes over an extended (long term) period of the lease?

**6. All of the residents** I have spoken to migrated to the Blue Mountains to get away from the stink of petrol fumes, car noise, and the rush and turmoil of the city. They came here for solitude, and peace and quiet and to enjoy the clean air. Are we seriously going to let two petrol-heads, (who I am told don't even live in the Blue Mountains) destroy all that for the sake of greed?

The people of the Blue Mountains have worked long and hard to keep the area pristine and clear. We have said 'No!' to organisation like McDonalds from opening up fast-food outlets, and have instead encouraged and promoted Slo-Food, - why should this proposal, which is really only about 'money', be handled any differently.

This land is PUBLIC land. A private lease allows changes to be decided behind closed doors. WHO could take over the lease? WHAT could they do in the future? Could it be sold?

There are numerous international studies demonstrating the significant impacts of helicopters on native fauna; in particular on disruptions to bird migrations; also on fauna reliant on hearing for feeding, mating and care of young.

The conclusion of a 2019 ecological study is that the aircraft activity will negatively impact on the internationally recognised migration of honeyeaters through the Blue Mountains. It could also impact other birds inhabiting the diverse bushland surrounding the site.

### ADD THIS LAND INTO THE SURROUNDING NATIONAL PARK

The airfield land was always intended to be returned to its surrounding National Park. This is the solution and is what must happen.

A commercial development within the World Heritage Area threatens the integrity of the land, makes it more difficult to manage as a natural area and could even put its status in jeopardy.

We need to stop this threat ever arising again! Protect our World Heritage Area

Keep this public land in public hands.

Fly Neighbourly Agreements are self regulated and not enforced by any government agency.

They have not protected the National Park in the past and cannot in the future.

### MAINTAIN FOR EMERGENCY USE ONLY

Keep the dirt airstrip for emergency landings and firefighting.

Management of the airstrip is best undertaken by a fire fighting agency. In addition to its other function the National Parks and Wildlife Service (NPWS) is a vital fire fighting agency already managing a number of emergency airfields.

If the recommendations above are implemented it will please numerous people who love the natural environment and want it preserved for the future and that also means it should still be there down the track for others to enjoy it as well. If some-one is given a commercial lease only a few people will benefit and that is financially, whilst numerous people will miss out on their love of the natural environment. How can a lease of the Katoomba Airfield make any sense?

I am a part time Sydney and Blue Mountains resident. When in the Blue Mountains I reside in the vicinity of Katoomba Airfield and am a regular user of the Blue Mountains National Park.

I object strongly to the proposed use of Katoomba Airfield for private commercial gain.

The proposed development is totally inappropriate in an area of World Heritage significance and if allowed to go ahead will significantly diminish the wilderness experience intended through the creation of the National Park as well as the amenity of residents in the Blue Mountains.

I and many other local residents spend many hours each year working to maintain the National Park on a voluntary basis through Bushcare activities. The proposal to allow this land which is owned by the public and in such a sensitive area, to be used for private commercial gain is an affront to those of us who give our services voluntarily because we truely value the park and the peaceful wilderness experience it provides and seek to leave the park in a pristine state for future generations to enjoy.

If allowed to proceed this proposal will diminish the experience of park users and degrade the World Heritage value of the Blue Mountains National Park. It represents the crass commercialisation of a public asset for private exploitation and shows a contemptuous disregard for the value of the wilderness experience which National Parks should afford and for the welfare and the protection of native animals which inhabit the park.

Katoomba Airfield should be placed within the National Park which surrounds it. I support its use for emergency purposes only as required, managed by the NPWS.

I am aware the NPWS currently seeks to prevent the use of drones in the park so that people can enjoy the park in a peaceful and private way. Helicopter joyflights over the park would make a mockery of this endeavour.

We write to un-equivocally state our opposition to the proposed commercial lease of Katoomba Airfield (crown land) currently under consideration by the NSW Department of Industry.

We submit that proposed lease is not just an 'everyday' commercial matter for Department resolution, but represents a fundamental challenge to all the outstanding local national and international values that make the Blue Mountains unique and of 'universal value' at the World scale. Such a lease (if issued) would not be in the broader interests of the state of NSW, and would certainly be of ongoing detriment to Blue Mountain residents and visitors with negative impacts upon the tourism visitation, economy, and enjoyment of a way of life. We submit that a commercial lease for Katoomba Airfield should not be issued.



### World Heritage & national heritage,

The Greater Blue Mountains Area (GBMA) is 1.03 million hectares of mostly wilderness land across seven National Parks, designated as of outstanding World Heritage value from 2 December 2000. The area was added to the National Heritage List in 2007...

We note that "The GBMA is protected and managed under legislation of both the Commonwealth of Australia and the State of New South Wales. All World Heritage properties in Australia are 'matters of national environmental significance' protected and managed under national legislation, the Environment Protection and Biodiversity Conservation Act 1999. This Act is the statutory instrument for implementing Australia's obligations under a number of multilateral environmental agreements including the World Heritage Convention. By law, any action that has, will have or is likely to have a significant impact on the World Heritage values of a World Heritage property must be referred to the responsible Minister for consideration. Substantial penalties apply for taking such an action without approval."

A requirement of the Act has been Management Plans, which set out the significant heritage aspects of the place and how the values of the site will be managed. Of relevance here is the identification of the second (of six) major challenges, being ".. inappropriate recreation and tourism activities, including the development of tourism infrastructure, due to increasing Australian and overseas visitor pressure and commercial ventures.." (https://www.environment.gov.au/heritage/places/world/blue-mountains)

### 2 Tourism and economic impacts

The Blue Mountains economy relies upon the nearly 3 million visitors annually – and growing. The tourism attraction is primarily World Heritage wilderness – and the qualities of awe and wonderment at nature - with

natural quiet that should accompany this. Especially when one moves away from the most popular tourism lookouts, one can truly appreciate the unique qualities that are increasingly rare in a busy world. Qualities such as contemplating the sublime; (relatively) un-spoilt nature; vastness; ecosystems; sunlight moving across escarpment /valley; the drip of water; bird-calls; wildlife; eucalypt forest swaying in the breeze; clean air ... silence and solitude. Such qualities are increasingly rare on a world scale – and that's why since time immemorial visitors have come to the Blue Mountains. Maintaining (enhancing) **visitor experience** is a fundamental necessity for the tourism industry and the Mountains economy. Commercial /frequent helicopter over-flying is not compatible with any of these qualities – and in fact is highly detrimental to them – affecting the commercial viability of tourism visitation to the Mountains more broadly. It comes down to expensive joy flights for a few .. at the expense of residents, visitors more generally, and the Mountains economy.

# 3 Previous Blue Mountains over-flying experience

Nigel Bell had a Churchill Fellowship (1994) which included looking at design/planning/management of World heritage areas, including the Grand Canyon (USA). This followed on from participation on the Blue Mountains World Heritage Committee and personal experience of the helicopter noise burden from helicopter over-flying and dipping down into the Grose Gorge when out bushwalking and camping. In the early 1990's commercial helicopter joy-flights occurred from around 10am till 5pm, with three helicopters in quick rotation taking off from Katoomba airfield and flying (highly-paying) tourists in a northerly loop across and into the valley. This destroyed the wilderness experience for those at the lookouts, those rock-climbing, those bushwalking, and more. I recall the Letter to the Editor (1993/94) of the quiet escarpment wedding ceremony destroyed as a helicopter decided to drop low and hover to see what was happening(!). The helicopter noise issue was especially poignant as it reverberates off the escarpment and across/into the valley, giving a wall of repeated noise of broad detriment for locals visitors and fauna – unacceptably – and against World Heritage values.

We have a copy of the <u>Report by the Blue Mountains Aircraft Working Party, To the Minister for the Environment (August 1995).</u> This arose from the broad concern and public opposition, and lead to a three-month trial 'Fly Neighbourly Advice' (FNA) policy which was then extended – requiring aircraft/helicopters to maintain a minimum 2000' altitude above ground level (AGL). Of note from the audible noise study... (Attachment E):

- Aircraft are the most commonly heard noise in the National Park and also the main source of annoyance.
- Aircraft are heard in 75% of cases.
- Where aircraft are heard, it is a helicopter in about 60% of cases.
- If aircraft were seen, reaction was weighted towards annoyed and very annoyed.
- National Park visitors are the most sensitive to aircraft noise.

## 4 'Natural quiet'


When discussing the tourism planning and management issues for the Grand Canyon, we obtained a copy of the July 1992 'Report to Congress: Potential Impacts of Aircraft Overflights of National Forest System Wilderness' – and forwarded a copy to the 'BM Working Party' above. This comprehensive research study on visitor enjoyment established that 'natural quiet' was a fundamental value – and a key reason why people visited US National Parks. Their acoustic measurements noted the especially invasive noise produced by helicopter rotor blades compared to small fixed-wing aeroplanes. Studies on noise reaction upon native animals/wildlife at that time were sparse and deemed inconclusive. Studies of human visitor reaction in wilderness areas confirmed 'noise-induced annoyance..' where aircraft were low, especially helicopters.

## 5 Conclusions

For the above reasons and more, we are totally against the re-introduction of commercial aeroplane/helicopter flights as a result of the *NSW Department of Industry* proposed leasing of Katoomba Airfield. The losses locally, nationally and internationally are considerable - whilst the commercial gains are extremely limited.

We urge the department to refuse the application – reserving usage of Katoomba airfield for emergency services only.

## To Crown Lands Department and Trish Doyle

The City of the Blue Mountains and the neighbouring City of Lithgow, also in the Blue Mountains are indeed in a unique situation. Two cities are relatively close together in a very large environmentally sensitive, scenic wilderness.

The Blue Mountains has a permanent population of about 77,000 and Lithgow about 22,000 distributed over 27 towns. The Blue Mountains is a linear city connected by one single road about 70 km long and it takes about an hour and twenty minutes to cross from east to west by road or train. The urban development is mostly on the ridges overlooking the valleys where great views are to be had,

The cities are old and well established with appropriate infrastructure except for one deficiency and that is a viable airstrip. The one and only airstrip at Medlow Bath was established many years ago by a private operator for his own use and operation of a scenic tour flight business. It has been used effectively as an emergency airfield for the evacuation of people to hospitals and during bushfire emergencies. The strip has been used by many private plane owners as well.

It is again proposed to establish a helicopter tour flight operation using the airfield.

The Blue Mountains is one of the most visited tourist attractions in Australia and is as important as the Barrier Reef, Ularu and Sydney with its Harbour, Opera House. Bridge and beaches. Its special environment is certainly its attraction and must be respected however there is no reason why a tourist initiative like scenic flights can't coexist.

I find it unreasonable that its use is now questioned by environmental groups. A city of this size not only needs an airstrip for emergencies but can do with the economic benefits and jobs that tourists can bring, with scenic flights as an added attraction. It could be suitable for a small air transport terminal for those wanting a quick visit.

Helicopters make noise. The flight paths can be restricted to the valleys where the views are and the noise will, therefore, be minimised to urban areas.

## Dear Sir Madam

I would like to outline to you some serious concerns regarding proposed lease for an aviation tourism business at the old airfield in the Blue Mountains at Mellow Bath.

- 1.Past experience in the mid 90's of helicopter flights operating from this old airfield was not good, low altitude flights combined with noise and exhaust and aviation fuel pollution was appalling. Far from enhancing tourism these flights will have a negative impact on tourists as the uniqueness of walking in a peaceful quiet environment will be totally lost.
- 2. The sub-leasing or selling of the lease to the airfield in the future is also a major concern. There appears to be no official mechanism to monitor ongoing compliance of all operators using this proposed site now and into the future. It should not be up to the local community to monitor compliance especially flight paths, altitude adherence and number of flight arrivals and departures per day.
- 3. The proposal to "improve" the airfield amenity will likely involve the clearing of established vegetation. If the facility was to offer refuelling options for aircraft we would see fuel storage in the middle of a high risk bushfire zone. Currently there is no town water connection, how will this facility protect its assets, both fuel and buildings with just water tanks, will the leaseholder clear even more vegetation to provide a fire buffer and meet strident BAL requirements.

The public land known as the Katoomba Airfield should not be used for a commercial purpose that will so negatively impacts both bluemountains residents and tourists. This crown land should be transferred to the national park and a dirt airstrip be maintained for emergency use only.



Good morning.

I am not sure if you are aware, but there is a push from a very small minority in the upper Blue Mountains community to rally ill-informed residents to oppose the current, and future operations at Katoomba Airfield.

(I have attached a flyer that has been circulated in the upper mountains for your reference.)

This is a definitely a misguided approach by persons that do not understand the local area, local environment hazards, and regulations regarding aircraft use and management.

As a third generation resident of Blackheath, a 30 year member of local emergency fire services, a pilot, and a concerned resident, I would therefore like to support the use of Katoomba Airfield, and encourage any approved development of this facility.

As Katoomba Airfield is the only Authorised Landing Area (ALA) between Bathurst in the West, and Bankstown in the East, a distance of approximately 75 nautical miles, it is essential that Katoomba airfield be maintained, if not upgraded, into the future.

As you are aware, Katoomba Airfield currently serves as an Emergency Airport to the local area, with and a handful of private aircraft, and the odd commercial helicopter operator using this rough facility.

The Blue Mountains experience major bushfires every few years, and this airfield not only serves as an emergency helicopter base for fire fighting aircraft, but is also used by fixed wing fire fighting aircraft, as well as fire spotting fixed wing aircraft, including the National Parks and Wildlife Service Cessna 206 fixed wing aircraft.

To my knowledge, not one cent has ever been provided by government or the local council to go towards the upkeep, let alone upgrade, of this facility.

This Airfield should remain under the jurisdiction of the Crownlands department, and never be incorporated into the National Park.

The noisy minority say they don't want this facility, especially in the off fire season when community interest is low, as they think there will be an influx of commercial helicopter operators?

The reality is, CASA (Civil Aviation Regulator) have Regulations and Blue Mountains Fly Neighbourly agreements in place, with which any aircraft operator must comply.

These regulations and agreements are in place to ensure noise conditions are adhered to by all aircraft operators, all of the time.

The silent majority of local residents, especially the long term residents that have all seen mountain bushfire and other local disasters before, will support the continued use, and welcome any upgrade (such as sealing the runway) of Katoomba Airfield.

As usual, there are a lot more of the silent majority out there, that will be outraged should this important local area

Dear Crown Lands, I am writing in support of the proposed FLYBLUE plans for Katoomba Airstrip YKAT. I have been a commercial helicopter pilot for 18 years; a vast majority of that time being in the Greater Sydney Basin. I have used YKAT more times than I can remember, in both an aerial firefighting role, and for charter and airwork roles. I can't imagine the Blue Mountains being without an airstrip, given the very limited landing options for both rotary and fixed wing aircraft. An airfield in the Blue Mountains is a necessity, not a luxury. Since the passing of Rod Hay in 2016, there has been concern amongst some aviators about YKAT closing permanently to all aircraft, despite the obvious benefit to not only aviators, but Blue Mountains residents and visitors as well. Earlier this year, during a helicopter charter flight to YKAT, I had the pleasure of meeting Derek & Floyd Larsen. Derek told me a bit about himself and about his aviation background, and then about FLYBLUE's plans for the future. In a climate where General Aviation is really struggling, mainly due to increased costs, to find someone who is willing to invest their own money into GA is a godsend! One of the first things Derek did, in the interests of Aviation Safety, was install two weather cameras and a weather station at YKAT, making the images and weather data available to anyone for free. Given this area is a critical location in terms of terrain and notoriously bad weather, this is something the federal government should have done a decade or two ago. Derek did it as a matter of priority. There has also been a significant clean up of waste materials and dilapidated structures. FLYBLUE have a passion for General Aviation, with aviation safety being at the top of the list. For FLYBLUE to be proposing further upgrades to YKAT and promoting a growth in General Aviation and offering improved safety, services and facilities in the Blue Mountains for aviators, it should be welcomed with open arms, and I'll say this again - for someone to be investing their own money into GA for the safety and benefit of others, is about as rare as hen's teeth. I wish to register my strongest objection to the proposed use of crown land at Mellow Bath/Katoomba for commercial aviation purposes.

Local residents have for years been advocating the return of this crown land to the National Park. The existing dirt airstrip is surrounded by National Park and as such is unsuitable for any commercial development. It needs to be incorporated into the Blue Mountains National Park and managed by the National Parks and Wildlife Service.

The proposed commercial development of the airfield will have detrimental effects on the local tourism industry. The Blue Mountains is famous for its natural environment and the outdoor experiences that it offers both visitors and locals. An estimated 1.25 million people undertake bushwalks in the Blue Mountains each year. Landing tourist helicopters and fixed winged aircraft within the World Heritage-listed national park could jeopardise the Blue Mountains experience for tourists who come here for peace and quiet.

The proposed commercial development of the airfield will also adversely affect residents' lifestyle and amenity. Residents in eastern Medlow Bath will bear the brunt of noise pollution from the proposed helicopter operations. However, from past experience of "joy flights" from this location, the noise readily spreads to residents in Evans Lookout Road, Blackheath and North Katoomba which are both less than 2km from the airfield and which will, no doubt, experience fly overs despite the unenforceable fly neighbourly policy.

I am writing to object - both as a resident and as a regular contractor to the local aviation industry - to any proposal for commercial lease of the former Katoomba Airfield.

This includes the ridiculous proposal for a 50-year commercial lease of the land by Flyblue Management Pty Ltd.

This runway was only established for incidental use and later for fire-fighting purposes. For decades (since at least 1988 to my knowledge) was earmarked for return to the National Parks estate for continued use for emergency purposes only.

The 1980s were dark times for the industry, with scenic flights becoming a focus of conflict with residents and tourism operators whose businesses were badly affected. Until now it seemed we had moved past the 'bad old days' of low-altitude scenic flights in the Blue Mountains. Now a single operator is set to destroy all the hard work the industry has put into resolving these conflicts.

The Fly Neighbourly agreement may permit operations from the land at Katoomba but the intent of the agreement was to put an end to the use of low-altitude joy flights over the wild areas of the Blue Mountains which are the backbone of our community and of our local economy.



I am a resident in Leura.

The proposed reopening of Katoomba airfield for helicopter and light plane flights over the upper Blue Mountains is of great concern.

We are of course accustomed to helicopters used by emergency services conducting hazard reduction, rescues and firefighting. They are very noisy. However these are essential to preserving human and animal lives and the environment.

Low level recreational and tourist flights over and adjacent to the towns of our World Heritage Listed area detract from one of the very reasons people live here and come to enjoy the serenity and beauty of a unique environment. Civil Aviation Regulation1988- REG157 is not effective in protecting resident peace and quiet along the escarpment and ridges as helicopters and light aircraft can fly very close to the developed areas at above the regulation minimum of 500 feet.

For example such aircraft could fly quite close to the world renowned Echo Point lookout disrupting visitor peaceful enjoyment of the iconic 3 Sisters and Jamison Valley view. Similarly they would damage enjoyment Wentworth Falls, Govett's Leap, Lincoln's Rock, Elysian Rock, Olympian Rock, Tarpian Rock, Gordon Falls, Katoomba Falls and so many others where residents and tourists take in the views, picnic and enjoy the sounds of the bush and the birdlife.

There are very few tourist flights over the Blue Mountains at present as the distance from Sydney airports is uneconomic. A local airfield would be a completely different proposition.

I am writing to express my strong objections to any proposal to use the Katoomba airfield for private commercial use. As an 11+ year resident of Blackheath I am already disappointed with the amount of low-flying air traffic we experience compared to when we first moved to the area in 2008. The main attraction of the Blue Mountains for my husband and I is the peace and quiet it affords and the abundant natural beauty and tranquility of a World Heritage area.

Please return the Katoomba Airfield to National Parks to be properly managed for community benefit in keeping with its World Heritage status and, as an airfield, for emergency use only.

My objections exist on several grounds:

- 1. **Significant noise impact** on hundreds of thousands of people who live in, and travel to, the Blue Mountains for the peace and quiet. It's quite obscene to suggest a for-profit scenic flight enterprise be allowed to operate over World Heritage land so that a handful of people with money be allowed an experience that interferes with not just the enjoyment of the area but the very reason people come here.
- 2. Lack of appropriate consultation and consideration of community views. While I appreciate this opportunity to have my view heard, there have been repeated recommendations for the airfield to be returned to National Parks in the past. Why has this not happened? And why was an Expression of Interest for use of the field sought before the community had been consulted or any environmental impact statement considered?
- 3. **Environmental concerns** including the impact on air quality, waterways, soil quality, and the diverse birdlife and flora and fauna. There is significant conflict between use of the airfield for commercial air traffic and the nature of the surround World Heritage area. Indeed the Greater Blue Moumtains World Heritage Area Strategic Plan recognises that 'inappropriate recreation and tourism activities, including the development of tourism infrastructure, under the increasing visitor pressure from Australian, overseas and commercial ventures' as one of six key threats to the area.



We fought hard to have this Blue Mountains World Heritage listing and don't want to see this status overthrown for narrow commercial gains that do not take account of the whole environmental and cultural concerns of our area.

#### THE BIG PICTURE:

As a long-term resident of the Upper Blue Moontains (32 years) I have noticed the increased use of flyovers by helicopters, the large amounts of rubbish left in our bushland and public toilets by tourists, and the seeming disregard for our environment and habitat. So many people I know spend their walks picking up after them. Many residents have told me of human faeces and tissues smack bang in the middle of e.g. the walking paths from Echo Point all the way along Cliff Walk to the Scenic World site. A powerful symbolic act which shows the blatant disregard of our heritage site. This is a regular occurrence which we, the people of The Blue Mountains, have to clean up on our walks. And this all close by the iconic Three Sisters and Echo Point.

I cannot tell you how many times I have been stuck in my car in Leura Mall, brought to a standstill, while a group of about 10-20 tourists have stood in the street for 5 to 10 mins taking selfies. They have no awareness that they are standing on a busy public road holding up traffic and I have had to resist placing my hand on the horn to move them on. Many residents tell me they don't resist. They honk, swear and are fed up. It is a huge concern for the shopkeepers and locals and has become worse each year. Employees tell me they sometimes hate their work because of the treatment by, and entitled attitude of, tourists.

I think there needs to be a mandatory information program set up at the bottom of the mountain (Glenbrook?) to brief visitors and tourists on how to act within our protected area and communities. The residents' rights seem to be counting for less and less now as the money from the tourism dollar is chased without due consideration for the culture and respect of our land.

Many visitors to our Blue Mountains already remark on being surprised with the amount of air traffic currently occurring. They come here for the unspoiled World Heritage National Park experience. More air traffic would deter their visits which would defeat the purpose of seeking out the tourist dollar and eventually leave our place trashed and very unattractive indeed.

SPECIFIC POINTS RELATING DIRECTLY TO THE PROPOSED AIRPORT PLANS FOR A COMMERCIAL HELICOPTER ENTERPRISE:

I attended the local Public Meetings put on by the The Department of Industry about this matter and heard many peoples' concerns which included:

- 1) Noise Pollution. It's bad enough already and would profoundly alter the nature and essence of the environment for which the Blue Mountains is famous. i.e. it would negatively impact and erode our environment and culture. The World Heritage National Park Listing, local businesses and lifestyles would suffer.
- 2) The destruction of habitats for animals and some threatened species would be significant. Another loss for The Blue Mountains.
- 3) The devaluing of our real estate. It's hard enough for small businesses up here, without the prospect of our houses and businesses losing value because of the cultural destruction of everything for which The Blue Mountains is famous.

The majority of residents at the meeting agreed that the best use of this airport is for it to be put in the hands of the National Park and protected forever for the benefit of all. This makes sense.

And everyone at the meeting voiced the need to keep the airport maintained so that it can always be used in emergencies. We need it for our high bushfire prone area. And pilots need it for emergency landings as I heard from one seasoned pilot that it was the only safe place to land over the Mountains.

The increased helicopter traffic would bring increased safety concerns. The last owner of the lease crashed his plane when overrunning the airport. With the very real danger of bushfires in The Blue Mountains, more air traffic would only increase safety issues and bushfire risks.

For all of the above reasons I strongly oppose any inappropriate leasing of Katoomba Airport and suggest it is put under management of the National Parks and Wildlife.

# Good evening,

I am writing to you to express my concerns with the leasing of Katoomba airfield to private companies for the purpose of providing helicopter joy flights over the Blue Mountains rather than returning that land to the World Heritage-listed National Park that surrounds it.

I strongly disagree with this land being used for commercial purposes for a few main reasons:

- 1. In November 2000 the Department of Land and Water stated in an assessment of the area that upon the ending of the lease the land would be returned to the National Park. However, the relevant facilities and equipment would be kept at the airfield for emergencies, bushfire surveillance and firefighting. In 2008 another assessment was made of the airfield by the Department of Lands and stated that the site should only be used for emergencies and returned to the National Park.
- 2. In the past the airfield has been used for commercial joy flights which was met with heavy opposition from residents in Medlow Bath, Katoomba, Leura and Wentworth Falls. In 1994, aircraft operators and the community came to the agreement to stop these joy flights after the impact that they had on the community in the Blue Mountains Fly Neighbourly Agreement (BMFNA).
- 3. The environmental impact that these joy flights would have on the National Park's ecosystem would be astonishing. Not only would the dumping of fuel over bushland have a significant impact on the flora and fauna in the area but the constant sound of helicopters during the day would destroy the area's acoustic signature which is vital for animal communication.
- 4. Finally, the economic impact of the commercialisation of Katoomba airfield would not in any way help the Blue Mountains. It will not add a significant amount of job opportunities to the area, nor will it generate a significant amount of revenue as helicopter flights are extraordinarily expensive, especially for backpackers visiting the area.

The NSW Government and Crownland should take these points into consideration and take steps to gather an understanding of the current ecosystems existing in the Blue Mountains and the environmental and financial impact the airfield will have. It should also honour agreements made in the past. Not only because those agreements and decisions were made for a reason but also for crownland's own reputation as this blatant disregard for previous decisions just shows crownland and the government to be greedy liars, looking to make some cash rather than meet the needs of the communities that they serve.

# 1. I OBJECT to any COMMERCIAL lease for this PUBLIC land

Scenic tours/joy flights, taking off and landing in a National Park should not occur because of the impacts on park visitors and our native plants and animals.

It is not right that a small number of people who would enjoy the benefits of the airstrip could ruin the area for the many more people who enjoy the bush from the ground including residents, visitors and bushwalkers. The enjoyment of most people would be adversely affected by the noise generated by just a few people. The shape of the valleys would also amplify any noise created.

Commercial development in the middle of a national park, and a World Heritage Area recognised for its natural values, is completely inappropriate and unnecessary.

# 2. I support previous recommendations to transfer this land to the Blue Mountains National Park.

I ask that this land be put into the national park to preserve and protect is environmental values. Fly Neighbourly Agreements are self regulated by the industry and not enforced by any government agency. They have not protected the national park in the past and cannot in the future. They are not a solution.

# 3. I ask to keep the airfield for EMERGENCY USE ONLY

I ask that the dirt airstrip be kept for emergency landings and firefighting only, not for commercial uses. This is the only way to protect the environmental values of the area.

Thank you for the opportunity to comment on this matter, so important to the Blue Mountains community and environment.

I ask that no lease be granted to a commercial operator, rather that the airfield be added to the Blue Mountains National Park and be managed by the NPWS for emergency and bush fire-fighting purposes only.

The airfield is completely surrounded by the Blue Mountains National Park (part of the Greater Blue Mountains World Heritage Area). World Heritage values need to be respected and protected. Several previous land assessments by NSW government agencies have recommended the airfield be added to the Park.

I see so many dangers with a commercial lease and flights over the park and adjoining residential areas:

- Disturbance of fauna, in particular birds, by helicopter noise that will cause frequent alarm and behaviour changes. The area is home to threatened species (Gang Gang Cockatoo and Scarlet Robin) and is part of the area that honeyeaters use in their annual autumn migration. The GBMWHA was declared a Key Biodiversity Area by Birdlife International in 2017.
- Soil erosion and groundwater contamination to surrounding bushland, in particular the examples of Blue Mountains Swamps on the site, a threatened ecological community.
- Noise for park visitors, particularly in the Grose Wilderness and Grand Canyon. Helicopter tourism for a few will detract from the sounds of nature and the tranquility that most people are seeking within a national park.
- Noise for residents of Medlow Bath, Katoomba, Leura and Wentworth Falls.
- The community has been given little information about the proposed lessees' intentions, or what future
  development or extension of activities that may be possible. 'Fly Neighbourly' policies are not enforceable
  by CASA.

Of course it will be necessary to ensure that the RFS and other emergency services have access to the airfield. If the airfield is added to the National Park, it could be managed by the NPWS, as they do for airfields in Mutawintji and Sturt National Parks. Funding for its upkeep could be made available by Treasury through the Bushfire Risk Mitigation and Resilience Program.

As a bushwalker who walks in the proposed area, I have concerns about the intrusion of helicopters on my walking experience.

I live under a helicopter flightpath at Lithgow which is necessary for medical purposes, not for entertainment or tourism, so must be accepted.

I do not consider it necessary to accept the proposed licensing of the Mellow Bath airport for helicopter use except for emergencies such as bush fires.

One of my concerns relates to birds suffering from trauma as a result of the helicopters. Research indicates that birds do indeed suffer trauma as a result of sudden, unexpected noise, such as a helicopter ascent or descent.

Since there is no number of flights mentioned, how will this be regulated? I have noted that there has already been a broken experience with regard to the Wolgan One and Only Resort in this matter. a monetary fine does not remove damage already incurred on the natural environment.

If there is need to transfer the license to some person, I would rather that the area be given to the National Parks and Wildlife Service which currently adjoins the proposed area.

Rare plants, animals and birds may well suffer from the pollution of fuel from the helicopters and increased road traffic associated with any air traffic.

Dear Crown Lands,

I was alarmed to hear that commercialisation of this airfield has again been mooted, after previous controversies and promises from various NSW government sources to add this public land to the national park. Community opposition of scenic flights has, if anything, substantially increased since then.

Such commercial use for the airfield must inevitably rely on local scenic flights for financial viability. This would have numerous negative impacts, including on the vital local tourism industry and its 'peaceful' image, on local residents and on fauna impacted by the noise. There is NO benign route from this site for scenic flights, which must overfly either residential/tourist precincts AND/OR quiet national park areas. The declared Grose Wilderness could be impacted. No 'fly neighbourly' policy can prevent these impacts, and such a 'policy' is unenforceable under current legislation anyway.

A long-term lease poses additional threats. It would be a marketable commodity and there can be no guarantee that new lessees (or the original lessees) would not seek expansion of the operation as initially approved. Whatever the intentions of the initial lease and the lessee, once an operation becomes established no government is likely to reject expansion if requested for commercial reasons (eg. to ensure survival of the business).

Further, the land is almost surrounded by the world-heritage-listed Blue Mountains National Park, and hence has substantial impacts on the management of the adjacent national park for conservation and compatible recreation.

The arguments against this proposal are many, and relate to widespread impacts on numerous people and the environment. The arguments for it are few and any benefits accrue mainly to the lessee and Crown Lands only, plus a very small number of visitors. I am confident that any proper cost-benefit analysis would find this proposal untenable.

For all these reasons, and in summary:

- I object to any commercial lease for the airfield site.
- I support the addition of the site to the surrounding national park.
- I support the ongoing use of the airfield for emergency operations ONLY.



Crown Land in NSW Proposed Lease of Katoomba Airfield

I object to the proposed development because it is within a World Heritage Area National park and would degrade both the natural attributes of the park and the experience of visitors and locals alike. I draw attention to the following:

#### Noise

The Blue Mountains National Park is a quiet place. Millions of people come each year to experience this, and to appreciate the beauty of the area.

Helicopters are noisy machines which, if allowed, will intrude into the peaceful and low impact experience of park visitors. This is particularly true of areas such as the Grand Canyon walk which begins two kilometres from the airfield and winds its way closer to the airfield. The proposed flight paths will impact on this area and landing and take-off will be particularly intrusive. Visitors using this track come for the quiet and low impact experience not for the intrusion of helicopters

Other areas within the National Park are similarly affected. These include Evans Lookout, Govett's Leap, Pulpit Rock and Braeside Walk. People who walk such tracks or visit lookouts regularly comment that it is the quiet and peaceful nature of these places that attracts them.

I live in Blackheath ( ) which is 3.4 kilometres in a straight line from the airfield. When it is in use for fire fighting and other emergency service operations loud noise is apparent but is accepted because such operations are necessary to save lives and prevent fire damage. I don't accept that commercial helicopter flights which will intrude continually on my everyday life are similar either conceptually or in terms of frequency.

# Natural Habitat

Noise impacts upon the fauna of the area. Birds and animals re frightened by noise and their existence become threatened. Australia is already a world leader in species extinction - the proposal, if approved, is likely to help keep Australia at the top of this unhappy leader board. Likewise fuel combustion pollution caused by further flights can have only negative impacts upon both flora and fauna.

# **Tourism Economics**

The proposer of the development claims that it will be of economic benefit. Given that helicopters have small passenger capacity it is very unlikely that the operation will bring much economic gain to the area.

For a positive economic impact the number of flights would need to be great - destroying even more the low impact visitor experience for which the Blue Mountains is rightly famous.

Many tourism operations in this area are low impact in nature. Visitors who use such services would have second thoughts if their prized and contemplative experience was destroyed by helicopter flights and the noise which accompanies them. Other small businesses such as cafes would similarly be negatively affected. Larger accommodation operations could also find their customer base diminishing - why come and stay if the reason for coming is no longer there?

# Individual Profit Versus Community Needs

The development proposal will obviously need to make a profit. That profit will perhaps be a good thing for the developer but not for the Blue Mountains community. There is strong opposition within this community members of which fear that their needs are in danger of being ignored in favour of personal profit based upon an unknown number of helicopter flights which will destroy the very thing that the flights are designed to capitalise upon.

I object to the commercialisation of Katoomba airfield. I believe the airfield land should be included in the Blue Mountains National Park and the working dirt strip should only be maintained for emergency and fire fighting use.

I lived in the Blue Mountains for a number of years with my family, and we came to the Mountains for the peace and quiet and quality of the lifestyle. I believe this will be disrupted if a commercial lease is granted and the current lease runs regular flights.

I have also been a professional artist for 35 years, and currently teach and work from my

The proposed flight paths will pass just north of my property. I believe the noise pollution, emissions and loss of privacy from regular commercial helicopter flights will negatively impact on my working practice. I believe this aspect of my business will suffer if the commercialisation of the airfield is approved and helicopter and other aircraft flights increase.

There is also a lake on my property which is a home to a large number of birds. I am concerned that helicopters noise will disrupt their breeding. The displayed flight paths, which are voluntary and non binding, pass just to the north of this lake. I am concerned the helicopters will divert to over the lake to see the large number of birds scattering.

I also run regular art workshops from my studio, with students often travelling from outside the Mountains to participate. Part of the attraction for students is to learn in a peaceful bushland location. I do not offer accommodation, but refer people to local bed and breakfasts, and local restaurants. If the workshops are interrupted by regular helicopter flights, I believe I will lose repeat customers. I also believe other tourism providers will be disadvantaged by the noise and emissions.

I also agree with the Civil Aviation Authority, Office of Airspace Regulation own environmental guidelines which clearly state

"Noise within the National Park system often interferes with the very reason visitors go to the National Park- for peace and quiet. Aircraft tends to interfere with natural quiet for visitors within National Parks. Another consideration of aircraft overflight over National Parks is the reduction in enjoyment and appreciation of cultural and historical resources within the National Parks and the reduction of the sounds of nature at the park."

My partner also regularly works from home, using teleconferencing to her city office. The noise of regular helicopter flights will disrupt this work.

I do not understand why the airfield leasee's business is given preference over our businesses or those of the other tourism operators. Loss of local economic activity will lead to less taxation revenue, more people needing to commute from the mountains for employment and loss of young people from the area. I believe that any economic benefit from the rent on the lease and the small amount of employment from the flights will be far outweighed by the economic loss of other Mountains businesses, as well as the loss of amenity by residents.

The "Fly Neighbourly" guidelines are voluntary. The operator has stated he intends to follow these guidelines at this stage. If a 50 year lease is granted, his priorities may change or he may onsell the lease to another operator who may not follow these guidelines. He also has no control over flights by other users taking off and landing at the airfield.

Although there is a minimum height limit, there does not seem to be any oversight of the disruption caused by the flights. It will be up to community members to document and object to breaches of flying height limits and it is not clear what action can be taken against pilots breaking these height limits.

There are occasion helicopter overflights by helicopters near our home eg landing at Katoomba hospital, the NPWS or electricity providers checking power lines. I have no objection to these occasional and important flights, but the noise level is certainly very high. If commercial scenic flights became regular events, it would be very disruptive.

The proposal to offset the carbon dioxide emissions from the flights by planting trees at the site, will only make for a tiny proportion of the carbon emissions from a helicopter flight. I don't believe much significance some be given to this voluntary undertaking. The emissions from fixed wing flights or helicopters will vastly exceed emissions from visitors to the mountains arriving by train, bus or car.

I also believe the community consultation process was flawed. The meeting I attended was overcrowded, and information about the proposal was limited. There should be another consultation after the operator has produced a full business plan, and before a lease is signed.

I urge the NSW government to reject the application to lease the Katoomba airfield to a commercial operator, and allow the airfield to be used for emergency use only. The land should be incorporated in the Blue Mountains National Park and managed by NPWS.

I object to the use of public land for the commercial use of Katoomba airfield. I have a number of concerns;

- Threat to the world heritage UNESCO listed Greater Blue Mountains Area (Ref 917). https://whc.unesco.org/en/list/917.
- 2. Volatile liquids and toxic chemicals stored on site. I have the following concerns;
  - Escape of liquids (EOL) during transfer into the environment. Contamination of bushland and a hazard to wildlife.
  - b. Storage of fuel in a bushfire prone area. The airfield is located in a high risk zone and would pose a bushfire risk to people and property in the Blue Mountains.
  - Transport of fuel and chemicals to the airfield present a danger to local residents. There is no local traffic management plan for these liquids.

#### Noise pollution.

- a. The proposed flight path is very close to my property. I will not be able to enjoy the quiet comfort of my residence.
- b. Noise created by helicopters is injurious to one's health. Current research show prolonged exposure to helicopter noise has significant impact on children's health in areas such as learning and sleep deprivation.
- Helicopter noise is particularly harmful because you not only hear it, but feel it because of the lowfrequency blade-slap vibration produced. This noise can have physiological impacts. A study needs to be done on this impact particularly for the vulnerable like the elderly and small children. This study should also extend to the local fauna.

# Air pollution.

- Elevated levels of air pollution. Danger to the fragile ecosystem of the Blue Mountains.
- Cancer causing toxic emissions. Health concerns for local residents and those over the flight path.
- Devaluation of property.

- a. Many people have moved to the Blue Mountains for the peace, serenity and beauty of the area along with the clean air. I am writing to express concern regarding the proposed lease of Katoomba Airfield.

My principal concern is regarding the safety risks associated with increased aviation activity.

I have been a professional pilot for 20 years, flying with the RAAF and 2 major Australian airlines, and am currently employed as a full time RPT pilot. I am currently a RAAF reservist. I have extensive experience as a Aviation safety officer and flying supervisor.

I am a licenced paraglider pilot, have flown at the Blackheath paragliding site, and intend to do so again numerous times in the future. The Blackheath site (and by extension a significant area around it) has a long and established history, and is considered one of the premier locations for sports aviation in NSW. As my experience is as a paraglider I will refer to those, however these concerns generally apply equally to other sports aviation types such as hand gliders and ultralight aircraft.

Without more clarity on the proposed operations, I am concerned that unless significant efforts are made to restrict regular powered flight in the Blackheath area away from the areas most commonly used by sports aviation, there may be an unacceptably high risk of a safety incident. Given that any near interaction between a powered aircraft and paraglider would likely result in a catastrophic failure of the glider, a fatality is a near certain outcome of such an event. Given the density of paragliders at the site, the likelihood of such an event would be high over time if the applicant's operations typically go near or through the site.

# Some points to consider:

- Paragliders have a very low visual profile from some angles. See and avoid procedures are unlikely to be an effective mitigation.
- The exact location and altitude of paragliding activity is diverse according to the weather conditions, and is not entirely predictable.
- Paragliders do not carry transponders, and carriage of them would not be an effective mitigation given the traffic density.
- Paragliders often do not carry radios, and it would be unreasonable to require that, given the cost in equipment and training associated. This would also be difficult to police.
- Paragliders have relatively low maneuverability in comparison to powered aircraft, so they would be almost entirely reliant on any powered aircraft to avoid them.
- The paragliding community brings money into the blue mountains community as many paragliders spend money at local businesses when using the site.
- Paragliding has negligible environmental impact.

As an aviation professional I am routinely supportive of efforts to develop and expand the aviation community through endeavours such as the lease of the Katoomba airfield. As a member of the community more broadly I am supportive of individuals who have the courage and creativity to start business like the one proposed. I have not been able to find any information on your website that addresses the risk of a direct or near mid-air between a powered aircraft and a paraglider. I am also interested in how the proposed lease interacts with the Fly Neighbourly advice FN2 as published by Airservices Australia.

The paragliding community can reasonably expect to continue to use the site as they do now. There is a large community including locals and others who travel from around Australia and from overseas to fly at Blackheath. Their use of the site for this purpose is well known and accepted. This community can reasonably expect to be offerred some guarantee that their use of the site will not be affected by developments at the Katoomba airfield now or into the future.

Before any decision is made to lease the airfield, I recommend that the department should establish appropriate measures to address the safety risk to aviation, and assess whether that would affect the viability of the lease.

I would propose the following items for consideration:

- that a Danger area is promulgated for the blackheath paragliding site. (other appropriate symbology should be considered for aviation charts)
- The applicant should be responsible for ensuring visiting aircraft are informed of the location of the Danger area and the requirement to avoid it where practicable.
- Arrangements are made to ensure paragliding activities are adequately communicated to visiting aircraft as part of compliance with FN2.
- Regular flight operations of the applicant should be required to avoid the danger area entirely
- Procedures for policing these points, with associated financial penalties.

Amongst domestic overnight visitors, who are likely to be amongst the greatest of contributors to the local economy, the top second and third reported activities were:

'Bushwalking or rainforest walks' (45.6%) was the 2nd most popular activity, followed by 'visit national parks or state parks' (44.3%).

Thus, as expected, the Blue Mountains World Heritage Area is likely to be one of the greatest contributors to the local tourism economy.

Katoomba Airfield is surrounded on all sides by the Blue Mountains National Park and the Greater Blue Mountains World Heritage Area. It is located just 1.5km from the nearest cliffline of Govett's Gorge, the most accessible part of the Grose Valley and that part most visited by tourists.

Given the location of the Katoomba Airfield it is inevitable that any use of the airfield as a base for helicopter charters will have unacceptable noise impacts on visitors to the national park, in addition to unknown effects on wildlife. To allow a relatively small number of visitors to destroy the peaceful enjoyment that many tourists are already deriving from the national park would not only be unjust, but also potentially economically counterproductive if the touted economic benefits of high end tourism were gained at the expense of driving the much bigger market of tourists seeking quiet nature based tourism experiences elsewhere.

I am particularly concerned about the impact of any proposed commercial lease on the Grose Valley. The Grose Valley has long been recognised as one of the most spectacular landscapes in NSW and has benefited from generations of community support to maintain it in its natural state, from the decision to reserve it from sale in 1875, to the citizen campaign to protect Blue Gum Forest in 1931, its reservation within the Blue Mountains National Park in 1959, its inscription on the World Heritage List as part of the Greater Blue Mountains World Heritage Area in 2000 and finally the declaration of the Grose Wilderness in 2001.

The Grose Wilderness is a jewel of incalculable value for the people of NSW. It offers the possibility of escape from all the stresses of modern life for quiet nature based recreation and yet is just two hours by train from the Sydney CBD. Psychologists are increasingly recognising the importance of such opportunities for the health and wellbeing of an urbanised population. Sydney thus has an advantage that few comparable world cities have. Amongst Alpha plus world cities only Tokyo has anything even remotely comparable. London does not have this. New York City doesn't either. Nor, it bears mentioning, does Melbourne. This should be a resource that Sydney guards jealously from encroachment, not allow to be destroyed by ill thought out development plans for limited private interests.

In early communications the lease proponent made assurances that it would not be running joy flights in the Grose Valley. These assurances have been repeated in the FAQ provided by the NSW Department of Planning, Industry and Environment, noting that: "FlyBlue also notes it does not intend to fly in sensitive and populated areas or over Echo Point, the Three Sisters, Grose Valley and up the Grand Canyon." Nevertheless, at information sessions and on the FlyBlue website the lease proponents have indicated a proposed flight path that cuts right across the Govett's Gorge before heading up the Grose Valley. Such a flight path would have direct noise impacts at Fortress Creek Canyon, Blue Gum Forest, Pulpit Rock, Perrys Lookdown, Hanging Rock and the entire upper Grose Valley, the most visited part of the Grose Wilderness. It matters not whether these flights are termed joy flights or heli-charters or any other name. What is certain is that they will mean dramatically increased noise pollution in the valley. CASA and the lease proponents recognise that airports have noise impacts. It is for this reason that they plan to avoid populated areas for their flight paths. However, in their planning they appear to have no consideration for noise impacts on the environment, and the natural quiet of our precious wilderness areas.

The NSW Government's own Wilderness Policy at <a href="https://www.environment.nsw.gov.au/topics/parks-reserves-and-protected-areas/park-policies/wilderness">https://www.environment.nsw.gov.au/topics/parks-reserves-and-protected-areas/park-policies/wilderness</a> outlines the following policy aims within identified wilderness:

Transport

21. Motorised transport operated by any agency, commercial interest or individual is not permitted in wilderness areas, except for management operations where:

the operation is necessary

use of the transport will not have any significant long-term impacts

the transport is the only feasible option available (for instance, during emergency operations).

22. Vehicle trails and helipads are prohibited. Existing ones should be closed and rehabilitated unless they are required for necessary management operations.

There would appear to be a clear conflict here that the NSW Government could have the above policies in place for lands managed as wilderness within the Blue Mountains National Park, and yet that the Department of Planning, Industry and Environment should be asked to grant a lease for use of public crown lands that includes a proposal that might approve a flight path cutting directly through the same lands.

Accordingly, I strongly urge you to refuse to grant a commercial lease over the Katoomba Airfield and instead support the incorporation of the airfield into Blue Mountains National Park as an emergency airfield only.

This submission **totally opposes** the proposal relating to the Katoomba Airfield (DP751627, Lot 550) on the following grounds:

- 1. <u>Incremental over-development of the Blue Mountains, a World Heritage Area</u>. The Katoomba Airfield proposal is only one of many changes the Blue Mountains is being subjected to all of them negatively. Any consideration of the Airfield proposal should therefore take into account the already changing context of the area that could be impacted by the granting of a lease to the applicant. To name just a few:
  - The impact of flight paths to Badgerys Creek Airport which is probably going to operate 24/4 i.e. without a curfew
  - The resuscitated DA before BMCC for a wildlife park (biggest drawcard crocodiles) in Wentworth Falls
  - The daily influx of tourists into mountain villages causing a crisis in parking of cars and large buses in inappropriate and/or dangerous places
  - The impact of medium density housing in areas adjoining bushland where foxes and domestic cats and dogs are affecting local wildlife such as lyrebirds, bandicoots, wallabies and birds.
    - As a result, the compromising of local amenity is already evident in noise levels, traffic congestion and impacts on biodiversity (this was especially stressed by several speakers at the meeting mentioned below).
- 2. <u>No EIS necessary?</u> At the meeting held in Katoomba on June 25 2019, one of the 4 officials from the then Department of Industry said to participants "An EIS may not be required". This statement alarmed listeners and raised questions about the entire process and its oversight by the department.
- **3.** Opacity of ownership. Several questioners raised the issue of ownership of the licence. One claimed that a search had revealed that the company FlyBlue Management P/L Ltd could be traced back to a discretionary trust. Departmental officers appeared confused as to what authority the state would have over such a trust. The question of the possibility of foreign ownership was also raised.
- **4.** <u>Length of lease.</u> The request for a 50-year lease is excessive and it seems unlikely that the granting of such a long lease would work in the public interest.
- 5. The proposal offers the "opening up" of the area as a positive benefit. This raises the question of whether/not this area around the airport should be "opened up" at all. Why not keep it as pristine as possible in this World Heritage Area? The proposer also speaks of "new and upgraded facilities for users of the airfield". This suggests a picture of overseas tourists flying directly into one of Sydney's airports, then taking a flight up to the mountains- why go by car/bus when you can fly? Maybe the Hydro-Majestic Hotel, 5-minutes from the Airfield could apply for a casino licence a lot can happen in 50 years. This is incremental development at work...
- **6.** One tree for every flight proposal. This must be one of the sillier sops that any developer has ever offered the community. How will such a scheme be monitored for 50 years remember? In a word ridiculous.

- 7. <u>Lack of detailed Business Plan.</u> The proposer should be required to provide a realistic detailed Business Plan showing predicted capital investment and revenue so that the Department is assured that the proposal is viable. What the local community does not need is the forced fire sale of the Airport so that the process is back to square one.
- **8.** <u>The weather.</u> Have the weather patterns of this mountain area been taken into account? This Airport is located in an extremely misty and high wind area (refer to the figures of wind speeds over nearby Mt Boyce) which surely will impact on flights. It is worth remembering that the previous owner of the Airport was killed in an accident when his plane crashed just 200 metres from the airport.

In conclusion, it is vital that Katoomba Airfield should be available at all times to Emergency Services and the proposer has offered this facility. However, the fact that the Bushfire Season in our area has been extended already is a hint of things to come. Interruptions to flight schedules may increase over the years and impact on revenue.

I'm a resident of the Blue Mountains, and involved in remote bushcare as a volunteer with both Blue Mountains City Council and National Parks and Wildlife Service NSW, and I have been involved with the weeding of Katoomba Creek just down hill from both Cascade Creek Dam and the Katoomba Airfield. I am concerned regarding the proposed lease of the airfield on a number of aspects:

- \* The impact that upgrading of the site and increasing the number of visitors to the site will have on the local environment in the area, including the spread of weeds.
- \* Potential impact on Cascade Dam or the Grose catchment if there were any leaks of fire fighting chemicals, fuel etc.
- \* Impact on both residents and the peaceful wilderness of the Blue Mountains National Park by increased aircraft noise
- \* The FlyBlue website statement of commitment to "delivering net positive environmental homogenous (sic) rejuvenation" sounds like they think they can destroy native bushland and get a net positive result by planting a single species of tree.

My feedback relates to the Government's withholding of data information vital to genuine and transparent consultation concerning the proposal.

Residents of the region have a right to know how many daily flights and daily passenger numbers are proposed, and the proposed flight paths, in order to be able to properly consider and provide feedback on the proposal.

It stands to reason that FlyBlue would have conducted detailed planning since any venture that requires investment and seeks to make a profit would have to undertake this kind of modelling. However, neither FlyBlue, nor the Government, have published these figures. Surely the Government would require this information in order to properly assess the application.

Noise pollution is also a legitimate consideration for residents and further necessitates modelling on proposed flight and passenger numbers, and flight paths. The applicant should be required to provide proper modelling of noise pollution. Failing to disclose this information also denies residents an opportunity to properly scrutinise and provide feedback on the proposal.

I wish to register my strongest objection to the proposed use of crown land at Mellow Bath/Katoomba for commercial aviation purposes.

Local residents have for years been advocating the return of this crown land to the National Park. The existing dirt airstrip is surrounded by National Park and as such is unsuitable for any commercial development. It needs to be incorporated into the Blue Mountains National Park and managed by the National Parks and Wildlife Service.

The proposed commercial development of the airfield will have detrimental effects on the local tourism industry. The Blue Mountains is famous for its natural environment and the outdoor experiences that it offers both visitors and locals. An estimated 1.25 million people undertake bushwalks in the Blue Mountains each year.

Landing tourist helicopters and fixed winged aircraft within the World Heritage-listed national park could jeopardise the Blue Mountains experience by:

- 1. Impacting the reputation of the Blue Mountains as a quiet and peaceful escape
- 2. Increasing noise and reducing amenity for hikers, climbers and canyoners
- 3. Concentrating tourist dollars in fewer hands. Tourists that arrive or depart by helicopter are much more likely to be dependent on a few operators for transport and accommodation
- 4. A decrease in reputation or "wilderness experience" will logically result in fewer visits, meaning less spent at local cafes, pubs, shops and retail outlets or spent on supporting local culture and events.

Katoomba Airfield is completely surrounded by the Greater Blue Mountains World Heritage Area. Within 5km of the airfield there are over 3000 native plant species, including those listed as endangered.

I have particular concerns that a commercial lease of the airfield will result in damage to the nearby rare hanging swamp habitat caused by runoff and erosion from increased traffic on the unsealed section of Grand Canyon Road and the asphalting of the runway.

The proposed commercial development of the airfield will also adversely affect residents' lifestyle and amenity. Residents in eastern Medlow Bath will bear the brunt of noise pollution from the proposed helicopter operations. However, from past experience of "joy flights" from this location, the noise readily spreads to residents in Evans Lookout Road, Blackheath and North Katoomba which are both less than 2km

from the airfield and which will, no doubt, experience fly overs despite the unenforceable fly neighbourly policy.

Finally, I have major concerns about the bureaucratic "process" which has got us to this point. The paralysis of intellect on display here is simply breathtaking. It's almost unbelievable that someone thought that this was a good idea. Proposing a commercial lease of crown land situated where it is demonstrates lack of insight, arrogance and complete disdain for the democratic process.

The lease of crown land at Mellow Bath for commercial aviation purposes must not proceed.

I wish to state that I Object to any commercial lease of the Katoomba Airfield. I believe that it should be put in to the National Park and maintained for Emergency uses only.

I live in Katoomba and can verify that we already have enough flights passing over the Blue Mountains already.

Any commercial leasee will necessarily need to make money from their operations and this will mean that there will be increased flights of helicopters and light aircraft from the airfield. Any increase of flights will be too many. There are already enough flights over the Blue Mountains and this airfield is very close to residents and to World Heritage National Park which is used for 'getting away' from such noise and disturbance. Any increase in flights, whether by 'neighbourly' flight paths or any other, will increase the disturbance to residents, native animals and tourists trying to relax in the bush.

It is of course useful for safety and for emergencies to retain the airfield as a part of the National Park and this should be easy to achieve. It is not necessary for the Blue Mountains to have another commercial airfield in the middle of a town.

Putting the airfield into the National Park and maintaining it for emergencies and park management requirements is the best solution and one that has already been studied and recommended.

The NSW Government via the Department of Industry (Crown Lands) has previously carried out many studies of the site, culminating in a recommendation in 2000 that the area be added to the Blue Mountains National Park, with the airfield being used for emergency purposes only.

Blue Mountains City Council have previously opposed the continuation of a private lease over the Airfield, requesting that the land be incorporated into the Blue Mountains National Park in 1999, 2000 and 2008. Likewise the National Parks and Wildlife Service (NPWS) has previously supported the Katoomba Airfield being incorporated into the National Park, with the airfield managed for emergency and bushfire fire-fighting purposes.

The National Parks and Wildlife Service manages a number of airfields within national parks for management and emergency purposes. Specific funding to manage the airfield could be allocated to National Parks from the Bushfire Risk Mitigation and Resilience Program managed by NSW Treasury.

# Katoomba Airfield - Government Killing the Golden Goose?

In the 1960's Katoomba Airfield was excised from the Blue Mountains National Park on the basis that it would be returned in 1988. However this never happened. Recently its main use has been for bushfire fighting and medical evacuations. With the growing population, traffic and fire threats to the region this is **CORE service provision in the Blue Mountains and World Heritage Area.** 

In 2000 and 2008 the NSW State Government undertook two assessments involving community consultations on the long-term future of the site. The Department concluded, that the land should not be commercially leased and that the site be incorporated into the Blue Mountains National Park on the expiry of the existing lease in 2008 and used **only for emergency and bushfire air operations**. The current commercial **lease proces**s is in direct contradiction of the land assessments and consultations carried out previously.

- 1. **Legal process:** On February 1<sup>st</sup> 2018 the Department granted a flying licence to Flyblue after a tender process which has never been made public and there was no public consultation. The airfield property is zoned E3 (environmental conservation under the Blue Mountains Local Environment Plan) and an aerodrome is not a permitted use. Therefore the approval may well find itself the subject of legal action.
- Consultation process: Combined with the governments and the proponents failure to consult or conduct an Environmental Impact Study on the proposal, the approval for a lease of 50 years increases the likelihood of a private sale, ensures growth in impact (over time) and cuts out local business & community altogether.
- 3. **Threat to existing low impact businesses:** The impact on current business eco tourism in the Upper Blue Mountains has not been calculated. The link here is to the top 10 activities people come to the mountains for companies running these busy <u>eco and adventure tourism</u> will all be impacted.
- 4. **Loss of Trade:** Conference venues, accommodation, luxury hotels such as the Hydro Majestic will all suffer losses from uncontrolled overhead helicopter noise.

No detailed flight plans have been made public, and the operator simply indicates that they would "not offer short trips" (under 15 minutes) nor fly at night (except in an emergency). No undertaking is given as to the frequency of flights, or flight paths and in fact there are no enforceable Regulations to cover this - residents and local businesses are left only with an unenforceable voluntary agreement.

World Heritage Areas across the World don't allow high impact noise air activities -

see Cappadocia for example - wilderness, vistas, wildlife, sanctuary, health and adventure retreats all lose their visitors / value and with over 100 years of investment into lifestyle tourism this would be like killing the goose that lays the golden egg. Governments need to make a decision for the long term when it comes to investment in Tourism - WHA listing will continue to drive investment in one direction and that is all put at risk under this proposal.

Dear Managers of Crown Lands in NSW,

I object strenuously to the current proposal to use Katoomba Airfield for commercial purposes. The idea has been proposed previously and been rejected. It has not gained any merit in the meantime. The use of the airfield by for commercial helicopter and light aircraft flights would degrade and prevent use of the National Park for more valid human purposes and impose unnecessary impacts on biodiversity. The proposal entails noise pollution, high levels of fossil fuel consumption (for flights) with attendant greenhouse emissions, and other petroleum-based pollution.

The proposal offers to provide a high-cost, semi-elite consumer experience that will destroy opportunities for low-cost, non-polluting, high-satisfaction activities such as bushwalking, camping and picnicking. These latter activities are deeply important for the wellbeing of Blue Mountains and Sydney residents and are deeply impacted by flight noise. The Grose Valley catchment (in which Katoomba Airfield is located) is renowned and highly visited for these activities. It is unique in terms of having high wilderness values and high accessibility for public transport, car use, Sydney residents and international visitors. These fundamental qualities support a substantial long-term tourism industry which could easily be compromised by the foolish imposition of low altitude flights.

The Grose Valley provides a much needed connection to nature for Sydney and Blue Mountains Residents that other locations simply cannot provide. The health benefits are clearly huge and are quite likely much greater than existing modelling suggests. That connection to nature is greatly compromised by helicopter and aircraft noise. Economic modelling which takes full account of human wellbeing and biodiversity benefits would show that this proposal constitutes an economic disaster.

The Grose Valley is also in the heart of the Greater Blue Mountains World Heritage Area (GBMWHA). Many analyses have shown that incremental development can and will erode the values of the GBMWHA, unless it is kept in check. The current proposal is exactly the sort of high impact incremental development that must be avoided if GBMWHA values are to be retained.

The revegetation of cleared areas is important for biodiversity but it cannot compensate the damage to biodiversity associated with low altitude flights. The proposal clearly constitutes a biodiversity loss.

## On the basis of what I've written above, I object to the proposed development.

I also ask that:

- the land be transferred to the National Park estate so it can be properly managed for biodiversity outcomes and light, sustainable human uses such as bushwalking, camping and picnicking;
- an airstrip suitable for emergency requirements be maintained and adequate funding for this purpose also be transferred to National Parks.

I am writing to express our concern at the proposed usage of the airfield at Medlow Bath, which is currently crown land, as a site for aviation tourism. We are concerned for a number of reasons:

- This land is currently public land and should be preserved as such. Allowing a tourism operator, or any other
  private entity, to use the land for commercial purposes is inappropriate. As the population continues to
  grow and land becomes more developed there are an ever decreasing number of public spaces available.
  Those that exist must be preserved for the sake of future generations.
- 2. Given that the Katoomba airfield sits within a stunning, World Heritage listed National Park a public space which can be enjoyed by all it makes sense for the crown land to be transferred to the national park. Not only would this preserve its public status forever, it would enhance the National Park and allow for a more cohesive land management plan to be in place.
- 3. The Blue Mountains offers a peaceful, natural environment for residents and visitors alike. The addition of aviation tourism, through scenic helicopter flights for example, would contribute significant noise pollution, having a detrimental impact on the quality of life for residents, and the enjoyment of the vast majority of visitors who are unlikely to be able to afford such attractions.
- 4. I wish to record my opposition to this proposal, and to submit that, in its current form the department cannot give the proposal the proper, genuine and realistic consideration required of the department by the principles of administrative law. The proposal is submitted to fail to particularise a number of matters which are essential for its proper evaluation, including:

- 1. The terms and conditions of proposed public access to the site;
- 2. The terms and conditions of insurance cover, if any, proposed with respect to persons having access to the site for other than purposes associated with the proposed development;
- 3. The bond, security, or other pecuniary guarantees offered by the proponents with respect to compliance with any approval granted, the cost of enforcement action with respect to non-compliance, and environmental protection, particularly with respect to spillages of fuel or other chemicals used in aviation, and escape of substances threatening adjacent water resources, floral or faunal habitats, and remediation of the site upon completion of the lease;
- 4. Proposals to address identified threats to native fauna, particularly bird migration, feeding, mating and care of young, and protocols for their enforcement;
- 5. Independently reviewed details of an appropriate commercial return to the public for private use of a public resource;
- 6. Personal guarantees from the proponents with respect to compliance with conditions of any approval granted, and costs of enforcement action with respect to non-compliances;
- 7. Specified, independently reviewed weather and time curfews, height, flight frequency, identity of aircraft, and noise limits as conditions of approval, instead of unenforceable vague assurances;
- 8. Monitoring, reporting and independent auditing proposals with respect to the matters identified in 7 above, instead of the current unenforceable self-regulating regime proposed;
- 9. An independent EIS addressing the three pillars of sustainable development.

I submit that the proponents bear the onus of establishing, in accordance with the precautionary principle, that the proposed development on public land for private gain cannot compromise the right of future generations of residents and visitors to enjoy this unique world heritage listed region, and that the current proposal does not begin to satisfy that obligation.

I respectfully submit that the current proposal must be rejected, and that, given the public importance of the issue, there be a public hearing with respect to the consideration of any amended application submitted by the proponents.

As a resident in the vicinity of Katoomba Airfield and a regular user of Blue Mountains National Park I object strongly to the proposed use of Katoomba Airfield for private commercial gain.

The proposed development is totally inappropriate in an area of World Heritage significance and if allowed to go ahead will significantly diminish the wilderness experience intended through the creation of the National Park as well as the amenity of residents in the Blue Mountains.

I and many other local residents spend many hours each year working to maintain the National Park on a voluntary basis through Bushcare activities. The proposal to allow this land which is owned by the public and in such a sensitive area, to be used for private commercial gain in a way that is detrimental to the park and the enjoyment of its users, is an affront to those of us who give our services voluntarily because we truely value the park and the peaceful wilderness experience it provides and seek to leave the park in a pristine state for future generations to enjoy.

If allowed to proceed this proposal will diminish the experience of park users and degrade the World Heritage value of the Blue Mountains National Park. It represents the crass commercialisation of a public asset for private exploitation and shows a contemptuous disregard for the value of the wilderness experience which National Parks should afford and for the welfare and the protection of native animals which inhabit the park.

Katoomba Airfield should be placed within the National Park which surrounds it. I support its use for emergency purposes only as required, managed by the NPWS.

I am aware the NPWS currently seeks to prevent the use of drones in the park so that people can enjoy the park in a peaceful and private way. Helicopter joyflights over the park would make a mockery of this endeavour.

The Blue Mountains National Park has been recognised as an area of World Heritage importance. Other world class National Parks have legislation protecting the "natural quiet and experience of the park" and Blue Mountains National Park should be protected in the same way.

Crownland NSW must act in the interests of local citizens and the broader NSW community who have supported the creation and protection of the Blue Mountains National Park and achieved its World Heritage recognition.

I would you to note my objection to the proposed lease of Katoomba Airfield to commercial enterprise. I believe that the Katoomba Airfield is a public asset that should be maintained for non-profit and emergency use only.

I propose that the lease application of Derek and Floyd Larsen and Flyblue be rejected and that the airfield be transferred, as previously proposed, to be incorporated into the Blue Mountains National Park, and further that the airfield be maintained with Federal and or NSW funding such as under the Natural Disaster Resilience Program or Bush Fire Risk Mitigation and Resilience Funding Brigade Mitigation Support Programme.

I suspect the nature of a commercial operation is such that it would be economically incentivised to increase helicopter traffic and have a detrimental impact on our community. The Significant increase Noise Pollution would impact in the following ways:

I OBJECT STRONGLY TO THE PROPOSED LEASE OF KATOOMBA AIRFIELD TO A COMMERCIAL OPERATOR BECAUSE ANY BENEFITS FAR OUTWEIGH THE DETRIMENT TO MANY MANY PEOPLE, AS BELOW:

For over 30 years thousands of meditators have enjoyed the tranquility of the Blue Mountains while practicing Vipassana at Dhamma Bhumi. Now the silence is threatened by the proposed lease of Katoomba airfield to a commercial flying operator. The airfield is about seven kilometers from the Centre. The operator would run commercial flights, including scenic helicopter tours, over the Blue Mountains. The licence is unrestricted, so that the flight paths and frequency of flights is entirely up to the operator with no further oversight or control.

The issue extends beyond the Centre. The Blue Mountains is a listed World Heritage area, noted for the grandeur of its mountain scenery, its abundant wildlife, and its peaceful silence. It is rare to have such beautiful and unique wilderness so close to a major population centre like Sydney. It is an amenity which needs to be protected. It is visited by people from Sydney and overseas to relax, to retreat from the pressures and noise of daily life, and to enjoy nature undisturbed. In addition to the local community Vipassana students are just some of the many who would be affected.

At present, the Katoomba Airfield is used just for emergency services. Between 1992-95, when a commercial lease was previously issued, it was mis-used and subsequently operations were closed down. When that lease expired, it was agreed that the airfield be returned to being part of the Blue Mountains National Park, but this never happened.

Meditators now have the prospect of low aircraft or helicopter flights directly over the Centre. While flights are meant to be above 1000 feet (30m) above residential areas, and 500 feet (15m) elsewhere, there is no enforcement process and a pilot can claim safety, poor weather etc.

The proposed lease is to be granted by the NSW Government Department of Lands. The government's own guidelines require that before such a lease is granted:

- its impact on the current community use and enjoyment of the land be considered,
- community engagement be transparent, conducted openly, fosters respect and trust, and is professional, honest and consistent.
- local communities have the opportunity to be involved and local voices heard.

Yet to date, no information has been offered about the flight paths, the frequency, and the number of flights. Clearly this is inadequate consultation.

We do not support the arrival of yet more air/noise pollution of our relatively quiet village and the surrounding National Park. There are already helicopter tours over the Blue Mountains and we suffer the accompanying noise whenever these machines fly anywhere near the Grose Valley. The reverberations and echoes are very loud and they do at times fly low. Helicopters taking off and landing at increased frequency will likely make life unbearable. And, if profit were an issue, property prices could plummet in Blackheath and Medlow Bath in particular.

When factoring in the noise already experienced from westward flights from Mascot (Kingsford Smith Airport) and projected noise level increase when the Western Sydney Airport comes online, the accompanying thud and engine noise of increased helicopter flights and to a slightly lesser extent, small planes, is greatly disturbing. There are already times when helicopter traffic increases to disrupt our every day life. Dear team,

I and my husband came to the upper Blue Mountains twelve years ago because we wanted to be where it was mountainous and quiet as we both enjoy quiet country pursuits such as hill walking and having wonderful and silent places to sit and enjoy the far reaching still pristine wilderness and ponder over the beauty, the age and the natural history, a just reward for our efforts, using nothing but our legs to get us there. A natural, healthy, non-damaging nor polluting activity.

We came from , where we had seen there what is now happening here; that is the unsuitable developments that promise big money to the developers, most not living in the area but seeing an opportunity to get rich at the expense of the environment.

These businesses include an old RAAF airstrip, used for Mountain Search and Rescue, and Air Ambulance helicopters. This was not a frequent occurance happily and was accepted by the local populace as necessary, all living in a rural area from choice and because it was where families had lived, some for hundreds of years.

This airstrip is now referred to as an 'Airport' and as such has developed to receive a great many aircraft from further and further afield, for the most part -Tourism. In turn this has turned the narrow peaceful country lanes into a steady stream of traffic and aircraft regularly fly over the mountains that we loved and where we have walked in silent admiration of the beauty of the Snowdonia Range.

Now we see the quiet and friendly Leura being swamped with tourists every day of the week; if we locals want to shop we must get up there and out before 10am, or wait until after 4pm. Before 10 there's a chance of parking but a lot of the shops are still closed. (I often walk, it's less trouble) The main shops open being the supermarket and the coffee shops. A shop owner I know says the tourists don't spend much, a) they haven't the time and b) always wanting discount, as is the practise in their home country. That business doesn't benefit from tourists and the locals are avoiding the village because of the tourist congestion.

I had occasion to use the Ladies toilets one morning and found the toilets were already in a very unpleasant state. The toilet block itself has been made very attractive with tiling.

We are now wondering if we should look at leaving Leura, which we have enjoyed, being small and quiet and where we, as newcomers and knowing nobody, have made a small circle of good friends and many pleasant aquaintances through the Blue Mountains Conservation Group and our bushwalking groups, all of whom treasure and appreciate the Blue Mountains for the area of special environmental interest that it is, and it being of WORLD HERITAGE LISTING. We have seen several acquaintances move away this last 2 years.

As in Snowdonia, it seems that anyone with an interest involving noisy engines is welcome in this previously quiet and peaceful landscape.

We enjoyed walking in the West MacDonald Ranges a few years ago and after that went to explore the King's Canyon. All sense of wilderness was totally spoiled by the regular buzzing of tourist aircraft overhead, causing us to decide we wouldn't be going there again!

Apart from all the environmental considerations and the air,noise and visual pollution, how on earth is the Great Western Highway to cope with the ever-increasing traffic?

Our family has owned a residence in Katoomba for over 20 years. We frequent the home on a regular basis with our family from our home in Sydney. We purchased the home for the peace and tranquillity and strong community ties the people from the upper mountains offer. To have peace and quiet and hear the birds and wind in the trees is priceless in a modern and noisy society we live in today.

We strongly object to the proposed Airport based on our own experience living under the flight path for small aircraft / helicopters in Sydney. The flight path runs along the Parramatta river on the north side of the embankment which runs and operates along the river past Gladesville / Tennyson Point, Putney area directly above our home. Hunters Hill LGA.

We accept living in Sydney there is constant noise from low air craft operating and running along the Parramatta river flight path and regular heavy aircraft operating from Mascot Domestic and International Airports over the Hunters Hill LGA.

The small aircraft is required to operate at a very low height. In fact so low drones are NOT permitted to be used in our area by the Parramatta river. The constant noise operates from 6am to 11pm each day and night. The constant flow of aircraft being required to operate so low above residential homes makes it impossible to hear each other speak or listen to the TV. The aircraft are so noisy and the loud noise from the engines cause the furniture in the house to vibrate when the aircraft pass. The emissions from the jet fuel leave a black haze of the home and outdoor furniture.

I object to the Katoomba Airfield being leased for commercial purposes, and request that the land be added to Blue Mountains National Park and the strip used for emergency purposes only.

I make this submission as a bushwalker, conservationist and historian very familiar with the Grose Valley. I am the author of the popular book

Blue Gum Forest, in the heart of the valley, was saved from the axe in 1932, and is arguably the cradle of the modern conservation movement in New South Wales.

In 1995, as the then

Grose Wilderness. The Wilderness was declared in 2001, the year after it was included in the Greater Blue

Mountains World Heritage Area. Formal assessment by NPWS had confirmed that it satisfied all the necessary

criteria for wilderness under the NSW Wilderness Act. It was of adequate size and in excellent natural condition, and

was capable of providing opportunities for solitude and appropriate self-reliant recreation. In other words, a place

where peace could be found in a natural setting.

The "Govett Gorge" part of the valley, which is very close to the Katoomba Airfield, was identified as fitting all the criteria but was not included in the formal declaration, so as not to constrain the number of bushwalkers and campers who could visit it and enjoy its natural wonders. For all intents and purposes, and in the eyes of the many visitors and the public generally, the Govett Gorge is as much wilderness as the area beyond.

There was a period in the early 1990s when frequent helicopter flights took place over the Grose Valley, particularly the Govett Gorge part. They were based at the Katoomba Airfield. At the time I was spending a great deal of time bushwalking in the area. The flights were intensely annoying: the noise seemed to be magnified by the cliffs, and completely distracted me from any sense of peace. Even the interval between flights was spoiled, as I found myself wondering when the next intrusion would be upon me.

The flights even impacted on one's experience at places like Evans Lookout. The sense of wonder at the famous scene was ruined.

Given the impacts not only on human experience but also on native wildlife—particularly birds—it is unlikely that the valley would have been assessed as fitting the wilderness criteria if the flights had been persisting at the time.

Local scenic flights—or indeed any frequent-flight regime—cannot be allowed to re-establish. Blue Mountains residents and visitors are already enduring too many flights, emanating from Bankstown, Sydney, Richmond and (in due course) Badgerys Creek airports.

While it is understood that the intended lessees of Katoomba Airfield are not proposing "scenic flights", there appears to be no definition of that concept. The temptation for flights to deviate from set paths for scenic purposes would be overwhelming and impossible to regulate. Moreover, once a lease is granted there can be no guarantee that its terms will not be changed, or the lease sold to operators with different intentions.

Aircraft tourism is for the benefit of a wealthy few, at the expense of the many tourists and walkers on the ground—and nearby residents—who are trying to find some peace in their lives.

It is with dismay that I read about the above proposal - and fail to understand why this has progressed so far as to require public opposition to draw the Department's attention to the issues this raises with local residents, local businesses, to say nothing of the great erosion of the protected Blue Mountains National Park.

As I understand the role of your Department, it includes the obligation to protect the environment, one would have thought especially areas with World Heritage recognition.

I cannot believe that your Department is so ignorant as to assume that helicopters flying over residents, and wilderness areas are not interfering with the rights of those below to enjoy normal peace and tranquility without the indulgence of cashed up visitors flying about.

I am not against anyone wanting to view the Mountains - they can walk in them, climb their cliffs, camp peacefully and if all that sounds like too much effort, I am sure the IMax theatre can provide them with a very good alternative using drone footage so that they can safely enjoy the view in comfort without the real fear of dying in a helicopter crash.

It will only take one fatal accident to destroy the business and that will be after they have disturbed the Mountains as so to risk its World Heritage status.- so why wait until someone dies? Just shut the whole proposal down now - save the Mountains for those who love the Mountains enough to choose to live there - and who wish to protect it from the greedy eyes of those thrill seekers who only wish to give the Mountains an unbearable noise to say nothing of the intrusion into people's right to privacy in their own homes.

As a resident of the Blue Mountains for decades on and off, my accustomed response to helicopter noise is alarm - knowing that they are usually only in the air to survey fires or do a rescue. Now it is proposed that the residents learn to endure this very disturbing noise as a matter of course to say nothing of the wildlife.

I ask you - why does a commercial flying operator have more rights - than the residents and businesses in the Blue Mountains??? Businesses depend on the tourist trade and you can bet that social media networks will report the helicopter noise to walkers, runners, climbers, bird watchers etc..... and they will stop coming in the droves that the resident businesses now enjoy.

There are 3 major types of sound - geophony - sounds made by the earth eg waterfalls, wind etc... Biophony sounds made by living creatures - eg bird songs, and anthrophony - sounds made by people and these can be divided into organised noise such as speech and music - or disorganised chaotic noise which is more and more part of our lives - and includes the chaotic noise of construction, traffic and helicopters. Most of this chaotic noise we learn to live with - but it is extremely stressful to living beings human and non-human.

Any department will the power would see it as being very beneficial to protect areas from chaotic noise whenever they had the power to do so.

Finally I have to add my own personal interest - I have lived in Blackheath for many years and I came there because of the Vipassana Meditation Centre. This meditation centre has been developed over 30 years and

people come from all over the world to meditate in its peaceful serene atmosphere. Every fortnight a 10 day silent meditation retreat is held - free of charge - and it is not a business - it is a unique experience in the Mountains. The courses are booked up well in advance with long waiting lists that have to be closed due to the demand.

People WANT Peace - and it is in your power to ensure that as much peace as possible is preserved wherever you can..... every bit of peace preserved spreads and helps the world become a more peaceful place and you know this is a good thing.

Meanwhile I suggest you check out the website <a href="www.bhumi.dhamma.org">www.bhumi.dhamma.org</a> and consider taking a 10 day course - so you can appreciate what peace and quiet really feel like. The course is funded by donation and no-one will ever ask you for a donation. The whole place has been built by generous donors who get no recognition nor any special treatment. There is no other gain than knowing that your donation goes towards giving someone else the chance to experience true peace and quiet for at least 10 days. So please protect this centre as well as the rest of the Mountains.

We are residents in and live around 8 km (directly) from Katoomba airfield at Medlow Bath. We strongly object to the proposal for this public land at Medlow Bath being used for commercial purposes, particularly for aviation tourism. We recognise that tourism is an important part of the Blue Mountains economy but we do not support the use of public land for the purposes of increasing air flight activity (rotary or fixed wing). Our reasons for this objection are as follows:

- 1. This public land should be freely available for legitimate use by the public and not be used for commercial purposes.

We are writing in objection to the proposed commercial lease on the Katoomba airfield. This airfield lies within the boundaries of the Greater Blue Mountains World Heritage Area. A commercial operation puts at risk the integrity of the Grose Wilderness Area.

The Blue Mountains needs the strip to be maintained for emergency procedures only (such as firefighting operations). We don't need constant air traffic from small fixed wing aircraft and helicopters. The granting of a long term commercial lease is almost certain to result in a steady flow of aircraft in and out of this airfield. The airstrip lies within the Grose Wilderness and this is home to many birds and other animals. There is not enough research into the effect that aircraft noise and movement will have on these animals. Some of them are vulnerable species such as the Gang Gang cockatoo. It is also highly likely that the annual honeyeater migration goes through this area as the birds fly north. More research needs to be done in this regard.

To issue an interim commercial lease prior to public consultation is not the right thing to do in relation to public land. This is why there is now a petition with 10,000 signatures opposing the commercial lease. Many people are opposed to it and we weren't consulted beforehand.

Not only is there a real threat the wildlife, but there is also a great potential of increased traffic in and out of Medlow Bath - a small and quiet village in the upper Blue Mountains, and the potential for residents of upper mountains and people enjoying a true wilderness experience (walkers and canyons) to be disturbed by noisy aircraft.

The land should be transferred into the hands of National Parks & Wildlife Service and they should be funded adequately to maintain the airstrip for emergency purposes only. A commercial lease is not appropriate within a World Heritage National Park and must not be granted.



I am writing this submission as an objection to the proposal for commercial use of the Katoomba Airfield. As a long term resident of the Blue Mountains, the proposed commercialisation of Katoomba Airfield will be detrimental to the environment and economy of the Blue Mountains as follows:

Concentrating tourist dollars in fewer hands. Tourists that arrive or depart by helicopter are much more likely to be dependent on a few operators for transport and accommodation and less on local businesses, thereby hurting the local economy. The amount of flights to make this a viable proposition would result in Increasing noise and reducing amenity for the the vast majority of vistrors - day tourists from Sydney and those who experience the bush from the ground - hikers, climbers and canyoners. There would be a decrease in reputation or 'wilderness experience' will logically result in fewer visits, meaning less spent at local cafes, pubs, shops and retail outlets or spent on supporting local culture and events.

Katoomba Airfield is completely surrounded by the Greater Blue Mountains World Heritage Area and the Blue Mountains World Heritage Area is up for review later this year. It's status may be effected, again affecting the area's reputation with the probable drop in numbers, again affecting the local economy.

Increased aircraft noise will adversely impact the liveability of upper Blue Mountains towns and villages, with the proposed business profiting a few but will adversely affect thousands.

Numerous government reports have recommended or anticipated the site should be returned to the National Park. Why has this process not occurred?

Flight paths have only been displayed at "drop-in" sessions at Hotel Blue, but do not include intended pathways beyond the immediate vicinity of the airfield. It is not appropriate to grant a long term lease for the commercial development and operation of an airfield on land which is wholly within the Blue Mountains National Park. However, I fully support continued use of the airfield for emergency purposes if required, as such a use clearly would be in our community's interests. Any upgrading of the airfield for commercial purposes will impact on the residents, and on the tourist trade on which the community is heavily economically dependent. I would like to outline my serious concerns regarding the proposal to allow an aviation tourism business to lease the old airfield at Medlow Bath in the Bluemountains of NSW.

Main Points of concern.

- 1. The noise and pollution from proposed flight paths of helicopters and fixed wing aircraft will impact on some of the most spectacular bush walks the Bluemountains has to offer especially the Grand Canyon area. Far from enhancing tourism in the area, these flights will have a negative impact on tourists as the uniqueness of walking in a peaceful quiet environment will be totally lost. Past experience in the mid 90's of helicopter flights operating from this old airfield was not good, low altitude flights combined with noise and exhaust pollution was appalling.
- 2. The sub-leasing or selling of the lease to the airfield in the future is also a major concern. There appears to be no official mechanism to monitor ongoing compliance of all operators using this proposed site now and into the future. It should not be up to the local community to monitor compliance especially flight paths, altitude adherence and number of flight arrivals and departures per day.
- 3. The proposal to "improve" the airfield amenity will likely involve the clearing of established vegetation. If the facility was to offer refuelling options for aircraft we would see fuel storage in the middle of a high risk bushfire zone. Currently there is no town water connection, how will this facility protect its assets, both fuel and buildings with just water tanks, will the leaseholder clear even more vegetation to provide a fire buffer and meet strident BAL requirements.

#### Overview

I am an avid bushwalker and fear the impact of helicopter and fixed wing aircraft on the area will be detrimental, this is a unique area and needs to be protected.

The public land known as the Katoomba Airfield should not be used for a commercial purpose that so negatively impacts both bluemountains residents and tourists.

This crown land should be transferred to the national park and a dirt airstrip be maintained for emergency use only.

- 1. The proposal fact sheet states, as I understand it, there will be no short duration joy flights or circuit training. There is no restriction, however, on flights into the airfield from elsewhere, or away from the airfield to elsewhere, to not engage in "sightseeing". The "fly neighbourly" proposals are purely voluntary and not enforceable.
- 2. The proposal's claim that this development of the airfield would enhance local tourism is a fallacy. I have lived in the Blue Mountains since 1991 and bushwalked, engaged in wildlife research and other activities since the 1970's. The over-riding sentiment expressed by visitors and residents, especially away from the more heavily visited areas, is how peaceful it is! The cacophony of noise from increased helicopter and fixed-wing aircraft traffic will ruin this attribute. Other tour operators and the community will not be able to promote the peacefulness as a selling point, which is not an "enhancement". This was recognized with the helicopter joy flights in the 1990's and they were eventually scrapped.
- 3. Leasing this public land purely to gain government revenue is of benefit to no one except perhaps the lessee. If the proposal goes ahead, it will further erode the world heritage values of the Blue Mountains National Park.
- 4. The Blue Mountains communities have benefitted from having the airfield available during emergencies such as bushfires. It should be retained and maintained for such use and nothing else.

Thank for the opportunity to provide a submission in relation to this matter.

I am a resident of Sydney who regularly visits the Blue Mountains as a tourist. I participate in a range of activities including hiking, tours, eating out, and shopping.

In general, I am typically in favour of further development of tourism infrastructure and services. Tourism is a renewable resource - if managed correctly.

I should also add that I have, in other countries, participated in the kinds of flights that might depart from Katoomba Airfield should it be leased to a commercial operator.

I do however, have deep concerns about the proposed lease. These are outlined below:

- Flights of this nature will affect the quality of experience for the majority of tourists. The noise and visual effect of having low flying aircraft of any sort in the skies will reduce the sense of rugged, natural beauty for which the Blue Mountains is famed. Due to the expense of such flights they will only be used by a very small proportion of tourists and therefore will affect the experience of the area for most other visitors. This will reduce the attractiveness of the area for visitors over time.
- While there may be a need for an emergency airstrip, the general rule should be for areas of excised land to be re-incorporated into the National Park. This approach helps to build the tourism asset (the National Park itself) while also achieving conservation/biodiversity outcomes. Commercialising every available parcel of land will ultimately degrade the natural environment as well as the attractiveness of the area to tourists.
- Revenue can be generated through other channels which are more accessible for visitors (financial or otherwise), sympathetic to the environment and in keeping with the reasons why people visit the area.

There are many other arguments to make against this proposal - some emotive, others practical and environmental. I will leave these to others to make.

From my perspective as a visitor to the area, I would view such flights as reducing the attractiveness of going to the Blue Mountains.

Managed correctly, the Blue Mountains area can be a tourism hotspot for generations to come.

I am opposed to the granting of a long-term lease (potentially 50 years) of Katoomba airfield for aviation tourism.

Channel 9 recently reported on Helicopter tourism turning the living conditions of residents beneath the flight paths into a "nightmare" (Nine News, Fri 26th July), and some were unable to live in their homes because of the noise from local tourist operators operating in the skies near their homes.

There is greater concern for the residents of the Blue Mountains, because unlike the residents in the article (the Gold Coast, QLD), the Blue Mountains are not a high density urban area where some background noise in unavoidable. Most areas in the mountains away from the highway, are characteristically peaceful, and surrounded by World Heritage National Park, with a large variety of bird life, including hawks, eagles, and black cockatoos, who would be impacted by the noise and traffic of tourist helicopters. Despite the aviation tourism operator in the article claiming to operate with sound abatement procedures and sensitivity to residents, the sounds of the helicopter joy rides have been compared to "a war zone [with] incoming wounded", with the disruption "relentless", "overwhelming", and "it goes all day".

Traffic in the Gold Coast case can be up to 20 joy flights per day, with a recent three-fold increase, ranging in duration from 5 minutes to 45 minutes. Most concerning is that Air Services Australia has said in a statement to Channel 9 that "There is no regulation that limits how many times an operator can offer helicopter joy flights". Essentially there are no guarantees that the operator would be required to operate in a way that is sensitive to the world heritage values of the area, to the wider tourism benefits, or to the residents who choose to live in the peaceful environs of the Blue Mountains, nor are there conditions imposed on the hours of operation, flight paths or the number of flights.

In conclusion, I oppose this public land being used for Commercial purposes. The granting of the lease would not benefit the residents of the Blue Mountains, yet it is they who would be unduly impacted. I believe the land should be transferred to the National Parks and Wildlife Service and protected for all Australians, and that the air field be used for emergency use only. Additionally, there is the risk that the lease may be transferred or sold without community consultation, and for uses not yet specified.

I moved to the mountains with a young family, and feel very lucky to have raised four children in such a beautiful environment, subsequently recognised with World Heritage listing. I am very concerned that the proposal is not in the best interests of our community. We owe it to future generations to protect our national park, and to resist encroachments on it. The airfield was originally excised from national park. I support the NPWS's approach of looking to incorporate into national parks any privately owned or leased land surrounded by national park when that land becomes available. It is not appropriate to grant a long term lease for the commercial development and operation of an airfield on land which is wholly within the Blue Mountains National Park. However, I fully support continued use of the airfield for emergency purposes if required, as such a use clearly would be in our community's interests. Any upgrading of the airfield for commercial purposes will impact on the residents, and on the tourist trade on which the community is heavily economically dependent. ## **NOISE** - the main reason for my objection

I was recently bush walking near Govetts Leap and the noise of two helicopters flying over just 30 minutes apart was deafening and quite an intrusion into what should otherwise have been a very peaceful activity.

There was no bushfire /emergency that day, so these would have been commercial operators most likely ferrying tourists from a nearby resort in the next valley.

#### **COMMERCIAL LEASE = more NOISE**

By granting a commercial lease the number of helicopter or fixed wing aircraft journeys would increase and hence exacerbate this noise pollution.

### **OTHER OBJECTIONS too**

There are also other issues of native wildlife disturbance, erosion, fuel runoff into the adjoining bushland, as well as increased traffic movements in Medlow Bath, etc.

### INCLUSION of site into NATIONAL PARK as PROPOSED in 2000

- Knowledge of the area, having owned property at Wentworth Falls and having visited parents there when bringing my family from Walgett, North-West NSW.
- I am a Private Pilot with some 1,300 hrs flying hours. As Club I produced newsletters for a wider aviation community. Aviation safety featured prominently, influenced by the Club having lost a number of members in different incidents.
- I found it a godsend that such a facility at Katoomba was available to me to land at.
- Katoomba Airport is strategically located in 'tiger country' for pilots entering Sydney airspace from the West. No other similar facility is available in the area.
- I see no environmental effects that have not already been noted during previous aviation operations as having any adverse impacts. I say this based on my experience in the natural resource management field, notably as of five water committees based on the Namoi Valley and Great Artesian Basin, and Management Committee.
- The *Blue Mountains Gazette* (17 Oct 2018) appears to have published a well-balanced article on the subject. If these are the main objections:
  - o "Whilst the Society recognises the value of Katoomba Airfield for emergency uses, we are concerned about the environmental impacts of its operation," Society president Madi Maclean said.
  - o "A new lease arrangement with an aero club or other private operator is unlikely to keep operations to a minimum and will not adequately safeguard the threatened ecological community on-site nor the likely presence of endangered species."
  - "Other concerns include soil erosion, groundwater contamination from chemicals and fuel stored on site and weed invasion. Depending on the frequency, duration and intensity of air operations proposed by the new licensees, there are also likely to be noise impacts as well as loss of amenity and privacy for local residents. This not only includes residents in Medlow Bath immediately adjacent to the airfield, but residents in the Upper Mountains if the new commercial licensees are proposing activities such as joy flights".

Amongst domestic overnight visitors, who are likely to be amongst the greatest of contributors to the local economy, the top second and third reported activities were:

'Bushwalking or rainforest walks' (45.6%), this was the 2nd most popular activity, followed by 'visit national parks or state parks' (44.3%).

Thus, as expected, the Blue Mountains World Heritage Area is likely to be one of the greatest contributors to the local tourism economy.

As the owner and operator of two holiday letting properties in Mount Victoria, situated on the border of the Blue Mountains National Park, I am acutely aware of the needs of domestic and international tourists visiting the area. Grossing 60K per annum, my business contributes thousands of dollars each year to the local economy through guests eating and drinking at local venues, local services for property maintenance such as painting, building and gardening services and directly employs two local property employees who manage the business.

95% of the tourists who stay in our accommodation are domestic tourists from the greater Sydney region, Canberra and interstate visitors. Based on surveys of the reasons for visiting the area, 98% of these tourists cite bushwalking or recreational activities such as climbing/canyoning or riding in the Blue Mountains National Park.

Katoomba Airfield is surrounded on all sides by the Blue Mountains National Park and the Greater Blue Mountains World Heritage Area. It is located just 1.5km from the nearest cliffline of Govett's Gorge, the most accessible part of the Grose Valley and that part most visited by tourists.

Accessing Wilderness areas easily, for the enjoyment of the peace, recreation and health benefits that wilderness provides is the prime selling point and reason my holiday accommodation business is successful. Any reduction in the wilderness values of the Grose Valley and wider Blue Mountains National Park area will threaten the enjoyment and peaceful recreation of visiting tourists, leading to a diminished tourism experience in the Blue Mountains area and inevitably lead to a reduction in the perceived value of the Blue Mountains as a site of accessible recreation in a wilderness area and a reduction in tourist numbers and visitors.

Given the location of the Katoomba Airfield it is inevitable that any use of the airfield as a base for helicopter charters will have serious noise impacts on visitors to the national park, in addition to unknown effects on wildlife. To allow a relatively small number of visitors employing these charter flight services to destroy the peaceful enjoyment of the millions of tourists visiting the national park would not only be unjust, but also potentially economically counterproductive if the touted economic benefits of high end tourism were gained at the expense of driving the much bigger market of tourists seeking quiet nature based tourism experiences elsewhere.

I am particularly concerned about the impact of any proposed commercial lease on the Grose Valley. The Grose Valley has long been recognised as one of the most spectacular landscapes in NSW and has benefited from generations of community support to maintain it in its natural state, from the decision to reserve it from sale in 1875, to the citizen campaign to protect Blue Gum Forest in 1931, its reservation within the Blue Mountains National Park in 1959, its inscription on the World Heritage List as part of the Greater Blue Mountains World Heritage Area in 2000 and finally the declaration of the Grose Wilderness in 2001.

The Grose Wilderness is a jewel of *incalculable* value for the residents of Sydney and the people of NSW. It offers the possibility of escape from all the stresses of modern life for quiet nature based recreation and yet is just two hours by train from the Sydney CBD. Medical Doctors, Psychiatrists and Psychologists are increasingly recognising the importance of such opportunities for the health and wellbeing of an urbanised population and are beginning to prescribe regular time spent in wilderness areas to treat illnesses such as depression, anxiety and other mental health conditions. Mental illness currently places significant and extensive costs on individuals, society and the NSW health system. It is likely that in the very near future the government will need to look at more comprehensive ways of tackling the mental health crisis in NSW. One of these interventions may be to increase access to nature based experiences in wilderness areas. The 5 million residents of Sydney can currently access wilderness areas to be used for nature based recreation in the Grose Valley and Blue Mountains National Park via public transport or private vehicle within 2 hours. This development proposal threatens the long term economic and health benefits of these wilderness areas for the people of NSW, is economically negligent and grossly unjust.

Easy access to wilderness areas gives Sydney an advantage that few comparable world cities have. Amongst Alpha plus world cities only Tokyo has anything even remotely comparable. London, Paris and Berlin do not have this. New York City doesn't either. Nor, it bears mentioning, does Melbourne. This should be a resource that the NSW government closely protects and guards from encroachment. The government should protect the benefits that wilderness areas provide and should not allow their inherent values to be destroyed by ill thought out development plans for limited private interests.

In early communications the lease proponent made assurances that it would not be running joy flights in the Grose Valley. These assurances have been repeated in the FAQ provided by the NSW Department of Planning, Industry and Environment, noting that: "FlyBlue also notes it does not intend to fly in sensitive

and populated areas or over Echo Point, the Three Sisters, Grose Valley and up the Grand Canyon." Nevertheless, at information sessions and on the FlyBlue website the lease proponents have indicated a proposed flight path that cuts right across the Govett's Gorge before heading up the Grose Valley. Such a flight path would have direct noise impacts at the Grand Canyon, Fortress Creek Canyon, Blue Gum Forest, Pulpit Rock, Perrys Lookdown, Hanging Rock and the entire upper Grose Valley, the most visited part of the Grose Wilderness. It matters not whether these flights are termed joy flights or heli-charters or any other name. What is certain is that they will mean *dramatically* increased noise pollution in the valley. CASA and the lease proponents recognise that airports have noise impacts. It is for this reason that they plan to avoid populated areas for their flight paths. However, in their planning they appear to have no consideration for noise impacts on the environment, and the natural quiet of our precious wilderness areas.

21. Motorised transport operated by any agency, commercial interest or individual is not permitted in wilderness areas, except for management operations where:

the operation is necessary use of the transport will not have any significant long-term impacts the transport is the only feasible option available (for instance, during emergency operations).

22. Vehicle trails and helipads are prohibited. Existing ones should be closed and rehabilitated unless they are required for necessary management operations.

There would appear to be a clear conflict here that the NSW Government could have the above policies in place for lands managed as wilderness within the Blue Mountains National Park, and yet that the Department of Planning, Industry and Environment should be asked to grant a lease for use of public crown lands that includes a proposal that might approve a flight path cutting directly through the same lands.

Accordingly, I strongly urge you to refuse to grant a commercial lease over the Katoomba Airfield and instead support the incorporation of the airfield into Blue Mountains National Park as an emergency airfield only.

As a long term resident of the Blue Mountains, I am writing to voice my strong opposition to the proposed commercial lease of Katoomba Airfield to a private company. It is shocking to find that no community consultation on options for the future of the airfield occurred prior to an interim license being issued to the proponent. This lease will only benefit an extremely small number of tour operators and a few wealthy tourists but it stands to jeopardise the livelihood of many, many other hospitality and tourist industry workers.

The mountains currently hosts well over 4 million land based visitors a year who come to experience the majesty and peace and quiet of this stunning world heritage area. The upper mountains has had the experience of dealing with disruptive noise when a previous operator had permission to run helicopter flights in the early 1990's.

We certainly don't want it to end up like the 12 Apostles in Victoria where the constant drone of helicopters completely ruined the experience for us. We would NEVER visit there again and we warn every guest or traveller we meet to give it a wide berth. We are so lucky in the mountains that amazing views are easy to access by car or on foot - you don't need to be in an aircraft!

Apart from noise pollution, there is also the threat of fuel spillage and other pollution as the airfield is surrounded by National Park. Another point for consideration is the Blue Mountains climate. The weather in the mountains can be extremely changeable and treacherous with unpredictable winds that can appear rapidly and sometimes gust over 100 km/hr.

Any aircraft accidents could also lead to a catastrophic bushfire which has the potential to cause great environmental damage and loss of life and property.

The airstrip should be incorporated into the Blue Mountains National Park and kept for emergency aircraft only, as was originally proposed in 2000 after Crown Lands themselves carried out extensive studies and came to this conclusion.

The Government of NSW has an obligation to protect the Blue Mountains as "World Heritage sites belong to all the peoples of the world, irrespective of the territory on which they are located."

For many years, the Blue Mountains

YKAT for the operation of portable field day amateur radio stations. These stations are used by BMARC members to participate in various field day contests run throughout the year by the Wireless Institute of Australia (WIA). The aim of these contest is to encourage, and provide familiarisation with, portable and field operation of amateur radio equipment and to provide training of amateur radio operators for emergency situations (eg when conventional communications infrastructure may be rendered inoperative due to natural disasters, etc).

YKAT is in an excellent location for amateur radio field operations, due to its remote location, high altitude and amenities, and BMARC is very grateful to the current licensees for their community focus, generosity and support in continuing to provide the club with access to this wonderful resource.

Since the current licensees took over the operation of YKAT, they have continued to make significant improvements to the site and amenities, such as improved toilet and shower facilities, water tanks, online weather station, security cameras, etc.

In addition to the above, the following important points, relating to YKAT's continued operation, should also be considered:

- YKAT has operated as a commercial airfield continuously since it opened in 1968 (ie 51 years). Although it is currently closed to fixed wing aircraft (except in emergencies), due to the eroded runways, it continues to be used by helicopters.
- YKAT plays a vital role for emergency service and defence aircraft, during events such as bushfires, and it is not only in the interests of aviation that it remains open, but it is also in the public interest.
- YKAT is an important ``safety ramp", in a geographically isolated area, for general aviation and has twice been used as such during the past 18 months. It is the only viable and safe landing area on the Blue Mountains between Bathurst and Sydney for all General Aviation aircraft, when traversing inhospitable terrain.
- The licensees' new enforceable YKAT Fly Neighbourly policy features appropriate flight paths away from residential areas, operating hours and general use of the airfield, with noise abatement procedures.
- The licensees plan to restore, protect and enhance the site including sealing the main RWY 06/24.

The plans that the licensees have proposed for YKAT can only be applauded, as developing a tourist facility, emergency response hub and providing access for community groups, will benefit the residents of the Blue Mountains for many years to come.

As a local resident, the proposal to lease the Katoomba Airfield for commercial purposes is alarming and I am strongly opposed to it. As the airfield is surrounded by National Park, it ideally belongs under National Park control, for emergency use only. Allowing a commercial operator will benefit only a few and comes with significant downsides to the local community, other visitors who come to enjoy the peace and beauty of the mountains and the environment.

I am particularly concerned about any noise impacts from a commercial operation. The local environment is generally one of very low noise levels which means that ANY low flying aircraft has a huge impact on the area. We have already noticed an increase in such aircraft which affects our quality of life. Flights over and around residential areas are also visually intrusive and impact on privacy.

Approximately 25,000 people that live in the villages surrounding the airfield will be negatively affected. The proposed flight paths appear as though they will also impact residents in the lower mountains.

So, to illustrate how bad helicopter noise would be if this airfield were to be commercialised (and the western background noise levels night & day (the loudest sounds having come from birds, which aren't actually counted as 'noise', which is irritating by definition). Then I've included some examples of measurements from aircraft passing overhead. As you cash see, helicopters are a nightmare! Deafeningly loud, hurting

your ears and drowning out every other sound! A Mac truck could drive by and you wouldn't hear it over this racket! It is absolutely absurd to consider helicopter joy flights as anywhere NEAR appropriate for a location such as the Blue Mountains! Dear Department of Industry,

I write to ask you to please take urgent action against the proposals for the Katoomba Airfield for commercial purposes, specifically, the proposed plane and helicopter joy flights over the Blue Mountains National Park.

Peace. Quiet. Nature.

These three things are very highly valued, and much sought-after by a great many people in this increasingly fast-paced, frenetic, noisy world.

They are the reasons I moved to which is filled with wildlife – Wallabies, Black Cockatoos, and countless other kinds of birdlife. It is at the top of the Kanimbla escarpment and valley, part of which is the Megalong Valley – a space which is within the World Heritage-listed (protected) National Park, and which could be directly affected by these flights.

Immersion in this natural environment – as I work, in my home, and during my research time in the bush - makes me feel connected to nature and all its subtleties, many of which only reveal themselves after long periods of time sitting quietly, undisturbed, within this environment. The sounds of the birds, the wind, the waterfalls, the trees, the smell of earth and eucalyptus, the positive, restorative effects of this 'natural quiet' on my mental health and wellbeing. I feel inspired, balanced, calm, rested, energised, and part of the natural world – qualities that I, as an artist – a painter who works with the landscape – inextricably embed in my artwork.

I am a sensitive person – sensitive to sound and activity - and deeply affected by my surroundings. If I am in peaceful, nurturing spaces, I am peaceful and feel nurtured. If I am in a place where I have chosen to live to access these things, that *should bethis* way, but is not, because some external, disruptive force is imposing itself upon this place, I feel agitated, disturbed, upset, anxious, and ultimately unable to find a sense of peace to make my work. This directly affects my income and mental health, which then affects my ability to work. It is a vicious downward spiral.

For me, and my work, and that of many people who live here, there is a direct correlation between ecology, mental health, and economy, and as described above, this proposal threatens to disrupt these three things to the extent that I will not be able to work. With the proposed plane and helicopter noise, and the emissions resulting from these, I will not be able to immerse myself in the landscape, internalise it, and have it emerge in my work. I will not be able to access the state of mind I require to work and live peacefully, with good mental health.

I am just one of many creatives who live here for similar reasons, the Blue Mountains has almost double the national average of creative people living here, and the reason for this is the quiet, the natural sounds and atmosphere, and the direct, undisturbed contact with nature that this environment affords.


The proposed plans for aviation tourism and helicopter joyflights are wholly at odds with the natural state of this place. Whatever brief, enjoyable experiences people may have by taking these flights, and whatever profit the business(es) may make through this, will not mitigate the damage and devastation they will cause – to the natural environment (flora and fauna), local businesses and livelihoods, the people who come to work, play, rest and recover here, and it's residents' quality of life and mental health. It is us who will have to live with the fallout of this activity – day in, day out. There will be no increase in profitability for local businesses, as these visitors will fly in and fly out without spending locally. In fact, many local businesses will suffer a loss of income, as with the increased noise, there will be less people wanting to stay and take refuge here - from the city and their busy lives - if there are helicopters and planes overhead.

On the point of mental health, many people come here, and have done for over a hundred years, to live or to visit, and restore their mental health following trauma. A key factor in them being able to recover is access to quiet, undisturbed

nature, and to be able to walk peacefully in the bush, connecting and communing with the plant and animal life. This will be increasingly impossible under these new plans, and will remove access to a potentially life-saving resource. The airstrip currently supports life-and-environment-saving emergency services - fire and air ambulance, which is as it should be and to which I have no objection.

In addition to the above and the fact that this is a World Heritage-listed area that should not be tampered with, it is Gundungurra and Darug land, it should not be disrespected so much as to become a tourist mecca with the skies full of planes and helicopters dumping emissions onto the people, land, animals, waterways and plants below.

I implore you to consider the significant negative impact of this proposal on the environment, businesses, and the people who live, work and visit here.

There is no way of controlling flights paths and the frequency of flights, as the ability to regulate them is minimal. The height restrictions are (500 feet) 150m above wilderness, and (1000 feet) 300m over houses.

There has been no study of the environmental impact on birds, animals, or humans, especially with regard to noise impact. No details have been released concerning the tender process, and the deeply-flawed public consultation process answered few questions. Once granted, the lease will secure the operator's tenure of the airfield for 50 years, opening the way for further commercial development, or even on-sale to another operator or developer.

Clearly, this lease to a commercial operator, FlyBlue Management Pty Ltd, should NOT be issued!!!!

I live in Leura and have done so since retiring in 2017. I moved here because of the quiet and beauty of this area and the lifestyle it offers. Leura and Katoomba are currently under the flight path of Sydney airport and we get jet aircraft flying overhead throughout the day although the noise in not great and hardly noticeable due to their height. From time to time we get helicopters flying towards Katoomba Airfield and although they are on the north side of the highway and less than one kilometer away from where I live, the noise level generated by helicopters when they fly the same flight path is significantly greater than that from the jet aircraft flying overhead; in fact local flights are clearly heard inside my house which is constructed from brick veneer.

With respect to the proposed modification of the Katoomba Airfield, I am concerned that no noise study has been conducted into this proposal which should be a mandatory exercise due to the impact aircraft, and particularly helicopter flights, would have into the amenity of resident, who pay some of the highest rates in NSW, and zero impact eco tourism businesses operating in the area. We came her to enjoy quiet in our retirement not to listen to helicopters flying in, out and around the tourist attractions of Katoomba. This is a World Heritage area and Australian National Park. It is not a fun park. Local residents do not want the airfield modified to attract what would be wealthy tourists able to afford the cost of flying into the area for a few minutes viewing the scenery before flying out again. There is also a proposal for 'joy flights' which common sense tells you that this would have a detrimental effect on locals and visitors alike. Who really wants to look at scenery while a helicopter or helicopters fly around overhead?

- 1. The airfield is surrounded by the World Heritage Blue Mountains National Park. Of note the airstrip is located close to major access points for the park including Evans Lookout, Govett's Leap, Pulpit Rock, ANvil Rock and Perrys Lookdown and the Grose Valley. The area is also unique in that the Grose Valley and is untouched right down to Grose Gorge near to the junction with the Nepean River. This is in contrast to the valleys on the other side of the ridge.
- 2. Commercial use will inevitably lead to increased plane and helicopter use for joy flights that will impact the surrounding area.
- 3. There is no need for a commercial airstrip in this area. Joy flights could be operated from strips located within the Sydney Basin. There is no demand for commercial use other than joy flights. I believe the airstrip has not been used for over 10 years.

The Blue Mountains is famous for its natural environment and the outdoor experiences that it offers both visitors and locals. An estimated 1.25 million people undertake bushwalks in the Blue Mountains each year.

Landing tourist helicopters and fixed winged aircraft within World Heritage-listed national park could jeopardise the Blue Mountains experience by:

- 1. Impacting the reputation of the Blue Mountains as a quiet and peaceful escape
- 2. Increasing noise and reducing amenity for hikers, climbers and canyoners
- 3. Concentrating tourist dollars in fewer hands. Tourists that arrive or depart by helicopter are much more likely to be dependent on a few operators for transport and accommodation
- 4. A decrease in reputation or 'wilderness experience' will logically result in fewer visits, meaning less spent at local cafes, pubs, shops and retail outlets or spent on supporting local culture and events.

Katoomba Airfield is completely surrounded by the Greater Blue Mountains World Heritage Area. Within 5km of the airfield there are over 3000 native species, including those listed as endangered.

- The Blue Mountains World Heritage Area is up for review later this year. It's status may be effected (and threatened further in combination with proposed changes to Warragamba Dam)
- 2. Damage to rare hanging swamp habitat caused by runoff and erosion from increased traffic on the unsealed section of Grand Canyon Road and the tarmacing of the runway
- 3. The potential impact of Helicopters on Blue Mountains Wildlife and other World Heritage Values

# Lifestyle and amenity

The liveability of upper Blue Mountains towns and villages is likely to be impacted by:

- 1. An increase in helicopters and associated noise—we already have issues with scenic flights over the area conducted by other operators. However, those helicopters do not land in or take off from within the World Heritage Area.
- 2. Helicopter noise can travel long distances in an acoustically-sensitive environment dominated by cliffs and canyons, potentially affecting parts of North Katoomba, Medlow Bath and Blackheath and other areas in earshot of the flight paths.
- 3. Any Fly Neighbourly Policy is self-regulated. The policy does not, at the admission of the lease applicant, include aircraft that do not originate from Katoomba Airfield, so that would include many arrivals.
- 4. Increased traffic along the route to the airfield (including fuel tankers and airport runway building equipment) on a narrow local road and walking path. The road is not designed for large vehicles (Station Street, Rutland Road and Grand Canyon Road). View <u>Route to YKAT (PDF)</u>, supplied by a local resident.

- 2. How can anyone properly engage in community consultation when we don't know the scale of the proposed helicopter tourism operation? The state government has steadfastly refused to release the numbers of flights and their frequency to the general public.
- 3. Flight paths have only been displayed at "drop-in" sessions at Hotel Blue, but do not include intended pathways beyond the immediate vicinity of the airfield. The proposed "hub and spoke" model means flights will head to the Central West. Do we know these flight paths? We do not. This model may also bring in other operators further increasing activity.
- 4. Why was the community not consulted by the state government about what kind of use was appropriate for such a sensitive site before they released a tender for a licence by direct negotiation (see <a href="Expression of Interest">Expression of Interest</a>), and awarded it to a high-impact helicopter tourism business, when community groups had also applied?
- 5. Why has public land, used by the Rural Fire Service during fire fighting operations, been licensed to a private operator to manage primarily for profit rather than for the benefit of the community?

I wish to express my opposition to the proposed lease of Crown Land at Medlow Bath occupied by Katoomba Airfield. I feel that the granting of a 50 year lease for the operation and development of an airfield within a World Heritage National Park, is not in the best interests of our community.

I object to the granting of the lease for the following reasons.

- 1. I am a bushwalker and currently the President of a local bushwalking club with 250 members. We walk in the area below the flight paths that will be used by helicopters and other aircraft. Our club, other bushwalkers and the many tourist who walk in the area come to the Blue Mountains to enjoy the peace and tranquillity of the Grose and Jamison Valleys. I am also a Blackheath resident with my home near the Grand Canyon, located not far from the airport. The presence of helicopters and aircraft would destroy the wilderness experience, the reason that many visit the Blue Mountains. In addition to the excessive noise there is also the visual disruption of helicopters spoiling views from lookouts and other vantage points below the flight path.
- 2 The land is surrounded by NSW National Park. I feel that it should be managed by NSWPS and not be used by a private company for personal gain. The existing airfield should be kept for emergency use only, as it has been for many years.
- 3. Fly Blue's clients represent a small minority of the millions of visitors to the Blue Mountains every year. We previously wrote to you (<u>via email to Scott Mullen on 19.02.19</u>) concerning the proposed lease of Crown Land at Medlow Bath, occupied by Katoomba Airfield. Since then, you've begun the formal 'community engagement and consultation' process and we therefore now wish to submit a formal submission, anticipating that it will be considered during preparation of your report into feedback received.

- 1. This proposed lease is counter to the general push to incorporate into National Parks any leased or privately-owned land that becomes available when that land is surrounded by existing NPWS-managed land. Incorporation allows for more coherent land management in the public interest, and provides security against environmental degradation within acknowledged areas of State and National significance (In this case, of course, the land is within a World Heritage listed National Park). The desire to seek financial returns via rental agreements from commercial operators is only one small consideration, to be weighed against the incalculable value to future generations of appropriately extending, in perpetuity, our Blue Mountains National Park. Because of its special location and value, we believe this public land should remain under the management of a public institution, not leased to a private company to develop for their personal gain. We would like to see Lot 550 DP 751657, Grand Canyon Road, Medlow Bath gazetted as an extension of our Blue Mountains National Park.
- 2. We don't regard the existing airfield solely as an historical nuisance, since all of us in this community have benefitted from its use during emergencies, such as bush fires. We would hope that future use by RFS and other emergency services will continue and perhaps be enhanced by dedicating the existing facilities to these organisations for training and operational purposes. This is compatible with the land being within the National Park and having the surrounding bush managed by NPWS. This could improve the provision of vital fire-fighting facilities in the Blue Mountains, without the need to pave a runway, or have aircraft low-flying daily over pristine bush and nearby villages. We request that the existing airfield be kept for Emergency Use Only.

We strongly object to the proposed lease of Katoomba Airfield to a private operator. After reading <a href="https://www.industry.nsw.gov.au/lands/public/on-exhibition/proposed-lease-of-katoomba-airfield">https://www.industry.nsw.gov.au/lands/public/on-exhibition/proposed-lease-of-katoomba-airfield</a>, we emailed this address asking whether there is any more information, and in particular an operating and business plan for the proposed lessee, and was informed that there is not.

We have also checked the website of the proposed lessee <a href="www.flyblue.com.au">www.flyblue.com.au</a> and found nothing about the proposed number of daily flights (helicopter or fixed wing), times or flight paths or about the impacts of the proposed operations on the environment of the Blue Mountains National Part or World Heritage Area.

We could not find an Environmental Impact Statement. The land management initiatives promised by the proponents are peripheral to the proposal and offer no real benefits beyond how the land would be managed if integrated onto the National Park.

In short, the lack of information alone is sufficient grounds to invalidate the proposal and lead to its rejection.

However, we have a number of objections in principle beyond this.

- 1. The land is Crown Land, in the middle of a national park. This is a historical opportunity to integrate it into the national park so it can be managed as an emergency airstrip by the National Parks and Wildlife Service.
- 2. The proposed use would damage the local economy, which relies on the visitors who come to the Blue Mountains for peace and quiet whether they stay in accommodation or bushwalk in the wilderness. We have experienced low-flying helicopter noise during bushfires (when we realise the operations are entirely necessary and serving the public interest). Regular aircraft noise would completely change the character of Katoomba and the surrounding areas.
- 3. Apart from the noise and other pollution generated by flights originating at the airfield, it would increase light aircraft traffic across the Blue Mountains, further eroding the amenity and the World Heritage values which tourists come for.
- 4. In effect, the proposal would destroy public amenity and reduce the income of existing tourism operators for the profit of the proponents, without adequate compensation (notwithstanding whatever lease payment may be made).

To sum up, the proposal must be rejected and the site (which is already Crown land, so does not need to be purchased) integrated into the National Park.



We own a cottage at Medlow Bath. We live in Sydney and typically use the cottage for stays of a few days every two to three weeks.

We wish to oppose the proposed lease on the basis of reduced amenity of our property. We find it impossible to quantify the degree of reduction as we have been unable to obtain any detail of the applicant's business plan. However it is presumably based on an increased use of the airfield by aircraft, with a consequent increase in ambient noise and of vehicle traffic on Grand Canyon Road.

We support the retention of the airfield to a standard suitable for use in emergencies, particularly bushfires. However we strongly believe that we should, as a society, fund this important function ourselves. Using private industry to fund it in the manner proposed does not eliminate the cost, it just transfers it to the people who live in the immediate vicinity. It also sets up a situation where the lessee has a financial incentive to increase traffic and activities. What starts out as a minimalist model – sufficient activity and associated income to maintain the airfield – becomes a pursuit of financial profit. The State government, as the lessee, will have a conflict of interest going forward. If activity and profit increase then the rent it charges can potentially also rise. This will conflict with its responsibility to the local community.

In our opinion the airfield should be transferred to the department that manages the national park that it sits within. This department should receive adequate annual funds to maintain the airfield for emergency use. We are sure that the NSW community would support the funding of this essential activity. The Government should not presume that it would not and should not make such a decision on the community's behalf.

I am writing re the old airfield at Medlow Bath which is located on Crown Land and surrounded by World Heritagelisted National Park.

I understand that lease of this land for the use of commercial aviation including tourism helicopter flights is under consideration.

In my opinion this airfield should be

- considered part of the World Heritage National Park and for passive recreational use by residents and tourists alike.
- for use by airborne emergency services only (rescue and bushfire).
- the broader community of the upper Blue Mts be consulted re a suitable constructive use of this land.

The following comments are based on my experience

- of travelling to and living in Katoomba over several years when bushfires, lost and or injured bushwalkers/ visitors have necessitated access to safe landing fields for the emergency use of helicopters.
- living in Alexandria bordering Redfern between two flight paths, approx 5 km from Sydney airport and 500 metres from Channel 7's base for around 9 years.
- I have found helicopter noise 'menacing' and intrusive (consider visibility too from lower elevation) on my everyday life be it work or leisure but I accept it, regarding emergency or short burst media / news purposes.

Risks and possible negative / unintended consequences of the proposed lease,

- Aviation noise and loss of sightseers: A reduction of enjoyment and amenity for the majority of tourists / sightseers to major tourist lookout areas due to noise 'pollution' for the benefit of a very few who can afford a scenic flight. Helicopters in particular.
- Regulation: if a lease was granted and regulations are set as part of that who will monitor adherence to those regulations? For aviation around major city and regional airports this is a priority. How will this be implemented for a non-consequential commercial venture in a national park bound space? And who will pay for it.?
- Fire risk stored fuel on this airfield, sparks from any take offs or landings and potentially any accidents which at some point in time might occur.
- Negative Impact on wildlife in the immediate surrounds of the airfield re noise and 'wind' generated and noise impact, potential propeller kill of helicopters and again noise impact on local wildlife leading to changes in habitats.

Objections to the commercial development of Katoomba airfield surrounded by Blue Mountains National Park, NSW, AUSTRALIA

I am writing to you to voice my strong objection to the proposal to develop Katoomba Airfield for commercial purposes as it is surrounded by World Heritage National Park. To proceed with this development is counter to UN and UNESCO advice and threatens the future classification of a pristine wilderness environment. Below are further reasons why I object.

### The possible presence of helicopters

Sustainable tourism can operate in the Blue Mountains without the presence of helicopters. It will only benefit a few at the expense of visitors and residents who seek to enjoy the natural environment. Helicopters using the airfield adjacent to the National Park, Grose Valley and Grand Canyon will only create discord and spoil a World Heritage site.

#### **Noise factor**

The level of noise created by helicopters and light planes coming and going on a regular basis will change Medlow Bath, North Katoomba and Blackheath dramatically. The very reason people come to the Mountains is to seek peace and quiet in a natural environment. The activities and noise created by a busy airfield will shatter the peaceful place in which we live and others come to visit.

#### **Protection of World Heritage National Park**

I accommodate travellers from all parts of the globe. I am constantly told by visitors the Blue Mountains National Park is unique and of world standard. As an asset easily reached from Sydney it is well worth protecting. I would like to see the airstrip returned to the National Park and continue to be used as an emergency airfield, which is how it operates now. We keep hearing how successful tourism is in the Mountains so surely the money can be found to upkeep it from alternative means, for example having an affordable entry fee to the National Park.

#### From small weekend occupant to unknown scale of commercial contender

When I moved to the peaceful village of Medlow Bath the activities of the airfield did not cause problems. The new applicant seems to be getting the green light without clearly stating in their business plan how big the operation will be. All indications are the operation will be large scale, necessary to repay costs of sealing a tarmac. I see this as a loose, loose situation. Sydney and overseas visitors, along with residents will pay the price to keep a few people wealthy. All visitors will loose out by not actually experiencing the natural beauty and quiet the Park has to offer in its present state.

### Three year temporary lease granted without community consultation

I find it hard to believe a temporary lease was granted for 3 years without community consultation. This favours the Larsens enormously and the community unfairly. I would like to see a three year temporary lease given to the community and local groups in opposition, to find alternative ways to fund the upkeep of the airfield. I believe this can be done.

### Possible granting of lease to operate during daylight hours

What kind of an existence are we to look forward to with planes operating daily from dawn to dusk for a possible 50 years? Furthermore there are presently no effective controls for monitoring the number, and flying height, of small planes within the sky. And on top of this there may be helicopters doing joy rides. **My current business activities hosting tourists and running art workshops will be compromised.** Visitors will go further afield to avoid the location and house prices will drop.


### Length of lease is too long, particularly if the site is overdeveloped

I am writing to you in regards to the proposal of granting a long-term lease of crown land for private profit at the Katoomba Airfield. I find this proposal deeply distressing for multiple reasons which I will list below:

- Noise impact on people: From a personal standpoint, as a resident of Medlow Bath, with the airport located at the end of my road, I am deeply concerned about the level of noise pollution this private lease will have on the surrounding residents of this peaceful community. Already many residents near the train line endure the night (and day) long noise pollution of freight trains that literally shake our house as they travel through. The prospect of further noise pollution from helicopter day flights is hard to imagine and would most certainly make me re-evaluate living in the upper mountains. This noise pollution in addition to that caused by the proposed Badgery's Creek airport will surely destroy the Blue Mountains National Park's reputation as a tranquil sanctuary for rest and relaxation, not to mention, threaten its UNESCO World Heritage Listing which is up for review later in the year.
- **Noise impact on Environment:** There are more than 3000 native species within a 5km radius of the airport, including those listed as endangered. The park "protects an unusually wide range of plant and animal species and communities, as well as a large number of threatened, rare and restricted species." (BMNP Plan of Management). We also must consider the potential damage that could be caused to rare and very sensitive hanging swamp habitat from runoff and erosion from increased traffic on the unsealed section of Grand Canyon Road and the tarmacking of the runway.
- Beneficial to few, harmful to most: This commercial lease will see profits in the pockets of few, whilst deeply impacting the larger tourism industry, upon which this local economy is so reliant. Tourists that arrive or depart by helicopter are much more likely to be dependent on a few operators for transport and accommodation, rather than spreading the economic benefits to a greater number of local businesses. The Blue Mountains attracts approximately 1.25 million bushwalkers a year, drawn the peaceful surrounds, not to mention the many retreats such as The Vipassana Centre, Dhamma Bhumi, in Blackheath that provide a place for healing and inner peace for thousands of people a year. All of which will be disturbed if this commercial lease is granted, in the name of benefitting a select few.

- This piece of Crown Land was removed from National Park in the 1960s on the basis that it would be returned in 1988. However, this did not occur. The Department did not honour the commitment but instead proposed a commercial lease.
- Aboriginal Land Rights: The Blue Mountains is home to countless significant and sacred sites of the Darug and Gundungurra people who walked this land long before we set foot on it. I believe that Crown Lands should be managed consistently with, and in a way that facilitates and furthers the objects and purposes of the Aboriginal Lands Rights Act 1983 (NSW). It should be recognised that 'the Aboriginal Land Rights Act 1983 is beneficial and remedial legislation designed to address past dispossession of, and injustice to, Aboriginal people' [1].

The license granted to Fly Blue Pty Ltd should be terminated according to Licensing of Crown Land Guidelines that permit 'licenses be terminated when an Aboriginal Land Claim has been made over the land' [2]

I would also like to propose that the land be transferred to Deerubbin Local Aboriginal Land Council, Aboriginal Land Claim no. 49068 registered on 1 July, 2019 with the condition that the airfield is maintained by the Deerubbin Local Aboriginal Land Council and available for emergency use only.

Are we willing to threaten the health and well-being of the wildlife and quality of life of residents whilst ignoring Aboriginal Land Rights, all in the name of personal profit?

As a resident of valley I am writing to strongly oppose the possible commercial lease of Katoomba Airfield. These are my reasons for opposing this development;

1.) The flight paths that Flyblue has presented are physically impossible The winds at Katoomba airfield are predominantly southwesterly, which is why the main airstrip is oriented that way. Flyblue's inbound and outbound aeroplane flight paths approach the runway at a 45 degree angle. It is a physical impossibility to takeoff or land a fixed wing plane at this angle. A plane needs to approach and depart a runway in line with the runway, which is (in turn) oriented to the prevailing wind. This means that there is no way to avoid Mellow Bath being directly overflown, with a massive impact to residents. The flight paths drawn, which currently avoid overflying populated areas, bear no relation to the actual direction of takeoff and landing. Furthermore, they do not describe the climb and descent altitudes as takeoff and landings are in progress. Any attempt to bypass Mellow Bath will be impossible or highly dangerous.

## 2.) Flight paths go through paragliding airspace.

There is a long established and well used paragliding ramp at Mt Blackheath. Paragliding traffic is high all around the Hargraves and Mt Blackheath cliff line. Flyblue is proposing to fly helicopters through this airspace, which will either be highly dangerous, or shut down this area to paragliders.

# 3.) Airtraffic is a safety risk to climbers and horse riders.

Immediately adjacent to Mt Blackheath is Centennial Glen stables, a long standing horse riding establishment for tourists and locals. It is located in a natural amphitheatre surrounded by cliffs. The presence of helicopters reverberating off these cliffs not only compromises the peaceful enjoyment of riders but poses a very real risk of horses spooking and injuring riders.

The cliffs under Mellow Bath and along Shipley are also a mecca for rock climbers, with a plethora of established climbing areas in the immediate vicinity. The presence of fixed wing and helicopter traffic approaching and leaving an airstrip as close as 4km away not only interferes with the climber's peaceful enjoyment of their sport but interferes with their safety as it interferes with the ability of a climber and a belayer to hear each other's instructions.

#### 4.) Degradation of World Heritage Area

The noise pollution caused by the proposed airfield will affect the peaceful enjoyment of the bush along Blackheath, Mellow Bath, Grose Valley and Megalong Valley bush walks. The Blue Gum Forest (the genesis of the Blue Mountains National Park) will be directly overflown as will the Govett's Leap Lookout and the clifftop track, The Grand Canyon, Nellie's Glen, The Six Foot Track, and the historic walks around the iconic Hydro Majestic. The pleasure of the very few in the air will interfere with the peaceful enjoyment of the very many in the bush below.

5.) Property Devaluation and loss of amenity The residents of the Blue Mountains place great value on their peace and quiet. The residents of Mellow Bath, Blackheath and Katoomba deserve to continue enjoying the serenity of their surroundings. People who live between these towns and in the communities of Shipley, Megalong and Kanimbla are even more remote and give up the convenience of towns and cities for the peace and quiet of remote living. To have this shattered by regular aircraft noise defeats the purpose of living in these areas, devalues their dwellings, and imposes only costs with no benefit.

#### 6.) Nuisance to farming operations

Overflying low populated areas does not mean they are unpopulated. I own and operate a cattle property in the Kanimbla Valley, and my southern boundary is on the proposed flight path. I have recent experience with helicopters in the area, as Macquarie Council recently undertook aerial spraying of blackberries and serrated tussock

by helicopter both on my own farm and neighbouring ones. I experienced first hand the considerable noise generated by a helicopter in my area. The approach of the machine could be heard from a great distance even when it was several kilometres away and at a high altitude. My horses were unsettled and it stirred up the cattle, who were already stressed in drought conditions. Having helicopter joy flights come in to give tourists a look at what is happening on my farm would cost me my privacy, my (and my animals') peace and quiet, and my safety.

7.) All costs and no benefit to the local community In conclusion, the local community, the tourists and the environment stand to lose considerably if the airport is operated as a commercial lease. There is no benefit. They lose access to a quiet area they are currently enjoying to exercise dogs etc. Who wants a scout camp or a bush track next to a fenced runway with planes and helicopters constantly taking off or landing? Who benefits from Flyblue's remote carbon offsets? No-one in the community affected. The airfield currently operates as a base for operations in bushfire or emergency, so there is no additional benefit in this regard. There is only one party that is benefitting from this commercial lease, and that party is Flyblue.

As a resident of Blackheath I am writing to express my strong objection to the proposed commercialisation of Katoomba airfield.

The reasons for my objection are many.

My partner and I bought our house in Blackheath ten years ago in order to be able to enjoy peace and quiet after living under the third runway in in the inner west of Sydney for many years. We love listening to the birds and the wind in the trees...and the silence. Silence is a precious commodity these days and one not to be given away lightly. Every visitor we have to Blackheath we take to Anvil Rock. We sit quietly and gaze at the wonder and beauty of a world heritage national park. Every visitor says 'this is so beautiful, so quiet, so peaceful, you are so lucky'. When my partner was diagnosed with ovarian cancer four years ago, the peace, the quiet, the birdsong, became even more important. It is healing, it is soothing, it is life affirming. It gives us joy. We do not want to lose it. And we are not alone in this.

Overwhelming when we collecting names for the petition against this proposal, people agreed with us. What we have is special, they said. It cannot be given up lightly, they said. And certainly not so that a small handful of people can make money from it. This is not a good enough reason.

It makes no economic sense either. Tourists come to the Blue Mountains because of what it currently offers. We know this- they tell us. If we take away the reason they come they will no longer come. Why would they? They will go somewhere else. Having a picnic on Anvil Rock with a helicopter buzzing overhead is not the same. It just isn't. The mountains relies a great deal on tourists coming here and contributing to the economy. They buy local food, wine and art. They stay in local cabins and cottages. They go home and they spread the word. Instagram is full of amazing photos of people enjoying the peace and beauty of our mountains. If it noisy and there is no quietness, they won't come. We will lose that income.

The impact on the environment will also be huge. Birdlife will diminish.

It is fantastic to live here and to visit here now and if this proposal goes ahead it will no longer be fantastic. It, like the birdlife, will be diminished forever.

Fly blue have said they will 'fly neighbourly'. This reminds me of politicians who promise the world then, when voted in, say they can no longer fulfil those promises. Once the lease is signed, that's it! Out of our hands.

I am asking that the airfield is transferred into the hands of the national park and that it can be maintained as a working strip for emergencies only.

I strongly object to the commercialisation of the Katoomba airfield.

My words are simple. I attended the small group meeting on day one of the public engagement process. I did not expect much and got what I expected. Fair enough it is a tough gig. This however is not an excuse for a serious lack of information. These sessions were funded by my taxpayer dollars as will be all forthcoming activities related to the proposed lease application.

I hope this forum of communication yields a more prolific outcome than the small group meetings.

I have three key areas that I am most concerned about, the rest are by-products of the three.

- 1. Economic Impact
- 2. Environmental Impact
- 3. Residential Impact

## **Economic Impact**

The Blue Mountains is a microeconomic entity intertwined and inseparable with tourism. The bulk of this economy is dependent on tourism; day trippers and weekenders, largely Sydney siders looking for a day out or a weekend escape somewhere quiet.

Destination NSW (one of the other departments in your cluster) publishes a report annually detailing the monetary gain of this tourism. The link to this report is <a href="https://www.destinationnsw.com.au/wp-content/uploads/2019/04/travel-to-blue-mountains-snapshot-dec-2018.pdf">https://www.destinationnsw.com.au/wp-content/uploads/2019/04/travel-to-blue-mountains-snapshot-dec-2018.pdf</a>

I trust you have read the report and so will simply highlight that even as little as a 10% reduction (i.e.: 500,000 tourists per annum) in this traffic will push many small businesses out of business thereby reducing employment and cause economic disaster for the region.

I question why the Department is spending taxpayer dollars on a business case that has not been substantiated to the community prior to community engagement.

Additionally, no independent economic impact study has been undertaken by the department, yet you continue to push for a new lease irrespective of the disaster it would create economically.

Process is not an excuse for incompetence.

# **Environmental Impact**

This is simply another example of wasting my taxpayer dollars on engaging the community about a plan that has no limits and no consideration or understanding of the impact to the environment.

# Why on earth would anyone consider putting a commercial airfield in the middle of a national park let alone a World Heritage Area?

I was surprised to see the flight paths publicly displayed at the drop-in venue for two reasons. First, the worst impact is not where the aircraft fly to, it is where they take off and land from. Helicopters have the highest rate of emissions when taking off and hovering, the impact of this occurring within the National Park (also a World Heritage Area) is a high risk. Second the flight paths go over prime scenic aerial views and local water supplies.

The area within a 5km radius is home to many endangered species, a simple perusal of the EPBC Act of 1999 (<a href="https://www.environment.gov.au/epbc/about">https://www.environment.gov.au/epbc/about</a>) will expand on this point. This partnered with being a National Park

and World Heritage Area ticks the three necessary boxes of why this is an environmentally unsound idea. Additional legislation that defines acceptable impact of adjoining lands on National parks include:

A simple read of the above or discussion with the relevant department will expose the short comings of not just a process that considers a lease application prior to clearly understanding the environmental implications but also that the lease applicants need to make money to support growth and investment at the cost of the surrounding environment.

Why has an independent environmental impact analysis not been commissioned, evaluated and presented to the community for comment as a part of the community engagement process.

The process is flawed, and the Department is privy to the business case and claim commercial in confidence when questioned regarding its content.

I would also like to speak to the marketing spin of the lease applicant's website which is riddled with greenwashing as well as whitewashing. None of which state anything conclusive and in the end are unsettling as to what the real plans are.

#### **Local Issues**

Medlow Bath is at the heart of the local issues that will need solving. It is not enough for the Department to say that if a lease is granted the next step will be for local government to approve a DA or compliance to local noise and industrial business.

Grand Canyon Rd is narrow impassable in many places by two vehicles. It has a plethora of wildlife crossing the road and already the current traffic related to the airfield do not abide by the speed limit even when transporting aviation fuel. They do not even give way to the plethora of walkers, runners and cyclists who use this road. The Licensees are one of the worst offenders for speeding down this road with zero concern for locals using the road.

It is a misnomer that the airfield is essential for emergency services. In fact, it is only one of several helicopter staging areas and is the most likely one to be cut off due to the remoteness of its location. It is wrong that your lease applicant is scare mongering the community into submission of their business case on the premise that their solution is the only solution to protect the community were a bushfire to come through. This is a complete fabrication and should cease!

There is also the issue of the flight circuit, a 3 nautical mile (5.5km) radius around the airfield wherein an aircraft can fly at any height and any direction irrespective of a fly neighbourly or ERSA instructions. This flight circuit encompasses at least 10km of the Grose wilderness and the villages of Medlow Bath, Blackheath, Katoomba and Wentworth Falls.

Whatever the lease applicants say they will do, they have already shown that their words are not to be believed. On February 3<sup>rd</sup> 12 flights came and went and they promised all flights would come in from the Grose and not over any homes or villages. I have photos of four of those helicopters that did not do this and instead went almost directly over my home and across Blackheath at approximately 100 ft. I am in that flight circuit and according to CASA they can do whatever they want, which is what they did.

There is also something called creep. For the location to be viable there will need to be thousands of helicopters taking off and landing each year. There will be multiple businesses and operators operating from the airfield (being a hub and spoke model). With this location being so close to the Three Sisters despite the unreliable word of the lease

applicants any of these operators can and will likely do as they wish and there will nothing anybody can do. The bottom line is that Crown Land will be out of their depth trying to manage a full-scale commercial airfield.

#### Closing

No matter how I look at the issues I keep coming back to my tax payer dollar paying to fix a problem best solved by just allowing the land to be incorporated back into the national park as should have occurred since 1988 and requested by Blue Mountains City Council on two occasions since.

The cost to incorporate the land into the national park partnered with minimal maintenance for emergency services would be far less than the extensive environmental and economic impact analysis required to progress. Additionally, the cost to develop the surrounding community to support the increased road traffic and heavy-duty trucks carrying aviation fuel and passengers all would come at the cost of reduced house values. No thank you. This is Crown land, the peoples land I should not have to suffer for its existence.

I would like to add my voice to those of stake-holders and residents of the Blue Mountains who seek to prevent an increase in helicopter and recreational air-flight activity in the city within a National Park. I say NO to the proposed commercial lease and YES to incorporating the airfield into the national park for use in emergencies.

I agree with the position taken by Katoomba Airfield Community Group that to say No to the proposals by the Lease Applicant, is to "help protect our town, tourist economy, wild valleys and escarpments from helicopter noise."

As a resident of Katoomba, I am in a position to offer comment from my personal experience of helicopters flying overhead. During the past two to three years I have been aware of a significant increase in helicopter flights above my home, in a suburban setting. My experience has been that helicopters arrive with great noise and without warning. They move fairly slowly, engulfing us in noise for a prolonged time. They may circle, hover and quite often return to complete a second sweep of the area. I don't know who operates these flights. I have considered that they may be related to fire-risk. However, the vehicles are unmarked.

They seem simply to intrude, flying so low as to render every feature of the vehicles clearly visible. I am mindful that I and my environment must also be clearly visible to the occupants of these helicopters - in that spirit, I experience a significant intrusion on my privacy.

Recently, I participated in a ten-day Meditation retreat at Dhamma Bhumi (Blackheath). Twice a helicopter flew overhead. I was inside a building on both occasions. The penetration of motor noise gave me to understand that the flight was not high in the sky and far away; rather it seemed to be quite close, a little distance above tree tops.

Regarding the proposed height restrictions - 300 meters over houses and an even lesser level of protection of only 150 meters over wilderness - I would like to offer the comment that "wilderness" is not empty or vacant space, but the habitat or home of living creatures whose hearing and environmental sensitivity is greater than those of human beings. I would also like to stress the caution that it may prove impossible to control flight paths and frequency of flights because ability of government to regulate practice is likely to prove to be minimal.

Approval of helicopter flights seems to be a thin wedge. The FAQ sheet published by NSW Government clearly states that if recreational flight activity, is approved, FlyBlue will apply for expansion and diversification of activity: "Subject to all necessary approvals, FlyBlue proposes to seal one of the two existing runways, to allow recreational, fixedwing aircraft to use the airfield". I wish FlyBlue well, however, its proposal seems detrimental to the "wilderness" nature of the Blue Mountains.

I would like to see Katoomba airfield integrated into the National Park and flights restricted to those that respond to emergency.

# Objection to Proposed Lease for Katoomba Airfield Ref # 602686

I am writing to express my concerns about the proposed lease of Katoomba Airfield to a private entity.

Apart from the issues that have been widely expressed by others (limited community consultation, use of public land for a commercial lease, impact on a World Heritage area etc etc), I wish to also make the following points:

#### 1) Any limitations on flights will be ignored. A precedent has already been set.

To allay concerns about intrusive flight numbers and flight paths, limits will apparently be imposed. Due to a precedent, it is extremely unlikely that this will be adhered to.

When the Wolgan Valley Resort was opened, it was given permission to run four helicopter landings per week. Over a two year period, they repeatedly breached this, running up to SEVENTEEN weekly flights. When they were discovered to be blatantly ignoring this and other environmental conditions, they promptly applied for a variation on the number of allowable flights. Therefore, it is almost certain that this will happen with this airfield.

It should be noted that agreeing to strict conditions and then breaching them and applying for a variation appears to be the standard business model for many new ventures in the Blue Mountains. Examples are the Wolgan Valley Resort in Newnes, the Fairmont Resort in Leura, Centennial Coal in Lithgow etc. See the links below for details.

# 2) It will NOT be beneficial to tourism

One of the justifications is the benefit to tourism. The only tourists benefitting will be the handful of tourists who will be looking at (but not truly experiencing) the World Heritage Listed Blue Mountains. The tens of thousands who visit to experience the Blue Mountains either through bushwalking or by visiting the lookouts will have their experience degraded (both visually and audibly).. Therefore the net effect on tourism will be negative.

# 3) The Blue Mountains World Heritage Listing is under threat

The World Heritage listing is already under threat due to the proposal to raise the height of Warragamba Dam for flood mitigation purposes. Add to this, the impact of 24/7 flights over the area when Badgerys Creek airport is complete and the increasing construction of medium density housing in the Blue Mountains and it appears that the Blue Mountains are seen by many as purely a money making concern and not as a refuge for and protection of native flora and fauna. This death by a thousand cuts has to be stopped.

I urge you to refuse the application for a private lease and to retain the airstrip for emergency operations only.


I would like to give a submission to the consideration of the future use of the crown land where the Katoomba Airfield at Medlow Bath is situated.

My concerns are as follows;

Commonwealth is not a term often used these days perhaps due to the cultural shift favouring individual gain. This proposal would appear to favour the profit motive over the shared heritage of the Blue Mountains Wilderness area. Joy flights are incompatible with wilderness areas at any time due to the noise generated and the facilities required for operation.

This submission is to register my objection to the granting of a commercial lease for Katoomba Airfield.

The airfield site is a public land inholding in the Blue Mountains National Park - part of the Greater Blue Mountains World Heritage Area (GBMWHA) - close to the Grose Valley and the iconic Grand Canyon walk at Blackheath.

The leaseholder is going to be running a scenic helicopter (ie joy rides) business. A business must make money to survive so it is highly likely that the operators will conduct as many flights as they can each day. Helicopter flights currently in the Blue Mountains region can be quite loud but one accepts it as such flights are few and far between. The focus of a money-making business will be to provide flights as often as possible. Looking after the environment and local wildlife will be a distant second.

The noise from take-off and landing will certainly disturb the serenity of bushwalkers, particularly in the Grose Valley region, as well as residents, especially those in the area to the north of the airfield between Blackheath and Wentworth Falls.

In regard to noise, the current licence holders have stated a Fly Neighbourly Agreement. As there is no regulatory authority to monitor or enforce such an agreement, it becomes, in effect, a self-regulating agreement which is hardly ideal and is open to however the leaseholders wish to define it.

A ecological study of the site undertaken earlier this year included information relating to the effect of noise on bird life:

Helicopters are particularly associated with lethal rotor downwash and brownouts: high velocity wind vortices are generated by helicopter blades when the machine is hovering above a runway or bushland. This generates smothering blankets of airborne dust particles, reduces habitat values and exposes vegetation and wildlife to lethal wind velocities. Tiny birds like the 11g Silvereye and the equally small Red-browed Finch would not survive this force and

First-hand accounts from participants in the autumn honeyeater migration counts indicate behavioural impacts that occur when birds encounter machines in the Blue Mountains. In 2018 helicopters involved in the site preparation for the Mt Solitary hazard reduction fire had an New Holland Honeyeater P9 Redbrowed Finches P10 5 immediate negative impact on some migrating flocks. Birds 'disappeared from the sky' and numbers counted dropped when the helicopters flew by. Flocks of birds rising from southern Mountains valleys have also been seen to turn back when trains or heavy highway traffic created noise, and visual and air current disturbance across their flight paths; whether these birds return to continue their preferred flight path is not known. During the June survey morning at the airfield a light aircraft circled the facility a number of times and the noise drowned out the bird song; when the aircraft left the bushland remained quite silent and bird activity had noticeably declined.

I believe the best outcome for the site would be to add it as part of the Blue Mountains National Park and for NSW Parks & Wildlife to manage it.

The airfield should, of course, be available for us in the case of an emergency such as medical, small aircraft mechanical issues and, of course, bushfire.

Any use of the airfield that is likely to have an impact on its World Heritage values would breach the (Commonwealth) Environmental Protection and Biodiversity Conservation Act.

It would require a full Environmental Impact study and the approval of the federal Minister for the Environment.

# No such study has been done, nor any such approval given.

The major impact would be noise, especially from helicopters and low-flying aircraft. This not only affects all those who wish to enjoy the park in all its grandeur and spectacular scenery, but also the wildlife. The park protects a large number of threatened, rare and restricted species.

It is my understanding that as of today over 12,000 people have signed a petition objecting to the airfield use and I would respectfully ask that you consider the matter carefully.

This submission is my written objection to the potential increase in aircraft flights over the Blue Mountains from the proposed use of Katoomba Airfield as a tourist "joy flight" operation. This is Crown Land and therefore owned by all Australian citizens. Usage should be limited to emergency situations only, for example air ambulance and bush fire management, not used for private commercial benefit.

I live in Winmalee in the lower Blue Mountains but I am not immune to the noise from a range of aircraft including helicopters. Operators fly over my home regularly day and night as they travel to and from Sydney to the Upper Blue Mountains and beyond. I can only imagine that a commercial airfield operating in Katoomba would be used as a pick up and drop off site and as a consequence ALL Blue Mountains residents and visitors would experience a massive increase in aircraft noise. Commercial interests would dictate an increase in the number of flights and those with money would see this as a way to avoid road transport which would ultimately mean more aircraft travelling over the Blue Mountains with all the associated noise.

Importantly, the environment and natural soundscape is fundamental to the Blue Mountains experience and has been a major factor for those who choose to live here. The noise created by helicopters as they hover over scenic spots and fly over homes is intrusive and no so-called measures to limit this would be effective. A helicopter makes so much noise that it can be heard long before it crosses over and long after it disappears.

Tourists are attracted to this World Heritage Listed Region because of this environment and increased aircraft noise would only deter people from coming here. Many Sydney people use the Blue Mountains as an escape from the noise and pollution in Sydney and come here for the outdoor activities. Why would anyone want to go bushwalking or linger outdoors with aircraft overhead intruding on their experience?

Importantly, our World Heritage listing is already at risk from Badgerys Creek airport and the proposed raising of the Waragamba Dam wall and the proposed Katoomba Airfield lease will be just another nail in the coffin. Our tourist industry has grown markedly since we achieved our World Heritage listing. I read recently that in Peru, aircraft flights are not allowed over Macchu Pichu as it is a World Heritage Listed site, albeit man made. Yet we in Australia, supposedly more environmentally aware, are expected to accept aircraft noise over this World Heritage Blue Mountains Region. Why is the Blue Mountains with its natural environment not being given the respect that it deserves?

Added to my concern regarding this whole public submission process is the lack of information on the number of flights and flight paths associated with the proposed lease. Also the length of the proposed lease which suggests a life time of noise pollution. I can only surmise that withholding this information from the public is an attempt to minimise opposition. This is not acceptable and no amount of spin on the "benefits" of this proposal or the "altruism" of the proposed lessors in offering access during emergencies makes up for the impact of this proposal on the day to day lives of those living and visiting the Blue Mountains. The future enjoyment which should be preserved for future generations is also at risk if this commercial lease is approved.

Therefore I am asking that this lease proposal be denied and Katoomba's Airfield be soley used for emergencies, not commercial interests.

I am making this submission in **support** of the proposed long term lease.

I live in Airfield and 2.5 kilometres from National Parks and Wildlife Service helicopter heliport.

My **support** is for the following reasons.

- **Rights of aviators.** I am a supporter of light aviation even though I do not own or operate light aircraft. I believe pilots and other small aviation operators have a reasonable right to fly aircraft across the Blue Mountains and have access to an appropriately managed airfield.
- **Private Lease verses Public Ownership.** I believe that the success of the Airfield is much more assured if Lessee operated rather than by a Government instrumentality. Government budgetary situations are such that its limited financial
  - resources should be services driven and it would be difficult to make an argument for NPWS or RFS for example to maintain and operate the Airfield. An example of an airfield going into private ownership is The Rylstone Airpark. This once neglected Council owned airstrip is now an established and well maintained facility with installation of a aircraft fuel facility and a number of privately owned aircraft hangers now in use. I refer to this as an example of success and in no way envisage that Katoomba Airfield would be used in the same way.
- Community Benefits. Upgrading of the Airfield and having it available to other services such as NSW Police, NSW Rural Fire Service and other emergency services creates a genuine asset which will be beneficial to the whole community. Climate change, increased population growth and development indicates the increased need for emergency services in the future.
- **Fly Blue Proposal.** The proposal that Fly Blue presents, as it currently stands, is a responsible plan for the Airfield that takes into account potential effects on local residents, recreational users, tourists and the environment.
- **Further approvals.** This proposal is for a long term lease which I support. If the lease is granted than I understand further approvals such as Development Applications need to be approved by Blue Mountains City Council, flightpaths settled, etc. This gives further opportunity for examination and refinement of the proposal.

- **Safety.** I recognise the airfield as an important asset for light aviation travelling between the Sydney basin and Western airfields, such as Bathurst, Mudgee or Rylstone. For safety reason a landing strip between the two regions is major safety resource.
- **Noise Issues.** My home location is regularly overflown, multiple times daily, by light aircraft with only sporadic helicopter activity. Pilots maintain the appropriate height above residential areas and this does not cause me irritation or concern. The occasional aircraft noise is a pleasure compared to the almost constant noise of the use of compression breaking devices used on truck travelling on the Great Western Highway through Blackheath.
- **No prolonged air activity.** The proposal by Fly Blue, involves aircraft landing and taking off and rules out, joy flights, pilot training and repeated circuits of the airfield.
- Adjacent Helicopter Activity. The National Parks and Wildlife Service maintains and uses a heliport behind its depot on Govetts Leap Road, Blackheath. This facility is within several hundred metres of the residential area. I am not aware of any complaints of noise from helicopter activity at this location.





We are writing to express our deep concern about the proposal to approve a long-term lease of Katoomba Airfield to commercial enterprise. We reside in Wentworth Falls and prior to moving here regularly stayed in a family owned holiday home in South Leura for over 35 years. We recall the 1980's when joy flights from the airstrip were permitted. The noise of those aircraft was disturbing to residents, wildlife and anyone enjoying the great outdoors. That was prior to the exponential rise of tourism from China, Korea, India and other countries due to cheaper travel.

# Please leave the airstrip under the protection of the National Park Service and keep the dirt strip for Emergency Services use only.

I list below our main points of opposition to the proposal and request that common sense and protection of the environment for future generations prevails over greed.

- 1. This airstrip is surrounded by World Heritage listed National Park. Allowing commercial flights in and out of the airstrip will have detrimental impact to the surrounding flora and fauna from noise and air pollution, not just from the aircraft but from the increased buses and cars entering the area ferrying tourists.
- 2. The noise impact has been assessed to impact everyone residing anywhere near their flight paths. They may fly up the Grose Valley, but the sound carries to all the residents nearby. In north Wentworth Falls we can hear planes and helicopters day and night that are flying along that valley and they are at much higher elevations than these aircraft will fly. People seek to live in the Blue Mountains by choice. It is a clean and quiet environment. Introducing extra air traffic in the local area will only be a step backwards and degrade what is a peaceful oasis still within reach of Sydney. We moved here permanently from Sydney to escape the endless sound of planes and traffic. If there are planes and even worse, helicopters buzzing over us we will have wasted our money.
- 3. Guarantees from the lessee that flights and aircraft will be restricted is nonsense. They will say whatever they have to in order to win the long-term lease and then who will police them? What guarantee will there be that in a few years they don't sell it on to an overseas consortium from Asia who will then fly day and night? These people are in business to make money, and if there is an increase in demand from tourists, they won't say no. The local environmental impact will be of no concern to them. It will be out of the government's hands and out of control. There is far too much risk in passing this land across to private enterprise.

I would like to make a submission regarding the proposed commercial lease of Katoomba airfield. I live at Medlow Bath and consider that commercial use of the airfiled is not appropriate for the following reasons:

- 1. The airfield is surrounded by the World Heritage Blue Mountains National Park. Of note the airstrip is located geographically close to major and popular access points for the park including Evans Lookout, Govett's Leap, Pulpit Rock, Anvil Rock, Perrys Lookdown and the Grose Valley. Any landings and take offs would certainly impact on the solitude and beauty currently experienced at these locations. The area is also unique in that the Grose Valley is untouched right down to Grose Gorge near to the junction with the Nepean River. This is in contrast to the valleys such as Jamison and Megalong on the other side of the ridge.
- 2. Commercial use will inevitably lead to increased plane and helicopter use for joy flights that will impact the surrounding area.
- 3. There is no need for a commercial airstrip in this area. Joy flights could be operated from strips located within the Sydney Basin e.g. Richmond, Bankstown and Camden. There is no demand for commercial use other than joy flights. I believe the airstrip has not been used for over 10 years.
- 4. The roads leading to the airstrip are not suitable for increased traffic associated with commercial operations. Railway Parade, Rutland Rd and Grand Canyon Rd are all narrow and unformed. They are not suitable for increased tourist traffic, fuel trucks or buses.
- 5. Current residents of Medlow Bath have chosen to live there because of its solitude and quietness. There are houses that will be directly impacted by the noise of planes taking off as well as helicopters landing and taking off. Residents are more than happy to put up with this noise for emergency reasons, but it is unfair to impact on their amenity so that wealthy tourists can fly, for example, from Katoomba to the Wolgan Valley.
- 6. Even if the current proposed lessees, Flloyd and Derek Larsen, have noble intentions regarding caring for the environment and reducing impact on local residents, I feel concerned that future lease holders may further develop the airstrip and further increase the impact on the Blue Mts National Park and surrounding townships.

I strongly suggest that the airstrip be taken over by NPWS and maintained for emergency use. NPWS would be best placed to determine the need for an airstrip versus a helicopter only facility.

I am writing to advise you, that as a resident and ratepayer of the City of the Blue Mountains, I welcome the proposed redevelopment of the Katoomba airstrip for commercial purposes.

I also advise that I object to being dictated to by small but vocal minority of residents (I doubt many of them <u>are</u> ratepayers) of regressive <u>luddites</u> that interfere in the economic advancement of the Blue Mountains LGA.

Of course, I am refering to the **Katoomba Airfield Community Group** (KACG) who have been lobbying for signatures to support a petition calling for a ban to the airfield redevelopment. On two non-consequetive occassions, I was asked to support the ban but when questioned about why there should be a ban, both members of the above group were unable to articulate any reason that made logical sense. Take a look at this group's website, the top three reasons for objecting to the airfield's redevelopment are:

- 1. We object to this public land being used for commercial purposes
- 2. This Crown land should be transferred to the National Park so that is is preserved forever
- 3. Keep a working dirt strip at the site for emergency use only

None on these bullet points are reasons for declining the re-development of the airfield. The first "reason" is ludicrous and is simply a statement of position, the second reason is illogical as the land the airfield is located on will always be there and has already been developed as it was a working airfield with regular light aircraft flights. The third "reason" will require regular maintenance to ensure it is fit for purpose for emergency use. The commercial redevelopment proposal can be designed to ensure that the airstrip is maintained and can be used for emergencies.

I will now outline my reasons for supporting the redevelopment of Katoomba airfield using headings usefully provided by the KACG.

### **Gain in Local Amenity**

A commercial redevelopment will increase the already high esteem that tourists have for the Blue Mountains LGA. Helicopter flights proposed by the redevelopment will be popular with tourists wishing to enjoy a truly unique experience of viewing a world heritage sight from the air. The proposal is not without precedent given that the Morrison Government approved a helipad with up to 30 flights a year on Lake Malbena in Tasmania, a world heritage sight in August 2018. The Federal Environment Minister's delegate determined that the proposal was unlikely to significantly impact a matter of national environmental importance and did not require federal assessment or approval, although this determination is disputed by the usual anti-development luddites. However, there are scenic tourist flights over Kakadu National Park (I've taken one), as well as Shark Bay and Monkey Mia. These initiatives have resulted in no loss of amenity to the local areas servicing tourists.

## **Economic Impacts**

The proposed redevelopment of the airfield will bring an economic gain for the upper Blue Mountains area. Tourist numbers to the Blue Mountains continues to grow year-on-year. Figures provided by Destimation NSW shows that the "Blue Mountains received over 1.1 million domestic overnight visitors "up by 9.2% on YE Dec 17. Visitors spent nearly 2.6 million nights in the region - up by 8.0% on YE Dec 17." In addition, "Eat out, dine at a restaurant or cafe" (61.8%) was the most popular activity undertaken by visitors to the region, followed by **bushwalking or rainforest walks (49.5%) and 'visit national parks or state parks' (46.6%).**" [my emphasis]. The primary purpose of visits to the Blue Mountains is for a 'holiday' according to Destination NSW and, speaking as an accomodation provider for said tourists, many of these are searching for unique experiences in this world heritage area. Helicopter rides of the area will be one such unique experience.

Further from Destination NSW, "Domestic overnight visitors spent \$406 million in the region - up by 6.9% on YE Dec 17. On average, they spent \$158 per night - down by 1.0% on YE Dec 17." This spend will likley increase with the commercial re-development of the airfield and will benefit the local economy immesely. There will also be opportunities for the Council to extract revenue from both the lesees and tourists to provide improved community services, and ease the financial pressure on overburdened ratepayers.

# **Environmental Impacts**

As usual with regressive luddites, these impacts are never articulated into logical arguments. On the KACG website is the usual un-scientific mumbo jumbo about climate change and CO2 (plant food) that no-one in that group has the qualifications to state.

Tourist flights, and other commercial aviation activity, has taken place at the airfield previously and over extended periods of time. There does not appear to have been any environmental degredation to the area, and KACG admits that no (reputable - meaning a study that determines findings acceptable to KACG) study into the impacts of helicopter noise has on the environment. In any case, the lease can be structure to limit the number and duration of flights to appease the environmentally sensitive souls that <code>inhibit</code> economic growth in the area. It should also be pointed out that in high season, the police resue helicopter makes several flights a day over the Jamison Valley looking for lost tourists and this activity does not seem to be objectionable from an environmental perspective. Furthermore, commercial flights from Sydney Airport regularly fly over the Blue Moutains heading westward so the area already has a significant aviation footprint that will not be significantly altered by the commercial redevelopment of the airfield.

I do have an <u>real</u> environmental concern regarding the redevelopment of the airfield and that relates to the storage of aviation fuel on site, its correct storage and risk mitigation factors needed in the event of a bush fire in the area. If the avaition fuel was to ignite then the resulting devation would be significant and an irreprable loss of world heritage is possible. The Department (and the lessee)would need to satisfy the community that the aviation activities on site have a robust risk management plan in place is adequate for the risks that exist and that the plan is approved by the Blue Mountains City Council emergency management team and the local area emergency crews.

<u>The Consultation Process</u> has been fine from my perspective. In fact, the KACG were kind enough to deliver leaflets that raised awareness of the proposal which motivated me to write this submission.

Dear Department of Crown Lands,

I wish to register my strong opposition to proposal ref No LX 602686.

As a Blackheath resident who hikes weekly on local trails near Katoomba airfield, I couldn't possibly be more opposed to the idea of regular helicopter and fixed wing flights in the upper Blue Mountains.

The natural beauty of the Blue Mountains canyon system, such as the Grose Valley, provides unique viewing for tourists and locals alike. The canyon system also has a unique effect on sound from passing air traffic. Occasional flights over the upper Blue Mountains are not uncommon, rescue helicopters and NPWS are often carrying out work in the Grose Valley. Helicopter noise reverberates in the Grose Valley and can actually be heard from my house, some 2kms distant. If one happens to be hiking in the Valley while the aircraft is overheard, the noise becomes an echoing feedback which dominates experience until the aircraft has passed.

The Fly Neighbourly policy offered by the submission is not enforceable and flight height and route can be bypassed by pilot decisions due to weather and safety. I've not been told of any reliable method this policy could be enforced. In any case, all flights on the proposed route would have significant noise impact within the Blackheath area, and Grose Valley in particular.

If this proposal was granted, it would be a disaster affecting the experience of thousands of visitors to local lookouts such as Govetts Leap, Evans Lookout, Pulpit Rock and Perry's Lookdown. Hikers on the many trails in the area and local residents would also be seriously impacted. The number of visitors to Blackheath has steadily increased over recent years and is orders of magnitude greater than the small number of tourists who can afford scenic flights.

I am convinced the Department would find it very challenging to describe a case where this proposal benefits the local community and tourists on the ground. The proposal appears to disproportionately benefit the commercial operator and a couple of local tour companies.

Additionally, I believe regular flights to and from Katoomba airfield may seriously jeopardise the existing Blue Mountains UNESCO World Heritage listing. The cumulative impact of losing World Heritage status would far outweigh any business proposition for commercial use of Katoomba airfield. Safety is another major concern for the Department as the airfield is bordered by high voltage power lines.

I sincerely ask the Department to reject the proposal and work with the NPWS to incorporate Katoomba airfield back into the Blue Mountains National Park, restricting air traffic to emergency use only.

- 1. The land was excluded from Blue Mountains National Park for a period of time and was then intended to be returned to the Park. It should not be available for lease, as it is public land and already has a greater value as bushland. This land should now be returned to NPWS to be managed as part of BMNP. I have no objection to the current gravel runway being maintained for use by emergency aircraft.
- 2. The proposed use of the land by the proponent is substantially unknown as to the types of aircraft and the frequency of flights. It is likely however that commercial reality will require frequent aircraft movements: this is unacceptable close to and over National Park as well as neighbouring townships. 

We have visited the Blue Mountains regularly to bushwalk and rock climb for over 25 years and have lived permanently here since 2014 in order to experience the peace and quiet all year round.

As residents of Blackheath we would like to lodge our fiercest **objection** to the proposed commercial lease of Katoomba Airfield. Our reasons for this objection are as follows:

- This airfield is in the middle of The Blue Mountains National Park. This is a world heritage listed area that millions of people come to enjoy every year. They do so for the peace and quiet that being surrounded by nature provides. People are able to experience the bush and listen to the birds in peace and quiet. Having helicopters and planes flying over these areas will seriously impact the enjoyment people have in coming to the park.
- The Blue Mountains is a world heritage area. All levels of government, as well as the people who live here, have a duty to protect world heritage areas for the reasons they are listed. One of these is for the wilderness values of the Blue Mountains. Allowing a commercial airfield within the park will seriously damage the very reasons it is listed.
- The proposal says that there will be no joy flights but scenic charters. This still suggests that flights will still be for sightseeing and therefore will produce noise over areas that people are walking in. In addition no where in the submission or the website of how many flights per day are proposed. It seems that this will be left to the proponents and therefore residents and visitors could be subjected to all day noise.
- In the submission it states that commercial flights will be allowed to use the airfield at commercial rates. This means helicopters and planes from anywhere could be landing within the Blue Mountains NP. There seems to be no restriction in the application on numbers of flights.
- Proposed flight paths say that they will miss residential areas but those proposed seem to fly
  over Shipley Plateau. There are hundreds of residents of Blackheath living in this area so we
  will be affected by low flying helicopters, and planes. Even if these aircraft fly adjacent to


I am writing to you in reference to the proposed commercialisation of the Katoomba Airfield and possible allowance of joy flights over the Blue Mountains

I object to the proposal to lease the Katoomba airfield to a commercial operator for the purposes of conducting joy flights - or tourist flyovers - in the Blue Mountains.

People choose to live in Blue Mountains for the quiet, the serenity, for a love of nature and wide open spaces. All of that is under threat from any increased aviation activity to and from Katoomba Airfield. I live near there - in Fifth Avenue - and I don't like the idea of vastly increased aircraft traffic in my local area.

Living in a gully, I well know the racket a helicopter makes flying over, such as the ones that check the power lines - the sound reverberates around the gully and is really loud and distracting. Am I supposed to put up with that several times a day?

As a keen bushwalker who often goes into remote areas - I don't like the thought of my enjoyment being shattered by helicopters clattering overhead, or through the valleys while I'm walking the ridges and cliff tops.

Helicopter/aircraft joy flights over the national park and world heritage areas is just a grotesque and perverse attack on not only what the national parks are set up to protect, but also our responsibility to protect and respect our World Heritage status. This government has already shown they are willing to destroy our World Heritage status with regard to the Great Barrier Reef (dredging the reef for the Adani mine) - now the Government is proposing to wreck the Blue Mountains National Park as well.

This proposal in my view detracts from the tourism allure of the Blue Mountains - as areas reserved for nature will now be subjected to the noise of aircraft traffic.

I have checked out Fly Blue's Info Pack - it is a smokescreen, an insult, there is no information about what is actually being proposed. The Govt has a business case for the lease, but has not seen fit to share that with the public. So how are we supposed to make an informed decision? We're forced to speculate about what this operation might be like.

The so-called community consultation process has been badly handled. This issue affects all residents of the Blue Mountains. If I hadn't been a member of a bushwalking group I probably would never have heard of it.

I wrote to Mark Maloney, the response I got stated 'no joy flights are being considered'. But that is exactly what is being considered. So the department misled me, and no doubt others that wrote in with concerns. So how many of them had their concerns allayed by the department, and will not follow up with a submission? And their letters will not form part of the 'consultation' process. I have been along to one of the drop-in sessions too, where lots of great comments were made - but these were not recorded and will not be part of the consultation process either. In my view, this is paying lip-service to the idea of community consultation.

In summary - the proposal has the potential to adversely affect my enjoyment of living in the Blue Mountains. It has the potential to disrupt the peace I feel both from where I live, and my primary recreation, which is bushwalking. It is completely inconsistent with the purpose of the National Park, World Heritage status and wilderness areas.

I implore you to reject the proposal and use the airfield for emergency aircraft only.

## To Whom it May Concern

My name is \_\_\_\_\_\_ - I am a private citizen who has lived in the Blue Mountains for the past 9 years. During this time, I have worked locally in the hospitality industry coming in contact with many visitors to the area and have had the privilege to appreciate the local environment by bush walking to many of the beautiful areas in the Mountains.

I am extremely concerned to learn of the proposed granting of a long term lease to a commercial leaseholder of Crown Land, i.e. Katoomba Airfield, which would allow aviation tourism, including the use of helicopters

I object strongly to the commercial leasing of public land which is surrounded by World Heritage area. In 2000 the then Department of Land and Water Conservation recommended that this land be joined back into the National Park and it has been expected by the local community that this would occur at some point.

The airfield is located only 5km from surrounding towns including Blackheath, Katoomba, Medlow Bath, Leura and North Wentworth Falls. The noise of helicopters would be most intrusive to these villages, particularly landing and taking off.

There has been a dramatic increase in visitors over the years, from international tourists to those coming by car, train or bus for the day, which also means greater management issues of traffic, waste, lookouts and tracks. This is now a matter of delicate balance between maintaining a thriving tourist economy, a residential environment which locals can still enjoy and appreciate and protection of the wilderness areas that make this a very special place.

This is a World Heritage Area declared so by the world body UNESCO and as such, protection should be the first priority, although there are proposals to change parts of this National Park by developers and government. There have been four information sessions (of 2 hours each) by your Department, but there has been no community consultation or feedback taken from concerned residents.

The purpose of any commercial undertaking is to develop to a point where a profitable return is made. Not only that, expansion of the business is desired to make more of a profit. We have all seen the result of governments outsourcing to private business without strict measures in place to protect the general population, e.g. freeways being constructed by companies placing a road toll which private citizens pay and the tolls increasing, even after roads are paid for and a reasonable profit returned.

Long term leaseholders may be in a position to expand use of Crown Land to further their own gains over a long period of time and, in such a critically balanced environment, this would be a disaster for all. CASA has set out the terms of the Fly Neighbourly Agreement, suggesting that local communities and commercial interests can work together. However, CASA has no authority to enforce any agreement which means that the onus to prove wrongdoing or accountability is on the community, making it harder to bring the leaseholder to comply with community needs.

CASA has also agreed that the noise factor of regular helicopter use in this delicate region is a serious one, affecting ALL wildlife and the pleasure that 1.25 million bush walks per year give to those coming to this area.

There is, therefore, only one solution to this proposal: No to commercial leasing of Katoomba Airfield which should be incorporated into the National Park - a World Heritage Area - and used for emergencies and community use.

With this letter, I wish to voice concern, and oppose, the proposal to lease crown land at Mellow Bath, known as 'Katoomba Airfield', for the purpose of recreational aviation.

I understand the Department of Industry is considering leasing the land to FlyBlue. I do not wish to see any commercial entreprise (FlyBlue or other) leasing the land with the purpose of undertaking leisure flights and helicopter rides, from the airfield and over the Shipley Plateau in Blackheath and beyond, or anywhere over the National Park.

Many of us residents have come here with the intent of living within a National Park, which in itself should be a guarantee of a certain amount of 'peace and quiet', in a green and well looked-after environment.

Here are the reasons for my disapproval:

1/ The applicant suggests that the flights and helicopter rides will be yet another draw card in attracting tourists to the Blue Mountains.

- Tourism has increased so much and so fast in the last 6 years, that the road
  infrastructure and the environment can barely cope with the increase in traffic and
  pollution as it is.
- Parking and road infrastructure in the upper Blue Mountains villages is at saturation,
  with locals deciding to stay indoors on weekends out of fear of the insane amount of
  traffic and related risks of collision. Tourism past the Blue Mountains (Lithgow and
  beyond) also has increased a huge amount in recent years, and the GWH being the
  thoroughfare, this is further congesting the roads from Wentworth Falls to the Victoria
  pass, and increasing accidents.
- The congestion on the Great Western Highway is of great concern in case of a major bushfire. It is not unusual to require 30 min or more to drive the 6km from Mount Victoria to Blackheath on any Sunday after lunchtime (unrelated to the current roadworks, purely the mass of vehicles clogging up the roads).
- Increased tourism from visitors coming for the day for a quick helicopter ride will NOT necessarily translate into dollars being spent in the local towns and the community (similar case to Scenic World Katoomba, where coaches from Sydney drop tourists off/pick them up at the gate).
- Noise pollution from the flights and rides would NOT benefit tourism, it would on the contrary reduce current tourism from visitors coming to the Blue Mountains to disconnect from noise and city-related pollution. The very reason so many tourists come to the Blue Mountains is to enjoy a quiet weekend in a National Park, not to stand at a lookout with helicopters and planes overhead.

2/ The applicant wants to make us believe that their activity is environmentally friendly and sustainable, and that they will enter 'a biodiversity agreement' by planting a few trees.

- The detriment caused to the environment by the very nature of their business far outweighs any amount of planting of trees they promise. No airfield operation is known to come near anything environmentally sustainable as the applicant would like us to believe.
- The Blue Mountains is a great getaway for outdoor lovers. Hikers and bushwalkers, paragliders, cyclists, rock climbers, canyoneers, birdwatchers and all-around nature lovers live or come here to enjoy the surrounds and practice their recreation and sports in a beautiful, quiet environment. As if the increase in drones flying around wasn't a matter of great annoyance already, you would now consider allowing helicopter rides from sunrise to sunset? This is not admissible. Anyone in their right mind knows that the noise pollution would be catastrophic for residents and fauna alike. The disturbance to both humans and animals (native and stock) would be beyond words.
- The sunrise to sunset operation hours requested by the applicant is a ludicrous concept. The noise pollution in general is unacceptable, let alone for so many hours of the days, and most likely on weekends when locals are supposed to rest from a work week. It has been shown that constant noise at that level is detrimental to mental health. The stress caused to humans and animals (think livestock in the Megalong Valley and on the plateau, native animals and pets) is difficult to measure but is undeniable.

I ask you to consider this pledge and give it thought -my words represent the feelings of many. Allowing helicopters and planes is denying the very identity of our surrounds.

Here is the Blue Mountains City Council description of our National Park:

'The Blue Mountains is a special place of ancient landscapes, towering golden hued stone escarpments, crashing waterfalls and magnificent eucalypts all set amongst inspiring panoramas, that will take your breath away. Visit the Blue Mountains - you won't be disappointed.'

PLEASE, DO NOT LEASE CROWN LAND 'KATOOMBA AIRFIELD' FOR RECREATIONAL AVIATION. IT IS YOUR DUTY OF CARE TO THE ENVIRONMENT, AND TO THE RESIDENTS.

I have read the parliamentary transcript of yesterday's petition presented by Blue Mountains state member, Trish Doyle, against Flyblue's generations long lease prosposal for Katoomba airfield.

I would like to point out to the member for Hawkesbury that the impacts of the airfield are far, far greater on the tourists and residents of the Blue Mountains than the Hawkesbury. There are very few Hawkesbury residents in the area effected by the proposed flightpaths of Flyblue over the Grose Valley in Blue Mountains National Park and World Heritage area. There are no villages or major tourist precincts in the Hawkesbury electorate on the north side of the valley of the Bell's Line of road.

By comparison the Blue Mountains villages of Woodford, Hazelbrook, Lawson, Bullaburra, Wentworth Falls, Leura, Katoomba, Medlow Bath, Blackheath and Mt. Victoria will all be effected either to the north, east, south and west. The major tourist precincts and sites of Evan's Lookout and Govett's Leap Lookout will be directly effected by helicopter and light but loud aircraft noise, as will the numerous lesser known walks and sites.

To imply to those members of parliament unfamiliar with the Blue Mountains National Park geography that the Hawkesbury electorate is equally or even much effected is very misleading, hence noone/anyone from that area turned up to parliament to address the petition, unlike the Blue Mountains residents.

Many light planes already fly through the upper Blue Mountains to and from Sydney along with westbound Sydney Aircraft. It's the Great Western Flightpath through the National Park already. No doubt it would suit a minority of people who are country (e.g. Dubbo, Bathurst, Cobar, Orange, Parkes )and city recreational pilots to see the park the lazy, noisy, easy way, wighout spending ,oney in the local economy but that wou,d nkt be repfesentative of the wishes of the majority of millions of visitors.

Superimposing Flyblue's proposed flightpaths over a topographic map of the Grose Valley lookouts and walks, including from the Mt. Hay rd., shows the obvious major impact of travelling helicopter noise over the majority of visitors who are quietly not disturbing anyone else, on the ground.

To approve Flyblue's proposal would change the atmosphere and ambience people love about the upper Blue Mountains experience irreparably, forever probably. It would be unlikely that if a 50 year lease was granted it wouldn't be renewed in future.

We could lose the high quality of our ecotourism experience on offer and never get it back. People would probably prefer cabins they could book on the site.

Fire risk always has to be a major consideration introducing high risk activities into the National Park. There are very few ways for 80,000 people to escape the upper mountains in a sudden bushfire emergency like the guickly dangerous recent fires of Winmalee.

Please consider our local tourism culture, the fact that this airfield is surrounded by bush and the majority of this major tourist destinations visitors activities when making your decision.

Then if an international tourist sitting in their suite at the Hydro Majestic viewing the panorama of the Megalong Valley is stunned as a helicopter flys by and a couple of passengers peer into their suite? Or finally the many tourists that stand at Echo Point each day ask why is a helicopter hovering over the Three Sisters and ruining their selfies?

As to the "Who" and "Why" it is irrelevant as there will always be tourist operators that will see the dollar value in exploiting pristine areas without seeing the consequences for the local populations and their amenity.

Which comes to my circumstance as a local resident living in direct line of the Airfield. Where I live myself and other residents accept helicopter flights to the Katoomba Hospital must occur as do various other Emergency Service flights over the region. But they are sporadic, and to give an example as to why there is opposition to this tourist venture, every few years the

oligopolistic power companies, without notifying residents, survey the power lines in each village and township, using helicopters.It lasts a couple of weeks

and suffice to say I can definitively advise crown lands that these surveys are very low and you can see the inhabitants of the helicopter, and the noise is pretty overwhelming too.

Hence in this brief submission it is obvious that any tourist flight business is exploiting a World Heritage area and effects all groups in the region with no benefit to the region. I am making a submission opposing the commercialization of Katoomba Airfield. by FlyBlue or any other private companies.

People come from all over Australia and the world to experience the peaceful and amazingly beautiful natural environment of the Blue Mountains. The bushwalking, sightseeing, rock climbing and canyoning are enjoyed in the Blue Mountains National Park and surrounding areas by millions of visitors and local residents every year. Much of the Blue Mountains National Park has been recognized as of such high value that it has been declared a World Heritage Area. The local economy of the upper Blue Mountains is tourism based in the form of accommodation, hospitality and outdoor recreation.

Helicopter and fixed wing Scenic Charter flights(thinly disguised joy flights) will destroy the tranquil atmosphere that is the Blue Mountains experience. Proposed flight paths over the Grose Valley close to the iconic Blue Gum forest and directly in view and earshot of the major lookouts in Blackheath i.e. Govetts Leap and Evans Lookout and will fly directly over the spectacular Pulpit Rock Lookout. This area is extremely popular with sightseers, bushwalkers(both day walkers and overnight hikers who camp in the Grose Valley). This flight path also passes close to the popular walk to Lockleys Pylon from Mount Hay road. The northern Grose Valley is popular with bushwalker's, canyoner's and rockclimber's who will also lose their wilderness atmosphere to noisy helicopter and fixed wing overflight. Departing flights according to the proposed flight paths will also carry ascending(therefore noisier aircraft) close to the Grand Canyon track on the South East edge of Blackheath. Grand Canyon track is probably the most popular half day walk in the entire Blue Mountains with hundreds of thousands of visits a year. This form of aerial tourism is totally incompatible with the outdoor experience sought by the vast majority of visitors to these areas. Many other outdoor recreation area's of the Blue Mountain's will be affected no doubt.

The proposed flight path to the south of Mount Blackheath is also very close to a popular paragliding and hangliding area at Mount Blackheath. Can pilots flying joy flights and being expected to take to entertain customer's take full care in areas where they are required to give way at all times to unpowered aircraft i.e. paraglider's and hanglider's?

Residents on the fringes of Blackheath, Medlow Bath and Katoomba will be very close or under these flight paths and their inevitable droning noise. Most people in these areas would say that their choice of dwelling is largely because of it's peaceful quiet environment. The upper Blue Mountains is at an altitude of 1000m or more and the flight altitude of 4500 feet AMSL(1371m) for fixed wing aircraft and 5000 feet AMSL(1524m) for helicopters would put these aircraft at an effective altitude of 371m or less for fixed wing and 524m or less for helicopters. This is a totally unacceptable imposition on the residents lifestyles and environment.

Why put local economy of the upper Blue Mountains based almost totally on tourism at dire risk for joy flight's to be available to a wealthy few? The Katoomba Airfield has been suggested in several government reports as a suitable and desirable inclusion in the Blue Mountains National Park. Emergency airfields are maintained by National Parks in other areas of NSW for firefighting and evacuation. This is the best outcome for the Katoomba Airfield for all concerned.

Please accept my email as my objection to any commercial use of Katoomba airfield.

I write this email with having lived in Katoomba during 1987 - 1989 when the commercial helicopter joy/scenic rides were available from Katoomba and or Medlow Bath/Blackheath Airstrip. I believe the location of the Airfield/strip is irrelevant to the impact the helicopter joy/scenic rides had in the Grose Valley or on Lockely's Pilon when experienced as a bush walker or as a sight see-er at Evans Look Out, or Govetts Leap Look Out. I experienced the impact on numerous occasions, regularly, during the period of commercial helicopter flights.

The impact involved the reverberating sound of extremely loud helicopter engine and propellers, from all directions as the helicopter hovered or traversed the valley, often level or below the cliff tops. The echoing of the engine and the propellers, off the walls of the cliffs, contributed to the reverberations. The sound was deafening. The sound waves could be felt while standing upon Lockely's Pilon.

This is a narrow valley, too narrow or a chopper not to sound intrusive. The initial sound of the chopper coming in to the valley was reminiscent of choppers from a war. Conversations with my nan stopped, we were unable to hear each other, and the period of time would take more than 3 - 5 minutes, and then, it would occur again, as the chopper returned. Usually there would be helicopters in the valley each hour, each one making a return trip, therefore a chopper would pass each half hour.

The interruption to either our walk or sight seeing was significant, turning a quite nature experience, into a shattering, jarring, loud, and extremely unpleasant while at times also physically uncomfortable on hearing and body, sound experience.

The experience of walking with, and taking to friends and relatives in the National Park was significantly diminished and tarnished by the presence of the helicopters. It was no longer peaceful, instead, it had become a 'fight' for a conversation before the next chopper flew by, or hovered close as it traversed the valley.

Flights would also pass in Jamison Valley, and with the valley being more open, the intrusion was less. However, the sight and sound of the passing helicopter flights still disturbed rather than complimented the tranquility of the National Park.

Please do not allow commercial use of Katoomba Airfield, to do so will significantly impact, in a detrimental and negative manner, the experience of wilderness in the Blue Mountains National Park.

I regard the Katoomba Airfield a public asset that should be maintained for non-profit and emergency use only.

#### I emphatically propose that:

- 1: The lease application of Derek and Floyd Larsen and Flyblue be rejected.
- 2: The airfield be transferred, as previously proposed, to be incorporated into the Blue Mountains National Park.
- 3: The airfield be maintained with Federal and or NSW funding such as under the Natural Disaster Resilience Program or Bush Fire Risk Mitigation and Resilience Funding Brigade Mitigation Support Programme.

I object to the commercialisation of the Katoomba Airfield as it would support significantly increased and effectively unlimited helicopter traffic over our community.

I believe the nature of a commercial operation is such that it would be economically incentivised to increase helicopter traffic. This would have detrimental impact on my Megalong Valley community in the following ways:

- \* Noise pollution would despoil the quiet rural environment that has attracted people to our valley for generations.
- \* Noise pollution would create safety concerns for community members such as horse riders, working with animals in our valley.
- \* Increased air traffic in our valley would undermine our natural privacy.
- \* Increased air traffic will undermine property values and the local economy by countering the very reasons that attract people to our valley to live or to visit either as tourists or for other activities such as horse riding.
- \* The noise and the low flying air traffic would put the wild life, including kangoroos and the huge and varied bird population under unbearable pressure and descimate the Valley's bird population.

The entire upper Mountains would be most detrimentally affected by the lease as the above negative impact would also apply to the whole district.

There are a lot of fragile old people living in the Upper Mountains as well as people with Mental Health problems and a large Developmentally Delayed population. Peace and quiet is necessary for the mental health of all of these people.

- 1. NO COMMERCIAL LEASE now or in the future There should be no Commercial Development in the middle of a National Park, let alone a World Heritage Area. Scenic tours/joy flights, taking off and landing in a National Park should not occur because of the impacts on park visitors and our native plants and animals. Joy flights were stopped in 1995 because of the noise, and should not start again. Because of the shapes of the valleys helicopter noise is echoed and amplified, impacting on far more areas than just directly below. My concern is not just with this specific proposal, I object to ANY commercial lease now or in the future. This land is PUBLIC land. A private lease allows changes to be decided behind closed doors. WHO could take over the lease? WHAT could they do in the future? Could it be sold? There are numerous international studies demonstrating the significant impacts of helicopters on native fauna, in particular on disruptions to bird migrations; also on fauna reliant on hearing for feeding, mating and care of young. The conclusion of a 2019 ecological study is that the aircraft activity will negatively impact on the internationally recognised migration of honeyeaters through the Blue Mountains. It could also impact other birds inhabiting the diverse bushland surrounding the site. (BMRM Ecological Surveys LINK BMCS website)
- 2. PUT THIS LAND INTO THE SURROUNDING NATIONAL PARK The airfield land was always intended to be returned to its surrounding National Park.

This is the solution. From reading about the 20 years' worth of past assessments, it seems the process to proceed with a commercial lease directly conflicts with all those previous studies, not to mention commitments by previous NSW governments. Those assessments of Katoomba Airfield have consistently recommended that the site be added to the Blue Mountains National Park and be used for emergency and bushfire air operations only.


I write to strenuously voice my opposition to the proposed lease of Katoomba Airfield for commercial operations.

I would like to express my strong support for the proposed new use at Katoomba airstrip.

There are no working airfields between Bankstown and Bathurst, which is far too large an area not be be serviced by a local airfield. The obsession with restricting the use of Katoomba airfield is not logical - in a country the size of Australia every significant settlement needs an airfield.

Opponents do not want to keep the airfield for 'public' and 'emergency' use - they don't want it at all. However, in reality, it should be a vital public amenity - the reason it is not used it is not safe to use as a proper airstrip. There would be no problem extending the airstrip to make it safe for light aircraft. None of the trees around the airfield are endangered - there are millions of them. We cannot run a community on the basis that it was acceptable for people who came before us to clear land and build a city, but that suddenly it is no longer possible to do any development.

Noise from joyflights will be limited. Aircraft cannot operate below 500 ft and, particularly with helicopters, noise abatement on takeoff and landing is easy. All that is needed is departure protocols that avoid houses, aircraft to quickly ascend to above 1500ft and only descend when away from populated areas, for example over the bushland. The pollution from operating a few joyflights is absolutely negligible, especially given the number of commercial airliners that cruise overhead.

I recommend that approval be granted for commercial use, but also that the airstrip be extended to make it safe for light aircraft. Many, many pilots would visit the airstrip and spend money in the local community. It would be excellent for local residents to be able to learn to fly in the Mountains, instead of facing a journey of at least an hour to get to the nearest airfield. If the airstrip was safe, I would expect flight training to become available which would be a great benefit.

The reality is that development and use of the runway and airfield is not going to have any real environmental impact. The area is inaccessible and hardly anyone would actually notice. With appropriate procedures, the noise would be manageable. The Mountains tourist economy is badly undeveloped - other than Scenic World there are no major developed activities, and if we are being honest, is Scenic World did not already exist there would be no chance of it ever being approved in the current environment. Joyflights over areas of natural beauty are carried out, under certain conditions, in almost all places worldwide. It is time to make use of a great resources for the Mountains.

#### The points that concern me:

- 1. A very important aspect of the Blue Mountains is the enjoyment had by hundreds of thousands each year coming to appreciate the natural beauty of our region. This beauty is primarily visual, but an essential aspect of enjoying this is the soundscape: with artificial noise whether you are at Echo Point or down in the Grose Valley the tranquillity of the experience is diminished, even destroyed. If you cannot conceive of this fact, consider this: Think of sitting down to enjoy a delicious meal prepared over time by your host only to have him/her put on some loud house music. Unlikely heh but effectively it is the guardians (hosts!) of our tranquil spaces who will be signing off on the destruction of that tranquillity. Yes, that dinner scenario is highly unlikely but the point remains even it was a neighbour playing that music a few doors down distant but very disturbing none the less.
- 2. How the prospect that a few may commercially gain from our public land in the face of such strong opposition from the locals just baffles me the whole process is about-face as the company have been given a licence to operate commercially on the airfield (while they await the prospect of a lease) BEORE any public consultation. The Katoomba Airfield, located close to Medlow Bath in the Blue Mountains, is a useful government owned resource that must be retained for use by all peoples of NSW.

Its value lies in the ability to have aircraft of small to medium size, fixed wing or rotary wing, to be able to use it for a variety of purposes. These include commercial operations, private flights, FFR (flood and fire relief) or for emergency medical evacuations. The commercial benefits alone will be of great importance to the community of the Blue Mountains.

In order to maintain the airfield in a serviceable condition for all operators to use will have a financial impact on the owners, the NSW government. The airfield is currently closed to fixed wing operations due to the unserviceability of the runway. #### 1. NO COMMERCIAL LEASE now or in the future

There should be no Commercial Development in the middle of a National Park, let alone a World Heritage Area.

Scenic tours/joy flights, taking off and landing in a National Park should not occur because of the impacts on park visitors and our native plants and animals.

Joy flights were stopped in 1995 because of the noise, and should not start again.

Because of the shapes of the valleys helicopter noise is echoed and amplified, impacting on far more areas than just directly below.

My concern is not just with this specific proposal, I object to ANY commercial lease now or in the future.

This land is PUBLIC land. A private lease allows changes to be decided behind closed doors. WHO could take over the lease? WHAT could they do in the future? Could it be sold?

There are numerous international studies demonstrating the significant impacts of helicopters on native fauna, in particular on disruptions to bird migrations; also on fauna reliant on hearing for feeding, mating and care of young.

The conclusion of a 2019 ecological study is that the aircraft activity will negatively impact on the internationally recognised migration of honeyeaters through the Blue Mountains. It could also impact other birds inhabiting the diverse bushland surrounding the site.

#### 2. PUT THIS LAND INTO THE SURROUNDING NATIONAL PARK

The airfield land was always intended to be returned to its surrounding National Park. This is the solution.

A commercial development within the World Heritage Area threatens the integrity of the land, makes it more difficult to manage as a natural area and could even put its status in jeopardy.

We need to stop this threat ever arising again! Protect our World Heritage Area

I wish to place on record my objection, in the strongest possible terms, to the proposed change to the use of Katoomba Airfield, to wit the proposed commercial operation for tourist flights. I chose to live in the Blue Mountains because of its peaceful environment. I accept being remote from city facilities as a worthwhile trade-off for quality of life close to nature. I bushwalk here regularly, at least once a week, for the same reason. And that is one of the main reasons for the Blue Mountains as a prime tourist destination. It is quite extraordinary, perhaps globally unique, to have such a glorious wilderness abutting against one of the world's great cities. For tourists, either domestic or international, the ability to be immersed in wilderness little more than an hour from Sydney is quite wonderful. It needs to be cherished and preserved, not sacrificed on the altar of a few dollars. It is public land. It is not appropriate to ride roughshod over the local community, as government is wont to do.

Being in natural bushland is more than a visual experience. For most people using the bush for recreation, there are other reasons to be there. Firstly there is the range of wildlife to see and hear. Secondly there is the sense of solitude, of communing with nature. Both these amenities would be lost with more flights, particularly given the manner in which sound rebounds around the cliff lines. In this modern society, beset by so many ills, there is the demonstrable need for more quiet reflection rather than more noise, particularly given that noise is increasingly recognised for its perverse impacts on quality of life. There is clearly great resistance to this proposal. Legislators need to recognise, to fully comprehend, that we live in a liberal democracy where the rule of law reflects the greater good; it is not a plutocracy (government by the rich for the rich). It is not appropriate to damage the quality of life for so many in the community for the sake of a commercial operator and a small number of cashed-up tourists who have little or no concern for the disturbance they cause. Of one thing we can be sure; if such an odious proposal came to fruition there would be intense pressure to inexorably increase the commercial return on investment by increasing flight numbers. Surely death by a thousand cuts.

It has come to my attention the suggestion that we the community will be protected by a 'Fly Neighbourly Agreement'. I would suggest that history shows us that such agreements are self-regulated and not enforced by any government agency. They have not protected the National Park in the past and cannot in the future. In fact the whole paradigm of self-regulation is a facetious charade in any commercial environment; money will always win.

How many more obscenities are to be thrust on this stunning and relatively untouched regions? Is it not enough for the government (for the commercial benefit of its benefactors, no doubt) to plan to destroy part of the World Heritage area with an enlarged Warragamba Dam reservoir (to enable their developer supporters to push more development onto the Hawkesbury-Nepean floodplain). Is it not enough to push a proposed West Sydney airport on us, with its flight paths either over our homes or over our quiet wilderness? Does this quest for growth and money have no limit? We are already made aware that the prized World Heritage nomination is in danger of being retracted because of the proposal to expand Lake Burragorang. This commercial aerodrome would likely be the nail in the coffin of that status.

I noted recently a suggestion from a proponent of this commercialisation that it would enhance the bush experience for hikers. Was something lost in the translation? That such a suggestion is laughable is clear; are the proponents so desperate that they are prepared to make such inane, almost insulting, suggestions? Are they so bereft of justification?

The best future for this facility has already been well discussed in the community, namely that is should be kept as a small strip for emergency services and otherwise subsumed into the national park estate.

On be basis of the above reasoning, I put on record my objection to the airfield proposal.



There should be no Commercial Development in the middle of a National Park, let alone a World Heritage Area. Joy flights were stopped in 1995 because of the noise, and should not start again.

The noise from helicopters is echoed and amplified impacting on areas outside the area just below. This impacts on visitors and residents.

My concern is not just with this specific proposal, I object to ANY commercial lease now or in the future.

This land is PUBLIC land. A private lease allows changes to be decided behind closed doors.

WHO could take over the lease? WHAT could they do in the future? Could it be sold?

There are numerous international studies demonstrating the significant impacts of helicopters on native fauna, in particular on disruptions to bird migrations; also on fauna reliant on hearing for feeding, mating and care of young.

The conclusion of a 2019 ecological study is that the aircraft activity will negatively impact on the internationally recognised migration of honeyeaters through the Blue Mountains. It could also impact other birds inhabiting the diverse bushland surrounding the site.

I would prefer that the airfield land was returned to its surrounding National Park as it was always intended.

A commercial development within the World Heritage Area threatens the integrity of the land, makes it more difficult to manage as a natural area and could even put its status in jeopardy.

We need to stop this threat ever arising again! Protect our World Heritage Area Keep this public land in public hands and keep the dirt airstrip for emergency landings and firefighting.

I frequently fly from Bankstown to Western NSW for personal pleasure. During any given year I will invest several thousand dollars into tourism and other industries in regional cities in NSW.

In the last 18 months I have overflown Katoomba to visit Cootamundra, Orange, Bathurst, Mudgee, Rylstone, Griffith, Wagga Wagga, Mildura, Dubbo, Cowra, Narromine, Temora and Parkes. I have purchased accommodation, wine, rental cars, restaurant meals, and other local services for myself and my passengers.

Since the closure of Katoomba Airfield, there are no usable emergency airfields between the Sydney Basin and Bathurst. If an aircraft I am flying falls into difficulty which requires a forced landing, especially over the Blue Mountains due to rapid changes in weather, it is very likely to be fatal to me and/or my passengers.

Katoomba Airfield used to provide an "out." Due to washouts and vegetation growth since it was closed, it's currently unsuitable as a safe landing area.

To restore its utility, it's necessary for it to be maintained. Nobody will maintain airstrips unless they can be used for other aviation purposes, thus it's necessary to lease it to someone who is willing and able to operate it as an airfield. For this reason, I commend and support the proposal to lease it to FlyBlue Management.

Airfields are an important community amenity. In addition to providing emergency options, they also draw airborne tourists, stimulate local businesses, inspire community activity in their vicinity, and a sense of "ownership" of a shared asset.



I am writing in regard to the proposed commercial lease of public land at Medlow bath occupied by Katoomba Airfield, to which I strongly object.

This airfield should be retained for Emergency use only.

The NSW Government via the Department of Industry (Crown Lands) has previously carried out many studies of the site, culminating in a recommendation in 2000 that the area be added to the Blue Mountains National Park. I believe that this would be the most sensible option.

As a Katoomba resident in the Echo Point precinct, I am well aware of the impact of increased tourist visitation to the area & believe strongly that, although tourism is critical to our local economy, it should be well planned & developed in a sustainable manner. Tourists visit the Blue Mountains primarily because of this world heritage listed area's natural beauty. Aircraft noise from joy flights is already noticeable in this area, particularly on weekends. It is however limited due the distance ( & therefore costs) from Sydney airports.

I note the following from the Office of Environment & Heritage website "The Greater Blue Mountains was added to the World Heritage List in 2000 in recognition of its significant natural values. It possesses unique plants and animals that relate an extraordinary story of the evolution of Australia's distinctive eucalypt vegetation and its associated communities".

The impact of the proposed commercial lease upon the Greater Blue Mountains World Heritage Area ("GMBWHA") should not be underestimated, with noise & pollution bound to have a detrimental impact upon local fauna & flora. Having spoken to other concerned residents & community groups, I understand that an increase in noise levels, particularly in the vicinity of escarpment areas, would likely disturb reproduction patterns & increase stress levels of fauna in these sensitive areas.

I believe that granting a commercial lease for the airfield would be the "tip of the iceberg" as joy flights would prove popular & we would end up seeing increases in air traffic well above what may be initially proposed. With iconic walking tracks such as the Grand Canyon in Blackheath being within a kilometre of the Katoomba Airfield, I fear noise levels created by aircraft would significantly reduce the general ambience sort out by the majority of people who visit the area to enjoy bushwalking.

The airfield is also located in close proximity to the water supply for Katoomba & surrounding townships – increased aircraft activity would no doubt have an effect from air pollution regardless of proposed changes in flight paths. Flight paths addressed in the proposals only seem to relate to take off & landings. If joy flights are allowed it is obvious they would be flying in the valley areas close enough to view of our magnificent escarpments. The noise of aircraft echoes considerably throughout these valleys. Echo point is not named as such for no reason.

Aside from the environmental impact there is no infrastructure to support any such venture. The access road to the airfield is currently unsealed & not in a fit state for overuse by tourists.

I implore you to withdraw the interim lease & refer the matter to the necessary department in order to proceed with the area being included in National Park.

RE: Proposed Commercial Lease of Katoomba Airfield

We strongly object to the proposed new commercial leasing of Katoomba Airfield for helicopter 'Joy Flights' over the World Heritage listed Blue Mountains National Park, on the following grounds:

- 1. World Heritage National Park Use:
- There should be no commercial development in any National Park, let alone in our World Heritage Area. A commercial development within the World Heritage Area threatens the integrity of the land, makes it more difficult to manage as a natural area and could put its World Heritage status in jeopardy. Please see PDF 1.
- · Katoomba Airfield should remain as an emergency airfield only.
- Katoomba Airfield should be incorporated into the surrounding National Park. The National Parks and Wildlife Service (NPWS) is a vital firefighting agency already managing a number of emergency airfields.
- · 2015 Blue Mountains LEP regarding ZONE E3 (Parts 2 & 3 p21) does not specify a commercial heliport as an acceptable development.[1]
- 2. Impacts of 'Joy Flights' on thousands of people, local native flora and fauna, and the environment for the commercial benefit of a few:
- · 'Joy flight' helicopters have serious environmental and community impacts, and create unnecessary pollution and noise.
- Scenic tours/joy flights, taking off and landing in a National Park should not occur because of the impacts on park visitors and our native plants and animals. Please see attached PDF 2.
- Lack of detailed information about the number of daily commercial helicopter flights, or possible future variability of flights paths.

- · Helicopters strike native birds[2] and frighten native wildlife.
- · Helicopters are allowed to fly as low as 500 feet. At this altitude they generate 78 decibels (db) of noise—way over the 'acceptable' limit of 65 decibels.[3] Additionally, 78db exponentially around 10 times louder than 65db.[4]
- That noise mitigation, known as a Fly Neighbourly Agreement[5], is voluntary, not enforceable and at the discretion of the Katoomba Airfield's commercial leaser.
- Two official key planning and regulation documents published by Air Services Australia and the Australian Government Civil Aviation Safety Authority(attached PDFs 4 and 5), do not take into account the fact that helicopter noise triggers PTSD in war veterans. A veteran playing wheelchair tennis at last October Invictus Games, suffered PTSD episode caused by an overhead helicopter. - 3. Impacts of Previous Commercial Lease of Katoomba Airfield for 'Joy Flights":
- That during emergency use of the Katoomba Airfield, for example, during bush fire and rescue operations, tax/rate payers would likely have to compensate the leaser for loss of business during those periods of time.
- During the last 'Joy Flight' commercial lease from 1992-1995, community complaints about noise were ignored. Please see attached PDF 3.
- 4. Potential Future Expansion of Commercial Leases for Katoomba Airfield:
- That if granted, this commercial lease (of unknown length) may open the door for longer and larger commercial operations such as for fixed wing aircraft.
- · Such a commercial lease can be sold on.
- · We ask please that the Katoomba Airfield be added to the Blue Mountains National Park to be managed by the NSW Parks and Wildlife Service (NPWS) with specific funding provided to NPWS for management and maintenance of the airfield.
- Due to accelerating climate change and its intensifying weather extremes, more frequent and extreme bushfire emergencies are likely. Therefore, we urge all relevant authorities to please continue the use of the Katoomba Airfield as an emergency airfield only.[6][7][8][9]

- 1. **This is public land, enclosed in a World Heritage listed National Park**. Why has this land, used by the Rural Fire Service during firefighting operations, been licensed to a private operator to manage primarily for profit rather than for the benefit of the community?
- 2. Why was the community not consulted by the state government about what kind of use was appropriate for such a sensitive site before they released a tender for a license by direct negotiation, and awarded it to a high-impact helicopter tourism business? Moreover, the government has not even given the general public basic information about the proposal, such as the number of flights and their frequency, and flight plans.
- 3. Numerous government reports over the years have recommended or anticipated that the site should be returned to the National Park. Why has nothing been done about this? Katoomba Airfield should be returned to the Blue Mountains National Park, to be used strictly as an emergency airfield.
- 4. A commercial airfield providing joy flights is the last thing this area needs. The tremendous racket of helicopters and other planes reverberating off escarpment and valley walls and floors would adversely affect the enjoyment of tourists to the Blue Mountains as well as negatively impact Blue Mountains residents. The natural topography of this area acts to magnify sound, and the area is already under intense threat from noise impacts from Western Sydney Airport.

Dear Sir.

I have been a visitor to the Blue Mountains since my childhood. I have walked the escarpments, the valleys and the canyons. Over the years they have been the places to visit with my many overseas visitors and I have now retired to Wentworth Falls for the peace and tranquillity of the wilderness, after many years of living with the noise and chaos of the city.

Helicopters are not machines of beauty. They are incredibly noisy, cumbersome bemouths. While they are a necessary evil for air ambulance, search and rescue and providing access to otherwise inaccessible areas, I know the noise is temporary, necessary and will come to an end.

This would not be the case for a Heliport. Katoomba airfield overlooks the Grose valley. Operating a heliport at Katoomba airfield will generate continuous unacceptable noise into the valley. It will destroy the peace, quietness and natural beauty of the area. People of all ages come to see this valley. Some will walk along the escarpment or down into the valley; others will just come to admire the view; all will leave refreshed, invigorated and restored. A heliport will destroy this experience.

Almost next to the airfield is a classic walk known as Grand Canyon. The walk off the Blackheath plateau descends into a narrow canyon of waterfalls. The air is filled with birdsong and shafts of sunlight glinting through the trees clinging off the sides of the cliffs. A sense of adventure takes over on entering a sequence of natural galleries cut into the cliff face, cliff on one side a precipitous drop on the other and the continuous sound of fast flowing water far below. National Parks have just spent several years repairing this walk for the enjoyment of many thousands of visitors. With a heliport next door, you may well ask why did they bother?

My understanding is that this piece of Crown Land would be incorporated into the surrounding National Park on termination of the current lease. This would make eminent sense. Retaining small land holdings within National Parks must be very inefficient. The original lease allowed a small group of aircraft enthusiasts to construct an airfield. The cost of maintaining this airfield by the owner of the lease became prohibitive and the various commercial enterprises operating on it have failed. There is no indication that a new operator would be any more successful. The site is totally surrounded by bush. There is only one road in and one road out. It will be difficult to protect in the event of a major bush-fire and the situation would be made worse by the storage of volatile aviation fuels.

It is doubtful a Heliport would be of any benefit to the local economy. The Blue Mountains are now recognised as having World Heritage status. Visitors come to see a World Heritage wilderness. The noise pollution of a heliport will have a progressive dulling effect on the visitor experience. They will no longer return; they will no longer recommend. World Heritage status could be lost. The Blue Mountains economy will suffer. Do you really want to "kill the golden goose"?

Operation of the airfield has left the area unsightly and degraded; open to weed infestation, has runoff issues and potential pollution problems from leaking fuel and engine oils. A new lease for a heliport will only

compound these problems. It is time for the land to be incorporated into the National Park for rehabilitation by the National Parks and Wild Life Service.

I am strongly of the opinion that the land should be incorporated into the Blue Mountains National Park.

To Whom it May Concern,

I am writing with concerns over the proposed lease of Crown Land at Medlow Bath. I am concerned that this proposal to grant perhaps a 50-year lease, for commercial operation and development of an airfield, on land which is wholly within the Blue Mountains National Park, is not in the best interests of our community and the protection of natural areas for future generations.

I believe this public land should remain under the management of a public institution, not leased to a private company to develop for their personal gain.

I would like to see Lot 550 DP 751657, Grand Canyon Road, Medlow Bath gazetted as an extension of our Blue Mountains National Park.

My main concerns with this proposal are

- Economic impacts such as effect on local businesses and property values
- Loss of local amenity for example due to noise, visual impact, privacy
- Environmental impacts including pollution, flora and fauna impact and world heritage status
- Concerns with the bureaucratic process

As an avid bush walker and firm believer in the importance of protecting wilderness areas I feel that from the airfield towards the NW, any increase in helicopter or light plane traffic impinges on the following areas in particular:

- The iconic Grand Canyon Track is under 1km from the airfield. Noise generated at takeoff and landing approaches would affect the experience of those walking in this area
- The Blue Mountains are a premier destination in Australia for canyoning. The track to Juggler Canyon is opposite the airfield. Arethusa Canyon, Alpheus Canyon, Fortress Canyon, Butterbox Canyon, David Crevasse, Orunga Canyon, Dalpura Canyon, Birrabang Canyon, Koombamba Canyon, Wotta Canyon, Better Offer Canyon, Yileen Canyon and Hat Hill Canyon are all within two kilometres of the proposed flight path. Rick Jamieson's Canyons near Sydney, 5th Edition, is a guide to around 100 of the Blue Mountains more accessible canyons. It is sold at Blue Mountains outdoor activity shops and at the NPWS Centre at the end of Govetts Leap Road. A significant increase in traffic on the proposed flight path has a potential impact on the experience in 15% of accessible canyons if sound levels are not minimised or eliminated.
- The sides of the Grose valley are the sites of a large variety of lookouts. Many are easily accessible by tourists in their cars, primarily Evans Lookout, Govetts Leap Lookout, Pulpit Rock, Perry's Lookdown and Anvil Rock. Paths along the edge of the Grose from Evans to Pulpit Rock exploit a cliff edge location with stupendous views. Walkers access views in the valley at Baltzer Lookout, Lockleys Pylon, Mt Banks and Fortress Ridge. At the magnificent lookout of Anvil Rock, the views along three arms of the bottle

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shaped Grose Valley with the tower blocks of Sydney visible on a clear day are unrivalled. Helicopters and other aircraft will fly almost over the top of this lookout.

The bottom of the Grose Valley is the site of a remote camp site. Paths lead to the bottom of the valley, through the Blue Gum forest and on to Mount Victoria. Perry's Lookdown, Rodriguez Pass, the Horse Track and Pierces Pass all lead walkers into and out of the valley. Mt Banks overlooking the Grose Valley and the site of the one of the Blue Mountains largest cliff faces could become a large echo chamber magnifying any sound.

The birthplace of the Blue Mountains National Park is the Blue Gum forest below Mt Banks. Almost 100 years ago, a group of bushwalkers intervened before trees were cleared to establish a walnut plantation. "The NPWS makes the following comment about this special place:

The historical and natural significance of the mighty Blue Gum Forest can't be understated. It's spoken of in hushed tones by those who know of it, and once seen, is never forgotten.

Situated in Grose Valley, in the World Heritage-listed Blue Mountains National Park, this stand of magnificent eucalypts is a fine example of closed forest. A haven for birds and wildlife, it was saved from the axe by bushwalkers in the 1930s. These intrepid nature-lovers pooled resources and bought the forest to preserve it for future generations." I am writing out of concern about the proposed use of Medlow airstrip for recreational aviation. I find it incomprehensible that you would even consider such a proposal. Please dismiss the proposal as absolute lunacy (or greed) and restore a little my confidence in your department's integrity.

To whom it may concern,

For over 30 years thousands of meditators have enjoyed the tranquility of the Blue Mountains while practicing Vipassana at Dhamma Bhumi situated in Blackheath. Now the silence is threatened by your proposed lease of Katoomba airfield to a commercial flying operator.

The airfield is only seven kilometers from the Vipassana Centre.

I understand that as the licence is unrestricted, the flight paths and frequency of flights is entirely up to the operator with no further oversight or control.

Meditators now have the prospect of low aircraft or helicopter flights directly over the Centre.

While flights are meant to be above 1000 feet (30m) above residential areas and 500 feet (15m) elsewhere, I believe there is no enforcement process and a pilot can claim safety, poor weather etc.

The impact on the Vipassana Centre would be enormous, not only because of the noise, but also the loss of privacy, with overhead viewing.

The Centre's solitude and natural environment could be invaded on a regular basis.

# A commercial lease of aircraft would destroy the ambience that makes the Vipassana Centre a viable place for meditators to congregate.

In addition, the Blue Mountains is a listed World Heritage area, noted for the breathtaking beauty of its scenery, abundant wildlife and its peaceful silence.

It is rare to have such beautiful and unique wilderness so close to a major city like Sydney with approximately 5.8 million people living within it.

It is an amenity which needs to be protected.

A commercial lease of aircraft would destroy the tranquility of the Blue Mountains, the flora, fauna and wildlife within it which serves as a most important and necessary retreat by the local community, Vipassana meditation students, Sydeysiders, visitors from across Australia and those visiting from overseas.

At present, the Katoomba Airfield is used just for emergency services.

It is a known fact that between 1992-95, when a commercial lease was previously issued, it was **mis-used** and subsequently operations were closed down.

When that lease expired, it was agreed that the airfield be returned to being part of the Blue Mountains National Park, but this never happened.

This should have happened for the reasons established at that time, including the misuse of the previous commercial lease which now serves as a very real reason as to why a commercial lease should not be established now.

I understand that the proposed lease is to be granted by the NSW Government Department of Lands. The government's own guidelines require that before such a lease is granted:

- It's impact on the current community use and enjoyment of the land be considered
- Community engagement be transparent, conducted openly, fosters respect and trust, and is professional, honest and consistent
- Local communities have the opportunity to be involved and local voices heard

Yet to date, and in contrast to the above, no information has been offered about the flight paths, the frequency, and the number of flights.

Clearly this is inadequate consultation.

I urge you to reconsider the above proposal in order to avoid the catastrophic mistake you are now considering making.

I, a resident of Blackheath, wish to voice my opposition to the proposed lease of Katoomba airfiled for the following reasons:

## 1. NO COMMERCIAL LEASE now or in the future

There should be no Commercial Development in the middle of a National Park, let alone a World Heritage Area. Scenic tours/joy flights, taking off and landing in a National Park should not occur because of the impacts on park visitors and our native plants and animals. Joy flights were stopped in 1995 because of the noise, and should not start again. Because of the shapes of the valleys helicopter noise is echoed and amplified, impacting on far more areas than just directly below. My concern is not just with this specific proposal, I object to ANY commercial lease now or in the future.

This land is PUBLIC land. A private lease allows changes to be decided behind closed doors. WHO could take over the lease? WHAT could they do in the future? Could it be sold? There are numerous international studies demonstrating the significant impacts of helicopters on native fauna, in particular on disruptions to bird migrations; also on fauna reliant on hearing for feeding, mating and care of young.

The conclusion of a 2019 ecological study is that the aircraft activity will negatively impact on the internationally recognised migration of honeyeaters through the Blue Mountains. It could also impact other birds inhabiting the diverse bushland surrounding the site. (BMRM Ecological Surveys - LINK BMCS website)

#### 2. PUT THIS LAND INTO THE SURROUNDING NATIONAL PARK

The airfield land was always intended to be returned to its surrounding National Park. This is the solution. A commercial development within the World Heritage Area threatens the integrity of the land, makes it more difficult to manage as a natural area and could even put its status in jeopardy.

We need to stop this threat ever arising again! Protect our World Heritage Area. Keep this public land in public hands. Fly Neighbourly Agreements are self regulated and not enforced by any government agency. They have not protected the National Park in the past and cannot in the future.

# 3. MAINTAIN FOR EMERGENCY USE ONLY

Keep the dirt airstrip for emergency landings and firefighting! Management of the airstrip is best undertaken by a firefighting agency. In addition to it's other function the National Parks and Wildlife Service (NPWS) is a vital firefighting agency already managing a number of emergency airfields.

I do not want a bloody commercial airfield generating joy flights and lining the pockets of some greedy in Katoomba, thank you.

I've lived in the Blue Mountains since 1983, which now, in 2019, qualifies me for local status. When I first came to live in Lawson, there was practically no night time traffic on the Great Western Highway. If one were travelling from Wentworth Falls to Lawson then, between 11.00 p.m. - midnight, you'd be lucky to see one other car on the Highway. When I moved to Bullaburra in 1986, I bought a property that was two kilometres off the Highway. The same state of affairs blessedly prevailed; I could only hear traffic if the wind was coming from a northerly direction and again it was still only the odd lone semi trailer going through to Sydney in the small hours.

Since the Highway was upgraded (this concluded in 2015) the noise is now endless. The Highway never stops. The noise never stops. We also have the added discomfort of bloody HELICOPTERS going around the villages for hours on end every couple of months (and usually on a weekend) to check the power lines. There's no break - they just keep flying. There isn't even an arrangement of an hour on and an hour off to give the residents' ears and nerves a break.

We also have, on average, four helicopters a night going through to Sydney - they may be medical emergencies being flown from Katoomba to Sydney, I do not know. Some of them may be rescue helicopters heralding yet another idiot Sydneyite who has got lost or fallen off a cliff. Occasionally they are from the television stations, if something particularly good's happened in our neck of the woods. But there's certainly more of them than there were 20 years ago. By the way, that doesn't count the ones during the day. Day or night, most of these helicopters are flying so low the windows rattle and I can feel it through the floor.

Now there's a proposal for MORE bloody noise? Not only more noise - it'll be extra noise generated only for the purpose of lining the pockets of a greedy or business who evidently abhors what he considers to be a vacuum. Who cannot stand to see good land apparently idle. Who thinks that building something on it and making more bloody noise and causing more irreversible damage is a good thing. Not to mention the loads of cash to be made. Who abhors a beautiful place and space, a WORLD HERITAGE place and space, which is already well on the way to being ruined for good. I am deeply concerned that the Department of Industry is considering granting a long term lease for private commercial tourism of Katoomba Airfield.

I strongly object to this commercial lease application and my request is that this public land be gazetted as part of Blue Mountains National Park to be used for emergencies only.

These are my reasons -

- 1. These 36 hectares are public land. This piece of land is surrounded by Blue Mountains National Park which has World Heritage status affording protection for future generations. It needs to be under the management of a public institution to ensure this protection and not leased to a private company for its commercial gain. To allow this airfield to be used for commercial flights will have a detrimental impact on the national park environment and the wildlife. I observe the annual migration of hundreds of thousands of honeyeaters over the mountains, many over my home in Medlow Bath and near the airfield. Recently I observed a rare raptor, a Collared Sparrowhawk along the road just past the airfield. There is no way the continual noise and flight disruption of light aircraft and helicopters will not affect the nesting and feeding habits of birds and other wildlife. There will also be inevitable pollution of the environment from runoff from the proposed sealed runway, the storage and transportation of fuel, the building of infrastructure for the commercial ventures at the airfield. There has been very little information provided regarding the number of flights but to make it a profitable business there would need to be constant use. The proposed flight paths ( just a chart at the drop-in community consultation) over the Blue Mountains National Park cannot be controlled.
- 2. Commercial use of Katoomba Airfield will have an adverse impact on the amenity of people living in the mountains, particularly the residents of Medlow Bath, Katoomba and Blackheath. As well as residents there are meditation centres, the RSPCA in north Katoomba and others who desire peace and quiet in their towns rather than the noise of helicopters and light planes. We have already experienced this and it is totally unacceptable noise pollution. Joy flights from the airfield will lead to increased traffic through residential Medlow Bath on a narrow road, unsealed in part. Fuel delivery through our village and fuel storage in a bushfire zone is dangerous.
- 3. Desirable tourism is that which brings people who wish to enjoy the natural peace and beauty of the mountains and have a low environmental impact on the national park. They improve the local economy by using local businesses. The very things they come to enjoy will be shattered by low flying aircraft. Helicopter joy flights in the early 1990s were shocking as the noise reverberates through the canyons. I personally experienced this while walking in the Grand Canyon in Blackheath which is very close to Katoomba Airfield. If this commercial lease is granted, people enjoying the wonder of the Grose Valley from Anvil Rock will have aircraft passing close overhead as shown on the the flight path chart.
- 4. If the airfield is commercially leased to a private company I have concern over what may be possible in future leases negotiated without public consultation. Public land should not be for private profit.

  Will it cost the public if the Bushfire Service requires access to the airfield disrupting the private enterprise.

As a longtime resident of the Blue Mountains and having been a a resident of Medlow Bath for the past twenty years I am aware of the massive amount of time and effort spent gaining World Heritage status for the greater Blue

Mountains. Surely this status should not be placed in jeopardy. Put this land in the national park and protect it forever.

As a resident of Katoomba for almost 30 years, I wish to have my say on the proposed lease of our community airfield to private citizens (from outside the area) for the making of personal profit to the detriment of residents, local businesses, tourists from NSW, Australia and the world over.

I see no advantage to anyone other than the proposed lessees, other helicopter pilots they would no doubt enlist and the privileged few able to pay for their services.

#### Social Impact:

Noise! Having witnessed the previous helicopter tourism flights 25 years ago at Echo Point, I remember the horrified reaction from the many visitors at the look-outs when the sound of the rotors cannoned above them. I can only imagine how a former Vietnam Veteran would have felt, or someone affected by bushfire or medical emergency requiring airlift. Normal helicopter noise is bad enough but over the mountains and in the canyons it is magnified greatly.

Personally, I, like many others, suffer from hearing sensitivity to sudden loud noises. I have little faith that any "fly neighbourly policy" proposed would be implemented, not being enforceable in any way.

We don't know what they have planned for the airfield which is surrounded by World Heritage listed National Park. I firmly believe that the airfield should be transferred to National Parks and protected forever.

#### **Environmental Impact:**

Should the airfield, now public land, be given over for commercial purposes, it would seriously threaten the aforementioned World Heritage listing.

There would no doubt be plans to put in place roads to cater for refuelling trucks and storage facility for massive amounts of fuel.

Frequent flights over the water catchment area could easily pollute our drinking water.

Over 4 million tourists visit the Blue Mountains annually to bush walk, run, take in the scenery and the tranquillity that now exists. How long would it take for word to get around should the paths and tracks become as noisy as any built up area.

There are many birds and wildlife resident in the valleys. Already we are seeing the extinction of more and more species which are finding it impossible to exist in our modern, noisy, overcrowded conditions.

## **Cultural Impact:**

In the current difficult economy many more Australian families are holidaying closer to home or looking for a low-cost day out close to Sydney. What a smack in the face for someone doing it tough to have their holiday experience ruined by helicopters noisily flying overhead, carrying one or two passengers at a time.

The Blue Mountains has been home to several Aboriginal communities for many years and the fame of the Three Sisters rock formation is born of Aboriginal beliefs. Have the local Elders been consulted about the proposed commercial lease of the land?

# **Economic Impact:**

As earlier stated, I see no benefit for local businesses in helicopter tourism from the Katoomba airfield. The comparatively miniscule number of passengers will more than likely only be stopping for meals at the most costly restaurants and not wandering around the shops and cafes in town.

A negative economic impact would be expected if the number of day visitors and bush walkers was to drop off due to the complete change in atmosphere and amenity of the area.

I note that the applicants have requested a 50 year lease! They can only intend to develop and on-sell their lucky windfall. Future generations would know a very different place to what we now have if the granting of this lease goes ahead.

I understand the lease applicants currently have a license for the exclusive use of the airfield land for which they are only paying \$486 per annum. Can we expect the cost of the lease if granted to be so generous?

Surely the airfield can be kept for emergency use, as is now the case, for not a great deal of money allocated for upkeep. The NSW Government has only recently allotted large amounts for upgrades of walking tracks around the mountains. Peace and quiet is needed and expected for such activities.



I am a private pilot resident in Victoria and writing to support the rejuvenation of Katoomba airport as a general aviation airport.

I flew into Katoomba when it was operational several times with my family. There is no other airport close that area of the Blue Mountains to make the area accessible. I did look at flying commercially to Mascot and then driving but the trip was too long to be feasible. In each case we flew there, we stayed in Katoomba or Leura, ate at the restaurants, and enjoyed the tourist facilities. But for the airport, we would have gone elsewhere. We haven't returned since the airport closed. It is rare to find an airstrip in Australia which is close enough to significant tourist attractions to be a short taxi ride away, as Katoomba is. The natural beauty of the area changes with the season and the weather - I would love to go back but won't unless I can fly in. Flying in makes it a feasible short 2 or 3 day trip from Victoria or southern Queensland, as well as rural NSW. It would be ideal for a group of 5-8 people. I am a member of national flying clubs - I understand what aviators are looking for.

Bear in mind, that when I fly in, I come down from a high level (out of earshot) and land with engines at idle as the airstrip is beautifully positioned. I then park the plane and spend all my time (and money) in the towns. The takeoff direction in the prevailing wind is over an unpopulated area, so this airstrip is one of the best located in terms of minimizing noise to local residents. I know from my own experience that neighbours with leaf blowers are much more annoying and noisy.

You have a unique asset in the airfield. I hope it becomes operational again.

As a ratepayer I think it only right that the wishes of the people of the Blue Mountains be adhered to and not that of few joyseekers.

I live in Springwood about a half hour drive from Katoomba. Its beautiful here. Restorative. Historical. Beautiful. Quiet. Peaceful.

My husband and daughter recently returned from Everest Base Camp and our warning comes from there. In conversation with the guides and porters, talk would often turn to the impact of the helicopter on the lives of the Nepalese villagers.

The local Nepalese have learnt to hate the helicopter. They hate the noise. That doofing doof doofing, thumping, jarring sound that's so typical of a helicopter. The noise drives them mad. It makes the animals skittish and difficult to handle when a helicopter flies by. There's no peace. They don't know when the next one will come by. The helicopters disturb the rest and sleep of all, animals and villagers alike. Helicopters disturb the peace of the day with their continued deep doofing, thumping sound. There is no such thing as a quiet helicopter. The smell of the air has changed with the increase use of helicopters for tourism because of the fume emissions. The arrival of the 'tourist' sightseeing helicopter, from which so few benefit, has resulted in noise pollution lowering their quality of village life by destroying the peaceful environment in which these people lived causing anxiety, depression and anger.

The tourist are flying over rather then trekking through so there is not even a financial gain to compensate for this destruction.

No, I do not want sightseeing helicopters flying out of Katoomba Airfield. There is no benefit to me or the mountains themselves in fact, the opposite is true. Both my husband and daughter said, it's really off putting, you'll be consumed by the beauty, thoroughly spellbound by the view when, suddenly you are roughly jarred out of your wonder and awe, back to reality, by the roaring arrival of a helicopter destroying the moment. Tourist come to the mountains to experience the ambiance, the peace, the quiet, the green and the smell of the earth. They come to escape the smell and noise of city living. Helicopters completely destroy the quiet, the complete tone and ambiance of the mountains will be destroyed.

I support Katoomba Airfield being used by emergency services but I do not, cannot support Katoomba Airfield being use as a base for commercial, sightseeing ventures especially after hearing about the concerns of the Nepalese and seriously, planting a few trees will not fix the noise pollution.

Katoomba Airfield Submission

I wish to object to a commercial licence being issued to Flyblue or another private operator for the Katoomba Airfield. My preference is that the land is handed over to the NPWS together with an allocation of funds to maintain it.

I do note that Fly Blue already has a licence to operate and assume that this is not an act of charity. If the NSW Government decides to flout community opinion on this matter, then the number of flights permitted should be no more than the existing level of operation. I am also concerned that a 50 year lease extends well beyond the working life of the proposed lessee. Over time this provides a toehold for less and less appropriate uses of the area.

My specific problems arise from my position as a resident of Blackheath and as a bushwalker who is an active member of a club with over 250 members from both the Blue Mountains and Sydney.

The fight paths from the airfield are a **major concern for bushwalking and related activities and will lead to a decline in the quality of the wilderness experience.** Although the proposed lessees pride themselves on not flying over built up areas, that in itself creates a serious problem. The blue line showing the path of the flights passes right over the Grose Valley. From the airfield towards the NW, any increase in helicopter or light plane traffic impinges on the following areas:

- The iconic Grand Canyon Track is under 1km from the airfield. Noise generated at takeoff and landing approaches would impact on the experience of those walking in this area
- The Blue Mountains are a premier destination in Australia for canyoning. The track to Juggler Canyon is opposite the airfield. Arethusa Canyon, Alpheus Canyon, Fortress Canyon, Butterbox Canyon, David Crevasse, Orunga Canyon, Dalpura Canyon, Birrabang Canyon, Koombamba Canyon, Wotta Canyon, Better Offer Canyon, Yileen Canyon and Hat Hill Canyon are all within two kilometres of the proposed flight path. Rick Jamieson's compendium of 100 canyons accessible from Sydney is sold in all the Blue Mountains Outdoor activity shops a significant increase in traffic on the proposed flight path will degrade the experience in 15% of accessible canyons.
- The sides of the Grose valley are the sites of a large variety of lookouts. Many are easily accessible by tourists in their cars, primarily Evans Lookout, Govetts Leap Lookout, Pulpit Rock, Perry's Lookdown and Anvil Rock. Paths along the edge of the Grose from Evans to Pulpit Rock exploit a cliff edge location with stupendous views. Walkers access views in the valley at Baltzer Lookout, Lockleys Pylon, Mt Banks and Fortress Ridge. In my opinion, the best lookout in the Blue Mountains is Anvil Rock, the views along three arms of the bottle shaped Grosse Valley with the tower blocks of Sydney visible on a clear day are unrivalled. Helicopters and other aircraft regularly flying the proposed route significantly diminish the previously available experiences at these locations.
- The bottom of the Grosse Valley is the site of a remote camp site. Paths lead to the bottom of the
  valley, through the Blue Gum forest and on to Mount Victoria. Mt Banks overlooking the Grose
  Valley and the site of the one of the Blue Mountains largest cliff faces will become the mountains
  largest echo chamber magnifying the sound which will be manifest along the length of the upper
  Grose Valley.

The birthplace of the Blue Mountains National Park is the Blue Gum forest below Mt Banks. Almost 100 years ago, a group of bushwalkers intervened before trees were cleared to establish a walnut plantation.

# The NPWS makes the following comment

The historical and natural significance of the mighty Blue Gum Forest can't be understated. It's spoken of in hushed tones by those who know of it, and once seen, is never forgotten.

Situated in Grose Valley, in the World Heritage-listed Blue Mountains National Park, this stand of magnificent eucalypts is a fine example of closed forest. A haven for birds and wildlife, it was saved from the axe by bushwalkers in the 1930s. These intrepid nature-lovers pooled resources and bought the forest to preserve it for future generations.

Spoiling this and other treasures of the Grose Valley by increasing flights and noise pollution to and from Katoomba Airfield is not in the best interest of the conservation values of the Blue Mountains. It also significantly impacts on the attractiveness of the area as an adventure tourism venue. It is my understanding that Blackheath village sees its future in more niche tourism as opposed to the big Katoomba mass attractions, for example the Three Sisters and Scenic World. Flight paths over Blackheath's diverse attractions unfairly impacts on the village economy.

The unfair impact on Blackheath extends to other dimensions of the proposal to issue a lease to Fly Blue. Blackheath will experience a greater level of sound pollution. A physicist friend of mine has produced a map showing the level of sound produced by light plane and helicopter flights. I hope she has included that map with her own submission. Based on US data, her map shows a shaded area where the level of sound would be the same level as conversation. Imagine talking in your own house, the street or garden and having a level of sound equivalent to a conversation added to your own interactions. According to her maps, three quarters of Blackheath would be affected by this level of sound. A greater proportion of Blackheath Village is affected than any other village in the Blue Mountains.

I am also concerned about the **impact on local fauna**. I have heard anecdotal reports on the effect of sound on wildlife. I myself, have watched an upset Eagle harrassing/being harassed by a NPWS helicopter assisting with track work. I have heard that there are scientific studies supporting this.

As a resident of the Blue Mountains, I am also concerned about the increasing number of impacts on the wider Blue Mountains area. The raising of Warragamba dam, mining impacts in the unprotected Gardens of Stone, the release of mine water into the Wollangambe River and the Western Sydney Airport are all potential impacts on the Blue Mountains. Enhanced commercial use of the Katoomba airfield is yet another impact

In conclusion, I object to any commercial lease. Commercial developments are not appropriate in a World Heritage area. Handing over public land for private profit creates a conflict that will have significant adverse impacts in the Blackheath area and its environment in particular.

I believe the best solution is to transfer this land to the National Park. That is the only way I can see that the people and animals of the area can be safeguarded from the impact of frequent flights of planes and helicopters.

Please consider my submission and objection to the issuing of a commercial lease over Katoomba Airfield, and the proposed helicopter joy flights over the World Heritage listed Blue Mountains National Park.

I live outside the Blue Mountains but have been a regular visitor and supporter of the area for many years. For almost fifteen years I have worked as a volunteer with the NSW National Parks and Wildlife Service (NPWS) and Blue Mountains Bushcare, focused on remote bush regeneration in the Upper Grose Valley wilderness and its feeder catchments, such as Katoomba and Govetts Creeks. As such I have contributed directly to ensuring the long term health of the World Heritage area impacted by this proposal. I believe that I have demonstrated a level of stewardship over the area and need to speak up on its behalf and the many locals and visitors who enjoy the quiet, peaceful, passive recreation that it is renowned for.

There are major, unacceptable impositions of this proposal concerning noise, intrusion and environmental impact. These imposts will negatively affect the amenity of:

- residents of Medlow Bath and Katoomba
- bushwalkers in the Grose Wilderness, Govetts Gorge, Grand Canyon and surrounding locations
- the many visitors to Govetts Leap, Evans Lookout, Pulpit Rock, Perrys Lookdown, Point Pilcher, and Echo Point.

The likely environmental impacts of the leasing proposal are unacceptable including:

- the impact of flights on native fauna, especially birds, which are particularly sensitive to effects from the extreme force of helicopter rotor downwash
- soil erosion
- groundwater contamination
- weed invasion at the airfield site, including negative impacts of operations on the nearby hanging swamp and creek. As a volunteer over many years addressing this specific issue I find this particularly galling.

There seems to be no independent governance whatsoever over the number or duration of flights under the leasing proposal. The supposed "Fly Neighbourly" policy appears to give carte blanche authority to the proponent to do as they please. This is completely unacceptable.

Katoomba Airfield should be included in the Blue Mountains National Park, to be managed as an emergency airfield and specific funding must be provided to the NPWS for its ongoing management. Many studies of the airfield site have been conducted by the NSW Government (Department of Industry - Crown Lands). In 2000 it was recommended that the area be added to the Blue Mountains National Park; the airfield to be used for emergency purposes only. Blue Mountains City Council has opposed the continuation of a private lease over the Airfield, also requesting the land be incorporated into the National Park in 1999, 2000 and 2008. The National Parks and Wildlife Service (NPWS) has previously supported the Katoomba Airfield being incorporated into the National Park, with the airfield managed for emergency and bushfire fire-fighting purposes. NPWS manages a number of airfields within national parks for management and emergency purposes. For example, the small helicopter landing facility maintained at the NPWS Blackheath (Govetts Leap) depot, which is used regularly for park management purposes and also emergency use e.g. Police rescue operations. Specific funding to manage the airfield could be allocated to NPWS from the Bushfire Risk Mitigation and Resilience Program managed by NSW Treasury.

The process around this matter has been inherently unfair and biased towards the proposed leaseholders without appropriate consideration of the owners of the site – the citizens and taxpayers of NSW. An interim license has been issued with no community consultation on options for the future of the airfield. The appropriateness of a commercial airfield should have been considered, with community input, before any such license was granted. I would hope that both the NSW Auditor General and the NSW Ombudsman would have something to say about a process that allows the prioritisation of a single commercial interest over the interests and concerns of the NSW public, to whom the NSW Government is tasked to represent. An environmental assessment of the land should have been completed to inform any licensing decision and consideration given to transferring the land to the Blue Mountains National Park.

Perhaps you have not visited nor lived in the area but the proposed site is in an area of a small village and the noise of planes coming and going will effect not only those there but in surrounding villages.



The Blue Mountains National Park's magnificent landform, the grandeur of its canyons, the variety of flora and fauna and birds, combined with the scenery, peace, and silence, make it a place of solitude and deep joy for residents and visitors alike. 12,000 people have signed a petition objecting to a proposal to add commercial flights to the airfield.

In 1999, the Blue Mountains City Council requested the Department of Land and Water Conservation to integrate Katoomba airfield into the National Park and restrict flights to emergencies only. This concept was reaffirmed by Blue Mountains Council again in 2008. Now a commercial operator, Flyblue, has been granted a licence by the Department to run joy flights and helicopter tours from Katoomba airfield, just a few kilometres from the Centre. There is no way of controlling flights paths and the frequency of flights, as the ability to regulate them is minimal. The height restrictions are (500 feet) 150m above wilderness, and (1000 feet) 300m over houses.

There has been no study of the environmental impact on birds, animals, or humans, especially with regard to noise impact. No details have been released concerning the tender process, and the deeply-flawed public consultation process answered few questions. Once granted, the lease will secure the operator's tenure of the airfield for 50 years, opening the way for further commercial development, or even on-sale to another operator or developer.

Clearly, this lease should not be issued. The Parliamentary debate is a unique opportunity to secure Katoomba airfield in its rightful place as part of the National Park. Otherwise, all who reside in, or visit and enjoy this part of the Blue Mountains, will have their peaceful amenity regularly disturbed.

I moved to Medlow Bath a bit over a year ago, purchasing our very own first home. I was shocked to learn that Katoomba Airfield, only a few kilometres away, was planned to be used for commercial purposes. There is a great bushwalk 'Bruce's Walk' from near the airfield to North Katoomba's Minnehaha Falls that would be lost with the airfield's commercialisation.

I am respectfully calling on you to make a decision to transfer the Crown land to the national park system so that it is preserved forever. A working dirt strip could still be used for emergencies, such as bushfires.

There are several reasons why <u>commercialisation of the airfield would be detrimental to the Blue Mountains:</u>

- Unbearable noise pollution for
  - o wildlife
  - o tourist, bushwalkers, climbers, canyoners
  - o local residents from Medlow Bath to Katoomba and Blackheath

# **Detrimental effects on the Local Tourism Industry**

The Blue Mountains is famous for its natural environment and the outdoor experiences that it offers both visitors and locals. An estimated 1.25 million people undertake bushwalks in the Blue Mountains each year.

Landing tourist helicopters and fixed winged aircraft within World Heritage-listed national park could jeopardise the Blue Mountains experience by:

- 1. Impacting the reputation of the Blue Mountains as a quiet and peaceful escape
- 2. Increasing noise and reducing amenity for hikers, climbers and canyoners
- 3. Concentrating tourist dollars in fewer hands. Tourists that arrive or depart by helicopter are much more likely to be dependent on a few operators for transport and accommodation
- 4. A decrease in reputation or 'wilderness experience' will logically result in fewer visits, meaning less spent at local cafes, pubs, shops and retail outlets or spent on supporting local culture and events.

# **The Environment**

Katoomba Airfield is completely surrounded by the Greater Blue Mountains World Heritage Area. Within 5km of the airfield there are over 3000 native species, including those listed as endangered.

- The Blue Mountains World Heritage Area is up for review later this year. It's status may be effected (and threatened further in combination with proposed changes to Warragamba Dam)
- Damage to rare hanging swamp habitat caused by runoff and erosion from increased traffic on the unsealed section of Grand Canyon Road and the tarmacking of the runway
- 3. The potential impact of Helicopters on Blue Mountains Wildlife and other World Heritage Values.

# Lifestyle and amenity

The liveability of upper Blue Mountains towns and villages is likely to be impacted by:

1. An increase in helicopters and associated noise—we already have issues with scenic flights over the area conducted by other operators. However, those helicopters do not land in or take off from within the World Heritage Area.

- 2. Helicopter noise can travel long distances in an acoustically-sensitive environment dominated by cliffs and canyons, potentially affecting parts of North Katoomba, Medlow Bath and Blackheath and other areas in earshot of the flight paths.
- 3. Any Fly Neighbourly Policy is self-regulated. The policy does not, at the admission of the lease applicant, include aircraft that do not originate from Katoomba Airfield, so that would include many arrivals.
- 4. Increased traffic along the route to the airfield (including fuel tankers and airport runway building equipment) on a narrow local road and walking path. The road is not designed for large vehicles.

# **Concerns about the process**

- 1. Numerous government reports have recommended or anticipated the site should be returned to the National Park. Why has this process not occurred?
- 2. How can anyone properly engage in community consultation when we don't know the scale of the proposed helicopter tourism operation? The state government has steadfastly refused to release the numbers of flights and their frequency to the general public.
- 3. Flight paths have only been displayed at "drop-in" sessions at Hotel Blue, but do not include intended pathways beyond the immediate vicinity of the airfield. The proposed "hub and spoke" model means flights will head to the Central West. Do we know these flight paths? We do not. This model may also bring in other operators further increasing activity.
- 4. Why was the community not consulted by the state government about what kind of use was appropriate for such a sensitive site before they released a tender for a licence by direct negotiation, and awarded it to a high-impact helicopter tourism business, when community groups had also applied?
- 5. Why has public land, used by the Rural Fire Service during fire fighting operations, been licensed to a private operator to manage primarily for profit rather than for the benefit of the community?

I write in reference to the proposed commercial licence for the Katoomba airfield at Medlow Bath , reference number 602686.

This application seems entirely inappropriate for the Blue Mountains area.

A commercial airstrip would generate heavy traffic loads on local streets, create vehicle noise and fumes in the immediate area and more deleteriously generate noise over several towns in the Upper Mountains.

Residents' amenity in the Upper Mountains area is based on living in a relatively quiet place and a large number of the Mountains community have come here for this reason. The noise of aircraft operating on a commercial basis, whether joyflights or otherwise, has the probable effect of destroying this atmosphere and creating serious negative effects on the amenity of residents. I foresee this following through with consequent lower property values as well.

Further, the reputation of the Blue Mountains as a wilderness area grounds much of the tourism to this region. Commercial air traffic taking off, travelling over and landing in the upper Mountains would be audible over sightseeing and hiking districts. Visitors will certainly be deterred by the noise and sight of regular aircraft movements as the fragile ambience of remote and pristine place depends largely for its value on the absence of such signs of everyday activity. Not only this, but cosy bed and breakfast venues will lose their important sense of seclusion when low-flying aircraft pass by.

In short, I consider the possible benefits to the relative few who may operate and use such an airfield to be far less in aesthetic, commercial and quality-of-life terms than what would be lost to the greater number of visitors and residents impacted by such a licence.

Dear Sir/Madam,

I am writing as a resident living in close proximity to the Katoomba Airfield to lodge my strong objection to the proposed commercial lease of the Crown land containing the airfield.

I am seriously concerned that the significant increase in the frequency of aircraft flights in my local area – specifically low-flying helicopters – will have a major detrimental effect on my quality of life, and the health of my family and the natural environment in which I chose to live.

Should the commercial lease be granted, these negative impacts would include:

- Increased pollution of the water and air in the areas flown over. My father was a helicopter pilot and I know well that helicopters' powerful downdraft causes dust and exhaust to pollute everything below them. Importantly, this would include the likely pollution of my and my neighbours' only <u>drinking water</u> supply. With water supplies already under stress from increasingly frequent droughts, any development that will possibly contaminate these supplies should be categorically ruled out.
- An increased risk of fire, due to both the aircraft carrying fuel and the storage of fuel at the airfield. Blue Mountains National Park is already vulnerable to bushfires, and adding a further significant risk factor makes no sense.
- A massive increase in <u>noise</u> pollution, which will impact not only on local residents such as myself and my family, but also on the abundant bird and other wildlife that makes this area unique and worthy of strict protections.

My home backs onto the Grose Valley My household would therefore be severely affected by noise from the aircraft - especially helicopters - flying above, and into and out of the valley. The deep valley walls will increase both the duration and the intensity of the noise.

I am a full-time carer for a severely disabled family member. We moved to live in our current location to provide him with the peace and quiet essential for his health. The negative impacts on both his physical and mental health of almost constant helicopter noise and interrupted sleep during the day (which he requires) would cause considerable permanent distress for both him and myself as his carer.

Given my circumstances, I am disappointed and angry that the "consultation" with residents who would be directly affected by the proposed lease of the airfield has been so inadequate. I received NO written notification (in the form of a letter, or even a letterboxed brochure) of the proposed change to use of the airfield, let alone an invitation to express my views on the issue.

When I did eventually find out about the commercial lease (through the efforts of a Blue Mountains environment organisation), the formal "consultation" process that I have participated in has been woeful and does not give me any confidence that the Department of Industry (Crown Lands) has been acting as an independent government body that listens to and takes into consideration the public's concerns and interests.

After attending the Department's information sessions and reading information on leasee's website, I am no clearer - and am left extremely worried - about:

- what the "fly neighbourly" agreements will mean in practice, and why they are not enforceable by law;
- exactly how many flights there will be each day;
- whether the flight paths and flight durations promised by the leasee will be monitored by an independent body, and enforced;
- how any future changes to the initial agreements and uses of the airfield will be decided, and how the affected community will be consulted;
- why there has been no consideration of the impacts on the property values of surrounding residences, and whether compensation will be paid in the event of this effect.

In previous decades, community concerns about excessive noise from helicopter tourism at the airfield <u>have</u> been listened to and conditions imposed to prevent such a development. I urge the Department of Industry to ensure that the thousands of people who will be affected by the current proposal are listened to again.

Katoomba Airfield belongs to the taxpayers of NSW. The use of the land should therefore be decided, NOT on the basis of the financial interests of a privately owned company, but on the basis of:

- (i) what is in the best interests of the <u>general</u> public, including the protection of a nationally important public environmental asset; and
- (ii) the majority view of the <u>local</u> public, which has been made clear by the 12,000+ local residents and national park users who have signed the petition to be presented to NSW parliament calling for the commercial lease of the airfield to be scrapped.

I understand that there have been multiple recommendations made by Crown Lands and Blue Mountains City Council over decades to incorporate the airstrip into the Blue Mountains National Park, which surrounds it on all sides. For all the reasons outlined above, I fully support that recommendation, with the proviso that the existing airfield continue to be available for use by emergency services only.

I would like to make a submission against tourism use of the Katoomba airfield for many reasons, not the least being the impact of noise on the World Heritage area adjoining the airfield. As a PhD student at Macquarie University investigating the ecology of the endangered ecological community of the upland peat swamps (THPSS) in the Blue Mountains, I witnessed helicopter noise during bushfires several years ago. The noise of them entering and leaving the airfield was uncomfortably high. There is much available literature on the impact of noise on wildlife and I have attached one such paper that may be useful in your evaluation. As you can see from the diagram copied below, the range noise impact on wildlife is many and varied from the acute sounds of aircraft starting up to the frequent and chronic sounds of overhead flight. Noise is just one of the impacts that are unsuitable in the important World Heritage area, where large numbers of tourists visit for its peaceful and tranquil places. Being so close to Sydney, it is arguably the only large scale quiet and natural place that is readily available by public transport. The amenity would be substantially lost by the imposition of noise posed by helicopters. This in addition to possible airport noise from the new Sydney airport. Other impacts include increased runoff pollution into pristine upland swamps and into the nearby Grose valley in the event of a fuel spill or safety release. I urge you to to refuse the application for increased air use at Katoomba airfield.




Figure 3. Conceptual framework for understanding how noise stimuli – perceived as a threat or interfering with cue detection (the disturbance–interference continuum) – can elicit behavioral responses that have direct consequences for fitness or via a physiological stress response, which can also feed back to behavioral changes. Startle/hide responses are more likely to occur in response to noise stimuli that are perceived as a threat (acute, erratic, or sudden sounds). Problems arising from a failure to detect cues are more likely to occur when noise stimuli are chronic and overlap with biologically relevant cues used for communication, orientation, and predator/prey detection. Problems arising from distraction may occur as a result of sounds with features ranging from those that interfere with cue detection to those that are perceived as threats. Lowercase letters indicate studies (listed on the right) providing evidence for the link made for each arrow. Dashed arrows signify a link that we predict as important but for which no current evidence exists. The asterisk denotes that which could result from a change in behavior or a failure to change behavior in response to noise.

At the conclusion of a most wonderful day, enjoying the beauty and tranquility of the Grand Canyon Walk in the Blue Mountains National Park, within its world famous World Heritage Area, we were shocked and dismayed to learn that, adjacent to this unique natural environment, a lease has been granted renewal, allowing resumption of a former airfield for purpose as a base for helicopter joy flights.

We are extremely concerned that the proposal may be granted approval and therefore yet another special sanctuary of natural wonder be compromised.

To have the expansive wilderness of the world renowned Blue Mountains so close and handy to our nation's largest city, visited by thousands of admirers, local and from far afield, is a precious wonder to be maintained in its most undisturbed state as is possible. People love the area as it is, joy flights are not needed to enhance tourism in this area, in fact, joy flights will detract from the very thing that tourists come to enjoy....peace, tranquility, splendid vistas, bird watching and clean air.....a fact that was noted in 1952 by Frank Hurley when he stated "The various towns grow nothing and they make nothing....they subsist entirely on the tourists who come to enjoy the scenic splendours and breathe their pure air".

It is our understanding that when the original excise of land from the National Park was granted for use as an airfield, the land would be returned to the National Park once its airfield use was at the time, concluded. Why has this not been done.

To have a noisy, intrusive facility such as a helicopter joy flight enterprise so close to the National Park would indeed severely compromise its current, relatively pristine qualities. Such qualities are becoming sadly, all to rare worldwide.

The powerful downdraught of helicopters in flight not only disrupts the flora and fauna beneath its path, more damaging is the direct injection of noxious aviation fuel exhaust gases into the forest canopy, watercourses etc. Furthermore, in an era of increasingly prevalent, adverse community health effects of obesity, lack of physical activity etc, visitors should be encouraged in every possible way to enjoy the many walking tracks of various levels of difficulty, throughout the National Park. Merely flying over the area by helicopter affords no opportunity for healthy lifestyle, physical activity. Additionally, helicopter flights afford no more than a superficial, bird's-eye view (without the visual acuity of a bird). It is without question, the role of National Parks, among other vital functions, to provide visitors opportunity immerse themselves in close proximity to nature. In the words of Davis Attenborough...."We cannot love that which we do not know," Flying by helicopter is most likely the least effective means by which one might come to know any natural environment.

The only use to which the area of land in question might in our opinion be granted for aviation purposes is for emergency uses such as search and rescue or fire safety.

We most strongly implore those responsible for oversight of the granting of the proposed lease in question, to ensure it does not proceed.

We can only imagine in disgust, how much more our walking experience today would have been ruined by the intrusive overflight of helicopters flying overhead. By the very nature of their expense and their capacity to cover a wide area in brief time, the noise pollution would be almost constant in its daily regularity and thus highly damaging to the peaceful integrity of this amazingly tranquil, natural wonder of the world.

Shame to those who even contemplate this enterprise, let alone to those who permit and conduct its implementation.

"It was the duty of government to reserve to the people the beauties of nature" spoken by Joseph Carruthers, NSW Premier February 1907, at the opening of The Grand Canyon Track. We can only hope that the present N.S.W. Premier will uphold the values and ideologies of her forebears who had the foresight to open the area for tourism, to enjoy the beauty of the area as intimately as possible (without intruding upon and comprising World Heritage values of today), and also keeping it as low impact as possible.

The leasing of the Katoomba Airfield to a commercial operator would destroy the environment in the Blue Mountains.

The major concerns for residents is that the proposed lessee has not come forth to let the residents know of his business plans for the Airfield.

I have heard that he is planning to have flights come from the following airports: -

Sydney – Wollongong – Newcastle – Bankstown – Bathurst – Campbelltown – Badgery's Creek when it opens, to name just a few. A total of over 300 flights per week was also suggested. This type of commercial venture is not suitable for the Blue Mountains, a Heritage listed area.

The noise and visual impact on residents of the Blue Mountains chose to live there because of the beauty, peace and the fresh air. The air will no doubt be polluted with constant flights. There would be hundreds of flighs flying over this pristine area every day if this lease go ahead.

Already there has been a significant increase of aircraft flying over Medlow Bath in the past few months, residents are not happy about this.

What about the infrastructure in Medlow Bath. The road along Station Street is far too narrow to carry any extra traffic. If the operator, as I understand, will be having buses pick up passengers from the airfield and take them on tours of the Blue Mountains, the roads from Medlow Bath station need to addressed as to suitability.

Buses taking visitors to various lookouts, restaurants, and sightseeing trips will cause major disruption to the already limited parking in the Blue Mountains – more parking needs to be provided – but where.

This proposed lease does not only affect the residents of Katoomba, Medlow Bath & Blackheath it will affect all the suburbs in the lower Blue Mountains, plus residents from Sydney, Newcastle, Bankstown, Bathurst, Campbelltown, Wollongong with many extra helicopters flying over their suburbs.

Have the residents of these suburbs been informed of the impact this will have on their lifestyles?

The impact on the flora and fauna would be disastrous, with extra noise and pollution from the planes.

Has anyone given thought to how dangerous this would be with the possibility of helicopter accidents, which in could in turn start a major bushfire and destroy many homes, the flora and fauna of this beautiful area.

Medlow Bath residents source their water from Medlow Lake – the pollution that would settle on the lake would put residents at a high health risk.

Is this land available for lease?

The traditional land owners of the Blue mountains have been inhabited for millennia by the Gundungurra people, now represented by the Gundungurra Tribal Council Aboriginal Corporation based in Katoomba and the Lower Blue Mountains by the Darug people now represented by the Darug Tribal Aboriginal Corporation, have these land owners been consulted?

I understand the cost to maintain the airfield for EMERGENCY PURPOSES is \$80,000 per year. Residents of the Blue Mountains would be happy to have an extra \$1.00 added to their rates to maintain the airfield for either Council or National Parks to take care of the airfield and to keep the airfield for emergency purposes only. When residents hear a helicopter flying over it is usually a warning sign that there has been a terrible accident or bush fire and we are all on alert to listen to broadcasts. In the case of a bush fire residents need to be ready to go – the road out of Medlow Bath from Station Street is so narrow it would be difficult for everyone to escape. We do not want another Black Friday as Victoria had several years ago – SAFETY FIRST FOR ALL RESIDENTS.

I understand that Derek Taylor has amended his application to a 50 year lease – what IS HIS BUSINESS PLAN – residents should be told the truth before any lease is granted.

I have lived in Leura in the Blue Mountains for almost 18 years and before that, while living in Sydney, spent many hours bush-walking in the Blue Mountains National Parks and the World Heritage Area.

I strongly object to the Katoomba Airfield being handed over to private interests for helicopter tourism. This piece of land is surrounded by National Park and should be incorporated into the National Park with an allowance for emergency-use-only (bush-fires, etc) of the airfield.

This is public land and should -not- be leased for commercial use. In addition, the proposed use of the commercial lease - helicopter tourism

- would have a severe detrimental effect on both the environment, bird life and wildlife in the immediate vicinity of the airfield, as well as the noise pollution and visual impact that would destroy the peace of the Blue Mountains area in general. I have walked the Milford Track in New Zealand and the day crossing the Mackinnon Pass was completely ruined by buzzing sightseeing helicopters.

Apart from humans, the birdlife of the Blue Mountains would be severely impacted by increased helicopter activity. Observation during the 2018 honey-eater count indicated that helicopters involved in the site preparation for the Mt Solitary hazard reduction fire had an immediate negative impact on some migrating flocks. Birds 'disappeared from the sky' and numbers counted dropped. The bush surrounding the airfield supports winter feeding for migratory birds and helicopters landing and taking off would severely impact this activity.

The bush surrounding the airfield would be impacted by development of roads and buildings to support the additional traffic to the airfield.

This very sensitive and important ecological area should be incorporated into the National Park to be preserved forever.

Please accept my submission with regards to a recent lease application for Katoomba Airfield in Medlow Bath.

I am opposed to the lease application and firmly believe it conflicts with the World Heritage Values the very land it sits within.

I request that it please be included in the national park and given to NPWS to manage for emergency services only.

I would like to stress that I am offended by the approach your lease applicant has taken in that they are trying to scare the community into say yes to their proposal suggesting that without a commercialised Katoomba Airfield and their lease application people will die if a fire comes through.

It does not matter if emergency services take precedence simply because Katoomba Airfield does not matter. There are so many places that helicopters can land and be used for what is called a "Staging Area" that not having Katoomba Airfield is a moot point. A Section 42 allows the RFS to commandeer any location anyhow when needed.

This farcical white washing by your lease applicant makes it seems like they are here to save the mountains which is nothing short of insulting, they cannot save the mountains they will instead destroy it in my opinion.

Anyone who knows anything about firefighting knows that the Katoomba Airfield cannot be used for fixed wing firefighting simply because the runway is too short. The canopy of the Blue Mountains is so dense that only large area tankers can be used as they carry enough water or fire retardant with the necessary hitting capacity to break through the canopy. These planes come from Richmond. Elvis the large helicopters can land anywhere it will fit and they come from Bankstown some 18 minutes by air.

The bottom-line fires are fought on the ground and it is the dedication of the thousands of RFS firefighters located in the Blue Mountains. The Blue Mountains RFS are recognised as having more firefighters and firefighting resources and equipment than any other area in NSW. It is these dedicated men and women who fight the fires, aircraft can slow impede but cannot stop on their own.

I personally support and live by the amazing values that living in a World Heritage Area provides. Things like "Slow Food", "Fresh Air", "Natural Quiet", "Sustainable Living", respecting nature and preserving the many rare and unique species of flora and fauna the Greater Blue Mountains World Heritage Area represents and protects. Why would the government consider a lease application that puts this at risk...WHY?

Did the department conduct an environmental study to ascertain the impacts of noise and toxic fumes on flora, fauna and people?

I am afraid that if this lease application is approved the animals will all leave. The water and dams the aircraft will be flying over will be contaminated. The environment will be impacted by airborne toxic emissions and the tourist will not come back because the very thing they come here for the World Heritage Values and Natural Quiet will be gone forever.

Another criticism of your lease applicant is this one tree for one flight. Surely, I am not the only one who knows what green washing is?

When I went to the drop-in session I was forced to sit at a table and listen to stuff that never addressed my concerns. I saw another table with people I recognised, one of them a pilot that I know. How come I was not allowed to sit at that table. Why were we broken down into small groups were people being stereotyped? I heard in other meetings people all talked as one big group, what was wrong with the people that came to that first session in the evening that they were not allowed the same?

I have another question why did Crown Lands wait 21 months to engage the community about what might be a befitting use of land the people own, and you manage? Why when I came to the drop-in sessions and visited your website is there nothing about the business case and the number of flights needed to make a return on the investment and what sort of investment is proposed that a 50-year lease is merited. Surely not one the community will accept or ensures the natural values of the World Heritage.

I am a regular visitor to the Blue Mountains and go there to enjoy the peace and serenity of the area and to enjoy the World Heritage listed Blue Mountains National Park.

Things that concern me are as follows:

The UNESCO criteria of the Blue Mountains National Park are

- 1)To contain superlative natural phenomena or areas with exceptional natural beauty and aesthetic importance
- 2)To be outstanding examples representing major stages of earths history,including the record of life, significant on going geological processes in the development of landforms or significant geomorphic or physiographic features
- 3)To be outstanding examples representing significant on going ecological and biological processes in the evolution and development of terrestrial, fresh water, coastal and marine ecosystems and communities of plants and animals
- 4)To contain the most important and significant natural habitats for in-situ conservation of biological diversity,including those containing threatened species of outstanding universal value from the point of view of science or conservation.

Blue Mountains National Park fulfils all of these. Any use of the airfield that will have or is likely to have a significant impact on its World Heritage values would breach the (Commonwealth) Environmental Protection and Biodiversity Conservation Act. It would require a full environmental impact study and the approval of the Federal Minister for the environment. No such study has been done, nor any such approval given.

The major impact would be noise, especially from helicopters and low flying aircraft. This not only affects people like me who wish to enjoy the park in all its grandeur and spectacular scenery, but also the wildlife. The park protects a large number of threatened species. Australian record of extinction is very poor.

The airfield is within 10km's of Katoomba, Medlow Bath and Blackheath, all of which will be affected. No detailed flight paths have been made public and the operator simply states that they would not offer short trips (under 15 minutes) nor fly at night (except in an emergency). No undertaking is given as to the frequency of flights, or flight paths. There is no formal regulation to cover this, only an unenforceable voluntary agreement.

For these reasons I oppose the proposed use of the airfield (except for emergencies). It should be merged into the national park as should have happened in 2008.

I understand the NSW Department of Industry is considering a proposal to lease Crown land at Medlow Bath known as Katoomba Airfield - Reference 602686.

I am writing to formally oppose this development on the grounds that the effect of an airfield in the upper Blue Mountains, is inappropriate given it's world heritage status.

### My reasons as follows:

- While I accept the investment proposed may support tourism for a small number of operators and may benefit some sections of the local economy, it will also have a negative effect on the peace and tranquility of an internationally recognised wilderness.
- Low flying aircraft emit substantial noise pollution that significantly detract from the sense of place and this additional noise will have a dire effect on the people who currently enjoy the wilderness of the Blue Mountains.
- By definition, wilderness is the most intact, undisturbed wild natural areas left on our planet—those last truly wild places that humans do not control and have not developed with roads, pipelines or other industrial infrastructure. The word *wilderness* derives from the notion of "wildness"—in other words, that which is not controlled by humans. The frequent operation of low flying aircraft in a wilderness area is completely incompatible with the definitions and notions of wilderness.
- Joy flights are available to a few tourists with the means to purchase this service and will benefit a small number of tourism operators. The majority of tourists are looking for bush walking and other immersive wilderness experiences. It is not fair that the short term enjoyment of a few tourists can so adversely affect the enjoyment of the vast majority of Blue Mountains tourists.
- The residents of the upper Blue Mountains deserve better than having to experience the excessive noise of constant joy flights.
- The negative aspects of this development far outweigh the small number of positive benefits that the proposal might or might not produce and for this reason the propsed development must NOT be approved.

I encourage anyone considering approving this development to spend time in Blue Gum Forest, Mt Solitary, the Grand Canyon, Wentworth Falls and the various other places of extreme beauty, and consider the effect of low flying aircraft operating in the vicinity. Their experience would be very diminished.

On behalf of the Megalong Valley Pony Club (MVPC), I am writing in opposition of the commercialisation of the Katoomba Airfield and its lease to Flyblue.

The MVPC meets routinely on the 1st and 3rd Sunday of each month, on the Megalong Valley Showground, as it has done for many years.

We believe that use of the Katoomba Airfield as a base for a heli-tourism business is inappropriate as it would logically support a significant increase in helicopter flights over the local area which is prized by many people for its natural beauty, peace and quiet.

Helicopter flights are noisy and disruptive. Helicopters noise can frighten horses which presents a significant safety concern for the us and particularly the children riders at MVPC.

Further, a number of the members of the MVPC have chosen and travel to attend this club because of its quiet rural location. These members contribute economically to the local community each time they visit, in paying for accommodation and food. As a resident of the Blue Mountains, I am concerned about the effects that such a venture might have upon an area which is characterised by its status as a World Heritage listed National Park, and not just to the human residents of the area, but the flora and fauna, as well. At present, the Blue Mountains enjoys clean air, peace and quiet, and is home to a multitude of native species. The noise and pollution caused by commercial aircraft using the airspace could only ruin this.

Given the controversy surrounding the construction of the Western Sydney Airport in nearby Badgery's Creek and how that might affect the Blue Mountains, it seems outrageous to suggest allowing a commercial airstrip to operate within the area itself, however small.

The interim leaseholders, Derek and Floyd Larsen, insist that they would adopt a "fly neighbourly" policy to minimise noise impacts. A noble sentiment, and, no doubt, genuine, but exactly how they intend to enforce this remains to be seen. They might appreciate the impact of a helicopter flying low over nearby houses, but will every single pilot using the airfield have the same attitude? Will noisy operators be banned from using it again, or will they simply be told, "please don't do it again" repeated times?

It has also been stated that granting a commercial lease will not include approval for short-term joy flights into or out of the airfield. That might be the case right now, but should a commercial lease be granted, it will open the door for such disruptive flights to be approved in the not-too-distant future, when, perhaps, the leaseholders assume that "everyone's used to it by now", and see an opportunity to push their operations even further.

Given the location of the airfield, it seems only appropriate that it should be made a part of the National Park itself, so that it can be protected from future attempts at exploiting it for commercial gain at the expense of the environment, and to be used solely for emergency purposes.

I want to submit my personal feedback on the proposed lease of the Katoomba airfield for commercial purposes.

I ask the Department of Planning, Industry and Environment to incorporate the Katoomba airfield into the Blue Mountains national park (BMNP) at the end of the current lease, and restrict any air traffic from this airfield to medical, firefighting or other emergency activities only. Leasing this airfield to a commercial aircraft operator will result in excessive noise throughout the entire national park, and would be directly opposing the requirements for the BMNP to remain an UNESCO world heritage listed site.

The proposed lease of the Katoomba airfield to a commercial operator will result in dozens to hundreds of aircraft flights (small planes or helicopters) every day in high season, and hence project an immense noise level into the surrounding areas. As the NP is so widely spread, and valleys will reflect the aircraft noise, the experience to all ground-bound visitors will be seriously impacted by the noise, making it less appealing to find tranquility and a sense of remoteness. After all, the mountains are welcoming everyone to explore the area by foot, bike, or motorised vehicles along the many roads spreading across the plateau. I can not overstate how utterly damaging the noise of low-flying aircrafts would be to the qualities that make this national park so unique. Already, any high flying plane or helicopter flying above the mountains can be heard for many tens or hundreds of miles away, and adding low flying tourist aircrafts will destroy the atmosphere inherent to this area.

I am deeply concerned about the likely impact of the proposed business on the airfield site. An unspecified number of helicopter flights will take off from and land on that site, for the sole purpose of entertaining a handful of tourist visitors.

The proposed business will be of no benefit to local residents - the only result they will get is increased noise.

The proposed business will also be of no benefit to local business - very few jobs for locals will be created by the fun flights, while businesses that rely on general tourism may suffer. The millions of tourists and day-trippers who come to the Blue Mounatins every year visit the area to experience the World Heritage listed natural beauty, not to observe noisy helicopters flying overhead.

Helicopter noise travels far in the Blue Mountains. Recently, I was on a bush walk around the Hat Hill area in Blackheath, and could clearly hear and see a helicopter flying over Wentworth Falls, about 20 km in the distance. It was the only noise I could hear on an otherwise tranquil day. I have also in the past been disturbed by helicopter noise above my home in Katoomba, by helicopters taking scenic flights along the Three Sisters area. Noise travels far in the quiet mountains.

I am worried that a business which benefits only a handful of individuals and disturbs thousands of residents and millions of tourists may be allowed to go ahead.

I hope that that the Katoomba Airfield will instead become part of the National Park, and will be maintained for emergency use only. This way, both local tourism and local residents will benefit.

## A commercial airfield will jeopardise our major industry:

The Blue Mountains is famous for its natural environment and the outdoor experiences that it offers both visitors and locals. An estimated **1.25 million people undertake bushwalks** in the Blue Mountains each year.

Landing tourist helicopters and fixed winged aircraft within World Heritage-listed national park could jeopardise the Blue Mountains experience by:

- 1. **Impacting the reputation** of the Blue Mountains as a quiet and peaceful escape
- 2. Increasing noise pollution and reducing amenity for hikers, climbers and canyoners
- 3. Concentrating tourist dollars in fewer hands, taking business and JOBS AWAY FROM LOCALS. Tourists that arrive or depart by helicopter are much more likely to be dependent on a few operators for transport and accommodation
- 4. A decrease in reputation or 'wilderness experience' will logically result in fewer visits, meaning less spent at local cafes, pubs, shops and retail outlets or spent on supporting local culture and events.

## Lack of transparency and shonky bureaucracy:

- 1. Numerous government reports have recommended or anticipated the site should be returned to the National Park. Why has this process not occurred?
- 2. How can anyone properly engage in community consultation when we don't know the scale of the proposed helicopter tourism operation? The state government has steadfastly refused to release the numbers of flights and their frequency to the general public.
- 3. Flight paths have only been displayed at "drop-in" sessions at Hotel Blue, but do not include intended pathways beyond the immediate vicinity of the airfield. The proposed "hub and spoke" model means flights will head to the Central West. Do we know these flight paths? We do not. This model may also bring in other operators further increasing activity.
- 4. Why was the **community not consulted** by the state government about what kind of use was appropriate for such a sensitive site before they released a tender for a licence by direct negotiation (see Expression of Interest), and awarded it to a high-impact helicopter tourism business, when community groups had also applied?
- 5. Why has public land, used by the Rural Fire Service during fire fighting operations, been licensed to a private operator to manage primarily for profit rather than for the benefit of the community?

I was recently made aware that Katoomba Airfield may possibly be granted a commercial licence. It was good meeting you, and thank you for the opportunity of commenting on the proposal.

While I support the use of Katoomba Airfield as an emergency airstrip, I wish to protest the proposal of a commercial licence in the strongest possible terms.

As a long term resident of the Blue Mountains I am well aware of the noise and disruption caused by helicopters. Every fire season and bushfire helicopters make themselves useful - this is appropriate in that it is a direct benefit to the residents.

A commercial licence is in-appropriate for the following reasons:-

- 1. If 'Joy Flights' were permitted, the residents of Katoomba (population 7,964) and surrounding area would be subjected to between 6 and 8 hours of continuous noise **for each helicopter operating.** I live 7 km from the airstrip and, due to the topographical formations of this Heritage, I can still hear aircraft operating from the airstrip.
- 2. The only people benefiting from the granting of this licence would be the helicopter and fixed wing operators, the licence owner (I have been told this is two people?) and the passengers. There will be of no benefit to the locals. 7,964 to 2 seems like a very unfair ratio to me.
- 3. The promise of a Joy-Flight may be appealing to day tourists, but it is unlikely to create an increase the number of 'bums on beds' being booked in the Katoomba area. The best way to see the Blue Mountains Park has always been by 'Shanks' Pony'. One of the major tourist contributors to the Blue Montains are those who travel up here to experience the walks through this beautiful place. Helicopter noise with destroy their peace and quiet as well. And these people do contribute to putting 'bums on beds'
- **4. Local wildlife** <u>will be</u> **adversely affected** by the noise, pressure from the rotor cavitations and polution. Also, it is unknown what affect commercial use will have on other local environmental matters (ie: Hanging swamps, weed intrusion, groundwater contamination, etc. For example, The area around the airfield is a regular home to roosting Black Cockatoos.)
- 5. What damage will be caused by fuel exhaust? Anyone living under the flight paths at Sydney Airport will already be aware of the black, greasy, residue, caused by aircraft exhaust, on horizontal surface around their homes. While I understand that the scale of operations is different, what will happen to the gum trees and other vegitation when exposed to fuel dumps and exhaust fumes over an extended (long term) period of the lease?
- **6. All of the residents** I have spoken to migrated to the Blue Mountains to get away from the stink of petrol fumes, car noise, and the rush and turmoil of the city. They came here for solitude, and peace and quiet and to enjoy the clean air. Are we seriously going to let two petrol-heads, (who I am told don't even live in the Blue Mountains) destroy all that for the sake of greed?

The people of the Blue Mountains have worked long and hard to keep the area pristine and clear. We have said 'No!' to organisation like McDonalds from opening up fast-food outlets, and have instead encouraged and promoted Slo-Food, - why should this proposal, which is really only about 'money', be handled any differently.

Plans to establish a commercial airport at North Katoomba should be cancelled permanently.

Operations at the airfield and flight paths over the surrounding areas would grossly compromise the amenity, aesthetic and environmental values of the World Heritage National Park.

No matter how minor the impacts suggested by the applicants for the commercial airfield license, the potential to escalate the air traffic at the site will remain throughout the proposed 50 year lease.

The potential to have a legally established high-traffic small aircraft airport with supporting infrastructure with potential for major expansion (given the area of the site) poses an unacceptable risk to the integrity of world heritage values of the national park.

The use of fixed wing aircraft and helicopters for passenger flights will introduce noise pollution to the wilderness areas of the National Park.

A strong commercial incentive for the introduction of "tourist joyflights" over the National Park and along the cliff lines, which are purportedly ruled out at this stage, means permission for joyflights would be pursued relentlessly at every opportunity.

The risk remains that future government or court decisions could allow joyflights to be operated from the site, to the benefit of a few but detriment to the whole community, visitors and the tourism drawcard value of the National Park.

This would be a further disaster for the tourism value of the Blue Mountains World Heritage National Park due to the impact of aircraft noise and intrusion of helicopters into wilderness areas.

Any commercial benefit of lease payments to the government would be insignificant in the context of the potential damage by aircraft noise to the reputation and dollar value of tourism in the Blue Mountains and the State Government revenue it generates.

To allow this proposal to go ahead would be shortsighted environmental vandalism and commercially negligent.

The airfield should be returned to the National Park and maintained as a rescue and firefighting emergency facility only.

The World Heritage area should be left in peace forever for the benefit of future generations.


I would like to voice my disapproval of the plans for an air field at Medlow Bath.

I write to object to the use of Katoomba Airfield for commercial purposes, and to the grant of any lease over it. As you know, on 1 August the <a href="NSW Parliament">NSW Parliament</a> will debate its future. This is the result of over 12,000 people signing a petition objecting to its use as a commercial aerodrome.

Presently, the airfield is used only for bushfire fighting, and medical evacuations. The noise of flights taking off and landing, and flying overhead would severely impact the peace and tranquillity of the Blue Mountains.

The unique qualities of Blue Mountains are recognised by its status as a World Heritage Area. The Blue Mountains National Park's magnificent landform, the grandeur of its canyons, the variety of flora and fauna and birds, combined with the scenery, peace, and silence, make it a delight for residents and visitors alike. Flights overhead, or even nearby, would shatter all this. Here is a <u>sample of helicopter noise</u> in the mountains.

In 1999 the Blue Mountains City Council requested the Department of Land and Water Conservation that the airfield should be integrated into the National Park and flights cease, except for emergencies. This concept was reaffirmed by Blue Mountains Council again in 2008. Now a commercial operator, Flyblue, has been granted a licence by the Department to run joy flights and helicopter tours from Katoomba airfield. There is no way of controlling flight paths and the frequency of flights, as the ability to regulate them is minimal. The height restrictions are (500 feet) 150m above wilderness, and (1000 feet) 300m over houses

There has been no study of the environmental impact on birds, animals, or humans, and especially noise impact. No details have been released concerning the tender process, and the deeply-flawed public consultation process answered few questions. Once granted, the lease will secure the operator's tenure of the airfield for 50 years, opening the way for further commercial development, or even on-sale to another operator or developer.

Clearly, this lease should not be issued. Otherwise, all who reside in, or visit and enjoy this part of the Blue Mountains will have their peaceful amenity regularly disturbed.

I ask that Katoomba airfield be reintegrated into the Blue Mountains National Park, and managed solely by the National Parks and Wildlife Service.

It gave the impression that this group was supporting FLy Blues lease and activity.





As a resident of in the Upper Blue Mountains, I strongly object to public land being used for commercial purposes and therefore wish to outline my opposition to the proposed long term lease being granted to current leaseholder Fly Blue. In my opinion the land should be transferred in perpetuity to the National Park and appropriate funding found to allow its occasional use for emergency purposes only.

Crown land belongs to the public. As a former member of the Blue Mountains Croquet Club, I have had personal experience of what was once crown land in Clanwilliam Street, Blackheath being sold to the local bowling club, then to the RSL and finally sold again to a private developer. Where there was once a well tended Croquet lawn, available for community use, there now stands a weed infested wasteground, waiting for the opportunity for private profit. The community has lost out.

I do not believe that the operators of Fly Blue understand or are listening to community concerns. On their website, they mention their proposed fly neighbourly policy (though with no specificity) and proudly say that commercial aircraft will avoid built up areas. This simply means that flights would be directly over World Heritage wilderness areas, with consequent negative impact on native fauna and people walking through the National Park. They mention carbon off sets through tree planting, yet do not specify what type of trees they would plant or where. They mention the development of walking tracks around the airfield surely a joke, given the many walking tracks in the National Park. It reeks of box ticking, rather than a genuine attempt to understand what locals are saying - ie that this commercial airfield is not wanted or needed.

To make a commercial success of an airport on this site, given the weather patterns in the Mountains, there would have to be many flights scheduled on clear days, again to the detriment of those wishing to enjoy the peace of the wilderness. Helicopters flying over narrow valleys create an amazing amount of noise. The many tourists who currently visit the Blue Mountains come to experience the wilderness. They come to bush walk, to climb, to explore the canyons in this unique area and to enjoy the birds and animals here. It is not right that the short lived enjoyment of a few wealthy air travellers should override the enjoyment of the many who are prepared to experience the wilderness at first hand.

I understand that a previous venture flying helicopters commercially from this airfield was closed down because of the disruption to local residents. Nothing has changed. A long term lease for commercial purposes would not be in the community interest and should be rejected.

When I, and many people who live in the Mountains, hear the sound of a helicopter, I think 'danger'. We live in a bushfire prone area. The local fauna think the same. Helicopters mean stress. Or I think 'someone is hurt'. Again, a negative connotation. Constant helicopter noise means stress and danger and, only one letter away, 'anger'. There are so many threats to the Mountains at present - the Western Sydney Airport, the raising of the Warragamba Dam, the impact of mining on the Wollamgambe River within our World Heritage area. We do not want, or need, a further threat, which is how I see this proposal for a long term commercial lease of the Katoomba airfield.

Please reject the proposal and hand the land to National Parks to manage in perpetuity.

Thank you for the opportunity to make a submission regarding this issue, one which has generated huge concern in the local community and beyond.

I strongly believe that the Katoomba airfield should not be opened to commercial exploitation, especially of the form that will constitute an erosion of the very thing that draws people to the Mountains.

The Blue Mountains offers a resource which is neither visible nor tactile. This is "natural quiet" - not the total absence of sound, but the presence of everyday sounds made within a natural environment. Birdsong, rustle of leaves in breezes, animal and insect sounds, water flowing over rocks, all contained within a quiet environment unaffected by the harsh noises of mankind and it's machinery. Together with geological and natural majesty, this is one of THE major attractions of the Blue Mountains. People come to the Mountains as a refuge from the city. The artery of the Western Highway snakes through the area bringing its own noise and other problems, but importantly giving access to literally millions of city folk and overseas tourists who can by staying and walking in the area be refreshed by the majesty and "natural quiet" of the Blue Mountains.

This is not a resource to be squandered. It is much of the positive "brand" of the Blue Mountains, and should be strenuously defended.

I ask also that you think of the long term and not corrupt the ideals established by the creation of the Blue Mountains National Park - one of such stature that it is World Heritage listed. You have the power to maintain those ideals, to keep the bastion of the Park intact so that future generations can continue to appreciate its uniqueness. Short term commercial gains (via lease payments, airfield maintenance, some marginal tourism dollars etc) should not be the decision driver when set against less tangible but much deeper and longer term human needs.

And the unfairness of the proposal is acute. The proposed form of commercialisation will undoubtedly damage the commercial prospects of many people with established businesses in the area that rely on the peace-and-quiet Blue Mts brand that has been on offer for centuries. It would be giving with one hand but taking away with the other.

I certainly do not object to the use of this public land for use as an emergency airfield - this is something which is humane and which does not generate the noise and infrastructure concerns associated with a commercial helicopter operation. Indeed if there were funding concerns associated with this, for airstrip maintenance etc, I feel sure that the community would step forward with \$ and time to assist this.

I believe too that this "commercialisation" issue should not only be rejected, but the matter be put to bed once and for all by the crown land becoming protected via transfer to the National Park.

To whom it may concern,

As a resident of the Blue Mountains for the past twenty-two (22) years and in particular, a resident of Katoomba for the last twelve (12) years, I wish to lodge my strongest possible objection to the potential granting of a commercial lease over the Katoomba Airfield.

#### My reasons are:

- Expansion of the airfield operations to the extent required to achieve a satisfactory economical
  return for the lease holders, will irreparably damage the established tourism industry in the Blue
  Mountains that rely on the tranquil, passive engagement of visitors with the beauty and silence of
  our natural vistas.
- The Department, in granting the lease will effectively drive the tourists away to other more
  pleasing and amenable locations. This flies in the face of the millions of dollars the NSW State
  Government is pouring into the Blue Mountains to foster low impact tourism.
- Two timely examples of significant State funding were publicised in this week's Blue Mountains
  Gazette (Page 7, Wednesday 31<sup>st</sup> July 2019), where the NSW Environment Minister Matt Kean,
  visited the Mountains to highlight the initiatives of his Government:
  - Upgrading the cliff top walk between Wentworth Falls and Katoomba expected to take around four (4) years, the State Government has committed \$10 million to upgrade the 13.6km 'grand cliff top walk'.
  - The Minister also announced significant upgrades to the tourist facilities at Govett's Leap Lookout at Blackheath, an area that will be severely impacted on by the proposed flights paths out over the Grose valley.
- Tourists want to enjoy the silent beauty of these areas, not be bombarded by intrusive noise of helicopters taking off from and landing at Katoomba Airfield.

- Since the very first lease was granted back in the 1960's, the intent was always for the airfield site to be incorporated into the National Park and there are numerous studies, reports and minutes where this intent has been continuously reinforced over the intervening period.
- It beggars belief that your Department is prepared to ignore all the historical evidence for what at best is a questionable proposal with extremely limited benefits to the Blue Mountains community.
- There will be no substantial increase in employment opportunities at the airfield and certainly none
  arising from the few privileged high-end tourists who might enjoy a quick helicopter flight around
  the mountains to tick off items on their bucket list.
- There will certainly be no maintenance base at the airfield because this requires a highly specialised workforce of aviation engineers located away from the mountains.
- What the expanded airfield operations will bring to the mountains is a heightened bushfire risk because of the onsite storage of large volumes of highly flammable aviation fuel. A cursory search using the bushfire risk tool on the NSW Rural Fire Service (RFS) website shows that the entire airfield site is designated as Bushfire Prone Land (BFPL). This on a site where town-water supply is all but non-existent. In fact, whenever the airfield is occasionally used by the RFS for firefighting operations, they must bring in vast quantities of water by road tankers.
- Storing the large volumes of aviation fuel required to support the expanded operations also poses a significant risk of ground-water contamination in an area that falls within the Upper Blue Mountains Water Catchment.
- This was highlighted as far back as 2000 when the then Department of Land & Water Conversation
   (DLWC) undertook a formal Lands Assessment and specifically called out the risk of onsite aviation
   fuel storage.
- The Department even went further and stated in a draft document put on public exhibition that
  the expansion of operations at the airfield was clearly inconsistent with the findings of its Land
  Assessment.
- Even the RFS does not see the airfield as a significant piece of infrastructure for their operations. They are spoilt for choice in relation to more suitable landing areas throughout the mountains for their fire-fighting helicopters. In the years I have lived at my current address, the RFS has used the old Katoomba Golf Course site for helicopter operations because it has what the Katoomba Airfield site lacks a permanent onsite water source by way of a large dam that is always full.
- The economic risks; the tourism impact risks; the water contamination risks; the bushfire risks; the
  lack of any real employment opportunities; and by far the environmental risks to the pristine
  Greater Blue Mountains World Heritage Area are just too great to allow such a damaging venture
  to proceed.

• Your Department has a unique, once in a generation opportunity to make a significant contribution to 'Destination NSW', by denying this lease application and incorporating the Katoomba Airfield site into the National Park, as was always the intention.

- The limited capacity of Department of Industry as the lessor to influence or manage the potential significant of site impacts of the proposed aviation enterprise.
- The lack of prior discussion with other government stakeholders such as the Blue Mountains City Council, National Parks and Wildlife Service, Water NSW, NSW Emergency Services, NSW Rural Fire Service and Blue Mountains City Council. These agencies are well placed to identify options and alternatives for use and provide information on potential risks or concerns with the proposed use of the site and the wider impacts.

In order to make an informed decision on future use of the site I believe the community should be presented with a set of options for consideration prior to a decision on the current lease proposal These options could include

- 1 Do Nothing (No lease or licence) Department of Industry or National Parks and Wildlife Service responsible for essential land management eg Biosecurity Duty of care
- 2. Maintain emergency airstrip. Land retained by Government (Dept of Industry or National Parks and Wildlife Service) Maintenance and upgrade of Airstrip funded by NSW Govt (for example using the Bushfire Risk Mitigation funding)
- 3. Commercial use with maintenance of airstrip as a lease condition.

For each option there must be a discussion of the potential benefits and drawbacks. These should be considered in view of the context of the site and the how the proposed use is distributed across the Blue Mountains World Heritage Area and the Grose and Wilderness Areas. , the amenity of local residents, the projected impacts on local businesses, the enjoyment of tourists and bushwalkers and the full range of potential impacts on wildlife and water supply.

To enable effective discussion there must be clarity around

- what is proposed;
- the various steps in the approval process for the full proposal; and
- who has key responsibility at each stage for making decisions or granting approval.

I do not believe it is sufficient for the Department of Industry (as the lessor and a key NSW Govt agency ) to defer questions about potential future impacts entirely to subsequent processes. If there is a proposal for commercial use of the site the community needs to have a clear understanding of the proposed nature and scale of the proposal before they are able to make an informed choice on their support for this option.

My preferred option for the site would be incorporate the land into the National Park with additional funding provided to the National Parks and Wildlife Service to enable retention and upkeep of the airstrip for emergency use.

The proposed lessees of the airport see this as an entrepreneurial opportunity. They have the credentials, energy, resources and local community commitment. The problem is not their proposal. The issue is one of trust in government to execute a transaction that is in the community's best long term interest.

The proposed privatisation of the airport has a context of Government wanting to achieve certain outcomes be they efficiency, investment, regional tourism services, improved emergency services, local employment etc. Such objectives need to be clearly articulated with clear strategies to make sure these desired outcomes are defined and assured. If the primary driver is the development of regional tourism then where is the regional tourism plan that supports this objective. Are these flights to Mudgee restaurants for example the type of tourist activities that the plan seeks to develop. Is this airport the best facility for such service. Where is the planning context?

Government also needs to be clear as to what it seeks to avoid. This could include avoiding noisy sightseeing joy flights over the wilderness that is the main regional tourism attraction. Where is the policy frameworkto achieve this. Other operators fly to the area from say Bankstown. How will all flights over the wilderness be controlled. What is the overall approach that then guides how to restrict the subject license/lease. In this context it should not only consider sightseeing flights but also the impact of flights to destinations in the region. eg lets avoid further noisy flights from the Wolgan Valley Hotel to drop into the Megalong tearooms leaving the Copter engines roaring much to the detriment of other patrons. How do you regulate such noise pollution - re hours of operation, destination, routes over wilderness ,flight height, noise level of aircraft etc. ?. Noise pollution is my primary concern. I am sure the proposed lessees have the same interests . I nevertheless would like appropriately detailed assurances that survive any tranfer of the business to new owners even if such new owners need to meet strict acceptance criteria under the terms of the lease.

Apart from clarifying what the government wants or does not want in considering this transaction on behalf of the community, government should make sure that the process is transparent and generates trust. For the lessees to operate effectively in a community they need to be trusted by that community. Government process plays a big part in generating trust.

- > Government should explain why a negotiated approach will produce better outcomes than a open tender approach.
- > Government should explain how it will achieve the desired outcomes and avoid problems through the conditions of the lease.
- > Government should also explain the tenor and pricing of the lease. This is a public asset and the oft used excuse of 'its commercial in confidence' simply does not wash with the community. It is arguable the lease should be say 20 years with conditional 10 year extensions thereafter. Investment decisions are made for 20 year investment horizons and restricting the license to such duration would make sense. There is nevertheless considerable value to the lessees in ultra long leases in a very low interest environment (future cash flows discounted to today's value would be discounted at a lower rate) and this value is best captured in the extension pricing set at the time of lease extensions.
- > there is considerable evidence available that privatisations of public assets/services fall short of desired outcomes due to the impact of unforseen developments. eg with climate change the emergency services use of the facility may dramatically increase this should not lead to unreasonable cost; there may be a desire to open the airport to other users at reasonable cost; accidents may lead to a desire to reduce the level of services. The lease should maximise government flexibility to adjust operations under the lease without incurring very high costs > government should explain how the lease will be monitored and how it has built -in corrective action triggers in the lease to achieve community expectations. The lessee could also assist in this regard by having a trusted community member on its Board or agreeing to regularly engage with the community. They are custodians of a community asset.

Community distrust is founded on years of jobs for the boys soft corruption , use of commercial in confidence to frustrate transparency, lack of lease or license enforcement , public purse bailouts, spin etc. In this case it should not be difficult to build immediate and long term trust through transparency and competent governance.

I write (cc Blue Mountains Gazette) regarding the consideration being given to the use of the old airfield at Medlow Bath for aviation tourism. I write in strong opposition to that possibility, for a range of reasons. These include:

- 1. That is crown land, or public land, and it is objectionable that it should be leased out for commercial purposes;
- 2. This is all the more so given that one of the great attractions of living in the Blue Mountains (and one of the main reasons that I left Sydney to live here ten years ago), is the freedom from noise pollution, and particularly of overflying aircraft. If the proposal is for 'aviation tourism', this means that we are not simply to be subject to aircraft flying over at 30,000 feet, but doing frequent circuits. In addition, it seems likely that the aircraft will include, or consist of helicopter traffic, which is a very different proposition from civilian aircraft overflights. The Care-flight helicopters are providing an essential service in cases of medical emergency. But as they demonstrate, low level helicopters generate much more noise, and if they are to be serving as sight-seeing vehicles, we can assume they will be flying circuits rather than 'as-the-crow-flies' Care-flights to the hospital. Given they can also hover, we are talking about an extremely obnoxious acoustic intrusion, dense with low frequency sound which has scientifically demonstrated pernicious effects on health (see for example Colin H. Hansen's 2005 collection of peer-reviewed academic research, 'The Effects of Low-Frequency Noise and vibration on People' (Multi-Science Publishing, Essex, UK).
- 3. In the context of the current climate change emergency, it is relevant to add that helicopters are among the most fuel-inefficient form of aviation transport.

But whether we are discussing more conventional light aircraft or helicopters, that a proposal for 'aviation tourism' should be under consideration over a World Heritage listed national park, with a significant residential population, is, frankly, outrageous. I would propose that a working strip be retained at the airfield for emergency purposes only, but apart from that, the crown land be transferred in perpetuity to the national park.


I have only observed emotive and predominantly exaggerated arguments against the proposal.

<u>Noise</u> - We live in the Upper Blue Mountains at Leura close to the cliff line which would be the target of joy flights due to the scenic appeal of the area. The quiet enjoyment of this high quality scenery is important to both residents and the thousands of tourists that undertake bush walks and visits to the many lookouts. The noise generated by joy flights would have a serious detrimental impact on the local tourist industry with many small businesses, such as cafes and shops, dependent on the scenic appeal of the area.

<u>Emergency Services</u> - There is already considerable air traffic in the area at times of bush fires and in connection with road accidents and other medical transfers. The community understands the need for this and knows that essential air traffic may well lead to the saving of lives or reduction in property loss. Joy flights do <u>not</u> come into this category. Also plans to open up areas for different clubs, as stated in their web site.


They will also have a Fly Neighbourly Policy, also that policy is outlined on their Web site.

We wish to object to the proposed leasing of crown land at Medlow Bath occupied by Katoomba airfield. We are residents of Wentworth Falls and have lived here for over 30 years. Our objections are as follows:

## 1. Impact on National Park and World Heritage area

We believe that the granting of this lease to Fly Blue will severely impact the intrinsic value of the Blue Mountains National Park and World Heritage Area. Although the proposed flight paths directly avoid the townships of the Upper Blue Mountains, these flight paths both in and out bound are in our opinion still precariously close to the townships and therefore aircraft noise would certainly impact on the residents. These proposed flight paths will also negatively impact on the enjoyment of tourists who come to the Blue Mountains to seek refuge from a noisy and busy city. We have had personal experience of the negative impact of helicopter noise in the National Parks of the South Island of New Zealand.

In addition, it is likely that the helicopter noise will severely impact on the behaviour, physiology and psychology of both native and domestic animals. Research has shown that anthroprogenic noise such as that emitted from a helicopter can result in a cascade of secondary stressors such as increasing the ambiguity in received signals or causing animals to leave a resourceful area (in:- *Anthroprogenic Noise as a Stressor in Animals in International Journal of Comparative Psychology A.J. Wright et al.*, 2007). This alone would have a negative if not disastrous consequence particularly on the wildlife that reside within the National Park and World Heritage Area. Anthroprogenic noise not only affects the behavioural responses of animals but has also been shown to affect both their physiological and psychological response (*A.J. Wright et al.*, 2007). Stress in both of these forms has also been shown to have major delitious effects on reproductive performance, growth and development and immune function (in *Physiological Adaptations to Acute Stress in the Ewe RE Newman 1995, MSc Thesis University of Wollongong*). Therefore, it is almost certain that helicopter noise particularly at times of landing and take off will indeed impose both an acute and chronic secondary stress on the local wildlife.

## 2. Impact on Tourism

We consider that the noise generated by aircraft potentially using FlyBlue's facility will negatively impact on the economic viability of other local tourist operators. This impact would be felt through loss of tourist numbers as a consequence of the adverse effect of aircraft noise, particularly in areas close to the landing and takeoff points such as the Grand Canyon. The Blue Mountains relies on tourism as a mainstay for its viability and any activity that potentially reduces tourist numbers will be sorely felt within the Mountain communities.

### 3. Return of airfield to National Park

We understand that the airfield was excised from the National Parks and Wildlife Service in the 1960s on the condition it be returned in 1988 at the expiration of the lease. The department of Land and Water Conservation also recommended in 2000 that the land be returned to the National Parks Estate. These actions and recommendations were proposed by government departments and not made at the whim of an

individual or vested interest group Therefore, the decision to return the airfield to the National Parks sys	stem
would have been assessed on well-founded principles. Surely these principles still apply today.

For over 30 years, thousands of meditators have enjoyed the tranquility of the Blue Mountains while practicing Vipassana at Dhamma Bhumi. Now the silence is threatened by the proposed lease of Katoomba airfield to a commercial flying operator. The airfield is about seven kilometres from the Centre. The operator would run commercial flights, including scenic helicopter tours, over the Blue Mountains. The licence is unrestricted, so that the flight paths and frequency of flights is entirely up to the operator with no further oversight or control.

The issue extends beyond the Centre. The Blue Mountains is a listed World Heritage area, noted for the grandeur of its mountain scenery, its abundant wildlife, and its peaceful silence. It is rare to have such beautiful and unique wilderness so close to a major population centre like Sydney. It is an amenity which needs to be protected. It is visited by people from Sydney and overseas to relax, to retreat from the pressures and noise of daily life, and to enjoy nature undisturbed. In addition to the local community Vipassana students are just some of the many who would be affected.

At present, the Katoomba Airfield is used just for emergency services. Between 1992-95, when a commercial lease was previously issued, it was mis-used and subsequently operations were closed down. When that lease expired, it was agreed that the airfield be returned to being part of the Blue Mountains National Park, but this never happened.

Meditators now have the prospect of low aircraft or helicopter flights directly over the Centre. While flights are meant to be above 1000 feet (30m) above residential areas, and 500 feet (15m) elsewhere, there is no enforcement process and a pilot can claim safety, poor weather etc.

The impact would be enormous, not only because of the noise, but also the loss of privacy, with overhead viewing. The Centre's solitude and natural environment could be invaded on a regular basis.

The proposed lease is to be granted by the NSW Government Department of Lands. The government's own guidelines require that before such a lease is granted:

- its impact on the current community use and enjoyment of the land be considered,
- community engagement be transparent, conducted openly, fosters respect and trust, and is professional, honest and consistent.
- local communities have the opportunity to be involved and local voices heard.

Yet to date, no information has been offered about the flight paths, the frequency, and the number of flights. Clearly this is inadequate consultation.

I would like to make a comment about the granting of a commercial license to Fly Blue to operate Katoomba Airfield. These are my own personal comments and do not represent an official statement or position of any organisation that I may have an association with.

I live in North Katoomba with the centre of the runway being 2.1km from my house. For this reason I feel that its fair to say that my house is close enough to be impacted by any operations that are proposed by this license. I fully support the granting of a license to operate Katoomba Airfield for commercial operation. The proposal and plans submitted by Fly Blue has more than adequately addressed the proposed use, and their plans for the airfield.

I would draw your attention to the following points when considering the application and granting of a commercial lease/license.

- The Airfield has been used and active for at least 50 years, during this time it has offered a facility that has greatly served the community and the public safety organisations that are here to protect not only our built assets but the broader environment and heritage area. Almost any person including myself has purchase property in this area knowing full well the airfield exists and is active.
- Very little weight should be given to any petitions or gathering of support by conservation agencies that are also likely to be considered in this process. These campaigns seem to be lead by individuals that have a vested interest in the airfield not operating. The information that was expressed by the people collecting petitions was simply untrue and was deliberately misleading the public into opposition. When these groups were challenged on the facts of what they were expressing they became very hostile. Most people who were asked to sign this petition are unlikely to be affected by this proposal and were simply too afraid to say no base don misleading information being expressed.
- I have good understanding of emergency services aviation operations holding qualifications and skills to manage emergency airbases. Whilst Katoomba has been used previously for emergency operations, a good base requires more than just a place land and operate. To be an effective emergency operations base the site ideally needs to have supporting infrastructure including but not limited to Sealed runways and grass landing areas, Power, Water, Toilets Heavy Support Vehicle access, Terminal buildings or areas of shelter for aircrews and Airbase personnel. The notion that the facility could just exist as it is without further investment, and serve as an effective airbase for emergency operations is ill informed.
- The Airfield needs to operate as commercial entity to ensure that the area is maintained and that environmental issues are managed. The notion that the airfield should be managed by National Parks is clearly not practical. They already have too many assets and not enough funding. This space should continue to exist, but should not be a burden on the tax payers of NSW
- Commercial joy flights already occur everyday over the Blue Mountains and aircraft land in the South of Katoomba on most days and sometimes more than once a day. The simple fact is that not having an airfield has no impact on the ability for operators to conduct flights over the Greater Blue Mountains.
- There is no research that aircraft noise from flying aircraft at a reasonable height has any adverse affect on wildlife and this reflected by the fact that there is no regulation or requirement for aircraft to fly above a certain height above conservation lands in Australia.

• The noise impact of aircraft landing at Katoomba Airfield is very minimal, and this will be even less based on the mitigation strategies proposed by Fly Blue. The nature of the noise form aircraft is short in duration and limited to daylight hours. There is far more constant noise generated by roads and rail lines than that of the airfield.

In Summary I believe that based on its historical use, minimal impact to the environment and a well communicated management plan that the license should be granted to operate Katoomba Airfield. I would be happy for more activity to occur than what is currently proposed, and would not like to see the lease and license terms to be restricted to the current management plans, as this would limit the investment that this or future entities will invest in the airfield.

The Crown Lands and Fly Blue should be commended for the open, transparent and equitable process that been undertaken so far and is very undeserving of the criticism and grubby campaign that has been led by other community organisations.

The current proposal will have several deleterious effects upon the amenity of the village of Medlow Bath, the experience of visiting international tourists, local bushwalkers, canyoners and rock climbers and the Blue Mountains' unique wildlife and environment. There has been no information provided as to the frequency of fixed wing or helicopter take-offs or landings at the airfield but to become commercially viable, the frequency will be significant!

helicopters are particularly noisy, and will echo up and down the valleys and off the cliff faces. It will undoubtably plague the million or so outdoor enthusiasts who use this area, and come here for the beauty, peace, and serenity that is obtainable here.

We have already seen an increase in helicopter rescues that occur on a regular basis, truck highway noise( this can easily be heard in Blue Gum forest, so I dread to think of multiple helicopters thumping away overhead!), and associated fuel pollutants. The effect of these pollutants on the flora and fauna of the area also remains unknown. This is crown land and should be accessible for everyone, not to a commercial group, so they can make money. The land should be allocated to national parks, with emergency access when needed.

If tourists wish to see the valley, upgrade a lookout, put in a new walking track, don't just cater for the rich people with very expensive flights.

We have so little of this wilderness left, we need to protect it.

## **Reasons for objections**

## **Detrimental effects on the Local Tourism Industry**

The Blue Mountains is famous for its natural environment and the outdoor experiences that it offers both visitors and locals.

An estimated 1.25 million people undertake bushwalks in the Blue Mountains each year.

Landing tourist helicopters and fixed winged aircraft within World Heritage-listed national park could jeopardise the Blue Mountains experience by:

- 1. Impacting the reputation of the Blue Mountains as a quiet and peaceful escape
- 2. Increasing noise and reducing amenity for hikers, climbers and canyoners
- 3. Concentrating tourist dollars in fewer hands. Tourists that arrive or depart by helicopter are much more likely to be dependent on a few operators for transport and accommodation. i.e. There is benefit to a small few and a significant detriment to the greater good.

4. A decrease in reputation or 'wilderness experience' will logically result in fewer visits, meaning less spent at local cafes, pubs, shops and retail outlets or spent on supporting local culture and events.

#### The Environment

Katoomba Airfield is completely surrounded by the Greater Blue Mountains World Heritage Area. Within 5km of the airfield there are over 3000 native species, including those listed as endangered.

- 1. The Blue Mountains World Heritage Area is up for review later this year. It's status may be effected by the proposed OVER USE.
- 2. Damage to rare hanging swamp habitat caused by runoff and erosion from increased traffic on the unsealed section of Grand Canyon Road and the tarmacing of the runway
- 3. The potential impact of Helicopters on Blue Mountains Wildlife and other World Heritage Values

### Lifestyle and amenity

The livability of upper Blue Mountains towns and villages is likely to be impacted by:

- 1. An increase in helicopters and associated noise pollution—we already have issues with scenic flights over the area conducted by other operators. However, those helicopters do not land in or take off from within the World Heritage Area.
- 2. Helicopter noise can travel long distances in an acoustically-sensitive environment dominated by cliffs and canyons, potentially affecting parts of North Katoomba, Medlow Bath and Blackheath and other areas in earshot of the flight paths.
- 3. Any Fly Neighbourly Policy is self-regulated. The policy does not, at the admission of the lease applicant, include aircraft that do not originate from Katoomba Airfield, so that would include many arrivals.
- 4. Increased traffic along the route to the airfield (including fuel tankers and airport runway building equipment) on a narrow local road and walking path. The road is not designed for large vehicles (Station Street, Rutland Road and Grand Canyon Road).

### Concerns about the bureaucratic process

- 1. Numerous government reports have recommended or anticipated the site should be returned to the National Park yet this recommendation has been ignored.
- 2. The scale of the proposed helicopter tourism operation is unknown, preventing proper community consultation. The NSW State Government has refused to release the numbers of flights and their frequency to the general public.
- 3. Flight paths have only been displayed at "drop-in" sessions at Hotel Blue (on weekdays only). These do not include intended pathways beyond the immediate vicinity of the airfield. The proposed "hub and spoke" model means flights will head to the Central West. We do not know the flight paths. This model may also bring in other operators further increasing activity.
- 4. There has been **no proper due diligence or transparency in the tender process**. The community was not consulted by the NSW State Government about what kind of use was appropriate for such a sensitive site before releasing a tender for a licence by direct negotiation. The licence was awarded to a high-impact helicopter tourism business. I understand community groups also applied.
- 5. The airport is public land, used by the Rural Fire Service during fire fighting operations, however it has now been licensed to a private operator to manage primarily for profit rather than for the benefit of the community?

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

I attained my Pilots Certificate in 2007 having conducted all of my flight training at YKAT with Hay Air,s Rod Hay. I am a current Committee Member of The Blue Mountains Aero Club and as such I have over the course of the intervening years spent many hours at the airfield and have done lots of work maintaining the runways and have made many many friends there with lots of interesting people from all over the world. Including Australias own Dick Smith who was accompanied by America,s first man to break the sound barrier, Colonel Chuck Yaeger, whom was suitably impressed by the magnificent scenery afforded him by flying into the area in Mr Smiths helicopter.

One of our local pilots / aircraft owners and Blue Mountains Aero Club member is also the First Australian to summit Mt Everest,

I currently live at which is just west of Lithgow and do most of my flying out of Bathurst due to YKAT not currently supporting fixed wing operations. I am hoping this will change very soon and I am hoping to be able to hanger our aeroplane in fresh new facilities at YKAT.

The safety benefits of YKAT to the broader aviation community cant be stressed enough when traversing the Blue Mountains from either Sydney to the states west (Bathurst / Dubbo) or from the South (Wollongong) to the North of the state Central Coast and beyond.

YKAT is like a Aircraft Carrier in the middle of the ocean. If needed due to mechanical failure or stress of weather, YKAT is THE only option.

The anti-YKAT lobby have stated the field be used ONLY as an emergency field. This is fanciful at best. The field needs to be maintained in a fully operational state at all times. If it is not being run by a full time operator it will very quickly turn into a night time drag strip and dumping ground for burnt out stolen cars and household rubbish and building waste just adding to the threat off fire.

There is NO WAY National Parks and Wildlife or Council will ever want to or spend tax payers money on keeping that sort of thing out of the site and the runways ready for emergency use.

- 1. Under no circumstances should commercial helicopter flights or fixed wing sightseeing flights be allowed over the Greater Blue Mountains World Heritage Area or its environs. Such flights would have a totally unacceptable impact on nearby residents and on those seeking to enjoy all the benefits of a National Park: peaceful contemplation of nature at its most beautiful. However, It is the responsibility and duty of all tiers of government to protect our World Heritage areas from exploitation and overuse.


The outdoors community that enjoys, respects and treasures the blue mountains does not welcome this deafening noise and unwelcomed intrusion.

In regards to the lease of katoomba airfield Ref: 602686,

I currently am in development of the Elazair as demonstrated by Dale Kramer of Canada, these light aircraft allow for the optimal use of electric technology in a effort to reduce the requirement on fossil fuels, development of these light aircraft are in essence a proof of concept that then can be scaled up to include all light recreational aircraft.

Currently my only option to test these aircraft is ryelstone airpark, this is counter to my efforts as accessing ryelstone from my home in faulconbridge means a 2.5h drive hauling the aircraft up in my 4wd, at a environmental cost of aproxmiatly 80L of lpg I would be best continued use of the 2stroke engines and fly at my local private airstrip to which is not suitable for strip testing.

If we opened up katoomba airfield to comercial use i would be in a prime position to establish a base to which I could leave my aircraft and develop the technology, as the airstrip is over 1400m long I would be able to do extensive strip testing without concerns of aborted take offs.

I understand the issues raised by the local comunity and would agree that flight operational time restrictions and exclusion zones would be a appropriate as mandated by many airfields but commercial use is necessary for the upkeep of the airfield thus there must be some providions made for comercial interest.

Further to this katoomba is perfectly located for light aircraft emergency or rest area on the way out of Sydney, on many occasions we would land at katoomba for coffee on our way to scone or Bathurst, remember that most of the light recreational aviation fly at a maximum speed slower than that of cars on the highway, reducing the capacity of the airfield will put light aircraft pilots and passengers in undue risk.

As for local interest I believe if managed correctly this is a prime gateway to the local area, I feel that many tourists shy away from visiting katoomba for its proximity from Sydney and if we were able to offer charter from bankstown to katoomba it will bennift the local economy.



### Katoomba Airfield Issues

In the 1960's Katoomba Airfield was excised from the Blue Mountains National Park on the basis that it would be returned in 1988. However this never happened. In 1999 the Council objected to the renewal of its lease, requesting that it be returned to the National Park. Recently its main use has been for bushfire fighting and medical evacuations.

2000 and 2008 NSW state Department of Land and Water Conservation undertook two assessments involving community consultations on the long-term future of the site. The Department concluded, supported by Blue Mountains City Council and the National Parks and Wildlife Service, that the land should not be commercially leased and that the site be incorporated into the Blue Mountains National Park on the expiry of the existing lease in 2008 and used only for emergency and bushfire air operations. The current commercial lease process is in direct contradiction of the land assessments and consultations carried out in the past.

On February 1st 2018 the Department granted a flying licence to Flyblue after a tender process which has never been made public. There was no public consultation.

The Blue Mountains National Park (BMNP) is a World Heritage Area. The UNESCO criteria include:

- to contain superlative natural phenomena or areas of exceptional natural beauty and aesthetic importance;
- to be outstanding examples representing major stages of earth's history, including the record of life, significant on-going geological processes in the development of landforms, or significant geomorphic or physiographic features;
- to be outstanding examples representing significant on-going ecological and biological processes in the evolution and development of terrestrial, fresh water, coastal and marine ecosystems and communities of plants and animals;

• to contain the most important and significant natural habitats for in-situ conservation of biological diversity, including those containing threatened species of outstanding universal value from the point of view of science or conservation.

BMNP fulfils all of these. Any use of the airfield that will have or is likely to have a significant impact on its World Heritage values would breach the (Commonwealth) Environmental Protection and Biodiversity Conservation Act. It would require a full Environmental Impact study and the approval of the federal Minister for the Environment. No such study has been done, nor any such approval given.

The major impact would be noise, especially from helicopters and low-flying aircraft. This not only affects all those who wish to enjoy the park in all its grandeur and spectacular scenery, but also the wildlife. The park protects a large number of threatened, rare and restricted species. Australian record on extinction is very poor.

The airfield is within 10 kilometres of the townships of Katoomba, Medlow Bath and Blackheath, so also of the Centre, all of which would be affected. No detailed flight plans have been made public, and the operator simply states that they would not offer short trips (under 15 minutes) nor fly at night (except in an emergency). No undertaking is given as to the frequency of flights, or flight paths. There is no formal regulation to cover this, only an unenforceable voluntary agreement.

The BMNP is described in its plan of management as:

of particular importance because of its spectacular scenery, the diversity of natural features and environments and its role in contributing to a comprehensive, adequate and representative conservation reserve system within the Sydney Basin bioregion and its importance in contributing to the corridor of natural lands along the Great Escarpment (Ollier, 1982). The park protects an unusually wide range of plant and animal species and communities, as well as a large number of threatened, rare and restricted species.

Other conservation values of the park include the range of Aboriginal sites and historic places protected in a natural environment. Blue Mountains National Park is also of importance as a major water catchment area for Sydney. The park is a major focus for domestic and international tourism as well as for many types of recreation in a natural environment. These range from the passive enjoyment of the park's scenery from easily accessible cliff-top lookouts, to more active wilderness experiences in the park's many canyons and gorges. The large remote areas of the park are of special significance in offering opportunities for both the maintenance of natural processes and self-reliant recreation. https://www.environment.nsw.gov.au/research-and-publications/publications-search/blue-mountains-national-park-plan-of-management

The Department has a community engagement policy, but this process has been deeply flawed. Public drop-in sessions have been held, but the rooms were too small, and the public's comments were not recorded as they should have been. The department's submission form is misleading.

The airfield property is zoned E3 (environmental conservation under the Blue Mountains Local Environment Plan) and an aerodrome is not a permitted use.



The main reason I go there is to escape the city environment and spend the weekend somewhere quiet. This benefit will no longer exist once the joy flights start. There are likely many others like me that will be less likely to visit the Blue Mountains with the prospect of aircraft constantly overhead.

The proposal seems great for FlyBlue but terrible for the community. The flights will no doubt be popular and FlyBlue will make a lot of money. However, the cost to the community is far too significant. Community members will see the enjoyment of their land decrease substantially with the addition of regular aircraft noise overhead. As mentioned above, tourists and weekend traffic will decrease substantially as the main value of the Blue Mountains to tourists is a "peaceful oasis" or pristine natural environment away from city noise. So you have a small group of people benefiting and a large group suffering for no benefit to them.

I completely adhere to the community opinion that: -1. Public land should remain out of the hands of private investors 2. The land ought be transferred into the hands of National Parks and Wildlife as it is (a) geographically commensurate, & (b) already has an environmental conservation management structure (as part of the Blue Mountains National Parks). 3. A viable working dirt strip is all that is required for occasional emergency fire and ambulance access. Furthermore however, I would like to speak for those who cannot speak for themselves - the wildlife. The local Newspaper last week postulated that if actioned, the strip would have a quiet zone allocated to flight paths. Of course that consideration is for the exclusive benefit of the humans which surround the airstrip. It deliberately punishes the wildlife who can't complain, can't petition and who suffer in silence. I am a wildlife rescue and rehabilitation officer. I also happen to ite the landing and transfer site for all local helicopter rescues. So I am not suggesting aircraft noise might have a detrimental effect on wildlife, I am advising you of the fact that it does have a detrimental effect. Because I see it. Helicopter pre-landing surveillance loop, then landing, transfer, warm-up and takeoff afterwards is deafening if you happen to be within 50m. Again, I am not being metaphorical. You can NOT stand outside during the process without ear protection, even if that is as makeshift as jamming your fingers in your ears. The unlucky possums, gliders and joeys I happen to have in my care at the time become hysterical with fear at helicopter proximity. They bang about in their cages

trying to escape or, for the larger macropods, rocket under bushes in terror. This noise level establishes a flight-of-fright physiological reaction; flooding them with adrenalin, elevating their stress cortisol levels, altering brain chemistry, changing

diurnal rhythms, impinging on reproductive cycles and, for the already sick, it can push them to cardiac arrest.

All while I watch helplessly.

Humans have removed the ecology on which they depend. We have paved their homes in order to set up our homes, and established industries which poison their air and water. We run over their mothers. We poison them with rat bait.

If you have <u>any</u> doubt as to the horrendous impact of humanity on our national wildlife, ask National Parks and Wildlife for the statistics they keep on how many native animals are brought into care every year. The answer is thousands, of every species.

Removing even more of their dwindling natural habitat in the call for promoting private tourist joy flights, would be the most callous action. They can't tell you. They can't object. They just die.

(And for those who would argue that there is plenty more bush for them to move to, away from the noise... I'd remind them of the idea that the North Atlantic could never be fished out.) The bush is far from "endless" anymore.

From an ethical standpoint, there are some actions whose rewards are more valuable than cash.

To quote the renowned Australia ethicist Peter Singer on animal rights, "The suffering we inflict on the animals while they are alive is perhaps an even clearer indication of our speciesism than the fact that we are prepared to kill them (for food). The question is not '*Can they reason?* [Or] *Can they talk?* [But] *Can they suffer?* **If a being suffers, there can be no moral justification** for refusing to take that suffering into consideration."

[Animal Liberation. Harper Perennial Press 1975]

Quoting our other monumental ethicist Richard Hare "Neither political liberty nor economic equality are of necessity good things of themselves." [P.166]
"It is in accordance with... [a rational, moral stance to such questions] to assign equal weight.. to all the preferences." [P.180]

(Moral Thinking: It's Levels Method and Point - OUP 1981)

Thus, firstly: Taking away the wildlife's peace and substituting that with terror is the epitome of a wilful consignment of suffering - and we ought be under an obligation to stop suffering wherever we see it.

Secondly: The benefit to humans of future economic profit (by building an airstrip for non-essential reasons), fails to treat the animals with the respect of equality. This is speciesism - every bit as abhorrent and unjustifiable as racism.

As a scientist and a wildlife rehabilitation officer, I can assert from direct personal evidential experience, that possums, gliders, macropods, birds and wombats <u>are</u> sentient. (And they are just the species I have direct experience with.) They experience fear and happiness, they dream (both good dreams and bad), they play, they have memories (also good memories and bad memories), they recognise

human faces and the names we temporarily give them, they make eye contact and when annoyed with you they will withdraw eye contact and will even shun you, and they mourn the deaths of those close to them. They are each a little individual with a distinct personality.

Given they <u>are</u> sentient, they fulfil Singer's requirement for equality of consideration.

I beseech the decision committee to act ethically: Consider the native wildlife and the noise impact of powered flight. Attribute their suffering equal measure and recognise our obligation to not create suffering.

- private joy flights and the noise they create would seriously undermine the integrity of the World Heritage Blue Mountains National Park
- noise created for the benefit of the few who can afford it will impact on the very reasons that visitors
  of all income-levels come to the mountains -- visitors who want to enjoy the peaceful ambience,
  nature in all its forms (bushwalking, rockclimbing, birdwatching etc), a relaxed cafe culture in the
  local villages etc
- while joy flights will benefit the private licensee, other tourist operators and accommodation providers will be disadvantaged from the inevitable downturn in visitor numbers -- visitors will use social media to share their experiences of how noise from helicopters spoiled their enjoyment
- with the upgrade of the highway, visitors can choose to bypass the upper mountains if the ambience has been destroyed, taking their weekend tourist dollars to Bathurst and Mudgee.
- locals who have chosen to live here to escape the noise of the city will have their peace and quiet severely impacted
- what will be the impact of regular helicopter noise on wildlife, especially nesting birds? (See case study below)
- once granted, a commercial lease will be unlikely to be revoked, thus creating a permanent disturbance on locals and the park

Please don't allow the short-term lure of financial gain for a few to seriously diminish this special place. Reserve the National Park for the activities that really matter. Protect the park's natural ambience for the benefit of everyong in the local and wider communities.

A local case study relevant to this submission: our bushcare group at Popes Glen (Blackheath) has received large government grants over 17 years to turn a weed-infested wasteland into a thriving wetland at the headwaters of Popes Glen Creek (which flows through the National Park and into the Gross River). Birds and frogs have returned to the area and the next project being considered is building a bird hide. We've recorded 57 species of birds in Popes Glen which would make it a focal point for visiting bird-watchers and interested tourists. This proposal would be greatly impacted by regular joy flights over nearby Govett's Leap -- the deep mountain valleys amplify the noise -- and possibly have to be abandoned. 

Badgerys Creek Airport will be only 1 hour's drive to Katoomba. The existing Bathurst airport is only 1 hour to Katoomba. Existing small air fields other than Katoomba already provide all the air landing facilities that anyone in the upper mountains could possibly need or want. An existing small air field is 1 hour or less by road from almost every village in the entire Blue Mountains.

## Bathurst airport, by road is:

- less than 1 hour to the upper mountains (Lithgow, Mount Victoria, Blackheath)
- 1 hour to Medlow Bath and Katoomba
- 1 hour 15 minutes to Wentworth Falls

## Camden airport, by road is:

- less than 1 hour to the lower mountains (Blaxland to Faulconbridge)
- 1 hour to the mid-mountains (Springwood to Bullaburra)
- 1 hour 15 minutes to Wentworth Falls

## SUBMISSION IF THE AIRFIELD IS NOT CLOSED

If the airfield is not closed and returned to forest I will be very disappointed that private profit has been given greater priority than the reality of premature deaths and serious damage to health for people who live near the airfield and near its flight paths.

Dear Scott Mullen,

I was recently made aware that Katoomba Airfield may possibly be granted a commercial licence. It was good meeting you, and thank you for the opportunity of commenting on the proposal.

While I support the use of Katoomba Airfield as an emergency airstrip, I wish to protest the proposal of a commercial licence in the strongest possible terms.

As a long term resident of the Blue Mountains I am well aware of the noise and disruption caused by helicopters. Every fire season and bushfire helicopters make themselves useful - this is appropriate in that it is a direct benefit to the residents.

A commercial licence is in-appropriate for the following reasons:-

- **1**. If 'Joy Flights' were permitted, the residents of Katoomba (population 7,964) and surrounding area would be subjected to between 6 and 8 hours of continuous noise **for each helicopter operating.** I live 7 km from the airstrip and, due to the topographical formations of this Heritage, I can still hear aircraft operating from the airstrip.
- **2.** The only people benefiting from the granting of this licence would be the helicopter and fixed wing operators, the licence owner (I have been told this is two people?) and the passengers. There will be of no benefit to the locals. **7,964 to 2 seems like a very unfair ratio to me.**
- 3. The promise of a Joy-Flight may be appealing to day tourists, but it is unlikely to create an increase the number of 'bums on beds' being booked in the Katoomba area. The best way to see the Blue Mountains Park has always been by 'Shanks' Pony'. One of the major tourist contributors to the Blue Montains are those who travel up here to experience the walks through this beautiful place. Helicopter noise with destroy their peace and quiet as well. And these people do contribute to putting 'bums on beds'
- **4. Local wildlife will be adversely affected** by the noise, pressure from the rotor cavitations and polution. Also, it is unknown what affect commercial use will have on other local environmental matters (ie: Hanging swamps, weed intrusion, groundwater contamination, etc. For example, The area around the airfield is a regular home to roosting Black Cockatoos.)
- 5. What damage will be caused by fuel exhaust? Anyone living under the flight paths at Sydney Airport will already be aware of the black, greasy,

residue, caused by aircraft exhaust, on horizontal surface around their homes. While I understand that the scale of operations is different, what will happen to the gum trees and other vegitation when exposed to fuel dumps and exhaust fumes over an extended (long term) period of the lease?

**6. All of the residents** I have spoken to migrated to the Blue Mountains to get away from the stink of petrol fumes, car noise, and the rush and turmoil of the city. They came here for solitude, and peace and quiet and to enjoy the clean air. Are we seriously going to let two petrol-heads, (who I am told don't even live in the Blue Mountains) destroy all that for the sake of greed?

The people of the Blue Mountains have worked long and hard to keep the area pristine and clear. We have said 'No!' to organisation like McDonalds from opening up fast-food outlets, and have instead encouraged and promoted Slo-Food, - why should this proposal, which is really only about 'money', be handled any differently.

I understand that when the Katoomba Airfield was closed (other than for emergency services) it was intended that it be returned to the National Park.


This was never done.

I wish to lodge my objection my strenuously to the above proposal, for the following reasons:-

I object to public land being used for commercial purposes and in particular, the emissions from said aircraft, noise, and seemingly lack of any control over number of flights.

This Crown land should be transferred to the National Park and protected. The working strip at this location should only be used for emergency purposes.

Any 'offset programs' proposed by the operators of Katoomba Airfield would be ineffective in addressing emissions. According to Professor Will Steffen for the Climate Council, carbon offsets involving tree planting for example, do not tackle the carbon that has been added to the atmosphere through fossil fuel use. In 2015, airlines spewed 781 million tonnes of co2 into the atmosphere: 2% of man-made co2 emissions. We certainly do not need any more.

The World Heritage National Park surrounding the Blue Mountains and its 27 villages is a major tourism drawcard. We cannot risk emissions and possible noise over this area from the aircraft frequently using this airfield. I am also concerned about the local amenity of residents living near the proposed airfield for aviation tourism.

Supposedly targeting high-end tourism, the proposed airport would do very little to contribute to low-impact cultural tourism, the most desirable form of tourism in our region with its potential to encourage visitors to explore our region for more than one day, experiencing both our unique built and natural environment on foot, or using existing sustainable ways of moving around, and in so doing, also support our local economy.

I am writing to you to object to the granting of a commercial lease for Katoomba Airfield.

I have lived in the upper Blue Mountains for much of my life and now reside in Springwood.

I know that the airfield has been operating for over 50 years and has had commercial leases operating over that period.

However, the current application for a commercial lease by FlyBlue presents a significant increase in the scale of operations compared to those of the past. I fear that this will have large adverse impacts upon the environment and community.

From your review of the submissions being made to you at this time, the overwhelming opposition to the granting of a commercial lease expressed by locals at the community consultation sessions held in Katoomba and the opposition expressed by over 12000 NSW citizens in the petition presented in the NSW parliament on 1<sup>st</sup> August, I believe the following outcomes must result:

- 1. NO commercial lease should be granted for the airfield
- 2. The airfield land be incorporated into in surrounding Blue Mountains National Park
- 3. The airfield be maintained for emergency use only and managed by NPWS with appropriate funding being provided for its upkeep.

The reasons for my opposition to the granting of a commercial lease follow:

#### 1. TOURISM AND NEGATIVE IMPACTS

The Blue Mountains is known for being a quiet, peaceful place, where millions of tourists flock each year. The noise impact generated by helicopters and other aircraft will reduce the enjoyment for hikers, climbers and canyoners. Many may not revisit the mountains for this reason.

Tourists who arrive or depart by helicopter or undertake pre-paid scenic helicopter tours (Joy flights) are likely to rely upon just a few operators for transport and accommodation. This will concentrate tourist dollars into a few hands and this will mean less money goes to the local economy, such as cafes, pubs, shops, and retail outlets.

## 2. ENVIRONMENTAL CONCERNS

Katoomba Airfield is completely surrounded by the Greater Blue Mountains World Heritage Area. Thousands of native species including endangered and threatened species live within this area. Flight paths and nesting areas of many birds including migratory birds will be disrupted by the impact of flights by helicopters and small planes taking place.

Damage to the surrounding rare hanging swamps can result from run-off and erosion caused by increased traffic on Grand Canyon road (especially the unsealed section leading to the airfield) as well as the proposed tarmacing of the runway.

Threats to the environment are posed by the transport of aviation fuel through parts of the GBMWHA and its storage at the airfield, where no town water supplies are present in case of emergency such as fire.

The GBMWHA's World Heritage status is up for review later this year, this may be affected by the granting of a lease which will allow significant air traffic operating from within the WHA and adds to that risk sur to the proposed changes to Warragamba Dam.

#### 3. LIFESTYLE AND AMENITY

Many residents of the Blue Mountains will be impacted by the noise of helicopters and small planes landing and taking off from Katoomba Airfield. While there are already some joy-flights over the area conducted by other operators which present some issues, this will greatly increase with flights taking off and landing within the WHA. Helicopter noise can travel long distances through the mountains which is dominated by cliffs and canyons and will affect many people in Wentworth Falls, Leura, Katoomba, North Katoomba, Medlow Bath and Blackheath.

Fly Neighbourly Advices (FNA's) is self-regulated. Breaches of an FNA are completely unenforceable and open to abuse.

Increased traffic on the roads leading to the airfield pose a risk and will diminish the amenity of people living in the upper Blue Mountains and in particular Medlow Bath. The roads are narrow, have blind corners and crests, pinch points where vehicles cannot safely pass each other and there are no footpaths for pedestrians and bushwalkers. There is an increased risk of accidents causing injury or worse when these roads are used by large fuel tankers, tourist coaches and other vehicles driven by people who are unfamiliar with the area.

#### 4. LACK OF TRANSPERANCY

The problem that I see with the proposed lease is that my community knows almost nothing about the number of flights that are being proposed and that the flight paths planned will take place over and operate from within the Greater Blue Mountains World Heritage Area and water catchment areas. We do not know anything about the scale of operations that are planned and what the future intentions of the applicants are given that I believe that they have requested a 50 year lease.

The local community has not been informed of the scale of the proposed operations. The lease applicants and the DoI have refused to release any information about this. How can people properly engage in community consultation when they have no information? Flight paths were only displayed at "drop-in sessions" at Hotel Blue but do not extend beyond the immediate vicinity of the airfield. The Lease Applicants have proposed that the airfield will act as a "hub and spoke" model leading to the central west of NSW but no information was presented about these flight paths.

In the past there have been numerous recommendations that the airfield be incorporated into the surrounding National Park when leases have expired. This does not look like it was even considered as an option when the DoI first put out a call for expressions of interest in 2017.

Why was the community not consulted about the appropriate use of such a sensitive site before they released a tender for a license by direct negotiation with a helicopter tourism business?

I consider that I have been fortunate to live in an area noted for its peace, tranquility and amazing natural beauty. I have a two children and wish very much for them to be able to appreciate the unspoiled beauty of this unique area, its flora and fauna and to not be witness to an area which has been damaged and diminished by development, such as the current lease application, which has gone too far and which benefits a very small few at the expense of so many others.

For these reasons, I believe you must reach the outcomes I noted at the beginning of this submission. The non-approval of the application and the airfield's incorporation into the GBMWHA under the management of NPWS will see our sensitive and beautiful environment

protected that all may experience it natural beauty and wonder, both now and into the future.

I hope you consider my submission carefully.

I have no issues with my submission being published but do not wish my address to be included.

I am a long term resident of The Blue Mountains and been lucky enough to be employed up here for all of it, most of this time in tourism. I understand how important tourism is to the Blue Mountains but how vital it is that this is balanced with protecting the National Park, the World Heritage listing and the people who live up here.

The airstrip at Medlow Bath is of course attractive to tourist operators but is unlikely to create an increased tourist demand to the area just another attraction for people already up here to enjoy. It would definitely increase noise, pollution and negatively impact the quiet lifestyle people enjoy here and probably pose a risk to World Heritage listing.

Even ignoring those reasons the fact that the airstrip is on Crown Land should mean that it is precluded from exploitation of commercial operators looking for a quick profit. I also think that this land should be transferred to the National Park and protected forever with the one proviso of keeping the airstrip operational for emergency use only. I had friends lose houses in bushfires and the ability to have use of this airstrip could help mitigate these tragedies.

Please don't allow short term commercial interests to take precedence over the natural environment.
